

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3437

3 418.658, 458.675, 461.740, 470.710, 657.345, 657.380, 657.610, 657.665, 657.710, 657.730, 657.734, 660.120,
4 660.300, 660.302, 660.312, 660.318, 660.321, 660.324, 660.327, 660.330, 660.333, 660.336, 660.339, 660.340,
5 660.343, 660.346, 660.349, 660.353, 660.358, 660.361, 660.364 and 678.425; repealing ORS 284.290,
6 284.292, 284.294 and 284.297; and prescribing an effective date.”.

7 Delete lines 5 through 30 and delete pages 2 through 5 and insert:

8 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 660.300 is amended to read:

9 “660.300. As used in ORS 660.300 to 660.364:

10 “(1) ‘Chief elected official’ means a county commissioner, a county judge or the mayor of the
11 City of Portland.

12 “(2) ‘Federal Act’ or ‘federal Workforce [*Investment*] **Innovation and Opportunity Act**’ means
13 the federal Workforce [*Investment Act of 1998 (enacted as P.L. 105-220 and codified as 29 U.S.C. 2801*
14 *et seq.*)] **Innovation and Opportunity Act (29 U.S.C. 3101 et seq.)**.

15 “(3) ‘Local workforce [*investment*] **development area**’ means the City of Portland or a county
16 when the city or county has been designated as a local workforce [*investment*] **development area**
17 under ORS 660.324. ‘Local workforce [*investment*] **development area**’ may include two or more
18 counties that have joined together to form a local workforce [*investment*] **development area** and
19 that have been designated as a local workforce [*investment*] **development area** under ORS 660.324.

20 “(4) ‘Local workforce [*investment*] **development board**’ means a board established pursuant to
21 section [2832] **3122** of the federal Workforce [*Investment Act of 1998*] **Innovation and Opportunity**
22 **Act**.

23 “(5) ‘Office’ means the Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development.

24 “(6) ‘Participant’ means a person receiving services under [*Title I-B of the federal Workforce*
25 *Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2801 et seq.)*] **the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportu-**
26 **nity Act (29 U.S.C. 3101 et seq.)**.

27 “(7) ‘Participant records’ means records relating to matters such as grades, conduct, personal
28 and academic evaluations, results of psychometric testing, counseling, disciplinary actions, if any,
29 and other personal matters.

30 “(8) ‘State workforce agencies’ means state agencies that administer workforce programs.

31 “[*(9) ‘Title I-B’ means the adult, dislocated worker and youth programs delivered under the federal*
32 *Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2801 et seq.)*.]

33 “[*(10)*] **(9)** ‘Workforce development’ means services designed to help individuals attain employ-
34 ment and progress along career pathways and to help businesses better achieve business goals by
35 more easily finding skilled employees. ‘Workforce development’ includes:

- 1 “(a) Education, training and apprenticeship services;
2 “(b) Labor market analysis;
3 “(c) Employment and reemployment services;
4 “(d) Employee recruitment and retention services; and
5 “(e) Convening, coordinating, oversight and evaluation services for business and state workforce
6 agencies.

7 “[~~(11)~~] (10) ‘Workforce programs’ means programs that have a primary mission of helping indi-
8 viduals become employed, retain employment, increase wages and progress along career pathways
9 and that are responsible for outcomes related to the primary mission.

10 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 660.302 is amended to read:

11 “660.302. (1) The Legislative Assembly finds that:

12 “(a) A robust and effective workforce system is necessary to produce a highly skilled workforce,
13 to advance more Oregonians into family wage jobs and to help Oregon businesses compete in a
14 global economy.

15 “(b) **Oregon’s economy is strongest when all workers are self-sufficient and all businesses
16 can find the talented workforce they need to grow.**

17 “(2) [*Therefore,*] The Legislative Assembly declares that:

18 “(a) **It will be beneficial to consolidate state-level coordination, employer engagement and
19 oversight responsibilities within the State Workforce and Talent Development Board and to
20 align state investments in workforce development, economic development and education to
21 meet the needs of identified key industries in this state.**

22 “(b) It is the policy of this state to promote the coordinated provision of education, employment,
23 economic development and job training to:

24 “[~~(1)~~] (A) Develop a workforce system that is flexible, accountable, outcome-focused and data-
25 driven;

26 “[~~(2)~~] (B) Meet the needs of employers for skilled, committed and innovative employees;

27 “[~~(3)~~] (C) Deliver an effective, efficient, highly integrated and responsive workforce system;

28 “[~~(4)~~] (D) Offer services;

29 “[~~(5)~~] (E) Ensure equity in program access, services and outcomes for populations that have
30 historically experienced high levels of unemployment, underemployment and poverty;

31 “[~~(6)~~] (F) Provide greater economic security and grow a more inclusive and dynamic economy;

32 “[~~(7)~~] (G) Support the economic health of local communities throughout this state with
33 workforce solutions that meet community needs and advance the prosperity of Oregonians and
34 Oregon-based businesses;

35 “[~~(8)~~] (H) Build on the WorkSource Oregon network of state workforce agencies, local workforce
36 [*investment*] **development** boards, public and private secondary and post-secondary institutions of
37 education and other public and private partners to deliver a comprehensive, robust and outcome-
38 oriented array of services to unemployed and underemployed individuals and to businesses seeking
39 employees; and

40 “[~~(9)~~] (I) Support the achievement of Oregon’s 40-40-20 goal in conjunction with the education
41 system and private industry to ensure that more Oregonians may access opportunities to gain skills
42 and earn credentials to support their employment goals.

43 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 660.312 is amended to read:

44 “660.312. (1) The Governor shall be responsible for a coordinated and comprehensive response
45 to education and workforce issues. The Governor shall appoint an Education and Workforce Policy

1 Advisor, who serves at the pleasure of the Governor. The advisor shall, with the advice of such
2 advisory committees as may be appointed or assigned, advise the Governor on policy, planning and
3 coordination for education and workforce development in Oregon.

4 “(2) The duties of the advisor shall include:

5 “(a) Guiding the development of state-level policy related to education and workforce issues;

6 “(b) Providing general direction and serving as a liaison between state and local efforts in edu-
7 cation, training and workforce development;

8 “(c) Ensuring, through collaboration with the leadership of local workforce [*investment*] **devel-**
9 **opment** boards, the alignment of statewide and local strategic plans, and the periodic reporting of
10 performance in the implementation of such plans; and

11 “(d) Consulting with local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards on the development and
12 implementation of a workforce performance measurement system.

