Co-Chair Johnson, Co-Chair Gomberg, Members of the Committee:

At Community Action Team in St. Helens, the Emergency Housing Account (EHA) is our most valuable tool to prevent and end homelessness. It makes miracles happen in our community every day. The program's unique flexibility has allowed us to effectively serve more families in need.

In 2016, the legislature allocated an additional \$10 million to the Emergency Housing Account due to the dramatic need for housing assistance across the state. Our agency used our portion of the funding to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless and to help those who are experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized.

Due to the lack of housing or affordable housing in our community, the main focus of EHA funding was prevention, we helped individuals and families remain in their existing housing. Many families are just a paycheck away from losing their homes with little or no flexibility in their budgets to deal with unexpected costs.

The additional EHA funds allowed us to prevent eviction for 46 households. Some of these families only needed assistance for one month while others were in need of support for a little longer. In addition to providing rent payment assistance, we helped each family create a budget and get connected to other resources both internally and externally.

These dollars also allowed us to provide assistance to 18 households who were experiencing homelessness. The flexibility of EHA gives us the ability to work more efficiently when it pertains to assisting clients with their housing needs. We were able to provide deposit assistance, first and last month's rent, and screening fees. We are pleased to report that 100% of these families continue to remain housed, six months after being served.

Adequately funding The Emergency Housing Account will ensure that we are able to serve those in our community who need it most.
