

# A-Engrossed Senate Bill 908

Ordered by the Senate April 24  
Including Senate Amendments dated April 24

Sponsored by Senator BEYER

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes Oregon Energy Commission as policy and rulemaking body for State Department of Energy. Transfers certain duties of State Department of Energy and Director of State Department of Energy to commission.

Modifies state energy policy.

Modifies general duties of department.

Requires department to develop statewide strategic energy plan. Requires commission to adopt plan no later than January 1, 2020. Requires department to present draft plan to Legislative Assembly no later than September 15, 2019. Requires commission to periodically review and update plan.

Requires department to provide biennial comprehensive energy report to Governor and Legislative Assembly.

Becomes operative January 1, 2018.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

**Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

## ENERGY POLICY

**SECTION 1.** ORS 469.010 is amended to read:

469.010. The Legislative Assembly finds and declares that:

(1) Continued growth in demand for [*nonrenewable energy forms*] **energy, at affordable cost,** poses a serious and immediate, as well as future, **concern.** [*problem. It is essential that future generations not be left a legacy of vanished or depleted resources, resulting in massive environmental, social and financial impact.*]

**NOTE:** Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (2) It is the goal of Oregon to promote the efficient use of energy resources [*and to develop*  
2 *permanently sustainable energy resources. The need exists for comprehensive state leadership in energy*  
3 *production, distribution and utilization.*] **consistent with state environmental policy.** It is, there-  
4 fore, the policy of Oregon:

5 (a) That **the** development and use of a diverse array of **affordable, sustainable energy re-**  
6 **sources be encouraged.** [*permanently sustainable energy resources be encouraged utilizing to the*  
7 *highest degree possible the private sector of our free enterprise system.*]

8 (b) That through state government example and **policy** [*other effective communications*], energy  
9 conservation and elimination of wasteful and uneconomical uses of energy and materials be pro-  
10 moted. [*This conservation must include, but not be limited to, resource recovery and materials recycl-*  
11 *ing.*]

12 [*(c) That the basic human needs of every citizen, present and future, shall be given priority in the*  
13 *allocation of energy resources, commensurate with perpetuation of a free and productive economy with*  
14 *special attention to the preservation and enhancement of environmental quality.*]

15 [*(d) That state government assist every citizen and industry in adjusting to a diminished avail-*  
16 *ability of energy.*]

17 [*(e) That energy-efficient modes of transportation for people and goods shall be encouraged, while*  
18 *energy-inefficient modes of transportation shall be discouraged.*]

19 **(c) That energy-efficient modes of transportation shall be encouraged.**

20 [(f)] **(d) That cost-effectiveness, balanced with environmental policy considerations,** be con-  
21 sidered in [state] agency decision-making relating to [energy sources, facilities or conservation, and  
22 that cost-effectiveness be considered in all agency decision-making relating to energy facilities] **energy**  
23 **conservation and energy facilities that generate electric power for sale.**

24 [(g)] **(e) That state government shall provide a source of impartial and objective information in**  
25 **order that this energy policy may be enhanced.**

26  
27 **PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE OREGON ENERGY COMMISSION**

28  
29 **(Establishment)**

30  
31 **SECTION 2. Sections 3 and 5 of this 2017 Act are added to and made a part of ORS 469.010**  
32 **to 469.155.**

33 **SECTION 3. (1) There is created an Oregon Energy Commission. The commission shall**  
34 **consist of five voting members, appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by**  
35 **the Senate as provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.**

36 **(2) All voting members of the commission must be well informed in energy and climate**  
37 **issues and shall be appointed as follows:**

38 **(a) One member shall be an economist;**

39 **(b) One member shall have a higher education background;**

40 **(c) One member shall represent residential energy users;**

41 **(d) One member shall represent commercial and industrial energy users; and**

42 **(e) One member shall have transportation expertise.**

43 **(3) No voting member of the commission shall:**

44 **(a) Hold any pecuniary interest in any business entity conducting operations that, if**  
45 **conducted in this state, would be subject to the commission's regulatory jurisdiction; or**

1 (b) Hold any pecuniary interest in, have any contract of employment with or have any  
2 substantial voluntary transactions with any business or activity subject to the commission's  
3 regulatory jurisdiction.

4 (4) One Oregon member of the Pacific Northwest Electric Power and Conservation Plan-  
5 ning Council shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member of the commission.

6 (5) The term of office of a voting member of the commission shall be four years, but the  
7 members of the commission may be removed by the Governor. Before the expiration of the  
8 term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor to assume the duties of the  
9 member on July 1 of the next following year. A member shall be eligible for reappointment,  
10 but no member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. In case of a vacancy for any  
11 cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the  
12 unexpired term.

13 (6) The commission shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice  
14 chairperson, for terms and with duties and powers necessary for the performance of the  
15 functions of the offices as the commission determines.

