TESTIMONY

Oregon Legislature ... Senate Rules Committee
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I commend your Senate Rules Committee for considering Senate Concurrent Resolution 14 concerning Executive Order #9066, a National "Day of Remembrance" and acknowledge the injustices suffered by our Japanese people during those dark days of World War II.

- I was a youngster, but in December, 1941, awoke as an American Citizen ... then days later went to sleep an Enemy Alien.
- The Executive Order brought additional Exclusion Orders: that ordered a Curfew singling out only Japanese, placed a Family Number onto us ... Evacuation.
- Our family lost everything ... all our possessions, my father lost three modest businesses, our family heirlooms, my sister lost her prized full set of Japanese Girl's Day dolls.

We were removed to the Portland Assembly Center, former North Portland Livestock Yards:

- This facility was fresh from being home to horse stalls, pig pens, chicken coops.
- I can never forget upon entering the building the smell of livestock urine, the pungent odor of manure underneath the wooden floors ..
- We were surrounded by armed guards, some with fixed bayonets.
- We were ordered to stuff "hay" into these canvas bags to serve as "our mattresses"
- Pigeons and thousands of flies buzzing all around us.
- We ate in two shifts, held "class" using the central arena benches.

• Yes, 3,767 of us ... in this barbed-wired barn during the summer of 1942.

We were then put aboard trains ... headed East – we knew not to where? We did not travel those days ... back in the 1930s, 1940s.

- Ended up in a Sea of Sagebrush, in remote, desolate
 Minidoka, about 20 miles NE of the town of Twin Falls, ID.
- 44 Blocks, tar-papered, non-insulated Barracks.
- We lined up for everything: to eat, to shower, to do our laundry ... even remember lining up for our two rolls of toilet paper once a week.
- Minidoka one of 10 American Concentration Camps ... scattered over several Western States.
- 120,000 Japanese were incarcerated ...
- Largest singling out and stripping of Freedoms from any ethnic group ... since Slavery.
- Our Block #34 had no water for two weeks; I had to bring pails to Block # 36 twice a day to get our water.
- Eight guard towers, armed guards, barbed wires encircled the entire Minidoka camp.
- We worked, built our schools, dental office, playground, hospital, even dug a huge hole for our "swimming pool"
- President FDR himself called these "American Concentration Camps"... referred to us as "Inmates".

1943 the U. S. Government/U. S Army decided to accept volunteers from camps and Hawaii into an all Japanese segregated United States Army unit.

- They formed the 442nd Regimental Combat Team.
- Fought in N. Africa, Italy, France, Germany
- They rescued the "Lost Battalion" suffering heavy casualties.
- They liberated the French town of Breyere ..
- They liberated the largest sub-camp of Dachau ..
- They ended their service as the most highly decorated unit in American military history ... 9,400 purple hearts, a number of Medals of Honors, etc.

• Japanese American soldiers giving their supreme sacrifice all while their parents were incarcerated behind barbed wires in concentration camps back in the USA.

Allow me to share how my parents finally became USA Citizens, back in 1952.

- My mother did not speak English forced to take her exam in English. Passed.
- 75 first generation elders ... Issei ... were sworn in as new American Citizens.
- No prouder group of Americans. Voted in every election thereafter.

WHY? Why were Japanese singled out? Why Exec Order # 9066?

- With no crime committed, no trial, no due process ...
- Single reason: Because of Who We Are ...

Freedom is Fragile ... We cannot be Careless with our Constitution

- It was a Dark Chapter in American history
- Not found in many school textbooks

May I suggest ... as you deliberate and consider: Concurrent Resolution # 14...

As one voice amongst those 120,000 of us "stripped of our freedom" and spending four years behind barbed wires...

The only right action, the right move is in full support and a strong Yes ... so America and Oregonians will not ever forget the injustices suffered by the Japanese people way back when ..
