## House Bill 2801

Sponsored by Representative GOMBERG

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Directs Department of Education to distribute moneys as strategic investment under Oregon Early Reading Program to nonprofit organizations that provide academically-aligned, evidence-based literacy programs through volunteer mentors who are 50 years of age or older to school districts for purpose of increasing delivery of reading assistance to students in kindergarten through third grade. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to early reading programs; amending ORS 327.810; and declaring an emergency. 2

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: 3

SECTION 1. ORS 327.810 is amended to read: 4