13 “(3) In the performance of duties, the advisor shall collectively involve state agencies, including
14 but not limited to:

15 “(a) The Department of Education;

16 “(b) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission;

17 “(c) The Oregon Business Development Department;

18 “[*d*] *The Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development;*]

19 “[*e*] (d) The Employment Department;

20 “[*f*] (e) The Department of Human Services;

21 “[*g*] (f) The Bureau of Labor and Industries;

22 “[*h*] (g) The Department of Corrections; and

23 “[*i*] (h) The public universities with governing boards listed in ORS 352.054.

24 “(4) The advisor shall seek input from key interested parties to help guide policy development,
25 including but not limited to representatives of:

26 “(a) Businesses and industry organizations;

27 “(b) Labor and labor organizations;

28 “(c) Local education providers, community colleges and other public and private post-secondary
29 institutions of education and their governing boards;

30 “(d) Local government;

31 “(e) Student, teacher, parent and faculty organizations;

32 “(f) Community-based organizations;

33 “(g) Public-private partnership organizations;

34 “(h) Independent nonprofit and proprietary post-secondary colleges and schools; and

35 “(i) The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board and local workforce [*in-*
36 *vestment*] **development** boards.

37 “(5) The advisor shall meet, on a regularly scheduled basis, with the local workforce
38 [*investment*] **development** boards and such others as necessary to ensure that local interests are
39 represented. The advisor shall seek input, advice and feedback on policy issues affecting state and
40 local education and workforce development from interested parties and any advisory committees
41 appointed or assigned under this section.

42 “(6) Pursuant to ORS chapter 183, the advisor may adopt rules necessary to carry out the duties
43 of the advisor.

44 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 660.318 is amended to read:

45 “660.318. (1) To implement and oversee state implementation of [*Title I-B*] **the federal**

1 **Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act**, the [*Office of Community Colleges and Workforce*
2 *Development*] **Higher Education Coordinating Commission** may:

3 “(a) Receive federal youth activities funds allotted to this state by the Secretary of Labor pur-
4 suant to [*Title I-B*] **the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act** and allocate those
5 funds that are not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended by the State Workforce
6 [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board and approved by the Governor.

7 “(b) Receive federal adult employment and training activities funds allotted to this state by the
8 Secretary of Labor pursuant to [*Title I-B*] **the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity**
9 **Act** and allocate those funds that are not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended
10 by the State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board and approved by the Governor.

11 “(c) Receive federal dislocated worker funds allotted to this state by the Secretary of Labor
12 pursuant to [*Title I-B*] **the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act** and allocate those
13 funds that are not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended by the State Workforce
14 [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board and approved by the Governor.

15 “(d) Establish a procedure for use by local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards to iden-
16 tify eligible providers of training services according to section [2864] **3174** of the federal Act and to
17 maintain the list of providers identified as eligible by the boards in all local workforce [*investment*]
18 **development** areas in this state.

19 “(e) Receive the comprehensive strategic plan developed and implemented by each local
20 workforce [*investment*] **development** board and review the plan, with input from representatives of
21 state and local workforce programs, to determine if the plan meets the requirements of section
22 [2833] **3123** of the federal Act and state policy.

23 “(f) Approve the plans, after review by the State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Develop-**
24 **ment** Board, that are found to meet the requirements of [*Title I-B*] **the federal Workforce Inno-**
25 **vation and Opportunity Act** and review and approve any amendments to the plans.

26 “(g) Carry out the required and allowable activities described in section [2864] **3174** of the fed-
27 eral Act with the advice of the Education and Workforce Policy Advisor.

28 “(h) Pursuant to ORS 660.339, establish procedures to maintain the confidentiality of the names
29 and records of participants in workforce programs for which the [*office*] **commission** is responsible,
30 including circumstances under which the names and records may be disclosed.

31 “(i) Establish a method to set performance standards for the Secretary of Labor as required
32 under section [2871] **3141** of the federal Act.

33 “(j) Perform planning functions related to [*Title I-B*] programs and performance reporting **under**
34 **the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act**.

35 “(2)(a) Subject to the availability of funds from the federal Workforce [*Investment*] **Innovation**
36 **and Opportunity Act**, the [*Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development*] **commission**
37 shall create and operate a summer youth employment program that reestablishes meaningful summer
38 work experience for persons between the ages of 14 and 24 and that meets the requirements for
39 funding under the federal Act.

40 “(b) Programs funded under this subsection:

41 “(A) Must include representatives of the business community in the planning, implementation
42 and evaluation of the program.

43 “(B) May provide for private and public sector employment opportunities.

44 “(C) Shall be managed by local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards in a manner that
45 coordinates regional state-sponsored youth work experience programs.

1 “(c) Local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards responsible for managing programs cre-
2 ated under this subsection shall provide training for business, labor and education leaders in use
3 of best practices that ensure positive summer work experiences for participants.

4 “(3) The [*Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development*] **commission** shall collab-
5 orate with the State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board and local workforce
6 [*investment*] **development** boards to collect data on summer work experience programs that identify
7 successful summer work experiences and allow for the identification and dissemination of promising
8 practices.

9 “(4) The [*Higher Education Coordinating*] commission, in consultation with the State Workforce
10 [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board, may adopt rules pursuant to ORS chapter 183 to im-
11 plement this section.

12 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 660.321 is amended to read:

13 “660.321. (1) A State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall be created
14 under section [*2821(b) and (c)*] **3111** of the [*Workforce Investment Act of 1998*] **federal Workforce**
15 **Innovation and Opportunity Act** to assist in the development of the [*State Unified*] Workforce **and**
16 **Talent Development** Plan established under ORS 660.324 [*and*], to carry out the other functions
17 described by the federal Act[,] **and to provide strategic planning and recommendations related**
18 **to state talent development.**

19 “(2) The membership of the board must be in accordance with the requirements of section
20 [*2821(b)*] **3111(b)** of the federal Act.

