Revenue Summary

The Health Related Licensing Boards (HRLB) is comprised of six independent licensing boards supported by Other Funds revenues primarily derived from examination, application, and licensing fees. The boards are combined into one agency for the ease of budgetary reporting; however each has a separate limitation within the bill that is approved by the Legislature.

Oregon Mortuary and Cemetery Board

The Subcommittee approved an additional \$99,338 Other Funds revenues, to reflect payments from the other five HRLBs for their respective proportion of the costs for a shared Accountant 2 position (1.00 FTE) established in Package 801.

Board of Medical Imaging

The Subcommittee approved an additional \$48,950 Other Funds revenues generated from criminal background check fees on all new applicants for any license or permit offered by the Board. The establishment of criminal background check fees is contingent on the passage of House Bill 5031.

Oregon Veterinary Medical Examining Board

The Subcommittee approved \$150,000 Other Funds revenues generated from the establishment of a \$150 annual veterinary facility registration fee, which is contingent on the passage of House Bill 2474.

Summary of Education Subcommittee Action

Oregon Mortuary and Cemetery Board

The Oregon Mortuary and Cemetery Board regulate the individuals and facilities engaged in the care, preparation, processing, transportation, and final disposition of human remains through licensing, inspection, and disciplinary programs. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$1,718,440 Other Funds and seven positions (7.00 FTE). The budget reflects an 18.8 percent increase from the 2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget and provides the Board with an ending balance of \$900,849, which is approximately 12.6 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

- Package 101 Indigent Disposition Fund Administration and Records Inspection: provides \$22,888 Other Funds limitation to increase the FTE of an existing vacant Office Specialist 1 permanent position from 0.71 FTE to 1.00 FTE and to reclassify the position to an Administrative Specialist 1. This position will conduct the administrative functions required for the operation of the Indigent Disposition Fund, including processing applications and payments. In order to accomplish this, the Board will enter into an inter-agency agreement with the Oregon Health Authority, which currently oversees the administration of the fund. House Bill 3243 (2015) would transfer this fund from the Oregon Health Authority to the Oregon Mortuary and Cemetery Board.
- Package 801 LFO Analyst Adjustment: provides \$154,707 Other Funds expenditure limitation and establishes a full-time Accountant 2 position (1.00 FTE) to provide the budget and accounting functions for all of HRLB. Previously, the HRLB utilized DAS Shared Client Services for these functions. The cost of the position will be distributed among the other HRLB in proportion to their previous usage rate when utilizing DAS Shared Client Services, and will be paid through Professional Services expenditure limitation.

Oregon Board of Naturopathic Medicine

The Oregon Board of Naturopathic Medicine regulates naturopathic physicians through licensing and disciplinary programs. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$711,566 Other Funds and three positions (2.50 FTE), which is an 8.9 percent increase from the 2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget provides the Board with an ending balance of \$216,503, which is approximately 7.3 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

• Package 801 – LFO Analyst Adjustment: eliminates \$867 Other Funds expenditure limitation. This reduction represents the Board's proportion of the prorated cost savings by sharing an Accountant 2 position, established under the Mortuary and Cemetery Board, for the purpose of providing budget and accounting services, in lieu of using DAS Shared Client Services. The Board's estimated share of the position is \$18,244, or 12 percent, which will be paid out of Professional Services.

Occupational Therapy Licensing Board

The Occupational Therapy Licensing Board regulates the practice of occupational therapy through licensing and disciplinary programs. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$457,585 Other Funds and two positions (1.50 FTE), which is a 20.4 percent increase from the

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2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget provides the Board with an ending balance of \$174,413, which is approximately 9.2 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

- Package 120 Increased Administrative Workload: provides \$61,870 Other Funds expenditure limitation to increase the FTE of an
 existing Office Specialist 2 position from 0.25 FTE to 0.50 FTE and to reclassify the position to an Administrative Specialist 2. This
 reclassification will allow the position to conduct more complex duties, including rule-making and assisting with complaint investigation.
 The increase in FTE will also allow the Board to keep up with its increasing administrative workload.
- Package 801 LFO Analyst Adjustment: eliminates \$867 Other Funds expenditure limitation. This reduction represents the Board's proportion of the prorated cost savings by sharing an Accountant 2 position, established under the Mortuary and Cemetery Board, for the purpose of providing budget and accounting services, in lieu of using DAS Shared Client Services. The Board's estimated share of the position is \$10,982, or seven percent, which will be paid out of Professional Services.

Board of Medical Imaging

The Oregon Board of Medical Imaging licenses and regulates radiographers, radiation therapists, limited x-ray machine operators, nuclear medicine technologists, sonographers, and MRI technologists. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$931,219 Other Funds and three positions (3.00 FTE), which is an 8.7 percent increase from the 2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget provides the Board with an ending balance of \$201,013, which is approximately 5.2 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

- Package 130 Fingerprint Background Check Fee: provides \$48,950 Other Funds limitation for criminal background checks. The Board plans to do fingerprint background checks on all new applicants for any license or permit offered by the Board. The charge for the fingerprints will be \$52 with the Board retaining \$7.50 and the remainder of \$44.50 passed through to the Oregon State Police.
- Package 801 LFO Analyst Adjustment: eliminates \$867 Other Funds expenditure limitation. This reduction represents the Board's proportion of the prorated cost savings by sharing an Accountant 2 position, established under the Mortuary and Cemetery Board, for the purpose of providing budget and accounting services, in lieu of using DAS Shared Client Services. The Board's estimated share of the position is \$31,423, or 20 percent, which will be paid out of Professional Services.

Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology

The Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology regulates Speech-Language Pathologists, Speech-Language Pathology Assistants, and Audiologists through licensing and disciplinary programs. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$665,948 Other Funds and three positions (2.50 FTE), which is a 22.4 percent increase from the 2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget provides the Board with an ending balance of \$189,236, which is approximately 6.8 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

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- Package 140 Investigative Workload and Background Checks: provides \$95,691 Other Funds expenditure limitation to establish a limited duration part-time Investigator 2 position (0.50 FTE) to address the increased investigative caseload and the initiation of fingerprint-based background checks for new applicants. This package does not include additional expenditure limitation for potential Attorney General costs that were requested. If Attorney General costs are increased as a result of adding the investigator position, the Board should return to the Legislature in 2016 for additional expenditure limitation.
- Package 801 LFO Analyst Adjustment: eliminates \$867 Other Funds expenditure limitation. This reduction represents the Board's proportion of the prorated cost savings by sharing an Accountant 2 position, established under the Mortuary and Cemetery Board, for the purpose of providing budget and accounting services, in lieu of using DAS Shared Client Services. The Board's estimated share of the position is \$12,565, or eight percent, which will be paid out of Professional Services.

Oregon Veterinary Medical Examining Board

The Oregon Veterinary Medical Examining Board regulates the veterinary professions in Oregon through enforcement of the Veterinary Practice Act. The Subcommittee approved a budget of \$910,136 Other Funds and four positions (3.50 FTE), which is a 20.4 percent increase from the 2013-15 Legislatively Approved Budget. The budget, which includes the establishment of an annual veterinary facility registration fee, provides the Board with an ending balance of \$426,733, which is approximately 11.3 months of operating expenses.

The Subcommittee approved the following:

- Package 150 Increased Veterinary Investigative Workload: provides \$110,705 Other Funds expenditure limitation to establish a permanent full-time Investigator 2 position (0.75 FTE). The position is anticipated to begin January 1, 2016 once the program is established. This position will conduct initial and random yearly annual inspections of registered veterinary facilities. This package also includes revenues of \$150,000 Other Funds for the establishment of a \$150 annual veterinary facility registration fee. The registration of veterinary facilities program is contingent on passage of House Bill 2474.
- Package 801 LFO Analyst Adjustment: eliminates \$867 Other Funds expenditure limitation. This reduction represents the Board's proportion of the prorated cost savings by sharing an Accountant 2 position, established under the Mortuary and Cemetery Board, for the purpose of providing budget and accounting services, in lieu of using DAS Shared Client Services. The Board's estimated share of the position is \$26,144, or 17 percent, which will be paid out of Professional Services.

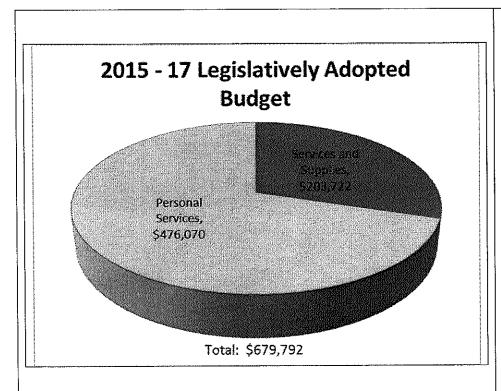

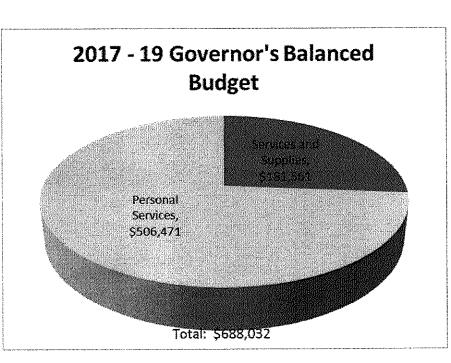

The Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology (BSPA) is one agency, one program, totally supported by Other Funds.

1.b. Mission Statement and Statutory Authority

The Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology (BSPA) seeks to protect the public by licensing and regulating the performance of Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs), Audiologists, and Speech-Language Pathology Assistants (SLPs).

681.420 Powers and duties; rules. The State Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology shall:

- (1) Administer, coordinate and enforce the provisions of this chapter;
- (2) Evaluate the qualifications of applicants for any license as issued under this chapter and supervise the examination of such applicants;
- (3) Investigate persons engaging in practices which violate the provisions of this chapter;
- (4) Conduct hearings and keep records and minutes as the board deems necessary to an orderly dispatch of business;
- (5) Adopt rules and regulations, including but not limited to governing ethical standards of practice under this chapter; and
- (6) Adopt a seal by which the board shall authenticate its proceedings. Copies of the proceedings, records and acts of the board, signed by the executive director or chairperson of the board and stamped with the seal, shall be prima facie evidence of the truth of such documents. [Formerly 694.465; 1995 c.280 §18; 2005 c.698 §18]

The authority and responsibilities of the Board are contained in the Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 681.205 through 681.605, and in Oregon Administrative Rules (OAR) 335-001-0000 through 335-095-0065.

1.c. Agency Strategic or Business Plans

The Mission and Program of BSPA dovetails closely with the Governor's five focus areas for state government:

- A Seamless System of Education Audiologists and Speech-Language Pathologists are critical professionals in Oregon's education system. Their work in Early Intervention, Early Childhood Special Education programs and in private practice to help students enter Kindergarten "ready-to-learn." Preschool and K-12 students with Individualized Education Plans (IEP) including autism and communication, language and hearing disorders must receive their IEP evaluations and treatment from licensed Audiologists and Speech-Language Pathologists.
- A Thriving Oregon Economy There is a chronic shortage of Audiologists, Speech-Language Pathologists and Speech-Language Pathology Assistants across the country. More people move to Oregon on a percentage basis than any other state, so with both a thriving economy and a shortage of professionals, the demand for these licensed professionals is strong.
- Excellence in State Government The Board values transparency in its work and updated its public information and transparency policy in November, 2015. BSPA goals include providing excellent customer service, processing licenses in a timely manner, conducting fair

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investigations and closing cases in a timely manner, participating in Board member training and other courses for staff and board members offered through ilearn and other organizations.

