House Joint Memorial 14

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Requests that Department of Veterans Affairs Portland Regional Benefit Office release data regarding Patient-Centered Community Care program.

JOINT MEMORIAL

To the Secretary of Veterans Affairs and the Director of the Department of Veterans Affairs

Portland Regional Benefit Office:

We, your memorialists, the Seventy-eighth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in leg

5 islative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:

6 Whereas the State of Oregon should ensure access to timely and quality health care for Oregon 7 veterans no matter where they live; and

8 Whereas rural veterans often have to drive several hours, sometimes in hazardous road condi-

9 tions, to receive medically necessary treatment or procedures from Department of Veterans Affairs 0. (VA) medical contary; and

10 (VA) medical centers; and

11 Whereas the Patient-Centered Community Care (PC3) program is a five-year program awarding 12 contracts amounting to over \$9 billion to companies for the purpose of setting up networks to pro-13 vide timely and quality care through veterans' local providers and eliminate long, costly and often 14 treacherous drives to distant VA medical centers; and

15 Whereas health care providers and veterans in central Oregon had been calling for a program 16 similar to PC3 seven years ago; and

Whereas in implementing PC3, the VA stated goals of reducing costs in providing health care as well as reducing wait times; and

19 Whereas PC3 was initiated in September 2013 and has now been operating for around 18 months,

20 enrolling providers and patients in the program; and

21 Whereas the VA should now have enough data to provide the public with numbers showing the 22 effectiveness of PC3 to date; and

23 Whereas the VA has yet to provide information showing the number of veterans served by 24 Community-Based Outpatient Clinics at the city, county or state level, the number of providers en-25 rolled by PC3 contractors, waiting times or funds expended by the PC3 contractors; and

26 Whereas PC3 and the new but also temporary VA Choice Program have the potential to become 27 permanent medical community cooperative programs; now, therefore,

28 Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

That we, the members of the Seventy-eighth Legislative Assembly, respectfully request that the Department of Veterans Affairs Portland Regional Benefit Office make public information on the

31 Patient-Centered Community Care program, including data on the program's effectiveness and the

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- 1 number of veterans served by the program; and be it further
- 2 Resolved, That a copy of this memorial shall be sent to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs and
- 3 to the Director of the Department of Veterans Affairs Portland Regional Benefit Office.

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
