Requires Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries to establish toll-free telephone hotline to receive inquiries related to employment status of persons who perform live entertainment.

Local Government Mandate:

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Analysis: This bill would require the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries to implement and maintain a toll-free line to receive inquires and complaints related to employment in the performance of live entertainment. The toll-free line would be required to be staffed by certified social workers or individuals who have a background in providing live entertainment as an independent contractor.

This bill represents a new activity not currently contemplated in the budget for the Bureau of Labor and Industries. No source of funding is identified in the measure. BOLI anticipates a cost of \$138,909 and 1.0 FTE to staff the phone line (presumably funded with General Fund). This fiscal impact statement is for the purpose of transmitting the measure from the House Committee on Business and Labor to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means. The agency anticipates having a fiscal impact associated with this bill, the amount of this impact is still being determined. A more complete fiscal analysis on the bill will be prepared as the measure is considered in the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.