- Safer, Healthier Communities Protecting public safety is the Mission of BSPA. The Board issues licenses, and regulates and enforces its statues and rules relating to ethics, professional competence, professional conduct and unlicensed practice. Audiologists and SLPs work in hospitals, nursing homes, schools, private practices and home health settings.
- Responsible Environmental Stewardship While this focus area is not the primary program of BSPA, the Board works to protect the environment by deploying automatic shut off lights, working toward a paperless office, utilization of online fillable forms for our licensees, online bi-annual renewal system, and supporting stewardship efforts conducted by teams in the greater Portland State Office Building.

According to Oregon Revised Statutes (681.220), it is the policy of the State of Oregon that is is necessary to provide regulatory authority over persons offering speech-language pathology and audiology services to the public in order to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare, protect the public from being misled by incompetent, unscrupulous and unauthorized persons, protect the public from unprofessional conduct by qualified speech-language pathologists and audiologists, and to help ensure the availability of the highest possible quality speech-language pathology and audiology services to people of this state who have communication disabilities. SLPs, SLPAs, and audiologists provide services to children, seniors, and disabled and/or vulnerable adults. SLPs treat swallowing disorders in patients with traumatic brain injury or stroke, and their clinical judgment can mean life or death for these patients at risk for aspiration. Incompetent hearing and speech professionals can have a significant negative impact on the appropriate development or rehabilitation of patients in their care. Any licensee exhibiting inappropriate behavior such as client abuse, boundary issues, and professional impairment can endanger or otherwise victimize Oregonians. Recent Board actions have addressed all these issues.

The Board's overall strategic goals include the following:

- Continuously improve administrative efficiency and effectiveness through identifying, developing and implementing best practices for customer service, licensing, investigation, disciplinary actions, and administration
- Improve licensee understanding of Board policies and processes
- Maintain or increase access to high quality speech and hearing services provided through licensed professionals
- Further develop partnerships with other licensing and regulatory agencies to achieve mutual aims
- Transparency in all of its dealings in accordance with Oregon law.

For the 2017-19 Biennium, the Board has identified four major strategic priorities, which relate to its public protection mission:

1. Create standards governing telepractice of speech-language pathology and audiology in Oregon.

2. Study the concept and potential statutes and rules for a new category of licensure – audiology assistants.

3. Review and clarify SLPA rules, work with school administrators and special education directors to ensure they utilize SLPAs according to Oregon law.

4. Implement the new workforce data collection law during license renewals.

Agency Program Description

The Agency is comprised of one program that regulates the practice of speech-language pathology and audiology and licenses speech-language pathologists, speech-language pathology assistants, and audiologists in the state of Oregon. The Board's functions are entirely supported by Other Funds; specifically by licensing fees and related administrative charges (such as delinquent fees, civil penalties, and sales of licensee mailing lists).

The Board regulates the professional practice of speech-language pathology and audiology through reviewing credentials for licensure, ongoing monitoring of licensees through compliance audits, and investigating complaints regarding professional competence and conduct. BSPA issues licenses to qualified applicants on an ongoing basis, and renews licenses biennially. All regular licenses must be renewed by December 31st of odd numbered years to be considered timely. This creates a very uneven revenue cycle, with 90% of BSPA's revenue historically realized in November/December/January of each new biennium.

BSPA references national standards developed by the American Speech-language Hearing Association (ASHA) regarding scope of practice, required education and training, and professional and ethical standards. BSPA also solicits input from the Oregon Academy of Audiology (OAA) and Oregon Speech-Language Hearing Association (OSHA) regarding issues important to licensees.

The Board regulates the professional practice of speech-language pathology and audiology through ongoing monitoring of licensees, including investigations regarding professional competence and conduct. The Board receives complaints and reviews them to determine whether the complaints fall within the Board's authority, and, if so, obtains information to establish whether a violation of statutes or rules has occurred. Investigative reports prepared by staff and paid and volunteer peer reviewers are examined, and Board members themselves may also interview licensees during an investigation. The Board functions as a "committee of the whole" to determine if a violation has occurred and to take appropriate disciplinary action. The Assistant Attorney General (AAG) assigned to the Board is consulted for legal advice on disciplinary and related administrative matters.

Conditional Licenses are a one-year license issued to SLPs completing their post-graduate supervised clinical experience.

Provisional SLPA Licenses are a temporary license issued for 6 months to SLPA candidates completing their clinical fieldwork.

Limited Licenses are a result of disciplinary action taken by the Board to preclude practice on certain age or diagnostic groups.

Probation is also a result of disciplinary action; the licensee may practice but must complete certain requirements before reinstatement.

The total number of licensees this year is up 14.9% over the same time in 2014. The total licensee count in 2015 increased 14.7% from 2013. It is most relevant to compare to two years ago, because of the timing of the biennial renewal cycle.

Staffing & Budget Highlights

The Board is currently staffed by two full-time positions, an Executive Director and an Administrative Assistant (Administrative Specialist 2). Investigative services continue to be provided by a contract professional with whom the Director and Board are very happy. The 2015-17 LAB included funding for a limited duration .5 FTE staff investigator, however the position has not yet been filled because the new Director (2/1/15) has been evaluating need. In preparing the 2015-17 budget, the Board had anticipated that the implementation of fingerprint background checks and license renewal LEDS checks would provide a substantial increase in the number of case investigations. This program was implemented in June, 2015, and the Board has in reality identified very few criminal history "hits," and as such, few new cases were generated from implementation of the background checks. Legal services are provided by the Oregon Department of Justice. The Board also contracted with expert clinical consultants for assistance on cases.

No General Funds are used to fund the Board program or functions. Licensing fees provide 98% of Board revenue; the remainder comes from civil penalties or delinquent fees for violations of Board statutes and rules, interest income and sales of mailing lists. These are all Other Funds.