16 (7) A majority of the voting members of the commission constitutes a quorum for the  
17 transaction of business.

18 (8) A member of the commission is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in  
19 ORS 292.495.

20 **SECTION 4.** Notwithstanding the term of office specified by section 3 of this 2017 Act,  
21 of the voting members first appointed to the Oregon Energy Commission:

22 (1) One shall serve for a term ending January 1, 2019.

23 (2) One shall serve for a term ending January 1, 2020.

24 (3) One shall serve for a term ending January 1, 2021.

25 (4) Two shall serve for terms ending January 1, 2022.

26  
27 (Functions, General Authority to Adopt Rules)  
28

29 **SECTION 5.** (1) It is the function of the Oregon Energy Commission to establish the  
30 policies for the operation of the State Department of Energy in a manner consistent with the  
31 policy stated in ORS 469.010.

32 (2) In accordance with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the commission shall  
33 adopt rules and issue orders as necessary for the administration of the laws that the com-  
34 mission, the Director of the State Department of Energy and the department are charged  
35 with administering.

36 (3) Except as provided in ORS 183.335 (5), the commission shall cause a public hearing to  
37 be held on any proposed rule or standard prior to its adoption. The hearing may be before  
38 the commission, any designated member thereof or any person designated by and acting for  
39 the commission.

40 (4) This section does not limit the authority granted the Energy Facility Siting Council  
41 under ORS 469.300 to 469.563, 469.590 to 469.619, 469.930 and 469.992.  
42

43 **TRANSFER OF RULEMAKING AUTHORITY FROM STATE**  
44 **DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY TO OREGON ENERGY COMMISSION**  
45

(Transfer)

**SECTION 6.** (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the duties, functions and powers of the State Department of Energy and the Director of the State Department of Energy relating to the establishment of policy for the operations of the department and the adoption of rules are imposed upon, transferred to and vested in the Oregon Energy Commission.

(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not affect, alter, transfer or limit the authority granted to the Energy Facility Siting Council under ORS 469.300 to 469.563, 469.590 to 469.619, 469.930 and 469.992, or the authority of the director granted under ORS 469.040 (1)(a) in supervising and facilitating the work and research on energy facility siting applications at the direction of the council.

(Action, Proceeding, Prosecution)

**SECTION 7.** The transfer of duties, functions and powers to the Oregon Energy Commission by section 6 of this 2017 Act does not affect any action, proceeding or prosecution involving or with respect to the duties, functions and powers begun before and pending at the time of the transfer, except that the Oregon Energy Commission is substituted for the State Department of Energy or the Director of the State Department of Energy in the action, proceeding or prosecution.

(Liability, Duty, Obligation)

**SECTION 8.** (1) Nothing in sections 2 to 10 or 14 to 17 of this 2017 Act, the amendments to statutes and session law by sections 1, 11, 12 and 18 to 105 of this 2017 Act or the repeal of statutes by section 13 of this 2017 Act relieves a person of a liability, duty or obligation accruing under or with respect to the duties, functions and powers transferred by section 6 of this 2017 Act. The Oregon Energy Commission may undertake the collection or enforcement of any such liability, duty or obligation.

(2) The rights and obligations of the State Department of Energy legally incurred under contracts, leases and business transactions executed, entered into or begun before the operative date of section 6 of this 2017 Act accruing under or with respect to the duties, functions and powers transferred by section 6 of this 2017 Act are transferred to the Oregon Energy Commission. For the purpose of succession to these rights and obligations, the Oregon Energy Commission is a continuation of the State Department of Energy and the Director of the State Department of Energy and not a new authority.

(Rules)

**SECTION 9.** Notwithstanding the transfer of duties, functions and powers by section 6 of this 2017 Act, the rules of the State Department of Energy and the Director of the State Department of Energy with respect to such duties, functions or powers that are in effect on the operative date of section 6 of this 2017 Act continue in effect until superseded or repealed by rules of the Oregon Energy Commission. References in the rules of the State Department

1 of Energy to the State Department of Energy or an officer or employee of the State De-  
2 partment of Energy with respect to the duties, functions and powers transferred by section  
3 6 of this 2017 Act are considered to be references to the Oregon Energy Commission.

4 **SECTION 10.** Whenever, in any statutory or uncodified law or resolution of the Legisla-  
5 tive Assembly or in any rule, document, record or proceeding authorized by the Legislative  
6 Assembly, in the context of the duties, functions and powers transferred by section 6 of this  
7 2017 Act, reference is made to the State Department of Energy, the Director of the State  
8 Department of Energy or an officer or employee of the State Department of Energy whose  
9 duties, functions or powers are transferred by section 6 of this 2017 Act, the reference is  
10 considered to be a reference to the Oregon Energy Commission or an officer or employee of  
11 the Oregon Energy Commission who by this 2017 Act is charged with carrying out the duties,  
12 functions and powers.