21 “(3) Representatives of business described in section [*2821(b)(1)(C)(i)*] **3111(b)(1)(C)(i)** of the
22 federal Act who are appointed to the board must be confirmed by the Senate in the manner pre-
23 scribed under ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

24 “(4) The Governor shall select a chairperson in accordance with the requirements of section
25 [*2821(c)*] **3111(c)** of the federal Act.

26 “(5) The Governor shall appoint one member who is a representative of a local workforce [*in-*
27 *vestment*] **development** board.

28 “(6) A majority of the board must be representatives of business, as described in section
29 [*2821(b)(1)(C)(i)*] **3111(b)(1)(C)(i)** of the federal Act.

30 “(7) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the board are nonvoting members of the
31 board and may act in an advisory capacity only.

32 “(8) To transact business at a meeting of the board, a quorum of voting members must partic-
33 ipate. A quorum consists of a majority of the voting members. At least 25 percent of the members
34 participating must be representatives of business, as described in section [*2821(b)(1)(C)(i)*]
35 **3111(b)(1)(C)(i)** of the federal Act.

36 “(9) Members of the board are not entitled to compensation, but may be reimbursed for actual
37 and necessary travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties
38 in the manner and amount provided for in ORS 292.495.

39 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 660.324 is amended to read:

40 “660.324. [*(1) The State Workforce Investment Board shall develop and submit to the Governor a*
41 *single, unified state plan that outlines a strategy, with quantitative goals, for the statewide workforce*
42 *investment system for the State of Oregon in accordance with section 2821 of the federal Workforce*
43 *Investment Act of 1998. In addition, the state plan must convey the expectations for performance and*
44 *the priorities for delivery of services to local workforce investment boards and state workforce agencies.*
45 *Upon the Governor’s approval of the state plan, the Governor shall cause the State Unified Workforce*

1 *Plan to be delivered to the Legislative Assembly.]*

2 “[(2) *The board shall develop and include in the state plan goals designed to promote Oregonians’*
3 *self-sufficiency. In addition to requirements under the federal Act regarding wage and other goals, the*
4 *state plan shall include quantifiable goals that will empower Oregonians to gain independence from*
5 *public assistance and move up the socioeconomic ladder.]*

6 “(1) **The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall identify:**

7 “(a) **Key industries in this state and the workforce skills needed for key industries to**
8 **grow and thrive;**

9 “(b) **In collaboration with workforce representatives, needs for education, training, work**
10 **experience, and job preparation to ensure Oregonians access to stable high-wage jobs and**
11 **employment advancement; and**

12 “(c) **Opportunities for partnerships with key industry sectors to coordinate workforce**
13 **development, economic development and education in response to industry and workforce**
14 **needs.**

15 “[3] (2) The board shall assist the Governor in:

16 “(a) Developing Oregon’s workforce [*investment*] **development** system;

17 “(b) Ensuring timely consultation and collaboration with chief elected officials, local workforce
18 [*investment*] **development** boards and other workforce stakeholders, including but not limited to
19 business and labor organizations and organizations working with persons with disabilities, persons
20 living at or below 100 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and the chronically unemployed and
21 underemployed;

22 “(c) Reviewing and approving local workforce plans;

23 “(d) Developing, as required by the federal Act, allocation formulas for the distribution of funds
24 to local workforce [*investment*] **development** areas for adult employment and training activities and
25 for youth activities that are developed by the local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards;

26 “(e) Working with local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards to increase efficiencies and
27 align workforce programs and services with local needs;

28 “(f) Recommending the duties and responsibilities of state agencies to implement the federal Act,
29 to avoid conflicts of interest and to capitalize on the experience developed by workforce partners
30 that are efficient and effective at meeting the requirements of the federal Act;

31 “(g) Participating in the development of a coordinated statewide system of activities and ser-
32 vices that includes both mandatory and optional partners of the one-stop delivery system, as pro-
33 vided in the federal Act;

34 “(h) Providing for the development, accountability and continuous improvement of comprehen-
35 sive workforce performance measures to assess the effectiveness of the workforce [*investment*] **de-**
36 **velopment** activities in this state;

37 “(i) Developing a statewide employment statistics system, as described in section 15(e) of the
38 Wagner-Peyser Act (29 U.S.C. 49L-2(e)); and

39 “(j) Preparing an annual report and submitting it to [*the United States Department of Education,*
40 *the United States Department of Health and Human Services and*] the United States Department of
41 Labor.

42 “[4] (3) The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board, in partnership with
43 the Governor, shall establish criteria for use by chief elected officials in appointing members to local
44 workforce [*investment*] **development** boards in accordance with the requirements of section [2832
45 *of the federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998*] **3122 of the federal Workforce Innovation and**

1 **Opportunity Act.** The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall establish
2 the following requirements:

3 “(a) To transact business at a meeting of a local workforce [*investment*] **development** board, a
4 quorum of members must participate. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members. At least
5 25 percent of the members participating must be representatives of business[, *as described in section*
6 *2821(b)(1)(C)(i) of the federal Act*].

7 “(b) When appropriate and upon a request from the chief elected official of a county or the City
8 of Portland, the State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall consider the
9 county or the City of Portland to be a candidate for designation as a local workforce [*investment*]
10 **development** area. The board shall consult with the county or the City of Portland before desig-
11 nating it as a local workforce [*investment*] **development** area. After considering the criteria in sec-
12 tion [2831] **3121** of the federal Act for designating local workforce [*investment*] **development** areas,
13 chief elected officials may submit a request to the board to combine their units of government into
14 a local workforce [*investment*] **development** area. The board shall make recommendations to the
15 Governor about the designation of local workforce [*investment*] **development** areas. Only the Gov-
16 ernor may designate local workforce [*investment*] **development** areas. The Governor must show just
17 cause for not designating a requested local workforce [*investment*] **development** area. A county or
18 the City of Portland may submit an appeal to the board, as provided in section [2831] **3121** of the
19 federal Act, if the Governor does not grant the county’s or the city’s request to designate a local
20 workforce [*investment*] **development** area.

