Our Principles

- Oregon statutory authority for emergency preparation and response starts at the local level.
 Priorities of local communities should be elevated with state, federal, and tribal partners to
 effectively improve resilience. Individuals closest to emergencies often know best what a
 community needs to survive and recover from an emergency. Bureaucratic processes and rules
 frequently delay the implementation of mitigation efforts or hinder emergency response and
 recovery, and red tape should be actively minimized.
- Resilience depends upon a variety of other policy areas, including public health, land-use
 planning, housing, public safety, transportation, energy, and many others. Interconnection and
 coordination of these too often separated efforts is a core concern of the Resilience
 Subcommittee.
- AOC supports improving the resilience of whole communities and county government against every hazard, including earthquakes, tsunamis, wildfires, active shooters, terrorist events, flooding, and storm events, among others.
- Preparing for an emergency is not enough: counties and partners also respond to the incident, maximize life safety, mitigate impacts, build capacity, and recover as flourishing communities.
- Maximizing county resilience requires engaging and collaborating with all partners as individuals and communities.