14 **STATE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY ADMINISTRATION**

15  
16 **(Modification of General Duties)**

17  
18 **SECTION 11.** ORS 469.030 is amended to read:

19 469.030. *[(1) There is created the State Department of Energy.]*

20 **(1) There is created under the Oregon Energy Commission a department to be known as**  
21 **the State Department of Energy. The department shall consist of the Director of the State**  
22 **Department of Energy and all personnel employed in the department. The primary purpose**  
23 **of the department shall be to provide expert advice to the Governor and the Legislative As-**  
24 **sembly on energy-related matters.**

25 **(2) Subject to the policy direction of the Oregon Energy Commission, and in furtherance**  
26 **of the purpose stated in subsection (1) of this section, the State Department of Energy shall:**

27 (a) **[Be] Collect, compile and analyze energy data and serve as** the central repository within  
28 the state government for *[the collection of data on energy resources;]* **energy information, to which**  
29 **all agencies shall send information on all energy-related research;**

30 **(b) Monitor energy industry research and developments;**

31 *[(b) Endeavor to utilize all public and private sources to inform and educate the public about en-*  
32 *ergy problems and ways in which the public can conserve energy resources;]*

33 (c) Engage in research, but whenever possible, contract with appropriate public or private  
34 agencies and disburse funds for research projects and other services related to energy resources,  
35 except that the State Department of Energy shall endeavor to avoid duplication of research whether  
36 completed or in progress;

37 (d) Qualify for, accept and disburse or utilize any private or federal moneys or services available  
38 for the administration of ORS *[176.820,]* 192.501 to 192.505, *[192.690,]* 469.010 to 469.155, 469.300 to  
39 469.563, 469.990, 757.710 and 757.720;

40 (e) Administer federal and state energy allocation and conservation programs and energy re-  
41 search and development programs and apply for and receive available funds *[therefor]* **for the pro-**  
42 **grams;**

43 *[(f) Be a clearinghouse for energy research to which all agencies shall send information on all*  
44 *energy related research;]*

45 *[(g)]* **(f) Prepare contingent energy programs to include all forms of energy not otherwise pro-**

1 vided pursuant to ORS 757.710 and 757.720;

2 *[(h) Maintain an inventory of energy research projects in Oregon and the results thereof;]*

3 *[(i) Collect, compile and analyze energy statistics, data and information;]*

4 *[(j)]* (g) Contract with public and private agencies for energy activities consistent with ORS  
5 469.010 and this section;

6 *[(k)]* (h) Upon request of the governing body of any affected jurisdiction, coordinate a public  
7 review of a proposed transmission line according to the provisions of ORS 469.442; and

8 *[(L) Advise the Governor on energy-related matters.]*

9 (i) **Provide staff support to the Oregon Hanford Cleanup Board, the Energy Facility Siting  
10 Council and the Oregon Global Warming Commission.**

11  
12 (Director)

13  
14 **SECTION 12.** ORS 469.040 is amended to read:

15 469.040. (1) The State Department of Energy shall be under the supervision of the Director of  
16 the State Department of Energy, who shall:

17 *[(a) Supervise the day-to-day functions of the State Department of Energy;]*

18 *[(b)]* (a) Supervise and facilitate the work and research on energy facility siting applications at  
19 the direction of the Energy Facility Siting Council; **and**

20 **(b) Subject to the direction of the Oregon Energy Commission:**

21 **(A) Supervise the day-to-day functions of the State Department of Energy; and**

22 *[(c)]* (B) Hire, assign, reassign and coordinate personnel of the State Department of Energy,  
23 prescribe their duties and fix their compensation, subject to the State Personnel Relations Law;  
24 *and*].

25 *[(d) Adopt rules and issue orders to carry out the duties of the director and the State Department  
26 of Energy in accordance with ORS chapter 183 and the policy stated in ORS 469.010.]*

27 (2) The director may delegate to any officer or employee the exercise and discharge in the  
28 director's name of any power, duty or function of whatever character vested in the director by law.  
29 The official act of any person acting in the director's name and by the director's authority shall be  
30 considered an official act of the director.

31 (3) The director shall be appointed by the *[Governor]* **Oregon Energy Commission, subject to  
32 confirmation by the Senate in the manner provided by ORS 171.562 and 171.565.**

33  
34 (Statewide Strategic Energy Plan)

35  
36 **SECTION 13.** ORS 469.060 and 469.070 are repealed.

37 **SECTION 14.** Sections 15 and 17 of this 2017 Act are added to and made a part of ORS  
38 469.010 to 469.155.

39 **SECTION 15.** (1) The State Department of Energy shall develop a statewide strategic  
40 energy plan to implement the energy policies stated in ORS 469.010 and 469.310 in a manner  
41 that:

42 (a) Takes a balanced approach to addressing the competing interests affected by the  
43 policies stated in ORS 469.010 and 469.310; and

44 (b) Provides for transparency and accountability in the actions of the department and the  
45 Oregon Energy Commission.