21 “[5] (4) The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall provide guid-
22 ance and direction to local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards in the development of local
23 workforce plans. The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall adopt
24 policies that:

25 “(a) Require each local workforce [*investment*] **development** board, in partnership with its chief
26 elected officials and in accordance with section [2833] **3123** of the federal Act, to develop and submit
27 to the Governor and the State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board a strategic
28 local workforce plan that includes, but is not limited to, performance goals; and

29 “(b) Permit each local workforce [*investment*] **development** board, in consultation with its chief
30 elected officials:

31 “(A) To determine, consistent with the requirements of the federal Act, the appropriate level of
32 services based on the workforce needs in the local workforce [*investment*] **development** area; and

33 “(B) To **designate or** certify [*local*] one-stop operators **and to terminate for cause the eligi-**
34 **bility of such operators.**

35 “(5) **The State Workforce and Talent Development Board may charter and enter into**
36 **performance compacts with local workforce development boards.**

37 “(6) The State Workforce [*Investment*] **and Talent Development** Board shall:

38 “(a) Function as the primary advisory committee to the Employment Department in conjunction
39 with the Employment Department Advisory Council established under ORS 657.695;

40 “(b) Collaborate with other advisory bodies also tasked with workforce development, including
41 but not limited to the Oregon State Rehabilitation Council, the Commission for the Blind, the State
42 Apprenticeship and Training Council and the Higher Education Coordinating Commission;

43 “(c) Work with the Chief Education Office and the Oregon Business Development Commission
44 to identify areas of common interest to efficiently align resources, recommend common strategies
45 and provide accountability for reaching statewide goals; and

1 “(d) Hold state workforce agencies and local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards ac-
2 countable for meeting performance goals and system outcomes.

3 “[*(7) The State Workforce Investment Board may charter and enter into performance compacts with*
4 *the local workforce investment boards.*]

5 “**(7) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall convene, engage and co-**
6 **ordinate with senior executives of identified key industries in this state, the Oregon Business**
7 **Development Commission, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, the Department**
8 **of Education, the Bureau of Labor and Industries, the STEM Investment Council, local**
9 **workforce development boards, the Employment Department, the Department of Human**
10 **Services, the Commission for the Blind, the Chief Education Office, the Youth Development**
11 **Council and any other partners from training or workforce development entities in this state**
12 **to:**

13 “**(a) Determine needs across identified key industries in this state, including challenges**
14 **and opportunities in developing and growing relevant talent pipelines;**

15 “**(b) Ensure that the talent pipeline development infrastructure includes:**

16 “**(A) A listening process to collect workforce needs of employers from identified key in-**
17 **dustries in this state;**

18 “**(B) Curriculum alignment for high-demand occupation skill needs;**

19 “**(C) Prediction and monitoring of national trends relating to high-demand industries and**
20 **occupations;**

21 “**(D) Occupation-aligned education and training options with a clearly articulated**
22 **progression;**

23 “**(E) Skills assessments; and**

24 “**(F) Academic career counseling;**

25 “**(c) Utilize sector partnerships to:**

26 “**(A) Advise the development of career pathway programs for critical occupations in**
27 **identified key industries in this state; and**

28 “**(B) Ensure the coordination of education, economic development, business and**
29 **workforce initiatives between key partners to develop a strong talent pipeline;**

30 “**(d) Leverage and optimize existing measures and data systems to improve systems**
31 **alignment and interagency communication; and**

32 “**(e) Ensure state alignment and coordination between industry sector partnerships and**
33 **initiatives in the local workforce development areas.**

34 “**(8)(a) Every biennium, the State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall coor-**
35 **ordinate and collaborate with entities listed under subsection (7) of this section to create a**
36 **single, unified state Workforce and Talent Development Plan.**

37 “**(b) The Workforce and Talent Development Plan must include:**

38 “**(A) A strategy, with quantitative goals, for the statewide workforce development system**
39 **for the State of Oregon in accordance with section 3111 of the federal Workforce Innovation**
40 **and Opportunity Act;**

41 “**(B) Quantifiable goals designed to promote Oregonians’ self-sufficiency and that will**
42 **empower Oregonians to gain independence from public assistance and move up the**
43 **socioeconomic ladder;**

44 “**(C) Expectations for performance and the priorities for delivery of services to local**
45 **workforce development boards and state workforce agencies;**

1 “(D) Industry-based information and data from the Employment Department and other
2 agencies and entities listed in subsection (7) of this section related to talent needs and gaps;

3 “(E) Analysis of data regarding the skills required for identified key industry jobs;

4 “(F) Information regarding the status of career pathway programs targeted at identified
5 key industries in this state;

6 “(G) Recommendations related to advancing talent pipeline and career pathways devel-
7 opment based on the identified talent issues and trends;

2 “(e) Represent an effective sharing of resources through public-private partnerships among

15 “(5)(a) A public-private partnership awarded a grant or loan under this section shall use the
16 grant or loan for any of the following:

19 “(C) Curriculum development.

20 “(D) Expansion or revision of a current project to increase the capacity of the project, alter the

45 “(2) In approving career and technical training for eligible dislocated workers who do not attend

1 training programs identified in subsection (1) of this section, the Director of the Employment De-
2 partment shall require:

3 “(a) That the career and technical training relates to an occupation or skill for which there are,
4 or are expected to be, reasonable employment opportunities in this state or relates to the develop-
5 ment of a self-employment enterprise for which there is a reasonable opportunity for success.

6 “(b) That the individual has the qualifications and aptitudes to successfully complete such career
7 and technical training.

8 “**SECTION 34.** ORS 329.850 is amended to read:

9 “329.850. (1) The Education and Workforce Policy Advisor, in consultation with the Department
10 of Education, the [*Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development*] **Higher Education**
11 **Coordinating Commission**, the Bureau of Labor and Industries, the Oregon Business Development
12 Department and the Department of Human Services, shall propose policies and strategies consistent
13 with this chapter.

14 “(2) The Education and Workforce Policy Advisor’s policies and strategies must take into ac-
15 count that:

16 “(a) The state must promote innovative thinking with respect to the curriculum and educational
17 delivery system of Oregon public schools;

18 “(b) The state must require of all youth a level of achievement that prepares them to pursue
19 college, career and technical education programs, apprenticeships, work-based training and school-
20 to-work programs;

21 “(c) Greater employer investment is essential in the ongoing training of all workers to meet
22 workforce needs;

31 “(1) The problem of poverty will not be solved solely by government programs and income sub-

34 instead requires savings, investment and the accumulation of assets.