For 2017-2019, projected revenue (all Other Funds) is \$527,816. Total expenditures are \$688,032, and the ending balance is projected at \$209,323. The projected ending balance is expected to sustain agency operations throughout the revenue cycle and through 2017-19 without fee increases. The Board absorbs the cost of debit/credit card processing fees during biannual renewals. It will also absorb the work force data fee and re-visit that cost in the 19-21 biennial budget estimates.

Environmental Factors

• Growth and aging of the state population is increasing the demand for SLP and audiology services. According to the *U.S. Occupational Outlook*, the number of audiologists is expected to grow 10% during 2006-2016, and the number of SLPs is projected to increase 11%. The number of licensees in Oregon increased 14.9% in the last two years.

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- Pacific University has added graduate programs in audiology and SLP, and PSU has increased its SLP graduate program capacity by 50%. These
 changes increased the number of Oregon graduates qualified for licensing beginning in 2013.
- A shortage of qualified SLPs has existed in all geographical areas of the state; particularly in rural areas. This appears to be subsiding somewhat with increased in-migration, the economic recovery, a significant increase in services being provided by telepractice, and the increased capacity of the Oregon training programs. There remains a challenge in recruitment and retention of SLPs in rural areas.
- Increased awareness of the law requiring speech-language pathology assistant (SLPA) certification and use of SLPAs due to the shortage of SLPs has contributed to the use of SLPAs. The Board responded in September 2013 by creating a Provisional SLPA license to allow individuals *not* enrolled in a university program to legally complete clinical fieldwork required for SLPA certification.
- SLPAs are required to be supervised by a SLP licensed by the Board, or by a SLP certified by TSPC who has agreed to follow the supervision rules adopted by the Board. This maintains supervision standards and provides the Board with jurisdiction over all aspects of SLPA practice.
- Improved awareness of the Board's role in consumer protection has resulted in increased administrative and legal costs associated with investigations and disciplinary actions. From 1989-2006, the Board received only 2-3 outside complaints per year. The Board now engages in more compliance investigations and communicates regularly with other jurisdictions regarding complaints filed elsewhere. There are about 50-70 new cases each calendar year.
- The number of SLPs licensed by TSPC declined from 1,007 in November 2009 to 512 in July 2014. The number of TSPC's SLPs who do not currently hold Board licensure, or have never held Board licensure is fewer than 200. This is the maximum number of individuals who would need to be grandfathered with TSPC after the new "universal licensure" law took effect.
- In ORS 694 and OAR 333-025, the State of Oregon requires hearing aid dealers to be licensed through the Oregon Health Licensing Agency. Legislative changes in 2009 recognized hearing aid dispensing as part of the scope of practice of audiologists. Board-licensed audiologists are no longer required to be licensed by OHLA; regulation of this function is now under the aegis of this Board. However, there remain issues of mutual interest and cooperation between BSPA and OHLA regarding these related license types. A recent example is the clarification by the Oregon Department of Justice that tinnitus evaluation is not in the scope of practice for hearing aid dispensers.

Budget Page <u>B7</u>

• In 2015 the legislature approved Music Therapists and Autism Behavioral Specialists as new license categories. In addition, the legislature approved a plan to require teachers to obtain training in dyslexia. There is significant crossover between these categories and speech-language pathology, so BSPA will be monitoring the implementation of these policies as regard to scope of practice, and to ensure that SLPs are providing evaluations and treatment as required by Federal IDEA law.

Agency Initiatives & Accomplishments

In the 2015-17 Biennium, the Board accomplished its two major strategic priorities.

- 1. Enhancing criminal background checks. As was noted in the Secretary of State's Audit of the Health Professional Regulatory Boards in early 2014, BSPA was one of just 3 health licensing boards that did not perform either LEDS or FBI-based checks. The Board implemented FBI fingerprint background checks for all new licensees in June, 2015, and ran all renewals through LEDS after the online renewals were completed January 31, 2016. Criminal background cases have increased, but not to the extent that was projected in the 2015-17 budget projections.
- 2. Creating and implementing universal standards for SLP licensure. The Board developed a strategic goal of better protecting Oregonians through establishing universal licensing standards for SLP licensure in this state. Prior to July 1, 2016, the Board's statute (ORS 681.230) allowed teachers licensed by the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission with a communications disorders or speech impaired endorsement, and who practice solely as an employee of a public school district, to be exempt from Board licensure. However, the requirements for licensure are quite different between BSPA and TSPC. Since 2009, Board leadership was actively discussing with TSPC and professional association leaders how TSPC's SLP licensure requirements could be brought into conformance with BSPA's. The Board follows national standards that are based on those of the American Speech-Lanaguage Hearing Association (ASHA) Certificate of Clinical Competency (CCCs). These include a a master's degree in SLP from an ASHA-accredited SLP program, completion of 1260 hours of post-graduate supervised clinical experience, and passing the Praxis exam in speech-language pathology. By comparison, TSPC licenses SLPs as teachers, based on only a bachelor's degree—and up until 2009, this included those with a bachelor's degree in any field. The Board proposed a Legislative Concept for the 2015 Legislative Session to eliminate the exemption from Board licensure for SLPs initially licensed by TSPC after June 30, 2016. In this way, TSPC would continue to "grandfather" the few hundred remaining licensees who are not also licensed by the Board. The Oregon legislature passed this bill, and the new policy was implemented on July 1, 2016.

Key Accomplishments July 2014-December 2016

Financial

Managed agency significantly under budget during 2015- 17, while still providing administrative services at effective levels.

- Revenues: Revenue collections are on track to exceed budget projections significantly.
- Expenditures for the current biennium are projected to be significantly under budget due to the delay in hiring a part time investigator, and because the agency teamed with other licensing boards to hire an in house accountant which was a significant savings.