1 (2) The statewide strategic energy plan shall include:

2 (a) A description of this state's long-term energy needs;

3 (b) The objectives of the plan;

4 (c) Actions that are designed to achieve the objectives of the plan;

5 (d) Plans related to the challenges presented by climate change;

6 (e) Provisions to ensure communication and partnership with key stakeholders;

7 (f) Quantitative and qualitative metrics for assessing the performance of the commission  
8 and the department in implementing the plan, which shall include, but need not be limited  
9 to, metrics related to:

10 (A) The consumption, generation, transmission and production of energy, including fuel  
11 energy;

12 (B) Energy costs;

13 (C) Energy sectors, markets, technologies, resources and facilities;

14 (D) Energy efficiency and conservation;

15 (E) The effects of energy use, including effects related to greenhouse gas emissions;

16 (g) Specific functions and roles to be performed by other state agencies in coordinating  
17 with the department to ensure a unified, statewide approach to addressing the energy needs  
18 and goals of this state consistent with state environmental policy and the policies set forth  
19 in ORS 469.010 and 469.310; and

20 (h) Public policy options and recommendations.

21 (3) The statewide strategic energy plan shall take effect upon adoption by the commis-  
22 sion.

23 (4) The commission shall periodically review and update the statewide strategic energy  
24 plan. The review required by this section shall include an analysis of how each of the pro-  
25 grams of the department contributes to meeting the goals of the statewide strategic energy  
26 plan and how each program can most effectively be administered in furtherance of the plan.  
27 Revisions of the plan shall take effect upon the commission's adoption of the revised plan  
28 by reference in rule.

29 **SECTION 16.** (1) The Oregon Energy Commission shall initially adopt the statewide  
30 strategic energy plan required by section 15 of this 2017 Act no later than January 1, 2020.

31 (2) The State Department of Energy shall prepare a draft statewide strategic energy plan  
32 and a report, that may include recommendations for legislation, on the draft plan. The de-  
33 partment shall, no later than September 15, 2019, submit the draft plan and the report to the  
34 appropriate interim committees of the Legislative Assembly in the manner provided under  
35 ORS 192.245.

36 **SECTION 17.** (1) No later than November 1 of every even-numbered year, the State De-  
37 partment of Energy shall transmit to the Governor and the Legislative Assembly a compre-  
38 hensive report on energy resources, policies, trends and forecasts in Oregon. The purposes  
39 of the report shall be to inform local, state, regional and federal energy policy development,  
40 energy planning and energy investments and to identify opportunities to further the energy  
41 policies stated in ORS 469.010 and 469.310 in conformance with the statewide strategic energy  
42 plan required under section 15 of this 2017 Act.

43 (2) Consistent with the legislatively approved budget, the report shall include, but need  
44 not be limited to:

45 (a) Information on and analysis of the state's progress toward achieving the goals of the

1 statewide strategic energy plan required by section 15 of this 2017 Act and on the effective-  
2 ness of the department's programs in contributing to meeting the goals of the plan.

3 (b) Information on the impact of activities carried out by the Oregon Energy Commission  
4 and the department on achieving the greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals set forth in  
5 ORS 468A.205.

6 (c) Data and information on:

7 (A) The consumption, generation, transmission and production of energy, including fuel  
8 energy;

9 (B) Energy costs;

10 (C) Energy sectors, markets, technologies, resources and facilities;

11 (D) Energy efficiency and conservation;

12 (E) The effects of energy use, including effects related to greenhouse gas emissions;

13 (F) Local, state, regional and federal regulations, policies and planning activities related  
14 to energy; and

15 (G) Emerging energy opportunities, challenges and impacts.

16 (3) The report may include, but need not be limited to:

17 (a) Recommendations for the development and maximum use of cost-effective conserva-  
18 tion methods and renewable resources, consistent with the statewide strategic energy plan,  
19 the energy policies stated in ORS 469.010 and 469.310 and, where appropriate, the energy plan  
20 and fish and wildlife program adopted by the Pacific Northwest Electric Power and Conser-  
21 vation Planning Council pursuant to P.L. 96-501; and

22 (b) Recommendations for proposed research, development and demonstration projects  
23 and programs necessary to further the purposes of the statewide strategic energy plan and  
24 energy policies stated in ORS 469.010 and 469.310.

25 (4) The report shall be compiled by collecting, organizing and refining data and informa-  
26 tion:

27 (a) Acquired by the department in the performance of the department's existing duties;  
28 or

29 (b) Required by the commission by rule to be submitted to the department for purposes  
30 of compiling the report.

31 (5) Upon request from the department, other agencies shall assist the department in the  
32 performance of the department's duties under this section.

33 (6) The department shall seek public input and provide opportunities for public comment  
34 during the development of the report.