35 “(3) It is appropriate for the state to institute an asset-based antipoverty strategy.

36 “(4) The state has an opportunity to take advantage of private and federal resources by making
37 the transition to an asset-based antipoverty strategy. Those resources include, but are not limited
38 to, the Assets for Independence Act (42 U.S.C. 604) and the Workforce [*Investment Act (P.L.*

27 “**SECTION 37.** ORS 657.380 is amended to read:

28 “657.380. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, for the purposes of ORS
29 657.370 to 657.390, an individual is unemployed and eligible to receive shared work benefits with
30 respect to any week if, in addition to meeting all other eligibility requirements of this chapter, the
31 Director of the Employment Department finds that:

32 “(a) During the week the individual is employed as a member of an affected group in an ap-
33 proved plan that was approved prior to the week and is in effect for the week.

34 “(b) During the week the individual’s normal weekly hours of work were reduced, in accordance
35 with an approved plan, at least 20 percent but not more than 40 percent, with a corresponding re-
36 duction in wages.

37 “(2) Shared work benefits may not be paid to an eligible individual in an amount greater than
38 26 times the individual’s weekly benefit amount of regular benefits.

39 “(3) The total amount of regular benefits and shared work benefits paid to an individual in a

4 “657.610. The Director of the Employment Department may:

5 “(1) For purposes of administration and control, and with the approval of the Governor, organize
6 and reorganize the department in whatever manner the director considers appropriate to carry out
7 the duties, functions and powers of the department.

8 “(2) Appoint all subordinate officers and employees of the department, whether classified or
9 unclassified, and prescribe their duties and compensation, subject to applicable provisions of the
10 State Personnel Relations Law.

11 “(3) Delegate to departmental officers and employees such responsibility and authority as the
12 director determines necessary.

13 “(4)(a) Determine all questions of general policy for this chapter;

27 “**SECTION 39.** ORS 657.665 is amended to read:

28 “657.665. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) to (5) of this section, all information in the
29 records of the Employment Department pertaining to the administration of the unemployment in-
30 surance, employment service and labor market information programs:

31 “(a) Is confidential and for the exclusive use and information of the Director of the Employment
32 Department in administering the unemployment insurance, employment service and labor market
33 information programs in Oregon.

34 “(b) May not be used in any court action or in any proceeding pending in the court unless the
35 director or the state is a party to the action or proceeding or unless the proceeding concerns the
36 establishment, enforcement or modification of a support obligation and support services are being
37 provided by the Division of Child Support or the district attorney pursuant to ORS 25.080.

38 “(c) Is exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

39 “(2) The Employment Department shall disclose information:

40 “(a) To any claimant or legal representative, at a hearing before an administrative law judge,
41 to the extent necessary for the proper presentation of an unemployment insurance claim.

42 “(b) Upon request to the United States Secretary of Labor. The Employment Department shall
43 disclose the information in a form and containing the information that the United States Secretary
44 of Labor may require. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other
45 purpose.

1 “(c) Pursuant to section 303(a)(7) of the Social Security Act, upon request to any agency of the
2 United States charged with the administration of public works or assistance through public em-
3 ployment. Under this paragraph, the Employment Department shall disclose the name, address, or-
4 dinary occupation and employment status of each recipient of unemployment insurance benefits and
5 a statement of the recipient’s right to further benefits under this chapter. The information disclosed
6 is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose.

7 “(d) Pursuant to section 303(c)(1) of the Social Security Act, to the Railroad Retirement Board.
8 Under this paragraph, the Employment Department shall disclose unemployment insurance records.
9 The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of
10 disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid by the board.

11 “(e) Pursuant to section 303(d) of the Social Security Act, upon request to officers and employees
12 of the United States Department of Agriculture and to officers or employees of any state Supple-
13 mental Nutrition Assistance Program agency for the purpose of determining an individual’s eligibil-
14 ity for or the amount of supplemental nutrition assistance. The information disclosed is confidential
15 and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this paragraph
16 shall be paid by the United States Department of Agriculture.

17 “(f) Pursuant to section 303(e)(1) and (2)(A)(ii) of the Social Security Act, to state or local child
18 support enforcement agencies enforcing child support obligations under Title IV-D of the Social Se-
19 curity Act for the purposes of establishing child support obligations, locating individuals owing child
20 support obligations and collecting child support obligations from those individuals. The information
21 disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing infor-
22 mation under this paragraph shall be paid by the child support enforcement agency.

23 “(g) Pursuant to sections 303(f) and 1137 of the Social Security Act, to agencies participating in
24 the income and eligibility verification system for the purpose of verifying an individual’s eligibility
25 for benefits, or the amount of benefits, under unemployment insurance, temporary assistance for
26 needy families, Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Supplemental Security
27 Income, child support enforcement or Social Security programs. The information disclosed is confi-
28 dential and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this
29 paragraph shall be paid by the requesting agency.

30 “(h) Pursuant to section 303(h) of the Social Security Act and section 3304(a)(16)(B) of the Fed-
31 eral Unemployment Tax Act, to the United States Department of Health and Human Services Na-
32 tional Directory of New Hires. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for
33 any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid by the
34 United States Department of Health and Human Services.

35 “(i) Pursuant to section 303(i) of the Social Security Act, to officers and employees of the United
36 States Department of Housing and Urban Development and to representatives of a public housing
37 agency for the purpose of determining an individual’s eligibility for benefits, or the amount of ben-
38 efits, under a housing assistance program of the United States Department of Housing and Urban
39 Development. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose.
40 The costs of disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid by the United States De-
41 partment of Housing and Urban Development or the public housing agency.

42 “(j) Pursuant to regulations of the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services issued
43 under section 3304(a)(16)(A) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, and except as required by sec-
44 tion 303 of the Social Security Act, to the state, a political subdivision or a federally recognized
45 Indian tribe that has signed an agreement with the Department of Human Services to administer

1 Part A of Title IV of the Social Security Act for the purpose of determining an individual's eligibility
2 for assistance, or the amount of assistance, under a program funded under Part A of Title IV of the
3 Social Security Act. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other
4 purpose.

5 “(k) Upon request, to the United States Attorney’s Office. Under this paragraph, the Employ-
6 ment Department may disclose an individual’s employment and wage information in response to a
7 federal grand jury subpoena or for the purpose of collecting civil and criminal judgments, including
8 restitution and special assessment fees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be
9 used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid
10 by the United States Attorney’s Office.

