WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Defines delegated entity as a dental care organization, mental health organization or similar organizational provider. Directs Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to conduct annual external quality review of each coordinated care organization (CCO), to notify all CCOs of the information about a delegated entity. If OHA has contracted with a contract review organization, directs OHA to provide all the CCOs with the information from the delegated entity.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Cumbersome duplicate audits
- Need to streamline
- Burden to CCOs
- Creating an "audit bank"

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:

BACKGROUND:

A coordinated care organization (CCO) is a network of all types of health care providers (physical health care, addictions and mental health care and sometimes dental care providers) who have agreed to work together in their local communities to serve people who receive health care coverage under the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid). CCOs are focused on prevention and helping people manage chronic conditions, like diabetes, which helps reduce unnecessary emergency room visits and gives people support to be healthy. Today, there are 16 CCOs operating in communities around Oregon.

The CCOs are local entities that have one budget that grows at a fixed rate for mental, physical and dental care. They are accountable for the health outcomes of their population and are governed by a partnership among health care providers, community members and stakeholders.