35  
36 (Other State Department of Energy Administrative Provisions)

37  
38 **SECTION 18.** ORS 469.085 is amended to read:

39 469.085. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, civil penalties under ORS 469.992 shall  
40 be imposed as provided in ORS 183.745.

41 (2) Notwithstanding ORS 183.745 (2), the notice to the person against whom a civil penalty is  
42 to be imposed shall reflect a complete statement of the consideration given to the factors listed in  
43 subsection (7) of this section. The notice may be served by either the [*Director of the State Depart-*  
44 *ment of Energy*] **Oregon Energy Commission** or the Energy Facility Siting Council.

45 (3) Notwithstanding ORS 183.745, if a hearing is not requested or if the person requesting a

1 hearing fails to appear, a final order shall be entered upon a prima facie case made on the record  
2 of the agency.

3 (4) The provisions of this section are in addition to and not in lieu of any other penalty or  
4 sanction provided by law. An action taken by the [director] **commission** or the council under this  
5 section may be joined by the [director] **commission** or the council with any other action against the  
6 same person under this chapter.

7 (5) Any civil penalty recovered under this section shall be paid into the General Fund.

8 (6) The [director] **commission** or the council shall adopt by rule a schedule of the amount of  
9 civil penalty that may be imposed for a particular violation.

10 (7) In imposing a penalty under ORS 469.992, the [director] **commission** or the council shall  
11 consider:

12 (a) The past history of the person incurring a penalty in taking all feasible steps or procedures  
13 necessary or appropriate to correct or prevent any violation;

14 (b) Any prior violations of ORS chapter 469 or rules, orders or permits relating to the alleged  
15 violation;

16 (c) The impact of the violation on public health and safety or public interests in fishery, navi-  
17 gation and recreation;

18 (d) Any other factors determined by the [director] **commission** or the council to be relevant;  
19 and

20 (e) The alleged violator's cooperativeness and effort to correct the violation.

21 (8) The penalty imposed under ORS 469.992 may be remitted or mitigated upon such terms and  
22 conditions as the [director] **commission** or council determines to be proper. Upon the request of the  
23 person incurring the penalty, the [director] **commission** or council shall consider evidence of the  
24 economic and financial condition of the person in determining whether a penalty shall be remitted  
25 or mitigated.

26 **SECTION 19.** ORS 469.110 is amended to read:

27 469.110. (1) At the direction of the [Director of the State Department of Energy] **Oregon Energy**  
28 **Commission**, the State Department of Energy may represent the state's energy-related interests in  
29 any matter involving the federal government, its departments or agencies, which is within the scope  
30 of the power and duties of the State Department of Energy, and may, upon request, represent the  
31 interest of a county, city, state agency, federally recognized Native American or American Indian  
32 tribe, special district or owner or operator of an energy facility.

33 (2) At the direction of the [director] **commission**, the department may intervene in any pro-  
34 ceeding undertaken by an agency for the purpose of expressing its views as to the effect of an  
35 agency action, upon state energy resources and state energy policy.

36 **SECTION 20.** ORS 469.120 is amended to read:

37 469.120. (1) The State Department of Energy Account is established.

38 (2) The account shall consist of all funds received by the State Department of Energy pursuant  
39 to law. All moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the State Department of Energy  
40 for payment of expenses of the department, **the Oregon Energy Commission** and [of] the Energy  
41 Facility Siting Council.

42 (3) Moneys collected under ORS 469.421 (8) may be expended only for the purposes of programs  
43 and activities that the **commission, the** council and the department are charged with administering  
44 and authorized to conduct under the laws of this state, including those enumerated in ORS 469.030.

45 (4) The Director of the State Department of Energy shall keep a record of all moneys deposited

1 in the account. The record shall indicate by special cumulative accounts the source from which  
2 moneys are derived and the individual activity or program, including any activities described in ORS

4 shall make available, upon request, the record for the prior fiscal year to any energy resource sup-  
5 plier that has paid the assessment imposed under ORS 469.421 (8). The director shall make the re-  
6 cord available within 30 days of receiving the request.

27 (2)(a) The [*State Department of Energy*] **Oregon Energy Commission** shall, in consultation with  
28 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, adopt rules establishing criteria for the com-  
29 parison of fuel cell power systems and other equipment options required by subsection (1) of this  
30 section.

31 (b) Criteria to be established under this subsection must address:

32 (A) The impact of emissions, including but not limited to nitrous oxide, sulfur oxide, carbon  
33 monoxide, carbon dioxide and particulates, from various equipment options, on the environment, re-  
34 gardless of whether the equipment is installed indoors or installed outdoors;

35 (B) Life cycle costs, including but not limited to acquisition costs, installation and commission-  
36 ing costs, siting and permitting costs, maintenance costs and fueling and decommissioning costs; and

38 **SECTION 23.** ORS 276.915 is amended to read:

39 276.915. (1) An authorized state agency may construct or renovate a facility only if the author-

41 servation measures and alternative energy systems. The determination by the authorized state  
42 agency shall include consideration of indoor air quality issues and operation and maintenance costs.