Operations

• Personnel management:

o The organization managed a successful transition to a new Executive Director on February 1, 2015. The prior director held the position for six years and retired.

Ottober 2013. This contractor is a minority-owned business.

Working with HRLB to implement in-house accountant.

- O Administrative assistant has completed master's in public administration program and serves on the state's Cultural Competency Committee. Provided the assistant with leadership development opportunities offered by the state.
- Reviewed all policies and procedures annually.
- Provided and oversaw support for over 2,755 licensees as of January 2016—a record high number of licensees and renewals.
- Communications
 - o Continued to update and codify Board policies and office procedures.
 - o Updated Board orientation manual in June 2016 for new Board members.
 - o One of the first agencies to revamp the website to the new Oregon "look and feel" format. The site went live in January, 2017.
 - o Continued outreach meetings to SLP students near their graduation dates to help them understand the licensure process.
 - o Prepare and send periodic newsletters to licensees and interested parties.
 - Outreach to special education directors and administrators to help them understand licensing requirements, and that SLPAs are not allowed to have "caseloads."
 - o Working closely with OSHA, OAA and other professional groups to identify emerging issues.
- Reviewed and updated all application forms for rule changes and to further clarify requirements and refine applications to ensure that applicants select the correct applications and do not engage in unlicensed practice.

Investigation/Discipline

- Spent significant staff and legal time on one major contested case, including lengthy settlement negotiations, which has now gone to Judicial Review. As such, BSPA is incurring legal fees from the DOJ Appellate Division in addition to its regular AGG fees.
- Investigated and managed expanded complaint caseload (41 cases in calendar 2015, 61 cases in 2016)
- Conducted investigations and drafted documents to sanction licensees as directed by Board, negotiated numerous consent orders.
- Met requirement for reporting Board actions to HIPDB within 30 days.

Compliance/Evaluation

- Underwent Secretary of State Audit in August-December 2013. Major issue identified was criminal background checks. Implemented them in June, 2015 for new licensees and checked all license holders during the 2015-16 renewal process.
- Revised Affirmative Action Plan for 2015-17 to meet requirements, and conducted agency operations in accordance with Plan.
- Close evaluation of application materials has revealed multiple cases of unlicensed practice by applicants and others. Cases addressed by Board in Executive Session.
- Continued to communicate TSPC and Board licensure requirements to multiple stakeholders, and licensees through educational contacts and follow-up on unlicensed practice cases.
- Conducted Professional Development and SLPA supervision audits, and with results reviewed by Board for potential action.

Strategic

• Collaborated with OSHA, ODE, TSPC, OEA, university program leaders to gain support for a Legislative Concept to eliminate the TSPC exemption and move towards universal licensure. Identified solutions for grandfathering and timing this transition. The concept passed and the new law was implemented July 1, 2016.

- Worked with Governor's Executive Appointments Office to identify appropriate board members and ensure they receive orientation and training. There have been three new board members and no time with open vacancies.
- Met regularly with other Health Related Licensing Boards to share best practices and consider further operational efficiencies.
- Implemented new temporary license category (Provisional SLPA) to address issues related to applicants with bachelor's degrees in SLP. Reached out to employers to solicit input and educate them about new requirements.

Policy Development

- Researched other agencies' policies and rules to draft temporary rules to implement enhanced criminal background checks. Worked closely with Oregon State Police to identify and overcome implementation barriers. Rules implemented May 2014 and the policy was implemented in June, 2015.
- New Executive Director attended CLEAR and NCSB annual conferences to learn about telepractice, audiology assistants and other national issues.

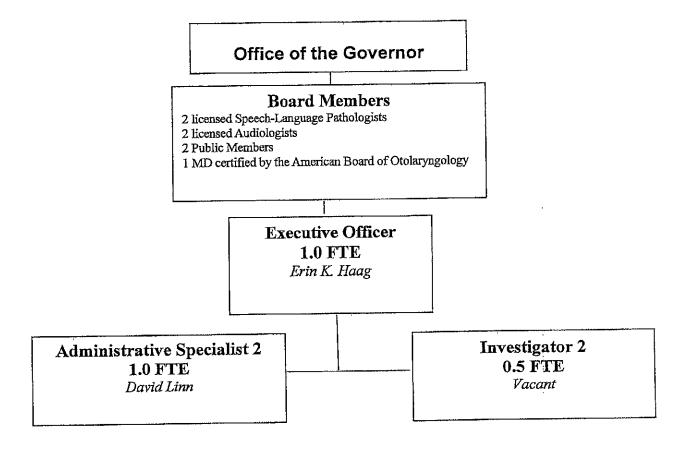

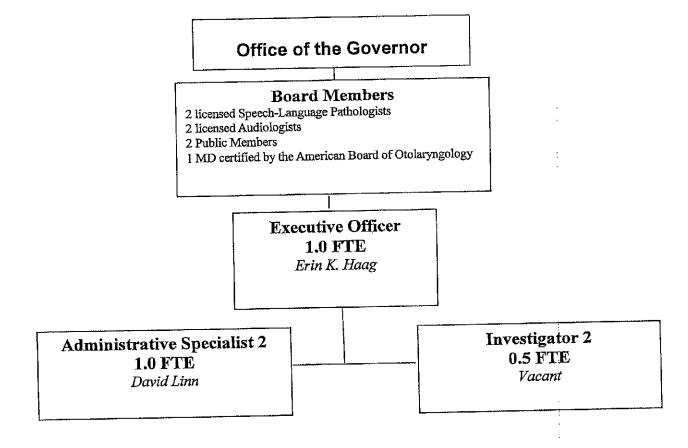

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REVENUES

1. Revenue Forecast Narrative

Source: The Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology is supported solely by Other Funds. Licensing fees are about 98% of revenue, with the remainder provided through delinquent fees, civil penalties, interest income, and sales of mailing lists.