11 “(3) The Employment Department may disclose information secured from employing units:

12 “(a) To agencies of this state, federal agencies and local government agencies to the extent
13 necessary to properly carry out governmental planning, performance measurement, program analy-
14 sis, socioeconomic analysis and policy analysis functions performed under applicable law. The in-
15 formation disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the agencies in any manner that
16 would identify individuals, claimants, employees or employing units. If the information disclosed
17 under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of dis-
18 closing the information shall be paid by the agency requesting the information.

19 “(b) As part of a geographic information system. Points on a map may be used to represent
20 economic data, including the location, employment size class and industrial classification of busi-
21 nesses in Oregon. Information presented as part of a geographic information system may not give
22 specific details regarding a business’s address, actual employment or proprietary information. If the
23 information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Depart-
24 ment, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the party requesting the information.

25 “(c) In accordance with ORS 657.673.

26 “(4) The Employment Department may:

27 “(a) Disclose information to public employees in the performance of their duties under state or
28 federal laws relating to the payment of unemployment insurance benefits, the provision of employ-
29 ment services and the provision of labor market information.

30 “(b) At the discretion of the Director of the Employment Department and subject to an intera-
31 gency agreement, disclose information to public officials in the performance of their official duties
32 administering or enforcing laws within their authority and to the agents or contractors of public
33 officials. The public official shall agree to assume responsibility for misuse of the information by
34 the official’s agent or contractor.

35 “(c) Disclose information pursuant to an informed consent, received from an employer or claim-
36 ant, to disclose the information.

37 “(d) Disclose information to partners under the federal Workforce [*Investment Act of 1998*] **In-**
38 **novation and Opportunity Act** for the purpose of administering state workforce programs under
39 the Act. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. The
40 costs of disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid by the requesting partner.

41 “(e) Disclose the names and addresses of employing units to the Bureau of Labor and Industries
42 for the purpose of disseminating information to employing units. The names and addresses disclosed
43 are confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this
44 paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the
45 information shall be paid by the bureau.

1 “(f) Disclose information to the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries for the
2 purpose of performing duties under ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870, 658.005 to 658.245 or 658.405 to
3 658.503 or ORS chapter 652, 653 or 659A. The information disclosed may include the names and ad-
4 dresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and employees. The information
5 disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. If the information disclosed
6 under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of dis-
7 closing the information shall be paid by the bureau.

8 “(g) Disclose information required under ORS 657.660 (3) and (4) to the Public Employees Re-
9 tirement System for the purpose of determining the eligibility of members of the retirement system
10 for disability retirement allowances under ORS chapter 238. The information disclosed is confiden-
11 tial and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this par-
12 agraph shall be paid by the Public Employees Retirement System.

13 “(h) Disclose to the Oregon Business Development Commission information required by the
14 commission in performing its duty under ORS 285A.050 to verify changes in employment levels fol-
15 lowing direct employer participation in Oregon Business Development Department programs or in-
16 direct participation through municipalities under ORS 285B.410 to 285B.482. The information
17 disclosed to the commission may include an employer’s employment level, total subject wages payroll
18 and whole hours worked. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any
19 other purpose. The commission may not disclose the information in any manner that would identify
20 an employing unit or employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission’s duty
21 under ORS 285A.050. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use
22 of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the com-
23 mission.

24 “(i) Disclose information to the Department of Revenue for the purpose of performing its duties
25 under ORS 293.250 or under the revenue and tax laws of this state. The information disclosed may
26 include the names and addresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and
27 employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department
28 of Revenue in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent
29 necessary to carry out the department’s duties under ORS 293.250 or in auditing or reviewing any
30 report or return required or permitted to be filed under the revenue and tax laws administered by
31 the department. The Department of Revenue may not disclose any information received to any pri-
32 vate collection agency or for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this paragraph
33 is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information
34 shall be paid by the Department of Revenue.

35 “(j) Disclose information to the Department of Consumer and Business Services for the purpose
36 of performing its duties under ORS chapters 654 and 656. The information disclosed may include the
37 name, address, number of employees and industrial classification code of an employer and payroll
38 data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed
39 by the Department of Consumer and Business Services in any manner that would identify an em-
40 ploying unit or employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the department’s duties under
41 ORS chapters 654 and 656, including administrative hearings and court proceedings in which the
42 Department of Consumer and Business Services is a party. If the information disclosed under this
43 paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the
44 information shall be paid by the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

45 “(k) Disclose information to the Construction Contractors Board for the purpose of performing

1 its duties under ORS chapter 701. The information disclosed to the board may include the names and
2 addresses of employers and status of their compliance with this chapter. If the information disclosed
3 under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of dis-
4 closing the information shall be paid by the board.

5 “(L) Disclose information to the State Fire Marshal to assist the State Fire Marshal in carrying
6 out duties under ORS 453.307 to 453.414. The information disclosed may include the name, address,
7 telephone number and industrial classification code of an employer. The information disclosed is
8 confidential and may not be disclosed by the State Fire Marshal in any manner that would identify
9 an employing unit except to the extent necessary to carry out duties under ORS 453.307 to 453.414.
10 If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment
11 Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the office of the State Fire
12 Marshal.

13 “(m) Disclose information to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for the purpose of
14 performing the commission’s duties under ORS chapter 348 and Title IV of the Higher Education
15 Act of 1965. The information disclosed may include the names and addresses of employers and em-
16 ployees and payroll data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and
17 may not be disclosed by the commission in any manner that would identify an employing unit or
18 employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission’s duties under ORS chapter
19 348 or Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965. If the information disclosed under this para-
20 graph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the infor-
21 mation shall be paid by the commission.

22 “(n) Disclose information to the Department of Transportation to assist the Department of
23 Transportation in carrying out the duties of the Department of Transportation relating to collection
24 of delinquent and liquidated debts, including taxes, under ORS 184.610 to 184.656, 184.670 to 184.733
25 and 805.263, ORS chapter 319 and the Oregon Vehicle Code. The information disclosed may include
26 the names and addresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and employees.
27 The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department of Transpor-
28 tation in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent nec-
29 essary to carry out the Department of Transportation’s duties relating to collection of delinquent
30 and liquidated debts or in auditing or reviewing any report or return required or permitted to be
31 filed under the revenue and tax laws administered by the Department of Transportation. The De-
32 partment of Transportation may not disclose any information received to any private collection
33 agency or for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared
34 for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by
35 the Department of Transportation.