43 (2) Whenever an authorized state agency determines that a major facility is to be constructed  
44 or renovated, the authorized state agency shall cause to be included in the design phase of the  
45 construction or renovation a provision that requires an energy consumption analysis to be prepared

42 (B) Changes one biofuel into another type of biofuel; or

44 (d) "Biomass" means organic matter that is available on a renewable or recurring basis and that  
45 is derived from:

1 (A) Forest or rangeland woody debris from harvesting or thinning conducted to improve forest  
2 or rangeland ecological health and reduce uncharacteristic stand replacing wildfire risk;

3 (B) Wood material from hardwood timber described in ORS 321.267 (3);

4 (C) Agricultural residues;

5 (D) Offal and tallow from animal rendering;

6 (E) Food wastes collected as provided under ORS chapter 459 or 459A;

7 (F) Wood debris collected as provided under ORS chapter 459 or 459A;

8 (G) Wastewater solids; or

9 (H) Crops grown solely to be used for energy.

10 (e) "Biomass" does not mean wood that has been treated with creosote, pentachlorophenol, in-  
11 organic arsenic or other inorganic chemical compounds or waste, other than matter described in  
12 paragraph (d) of this subsection.

13 (f) "Biomass collector" means a person that collects biomass in Oregon to be used, in Oregon,  
14 as biofuel or to produce biofuel.

15 (g) "Canola" means plants of the genus Brassica:

16 (A) In which seeds having a high oil content are the primary economically valuable product; and

17 (B) That have a high erucic acid content suitable for industrial uses or a low erucic acid content  
18 suitable for edible oils.

19 (h) "Oilseed processor" means a person that receives agricultural oilseeds and separates them  
20 into meal and oil by mechanical or chemical means.

21 (i) "Willamette Valley" means Clackamas, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Washington and  
22 Yamhill Counties and the portion of Benton and Lane Counties lying east of the summit of the Coast  
23 Range.

24 (2) The [Director of the State Department of Energy] **Oregon Energy Commission** may adopt  
25 rules to define criteria, only as the criteria apply to organic biomass, to determine additional char-  
26 acteristics of biomass for purposes of this section.

27 (3)(a) An agricultural producer or biomass collector shall be allowed a credit against the taxes  
28 that would otherwise be due under ORS chapter 316 or, if the taxpayer is a corporation, under ORS

31 biofuel; or

  - 40 who on October 3, 1989, has a valid dealer system certification, which shall authorize the sale and
  - 41 installation of the same domestic water heating alternative energy devices authorized by the dealer
  - 42 certification.
  - 43 (e) If the State Department of Energy finds that an alternative energy device can meet the
  - 44 standards adopted under ORS 469B.103, the Director of the State Department of Energy may issue
  - 45 an alternative energy device system certificate to the taxpayer constructing or installing or having

1 an alternative energy device constructed or installed.

2 (f) An application for an alternative energy device system certificate shall be made in writing  
3 on a form provided by the State Department of Energy and shall contain:

4 (A) A specific description of the alternative energy device, including, but not limited to, the  
5 material, equipment and mechanism used in the device, operating procedure, sizing, siting method  
6 and construction or installation procedure;

7 (B) The constructed or installed cost of the device; and

8 (C) A statement that the taxpayer has all permits required for construction or installation of the

28 (c) The applicant was directly involved in an act for which the director has levied civil penalties  
29 or revoked, canceled or suspended any certification under ORS 469B.130 to 469B.169 or 469B.320 to  
30 469B.347; or

31 (d) The applicant or the principal, director, officer, owner, majority shareholder or member of  
32 the applicant, or the manager of the applicant if the applicant is a limited liability company, is in  
33 arrears for payments owed to any government agency while in any capacity with direct or indirect  
34 control over a business.

36 469B.332. (1) A final certification for a transportation project may not be issued by the Director

36 contractors is of high quality and will result in a high degree of customer satisfaction.

37 (2) The certification standards established by the [*department*] **commission** must, at a minimum,  
38 require that the primary contractor:

39 (a) Prove that the primary contractor and the primary contractor's subcontractors have suffi-  
40 cient skill to successfully install energy efficiency, renewable energy or weatherization projects.

41 (b) Not be a contractor listed by the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries under  
42 ORS 279C.860 as ineligible to receive a contract or subcontract for public works.

43 (c) Be an equal opportunity employer or small business or be a disadvantaged business enter-  
44 prise, a minority-owned business, a woman-owned business, a business that a service-disabled veteran  
45 owns or an emerging small business, as those terms are defined in ORS 200.005.