Matching Funds: None

Agency Programs Funded with Revenue: This agency has one program: regulating speech pathology and audiology practice.

General Limits on Use of Funds: Funds are appropriated for administration and enforcement of ORS 681.205 through 681.991, and OAR 335-001-0000 through 335-070-0095.

Basis for 2017-19 Estimates:

Agency revenue is almost exclusively driven by licensing fees and volume. Licensing volume is affected by the supply and demand for SLPs, SLPAs, and audiologists in Oregon.

Supply is a function of in-migration of qualified professionals and the number of graduates of training programs. In-migration is affected by optimism of migrants to the state seeking jobs, the overall employment outlook, and the housing market. Oregon's economy has recovered well and the number of people wanting a license have increased by 14.9% over the last two years. Historically, the number of Oregon graduates has been stable, with only two programs training SLPs and one preparing SLPAs. Beginning in 2013, Portland State University expanded to 50 SLPs per year (up from 30), and in 2014 and 2015, Pacific University's new SLP and audiology programs began graduating students.

The impact of retirement of professionals currently working is not known—although baby boomers are reaching retirement age, the weak economy of 2008-09 has caused many people to defer expected retirement. Even with the recent recovery, jobs may not be vacated for new licensees. However, there continues to be strong demand for SLPs and Audiologists in Oregon.

Revenue projected for the current biennium (2015-17) is likely to be as high as \$630,000 over the LAB because of the strong increase in the number of new and renewing licensees. The revenue budgeted for 2017-19 is a conservative \$527,816 as it was based on a calculation of current service levels that did not take into account the recent renewal cycle.

Adequate revenue is needed to provide funding for both operations and cash flow. Approximately 90% of the Board's revenue is derived from license renewals, which are tied to the license expiration date of January 30th of each even-numbered year. The Governor's Balanced Request Budget is \$688,032 with an ending balance projected to be \$209,323 or about seven months of operating expenditures.

BSPA previously budgeted 7 months of operations for the ending balance. However, in 2011, the renewal deadline was moved 30 days earlier (to December 31st of odd-numbered years), and the agency has seen a positive impact on cash flow. After analyzing the 2011, 2013 and 2015 monthly revenue patterns, we now believe that we can meet cash flow needs for the beginning of each biennium with an ending balance equaling 7-8 months of operating costs. This is because the agency receives revenue in May-September from new graduates and licensees moving from other states to take K-12 jobs. Also, since renewals open in November (and peak in the last half of December, right before the December 31st deadline), 7-8 months of ending balance is deemed appropriate.

When projecting needed ending balance, it would be prudent to include an amount to cover extraordinary case costs, for which BSPA is self-insured. A reasonable estimate would be \$100,000 per biennium. This amount is based on past history of legal costs, and the fact that one case has now cost more than \$50,000 and has now started the Judicial Review process which will also include costs from the DOJ's appellate division. While this amount has not been included the ending balance projections in this budget request, it is important to recognize that this business risk is uncovered.

As the volume and complexity of cases has increased, legal and investigative costs have grown. BSPA is totally supported by licensing fees paid by licensees, with no "reinsurance" provided by the General Fund or any third party policy. The Board must have sufficient reserves to cover actions it takes to protect the public. In one recent case, the Board discovered that another state did not revoke an individual's license because they lacked funds. That one case bankrupted that state's licensing board. We want to avoid similar poor public policy.

BSPA's cash reserves must be used to pay investigative, legal, and hearing costs that exceed budget. The Board has statutory authority to charge licensees for the costs of disciplinary proceedings. Nevertheless, at times it may be inappropriate to charge the licensee for legal costs, such as when seeking to avoid hearing costs by entering into a Stipulated Agreement with the licensee. Often licensees will leave the state after incurring large legal fees and are uncollectible.

Proposed Changes in Revenue Sources or Fees

The Board has statutory authority in ORS 681.340 to impose fees for license fees and renewal thereof.

The agency is not requesting a fee increase in 2017-19 to support projected current service levels. It is reasonable to expect that fees will be raised about every 4 years thereafter to accommodate inflation and increased workload.

Types of Licenses and Who Pays

- Licensing fees are paid on a biennial basis by active speech-language pathologists (SLPs), speech-language pathology assistants (SLPAs), and audiologists (AUDs). Individuals dually licensed in both SLP and AUD pay only a single fee.
- Delinquent fees are levied on licensees who are late in renewing, re-activating after a lapse, and for other reasons specified in our rules (including late or inadequate reporting of professional development).
- The application fee is a one-time, non-refundable fee for initial licenses of all types.
- The conditional license fee is for a special one-year license for newly graduated SLPs during their clinical fellowship year which is renewable for one year if needed while the individual completes their fellowship requirements.
- Miscellaneous fees are charged for sales of mailing lists to licensees or members of the public.

Temporary license fees were approved as part of the 2013-15 budget process. The Board adopted OAR 335-085-0010 to implement this license category, effective July 1, 2013. Temporary licenses are valid for up to 6 months, and its current uses are:

- To allow an applicant to be licensed while awaiting final transcripts to be issued in the event that all degree requirements have been met, but the university only confers degrees at certain dates in the year.
- To allow applicants who are licensed after May 1st of odd-numbered years to be issued a lower-cost limited term initial license, since they will need to renew it by December 31st. This makes the initial costs fairer for licensees applying within a short time before the renewal deadline.
- Effective September 13, 2013, the Board created a new temporary Provisional SLPA license. This license allows an SLPA candidate to complete their clinical fieldwork outside of an academic practicum course without engaging in unlicensed practice.

