# Work Going On (cont.)

- The Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI)
  - Is the clearinghouse for geological hazards in Oregon
  - Has mapped many landslide areas in the SLIDO database
  - Works with the Federal Emergency Management
     Agency (FEMA) on flood hazards

# Work Going On (cont.)

- Counties must take some flood plain mitigation measures to be eligible for federal flood insurance
- Building codes discourage the location of some facilities in tsunami areas
- Oregon Office of Emergency Management focuses on tsunami, earthquake, and volcanic hazards
  - Mostly provides education

## What Have we Done in Oregon?

- Mapped hazards
- Raised awareness
- Taken some first mitigation steps
  - Building codes
- Provided some guidance to local governments for certain natural hazards
  - Some local governments have stepped up and taken even more steps
- The vast majority of the work has focused on tsunamis and earthquakes

# Oregon's Statewide Land Use Planning Goals

- 19 goals that provide non-binding guidance on how local governments should plan for future development
- Most of the goals have also been implemented in rule or statute
  - This <u>requires</u> local governments to take them into account
  - Often there are standards that must be met or processes that must be completed
  - Often there are also "safe harbors" that provide a simple cookie cutter way of satisfying the goal

#### Oregon's Statewide Planning Goals and Guidelines GOAL 7: AREAS SUBJECT TO NATURAL HAZARDS

To protect people and property from natural hazards.

#### A. NATURAL HAZARD PLANNING

- Local governments shall adopt comprehensive plans (inventories, policies and implementing measures) to reduce risk to people and property from natural hazards.
- 2. Natural hazards for purposes of this goal are: floods (coastal and riverine), landslides,<sup>1</sup> earthquakes and related hazards, tsunamis, coastal erosion, and wildfires. Local governments may identify and plan for other natural hazards.

property based on the new inventory information and an assessment of:

- a. the frequency, severity and location of the hazard;
- b. the effects of the hazard on existing and future development;
- c. the potential for development in the hazard area to increase the frequency and severity of the hazard; and
- d. the types and intensities of land uses to be allowed in the hazard area.
- Allow an opportunity for citizen review and comment on the new inventory information and the results of the evaluation and incorporate such information into the comprehensive plan, as necessary.

#### Goal 7 – Natural Hazards

- Goal 7 encompasses
  - Tsunamis and earthquakes
  - A host of hazards exacerbated by climate change including coastal and riverine flooding, coastal erosion, landslides, and wildfires
- Has not been implemented in rule or in statute
  - So there is a patchwork of regulation and little attention paid to natural hazards by many local governments
- It is important to implement Goal 7 so that we ensure that local governments take natural hazards into account when they are planning for future development
