# Senate Bill 429

Sponsored by Senator KRUSE (Presession filed.)

### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Provides that new State Board of Education established under Oregon Constitution shall consist of 11 members appointed by Governor to represent kindergarten through grade 12, community colleges and public universities.

Directs State Board of Education to appoint Superintendent of Public Instruction. Directs existing State Board of Education to convene work group on seamless educational system transition. Requires work group to file reports.

Takes effect only if Senate Joint Resolution 7 (2015) is approved by people at next regular general election.

Takes effect July 1, 2017.

(1) The State Board of Education shall consist of 11 members. 10 (2) The members of the board shall be appointed by the Governor from among the resi-11 dents of this state as follows: 12 (a) Five members representing kindergarten through grade 12, one from each of the five 13congressional districts. When selecting the members, the Governor shall consider a list of 14 persons that is jointly submitted by an organization representing school employees, an or-15 ganization representing school administrators and an organization representing school district boards. The list shall consist of a total of 15 persons and shall provide the names of 16 17 three persons from each congressional district. 18 (b) Three members representing public universities listed in ORS 352.002. When selecting the members, the Governor shall consider a list of persons that is submitted by an organ-19 20 ization representing public universities. The list shall consist of a total of five persons. 21(c) Three members representing community colleges. When selecting the members, the 22 Governor shall consider a list of persons that is submitted by an organization representing 23community colleges. The list shall consist of a total of five persons. 24 (3) A member of the board shall serve for a term of four years and may not serve more 25than two consecutive full terms. Appointments are subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565. 26 27(4) Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a succes1 sor whose term begins on the following July 1.

2 (5) The Governor may remove a member of the board for cause at any time after notice
3 and public hearing. A vacancy occurring in a position shall be filled as provided in ORS
4 326.031.

(6) The members of the board shall be nonpartisan.

6 (7) A member of the board may not engage in teaching or participate in the adminis-7 tration or operation of any school, community college or public university listed in ORS 8 352.002 while serving on the board.

9 SECTION 2. Notwithstanding section 1 of this 2015 Act, the members first appointed to
 10 the State Board of Education as provided by section 1 of this 2015 Act shall determine by lot
 11 the length of their terms such that:

12 (1) Five shall serve a term expiring on July 1, 2019; and

13 (2) Six shall serve a term expiring on July 1, 2021.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> (1) On June 30, 2017, the terms of office of the current members of the State
 Board of Education expire.

16 (2) Notwithstanding the prohibition under section 1 of this 2015 Act against a person 17 serving more than two consecutive full terms as a board member, a member is eligible for 18 reappointment to the board if the member's term of office is terminated pursuant to this 19 section.

An appointee for a vacancy must comply with the membership requirements of section 1 (2) of this 2015 Act. The term of an appointee for 28a vacancy under this section expires at the end of the unexpired term. 29

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1 (2) By April 15 next after the date an appointment takes effect, every appointed public official 2 on a board or commission listed in subsection (1) of this section shall file with the Oregon Govern-3 ment Ethics Commission a statement of economic interest as required under ORS 244.060, 244.070 4 and 244.090.

5 (3) By April 15 next after the filing deadline for the primary election, each candidate described 6 in subsection (1) of this section shall file with the commission a statement of economic interest as 7 required under ORS 244.060, 244.070 and 244.090.

8 (4) Within 30 days after the filing deadline for the general election, each candidate described in 9 subsection (1) of this section who was not a candidate in the preceding primary election, or who 10 was nominated for public office described in subsection (1) of this section at the preceding primary 11 election by write-in votes, shall file with the commission a statement of economic interest as re-12 quired under ORS 244.060, 244.070 and 244.090.

430.241. (1) As used in this section and ORS 430.242:

(a) "Local government" means a local government as defined in ORS 174.116 that receives state
 or federal funding for programs that provide alcohol or drug prevention or treatment services.

(b) "Participating state agency" means the Youth Development Division, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Human Services, the Oregon Health Authority, the Department of Education, the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, the Oregon State Police, the Oregon Youth Authority or any other state agency that is approved by the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission to license, contract for, provide or coordinate alcohol or drug prevention or treatment services.

(1) The members of the Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary Action and Service must be citizens of this state who have a proven commitment to community service and who have a demonstrated interest in fostering and nurturing citizen involvement as a strategy for strengthening communities and promoting the ethic of service in all sectors of this state.

(2) The Governor shall appoint as members of the commission at least one of each of the fol-lowing:

(a) An individual with experience in educational, training and development needs of youth, par ticularly disadvantaged youth.

30 (b) An individual with experience in promoting involvement of older adults in service and 31 volunteerism.

32 (c) A representative of community-based agencies or organizations within this state.

33 (d) The [Deputy] Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee.

34 (e) A representative of local governments in this state.