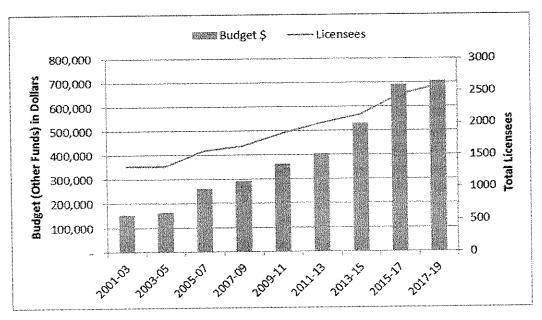

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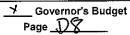

Annual Performance Progress Report

The Board's Annual Self-Evaluation will be conducted at its August, 2017 meeting and will be included in the Agency's 19-21 Budget submission.

Facility Proposal Impact on Work Space Requirements

To accommodate the 0.5 FTE Investigator, space is expected to be sub-leased from another licensing Board within Suite 407 of the Portland State Office Building.

Audit Response: BSPA was included in the Secretary of State's audit of all Health Professional Regulatory Boards (SOS 2014-06). The LAB for 2015-17 included a Policy Package to add a 0.5 FTE Investigator position and the other legal and professional services fees required to support the agency's current workload and the enhanced criminal background check function. As yet this position is unfilled.

The other recommendation is for expanded Board training. BSPA's Executive Director has developed and maintained a Board Orientation Manual that is reviewed with each incoming Board member in person before their first meeting. In addition, the Executive Director has successfully obtained and utilized additional resources over the last few biennia for Employee (and Board member) Training and Out-of-State Travel to support Board members' attendance at the excellent one-day Board member training session provided at the annual meeting of the National Council of State Boards of Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology. If other quality training offerings become available, BSPA would gladly take advantage of collaboration with other State agencies (including DOJ) to offer these to its Board members. Finally, the Board is complying with the new requirement that members appointed after January 1, 2016 take part in state of Oregon board and commission training.

Affirmative Action Report

BSPA's affirmative action policy provides that any appointments or hiring of employees for the Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology will be free of discrimination. Board members and the Executive Officer will provide a work environment free of harassment based on religion, race, age, disability status, gender, sexual orientation, or any other factor prohibited by law.

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The agency Affirmative Action plan approved by the Governor follows. It will accompany recruitment materials supplied to applicants seeking employment with the Board. The Affirmative Action Report is submitted biennially to the Affirmative Action Director, Office of the Governor.

The Board currently has a total of 2.5 FTE, so the opportunity to set a goal for hiring disabled or minority individuals is limited. The Board exercises impartial and unbiased evaluation of applications and interviews for employment when vacancies occur or any temporary or permanent positions are authorized. The Board will provide a reasonable accommodation if such accommodation is needed to adequately and equally perform job tasks.

Compliance - Currently, agency staff consists of one white female manager and one white male support staff. The board utilizes a minority owned investigation business and is currently served by an African-American AAG.

ORS 659A.015 requires agencies to report awards of construction, service and personal service contracts awarded to minority businesses. BSPA currently contracts with white male and white female hearing and speech professionals selected to serve as clinical consultants in Board investigations. Very few hearing and speech professionals in Oregon or nationally are ethnic minorities, and most are women.

In October 2013, the Board entered into a professional services contract with a minority-owned private investigator company.

In recruiting for three vacancies on the Board, the Board members and Executive Director reached out to individuals in a variety of geographic settings, ages, genders, and ethnic minority groups. The Board is currently comprised of six women, one of whom is Asian-American, and one white man who has had a hearing loss since early childhood and is a licensed audiologist.

Senate Bill 786 Compliance

Senate Bill 786 mandated the Health-Related Licensing Boards to:

- 1. Establish programs to increase the representation of people of color and bilingual people on the boards and in the professions that they regulate.
- 2. Maintain records of the racial and ethnic makeup of applicants and professionals regulated by the board.
- 3. Report biennially to the legislature on the above two.

Statement on Board Position Opening Advertisement

Board members are appointed by the Governor. The Governor may take ethnicity, multilingual skills, geographic diversity, gender, or other factors into consideration as he sees fit. The new Governor's appointees are two white females from the Portland metro area and one Asian-American female from Central Oregon and a white male from Beaverton. Other Board members are white females from the Portland area, Eastern and Central Oregon.

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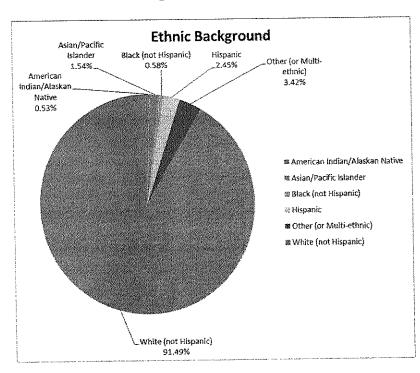
When Board member vacancies are announced on the Board's website and newsletter, the following statement is included: "the Board encourages people of color and bilingual people to apply for member positions".

The Board is awaiting the results of a pilot project between the Oregon Healthcare Workforce Initiative and certain other health professional licensing boards to identify characteristics of existing licensees in the professions we regulate, and to identify issues and actions for future recruiting.

Racial, Ethnic, and Linguistic Characteristics of Licensees

BSPA has tracked ethnicity and multilingualism of our applicants since 2002, although some applicants decline to provide the information. July 2014 data show the following breakdown of ethnicity and language fluency for active licensees who are audiologists, speech pathologists, or SLPAs:



A total of 291 licensees (up from 169 in 2012 and 233 in 2014) report being bilingual, in the languages listed below.

Portland State University's SLP graduate program has a specialty offering in bilingual SLP, focusing on Spanish. This may be contributing to the increasing number of licensees reporting fluency in Spanish, which is up 18% from two years ago.

Regulatory Streamlining

Per Executive Order 03-01, the Board regularly reviews regulations and regulatory processes to identify opportunities to streamline these processes to reduce regulatory burdens without compromising standards.