36 “(o) Disclose information to the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Au-
37 thority to assist the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Authority in the col-
38 lection of debts that the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Authority are
39 authorized by law to collect. The information disclosed may include the names, addresses and pay-
40 roll data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be dis-
41 closed by the Department of Human Services or the Oregon Health Authority in a manner that
42 would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent necessary for the collection of
43 debts as described in this paragraph. The Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health
44 Authority may not disclose information received under this paragraph to a private collection agency
45 or use the information for a purpose other than the collection of debts as described in this para-

1 graph. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employ-
2 ment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the Department of Human
3 Services or the Oregon Health Authority.

4 “(p) Disclose to the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission information required by the commis-
5 sion in evaluating and measuring the performance of alcohol and drug prevention and treatment
6 programs under ORS 430.242 or the impact of the programs on employment. The information dis-
7 closed to the commission may include total subject wages payroll and whole hours worked. The in-
8 formation disclosed under this paragraph is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose.
9 The commission may not disclose the information in any manner that would identify an employing
10 unit or employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission’s duties under ORS
11 430.242. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Em-
12 ployment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the commission.

13 “(q) Disclose to any person establishment level information secured pursuant to this chapter
14 from federal, state and local government employing units. If the information disclosed under this
15 paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the
16 information shall be paid by the party requesting the information.

17 “(r) Disclose to any person the industrial classification code assigned to an employing unit. If
18 the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment De-
19 partment, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the party requesting the informa-
20 tion.

21 “(5) The Employment Department may make public all decisions of the Employment Appeals
22 Board.

23 “(6) Any officer appointed by or any employee of the Director of the Employment Department
24 who discloses confidential information, except with the authority of the director, pursuant to rules
25 or as otherwise required by law, may be disqualified from holding any appointment or employment
26 with the Employment Department.

27 “(7) Any person or any officer or employee of an entity to whom information is disclosed by the
28 Employment Department under this section who divulges or uses the information for any purpose
29 other than that specified in the provision of law or agreement authorizing the use or disclosure may
30 be disqualified from performing any service under contract or disqualified from holding any ap-
31 pointment or employment with the state agency that engaged or employed that person, officer or
32 employee. The Employment Department may immediately cancel or modify any information sharing
33 agreement with an entity when a person or an officer or employee of that entity discloses confi-
34 dential information, other than as specified in law or agreement.

35 “**SECTION 40.** ORS 657.730 is amended to read:

36 “657.730. (1) As used in this section, unless the context requires otherwise:

37 “(a) ‘Labor market analysis’ means the measurement and evaluation of economic forces as they
38 relate to the employment process in the local labor market area. Variables affecting labor market
39 relationships include, but are not limited to, such factors as labor force changes and characteristics,
40 population changes and characteristics, occupational and industrial structure and development,
41 technological developments, shifts in consumer demand, volume and extent of unionization and trade
42 disputes, recruitment practices, wage levels, conditions of employment and training opportunities.

43 “(b) ‘Labor market area’ means an economically integrated geographic area within which indi-
44 viduals can reside and find employment within a reasonable distance or can readily change em-
45 ployment without changing their place of residence. Such areas shall be identified in accordance

1 with criteria used by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor in
2 defining such areas or similar criteria established by the Director of the Employment Department.
3 The area generally takes the name of its community. The boundaries depend primarily on economic
4 and geographic factors. The State of Oregon is divided into labor market areas, which usually in-
5 clude a county or group of contiguous counties.

6 “(c) ‘Labor market information’ means the body of information generated from measurement and
7 evaluation of the socioeconomic factors and variables influencing the employment process in the
8 state and specific labor market areas. These socioeconomic factors and variables affect labor de-
9 mand and supply relationships and include:

10 “(A) Labor force information, which includes but is not limited to employment, unemployment,
11 labor force participation, labor turnover and mobility, average hours and earnings and changes and
12 characteristics of the population and labor force within specific labor market areas and the state;

13 “(B) Occupational information, which includes but is not limited to occupational supply and de-
14 mand estimates and projections, characteristics of occupations, wage levels, job duties, training and
15 education requirements, conditions of employment, unionization, retirement practices and training
16 opportunities;

17 “(C) Economic information, which includes but is not limited to number of business starts and
18 stops by industry and labor market area, information on employment growth and decline by industry
19 and labor market area, employer establishment data and number of union disputes and strikes by
20 industry and labor market area; and

21 “(D) Program information, which includes but is not limited to program participant or student
22 information gathered in cooperation with other state and local agencies along with related labor
23 market information to evaluate the effectiveness, efficiency and impact of state and local employ-
24 ment, training, education and job creation efforts in support of planning, management, implementa-
25 tion and evaluation.

26 “(2) The Director of the Employment Department shall have the following duties:

27 “(a) Oversight, operation and management of a statewide comprehensive labor market and oc-
28 cupational supply and demand information system, including development of a five-year employment
29 forecast for state and labor market areas.

30 “(b) Preparation of local labor market information packages for the state’s workforce system,
31 including special studies and job impact analyses in support of state and local employment, training,
32 education and job creation programs, especially activities that prevent job loss, reduce unemploy-
33 ment and create jobs.

34 “(c) Coordination with other appropriate public agencies to improve employment estimates by
35 enhancing data on corporate officers, improving business establishment listings, expanding samples
36 for employment estimates and developing business entry or exit analysis relevant to the generation
37 of occupational and economic forecasts.

38 “(d) Production of long-term and occupational employment forecasts in cooperation with other
39 appropriate agencies.

40 “(e) Coordination with state workforce agencies as defined in ORS 660.300 to study ways to
41 standardize federal and state multiagency administrative records, such as unemployment insurance
42 information and other information to produce employment, training, education and economic analysis
43 needed to improve labor market information products and services.

