

Vote Yes on SB 320

Support Economic Development and Addressing Food Deserts

SB 320 offers a low-risk, scale-appropriate regulation to enable aspiring small business food entrepreneurs the opportunity to meet the unmet demand for baked goods and confections in communities throughout Oregon.

Under this bill, sellers of low production baked goods sold directly to consumers would not be required to have a food processing license, which start at \$152 per year.

- Required to follow all food safety and sanitation regulations
- Food handlers card required
- Low-risk baked goods only: goods that do not require temperature control (hot or cold) to keep the product safe from attracting or incubating harmful micro-organisms.
- Direct sales only: no wholesale or retail.
- Limits to maximum of \$20,000 in gross sales annually. If a business operates above this limit, it would need to acquire a license and registration from ODA.
- Robust labeling requirements, including address, allergens, ingredients and indication that goods are produced in an uninspected kitchen
- Oregon Department of Agriculture has the authority to inspect and require a license if there are concerns about food safety
- No marijuana
- No internet sales