Methods to Identify Streamlining Opportunities

The methods for identifying opportunities for streamlining include:

- Regularly reviewing licensing and disciplinary processes to seek efficiencies and reduce burdens to licensees and staff
- Continuing collaboration with other health licensing boards
- Monitoring national trends in licensing speech and hearing professionals

- Monitoring customer service surveys completed by licensees
- Encouraging stakeholder input during legislative and administrative processes for making new regulations

Tracking Progress on Reducing Regulatory Barriers

Collaborative Efforts—The Board's collaboration with other Health Related Licensing Boards, especially those co-located in Suite 407 of the Portland State Office Building, demonstrates our commitment to streamlining operations and thereby reducing regulatory burdens to our licensees. Our shared services include Information Technology (including servers, fax, copier), conferencing capabilities (critical for Board meetings), and other support services such as document shredding. Joint purchasing contracts provide volume discounts and stability in service capabilities. Some examples include:

- Agency Performance Measures: Through the shared IT consultant, the Boards developed an on-line customer service survey which automatically collates and calculates responses electronically. Other custom reports allow tracking of licensing throughput. Further discussion is underway regarding the development of common operational measures.
- IT System Development & Support (operational support, asset management, database development, shared hardware and software, data security): The shared IT consultant provides low cost, yet customized, solutions to agency needs.
- Business Continuity Plan: The Boards have jointly developed an effective plan to address emergencies related to weather, security, or facility contingencies.
- Employee Safety and Human Resources Issues
- Tenant Issues
- Document Handling and Information Security: Suite 407 is key-carded to create more security for staff and confidential documents. This system provides one layer of security, which is supplemented by one or two other layers for different types of information.
- The Boards presented proposals to DOJ and to DAS to "embed" an AAG and a staff accountant, respectively, in Suite 407 to streamline operations and communications with these service providers. HRLB now has a staff accountant.

The directors of all the Health Professional Regulatory Boards (including larger agencies such as medical, dental, and nursing boards, as well as medium- and small-sized agencies) also meet monthly. This collaboration facilitates coordinated responses to initiatives of other state agencies and discussions of best practices among boards. Importantly, it also provides the mechanisms for a peer review audit that was initiated through HB2118 in 2009, and has provided valuable feedback to the agencies that have participated to date, including this agency, in fall 2013.

Affirmative Action Statement Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology (BSPA) December, 2016

Affirmative Action Policy Statement:

It is the policy of BSPA that no person shall be discriminated against because of race, religion, national origin, gender, age, marital status, sexual preference or identity, disability or any other factor prohibited by law. This policy applies to employee hires, members of the board, licensees and its dealings with the public.

Board Program and Personnel:

The Board of Examiners for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology (BSPA) was established in 1973 to license and regulate the performance of speech-language pathologists and audiologists for consumer protection in Oregon. BSPA is a is very small organization, with only two full time staff people and is as such rather limited in its hiring ability. BSPA is governed by a board that includes two speech-language pathologists, two audiologists, one ear nose and throat physician, and two community members (lay people).

Affirmative Action Objectives and progress:

- 2013-15 Biennium: In October, 2013 the board was very pleased to enter into a professional services contract with a minority-owned (African American) investigator company, George Finch, LLC. Although BSPA has obtained approval for a part time investigator position as part of the 2015-17 biennium, we have been so impressed with the work of Mr. Finch that the board has delayed filling the staff position. In February, 2015, the board's executive director retired and was replaced by a woman who at age 55 is technically a senior citizen. During most of the past biennium, all of the board members have been women.
- 2015-17 Biennium: During the current biennium, the board has continued to prioritize diversity of its staff, contractors and board. The board has two full time staff persons and is led by a female executive director who is supported by a white male assistant who recently earned his master's degree in public administration and is now over-qualified for the administration assistant II position. We expect him to move on to a management position in government sometime in the next two years. The executive director is committed to following all affirmative action guidelines if and when that vacancy occurs. This current assistant is thoroughly committed to diversity and the executive director has provided him the time and opportunity to serve as a member of the Oregon Cultural Competency Committee. He has attended several meetings of this group which is implementing the new law encouraging licensed health professionals in Oregon to take courses on the subject. For most of this biennium, the Board has been made up of seven women, one of whom is Asian American, and two of whom are retired senior citizens. Two months ago a vacancy allowed the Board to add a young white male audiologist who also was born with a hearing loss and has worn hearing aids since he was a small child. It is important for the board to include individuals who are either consumers of SLP or audiology

services, or have family members who have used those services. The board continues to work with a contract investigator who is an African American and owns his own business. The board is fortunate that their assigned legal counsel from the Attorney General's office is African American. Although BSPA is a small organization, it has demonstrated a commitment to creating a diverse staff and board, and works to ensure that day to day interactions with licensees and the general public are free from discrimination of all types.

Affirmative Action 2017-19 Objectives:

The board will continue to work to ensure diversity of its staff, board and contractors during the 2017-19 Biennium. Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists work with a wide range of individuals in education and healthcare, so the board's objective is to look more like the communities served by the professions. As such we hope to add at least one person to the board who is fluent in Spanish as well as underserved communities in Portland and rural areas of the state. In order to better balance the board, we should attempt to add at least one man. We look forward to working with the Governor's staff on increasing and diversifying the board member applicant pool through outreach and recruitment.

Because of budget challenges for the new biennium, the Governor has asked that new hiring be delayed for at least 60 days, preferably until the end of the current biennium which is June 30, 2017. Assuming that the Governor's budget for the board is approved by the legislature, we are likely to recruit for the part time investigator staff position after that date and will work to hire an employee that reflects the diversity of the state of Oregon.

Human Resources Agency Support: The agency does its own HR work in cooperation with DAS. In order to meet our goal of hiring a diverse staff we will advertise any open positions in a wide range of diverse publications to generate the candidate pool. We will also reach out to the Governor's office in the case of any vacancies to identify potential candidates.