44 “(f) Production of labor market information and economic analysis needed to facilitate the effi-
45 cient and effective matching of the supply and demand of labor critical to an effective labor ex-

1 change in Oregon. Information collected will be coordinated with other public agencies through
2 cooperative data collection efforts for statistical analysis, research or studies including, but not
3 limited to, agricultural labor supply and demand, high performance organizations, targeted industries
4 programs, and industrial improvement and expansion.

5 “(g) Administration of other appropriate labor market information activities including support
6 of efforts by local workforce [*investment*] **development** boards, as defined in ORS 660.300, to align
7 economic development, education and training with workforce development investments and services
8 for job seekers and businesses to efficiently address local labor market needs and statewide
9 workforce development priorities.

10 “(3) To implement this section, the director shall have authority to:

11 “(a) Establish rules and procedures to recover reasonable costs incurred in producing and pro-
12 viding:

13 “(A) Labor market information products developed by the Employment Department in the ordi-
14 nary course of business when the request results in costs over and above the ordinary costs of
15 production including, but not limited to, special publication runs, photocopying or supplying the
16 copy in some other medium; and

17 “(B) Special labor market information products in response to individual requests that incur
18 costs beyond the ordinary costs of doing business including, but not limited to, computer time, staff
19 costs, preparation and distribution of surveys, electronic scanning, and special data collection, for-
20 matted and analysis. The director may enter into agreements with other public agencies to provide
21 special labor market information products in a quid pro quo arrangement.

22 “(b) Receive federal set aside funds from federal programs that are authorized to fund state and
23 local labor market information and are required to use such information in support of their pro-
24 grams.

25 “(c) Enter into agreements for statistical analysis, research or evaluation studies of privately
26 and publicly funded employment, training, education and economic development programs.

27 “**SECTION 41.** ORS 657.734 is amended to read:

28 “657.734. (1) As used in this section:

29 “(a) ‘Public body’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 192.410.

30 “(b) ‘System participant’ means:

31 “(A) Mandatory partners under the federal Workforce [*Investment Act of 1998 (enacted as P.L.*
32 *105-220 and codified as 29 U.S.C. 2801 et seq.)*] **Innovation and Opportunity Act** and other one-stop
33 system partners, which may include public bodies and private organizations; and

34 “(B) Public bodies and private organizations that have been approved by the Director of the
35 Employment Department, in consultation with the Education and Workforce Policy Advisor, to par-
36 ticipate in the Performance Reporting Information System.

37 “(2) There is established the Performance Reporting Information System for the purpose of col-
38 lecting, analyzing and sharing statistical and demographic data for the development and reporting
39 of workforce system performance measures.

40 “(3) The Performance Reporting Information System is intended to share the data described in
41 subsection (2) of this section, by agreement, with all system participants.

42 “(4) The Director of the Employment Department shall administer and, in consultation with the
43 Education and Workforce Policy Advisor, oversee the development of the Performance Reporting
44 Information System. System participants shall be designated as participants in the system by rule
45 of the Employment Department, in consultation with the Education and Workforce Policy Advisor.

1 A system participant shall enter into an interagency or other applicable agreement with the director
2 that:

3 “(a) Establishes protocols for the collection and sharing of data in the system;

4 “(b) Establishes safeguards for protecting the confidentiality of data in the system;

5 “(c) Includes provisions regarding informed consent for sharing information obtained from indi-
6 viduals; and

7 “(d) Provides for the sharing of costs for developing and maintaining the system.

8 “(5)(a) All individual record information in the Performance Reporting Information System is
9 confidential and may not be disclosed as a public record under the provisions of ORS 192.410 to
10 192.505. As administrator of the system, the director may view all data or individual record infor-
11 mation in the system. System participants may not allow public access to information received from
12 the system that identifies a particular individual unless required by law. System participants shall
13 limit the disclosure of, or refuse to disclose, aggregate or summary level information when a small
14 number of aggregated records or some other factor creates a reasonable risk that the identity of
15 individuals may be discovered or disclosed.

16 “(b) System participants shall provide information in a format that encodes identifying data, in-
17 cluding the client’s Social Security number, using a formula unique to the system participant. In
18 disclosing Social Security numbers to the system, system participants shall comply with any state
19 and federal laws that govern the collection and use of Social Security numbers by the system par-
20 ticipant and any additional requirements specified by the director, in consultation with the Educa-
21 tion and Workforce Policy Advisor, that are included in the agreement entered into under subsection
22 (4) of this section.

23 “(6) The information in the Performance Reporting Information System is not a public record for
24 purposes of ORS 192.410 to 192.505. For purposes of ORS 192.410 to 192.505, the information sub-
25 mitted to the system and the information received from the system is a public record, and the
26 custodian of such information is the system participant that submits or receives the information. If
27 the system participant receiving the information is not a public body, the department shall keep a
28 copy of the system information sent to that system participant and shall be the custodian of that
29 copy for purposes of ORS 192.410 to 192.505. As custodian, the department shall limit the disclosure
30 of, or refuse to disclose, aggregate or summary level information when a small number of aggregated
31 records or some other factor creates a reasonable risk that the identity of individuals may be dis-
32 covered or disclosed. The department shall refer all other requests for disclosure of system infor-
33 mation to the public body that is the custodian of the information.

34 “(7) The department may charge a reasonable fee under ORS 192.440 for the disclosure of re-
35 ports containing only aggregate data to individuals, public bodies or private organizations.

36 “(8) If a system participant prepares or acquires a record that is confidential under federal or
37 state law, including ORS 192.502 (2), the system participant does not violate state confidentiality
38 laws by providing the information described in this section to the Performance Reporting Informa-
39 tion System. Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS 279C.815 (4), 279C.850 (3), 657.665 and 660.339,
40 the Bureau of Labor and Industries, the [*Office of Community Colleges and Workforce Development*]
41 **Higher Education Coordinating Commission** and the Employment Department are authorized to
42 provide information to the system.

43 “(9) Any individual who, without proper authority, discloses confidential information under this
44 section may be disqualified from holding any appointment or employment with the State of Oregon.
45 The department shall adopt by rule procedures to prevent disclosure of confidential information

1 submitted to the Performance Reporting Information System.

2 **“SECTION 42. ORS 284.290, 284.292, 284.294 and 284.297 are repealed.**

3 **“SECTION 43. This 2017 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2017**
4 **regular session of the Seventy-ninth Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.”.**

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
