Early Learning Division and Council

Early Learning Workforce and Child Care Subsidies for Families

- High cost of child care and cost burden on parents
- Tax credit utilization
- Relationship between low wages of providers, turnover and family stability
- Pathways to early learning workforce and degrees needed
- Portability of background checks for child care workforce
- Qualifications to receive child care subsidies and the “cliff”
- Equity in child care services
- Fairness of market-based payments in employment-related day care
- Child care needs do not end at five

Early Intervention in Special Education

- Funding has not kept pace with costs
- Unserved children and families
 - Services are below recommended levels
 - Most in need are getting lowest number of services
- Need improved screening and referral
