Re: HB 5203: Dedicate Lottery-Backed Bonds for Preservation of Existing Affordable Housing

Co-Chair Girod, Co-Chair Read, Members of the Committee:

I am the Executive Director of Community Action Team (CAT), the anti-poverty nonprofit that serves Clatsop, Tillamook and Columbia counties. Since 1984, we have been working to preserve public and private housing, including the homes of low-income homeowners, owners of manufactured homes (in parks or on private land) and affordable rental housing. This current housing crisis is the worst we have ever experienced.

CAT is also the emergency housing provider in these counties. This crisis has made housing the homeless, very much more difficult. Our unfulfilled priority is families with kids. Part of this results from increasing need. But today, our biggest problem is the absence of available units, at any price. Our homeless families often find they have been placed on a list with dozens of other families competing for the same home. For many, this happens, again and again. Without a home, it is impossible for these families to turn their lives around.

We must find a way to preserve our existing housing stock, in particular those homes that are affordable to low and very low-income families. These homes are disappearing faster than public and private efforts can replace them. In hot markets like this one, low-income apartment buildings with rental assistance are more valuable taken out of their federal programs. The land under manufactured home parks becomes more valuable for new development, leaving very poor "homeowners" with an old singlewide, which no other park will accept.

Since 2006, the Preservation program created with Lottery Backed Bonds has preserved nearly 9,000 of these units at a cost to the state of just under \$14,000 each. This is just 5% of the cost of new affordable units. This is the cheapest source of affordable housing we have.

Please support HB 5203. It is our most cost efficient tool to build and maintain the pool of affordable units in our communities. Thank you for your service.
