

ACLU of Oregon Urges a Yes Vote on HB 3242

The American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon¹ supports HB 3242, which would require peace officers to electronically record custodial interviews conducted by a peace officer in a law enforcement facility with youth during investigations of person felonies.²

The rights of the accused are a cornerstone of a fair judicial system. As the Supreme Court has noted,³ these rights are especially important when young people who lack an adult's capacity to understand the consequences of their actions. HB 3242 will help protect the rights of youth when interacting with the criminal justice system.

Recording interviews will benefit law enforcement and increase public trust and public safety. The existence of an objective and reviewable record will protect officers against false accusations. A clear record of what occurred during interviews will also provide much-needed transparency in the system, which will increase public trust in law enforcement. An increase in public trust leads to an increase in public safety.

Recording interviews will increase the efficiency of law enforcement. It will allow officers to focus on the interview at hand, rather than performing the additional task of taking handwritten and incomplete notes.

Recording interviews will provide courts with more accurate and reliable records of youth interviews. For example, it will clarify questions around Miranda and voluntariness and it will decrease wrongful convictions by providing an "objective, comprehensive, and reviewable record...to challenge misleading or false testimony." Courts in eight states have implemented rules that encourage law enforcement officers to record custodial interrogations. Oregon should follow their lead.

For all these reasons, we urge you to vote yes on HB 3242.