1 (d) Demonstrate a history of compliance with the rules and other requirements of the Con-  
2 struction Contractors Board and of the Workers' Compensation Division and the Occupational  
3 Safety and Health Division of the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

4 (e) Employ at least 80 percent of employees used for energy efficiency and sustainable technol-  
5 ogy loan program projects from the local work force, if a sufficient supply of skilled workers is  
6 available locally.

7 (f) Demonstrate a history of compliance with federal and state wage and hour laws.

8 (g) Pay wages to employees used for energy efficiency and sustainable technology loan program  
9 projects at a rate equal to at least 180 percent of the state minimum wage.

10 (3) The [*State Department of Energy*] **commission** shall consult with the Public Purpose Fund  
11 Administrator and utilities when developing certification standards for primary contractors.

12 (4) The Construction Contractors Board may issue a qualifying primary contractor a certifica-

7 stations and other equipment.

8 (9) "Distribution utility" means an electric utility that owns and operates a distribution system  
9 connecting the transmission grid to the retail electricity consumer.

10 (10) "Economic utility investment" means all electric company investments, including plants and  
11 equipment and contractual or other legal obligations, properly dedicated to generation or conser-  
12 vation, that were prudent at the time the obligations were assumed but the full benefits of which

17 (11) "Electric company" means an entity engaged in the business of distributing electricity to

20 chapter 62 or under the laws of another state if the service territory of the electric cooperative  
21 includes a portion of this state.

22 (13) "Electric utility" means an electric company or consumer-owned utility that is engaged in  
23 the business of distributing electricity to retail electricity consumers in this state.

24 (14) "Electricity" means electric energy, measured in kilowatt-hours, or electric capacity,

26 (15) "Electricity services" means electricity distribution, transmission, generation or

28 (16) "Electricity service supplier" means a person or entity that offers to sell electricity services

30 vice supplier" does not include an electric utility selling electricity to retail electricity consumers

40 (20) "Municipal electric utility" means an electric distribution utility owned and operated by or  
41 on behalf of a city.

42 (21) "New renewable energy resource" means a renewable energy resource project, or a new  
43 addition to an existing renewable energy resource project, or the electricity produced by the project,  
44 that is not in operation on July 23, 1999. "New renewable energy resource" does not include any  
45 portion of a renewable energy resource project under contract to the Bonneville Power Adminis-

1 tration on or before July 23, 1999.

2 (22) "One average megawatt" means 8,760,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity per year.

3 (23) "People's utility district" has the meaning given that term in ORS 261.010.

4 (24) "Portfolio access" means the ability of a retail electricity consumer to choose from a set  
5 of product and pricing options for electricity determined by the governing board of a consumer-  
6 owned utility and may include product and pricing options offered by the utility or by an electricity  
7 service supplier.

8 (25) "Power generation company" means a company engaged in the production and sale of  
9 electricity to wholesale customers, including but not limited to independent power producers, affil-  
10 iated generation companies, municipal and state authorities, provided the company is not regulated  
11 by the commission.

12 (26) "Qualifying expenditures" means those expenditures for energy conservation measures that  
13 have a simple payback period of not less than one year and not more than 10 years, and expen-  
14 ditures for the above-market costs of new renewable energy resources, provided that the [*State De-*  
15 *partment of Energy*] **Oregon Energy Commission** by rule may establish a limit on the maximum  
16 above-market cost for renewable energy that is allowed as a credit.

17 (27) "Renewable energy resources" means:

18 (a) Electricity generation facilities fueled by wind, waste, solar or geothermal power or by low-  
19 emission nontoxic biomass based on solid organic fuels from wood, forest and field residues.

20 (b) Dedicated energy crops available on a renewable basis.

21 (c) Landfill gas and digester gas.

22 (d) Hydroelectric facilities located outside protected areas as defined by federal law in effect  
23 on July 23, 1999.

24 (28) "Residential electricity consumer" means an electricity consumer who resides at a dwelling  
25 primarily used for residential purposes. "Residential electricity consumer" does not include retail  
26 electricity consumers in a dwelling typically used for residency periods of less than 30 days, in-  
27 cluding hotels, motels, camps, lodges and clubs. As used in this subsection, "dwelling" includes but  
28 is not limited to single family dwellings, separately metered apartments, adult foster homes, manu-

42 (33) "Transmission facility" means the plant and equipment used to transmit electricity in  
43 interstate commerce.

44 (34) "Undue market power" means the unfair or improper exercise of influence to increase or  
45 decrease the availability or price of a service or product in a manner inconsistent with competitive

1 markets.

2 (35) "Uneconomic utility investment" means all electric company investments, including plants  
3 and equipment and contractual or other legal obligations, properly dedicated to generation, conser-  
4 vation and workforce commitments, that were prudent at the time the obligations were assumed but  
5 the full costs of which are no longer recoverable as a direct result of ORS 757.600 to 757.667, absent  
6 transition charges. "Uneconomic utility investment" does not include costs or expenses disallowed  
7 by the commission in a prudence review or other proceeding, to the extent of such disallowance, and  
8 does not include fines or penalties as authorized by state or federal law.

9 **SECTION 104.** ORS 757.612 is amended to read:

10 757.612. (1) There is established an annual public purpose expenditure standard for electric

41 (c) The costs of administering subsections (1) to (6) of this section for an electric company or  
42 Oregon Community Power shall be paid out of the funds collected through public purpose charges.  
43 The commission may require that an electric company or Oregon Community Power direct funds  
44 collected through public purpose charges to the state agencies responsible for implementing sub-  
45 sections (1) to (6) of this section in order to pay the costs of administering such responsibilities.

1 (d) The commission shall direct the manner in which public purpose charges are collected and  
2 spent by an electric company or Oregon Community Power and may require an electric company  
3 or Oregon Community Power to expend funds through competitive bids or other means designed to  
4 encourage competition, except that funds dedicated for low-income weatherization shall be directed  
5 to the Housing and Community Services Department as provided in subsection (7) of this section.  
6 The commission may also direct that funds collected by an electric company or Oregon Community  
7 Power through public purpose charges be paid to a nongovernmental entity for investment in public  
8 purposes described in subsection (1) of this section. Notwithstanding any other provision of this  
9 subsection:

10 (A) At least 80 percent of the funds allocated for conservation shall be spent within the service  
11 area of the electric company that collected the funds; or

12 (B) If Oregon Community Power collected the funds, at least 80 percent of the funds allocated  
13 for conservation shall be spent within the service area of Oregon Community Power.

14 (e)(A) The first 10 percent of the funds collected annually by an electric company or Oregon  
15 Community Power under subsection (2) of this section shall be distributed to school districts that  
16 are located in the service territory of the electric company or Oregon Community Power. The funds  
17 shall be distributed to individual school districts according to the weighted average daily member-  
18 ship (ADMw) of each school district for the prior fiscal year as calculated under ORS 327.013. The  
19 commission shall establish by rule a methodology for distributing a proportionate share of funds  
20 under this paragraph to school districts that are only partially located in the service territory of the  
21 electric company or Oregon Community Power.

22 (B) A school district that receives funds under this paragraph shall use the funds first to pay  
23 for energy audits for schools located within the school district. A school district may not expend  
24 additional funds received under this paragraph on a school facility until an energy audit has been  
25 completed for that school facility. To the extent practicable, a school district shall coordinate with  
26 the State Department of Energy and incorporate federal funding in complying with this paragraph.  
27 Following completion of an energy audit for an individual school, the school district may expend  
28 funds received under this paragraph to implement the energy audit. Once an energy audit has been  
29 conducted and completely implemented for each school within the school district, the school district  
30 may expend funds received under this paragraph for any of the following purposes:

31 (i) Conducting energy audits. A school district shall conduct an energy audit prior to expending  
32 funds on any other purpose authorized under this paragraph unless the school district has performed  
33 an energy audit within the three years immediately prior to receiving the funds.

34 (ii) Weatherization and upgrading the energy efficiency of school district facilities.

35 (iii) Energy conservation education programs.

36 (iv) Purchasing electricity from environmentally focused sources and investing in renewable  
37 energy resources.

38 (f) The commission may not establish a different public purpose charge than the public purpose  
39 charge described in subsection (2) of this section.

40 (g) If the commission directs funds collected through public purpose charges to a nongovern-  
41 mental entity, the entity shall:

42 (A) Include on the entity's board of directors an ex officio member designated by the commis-  
43 sion, who shall also serve on the entity's nominating committee for filling board vacancies.

44 (B) Require the entity's officers and directors to provide an annual disclosure of economic in-  
45 terest to be filed with the commission on or prior to April 15 of each calendar year for public review

1 in a form similar to the statement of economic interest required for public officials under ORS  
2 244.060.

3 (C) Require the entity's officers and directors to declare actual and potential conflicts of interest  
4 at regular meetings of the entity's governing body when such conflicts arise, and require an officer  
5 or director to abstain from participating in any discussion or vote on any item where that officer  
6 or director has an actual conflict of interest. For the purposes of this subparagraph, "actual conflict  
7 of interest" and "potential conflict of interest" have the meanings given those terms in ORS 244.020.

8 (D) Arrange for an independent auditor to audit the entity's financial statements annually, and  
9 direct the auditor to file an audit opinion with the commission for public review.

10 (E) File with the commission annually the entity's budget, action plan and quarterly and annual  
11 reports for public review.

12 (F) At least once every five years, contract for an independent management evaluation to review  
13 the entity's operations, efficiency and effectiveness, and direct the independent reviewer to file a  
14 report with the commission for public review.

15 (h) The commission may remove from the board of directors of a nongovernmental entity an of-  
16 ficer or director who fails to provide an annual disclosure of economic interest or declare actual  
17 or potential conflict of interest, as described in paragraph (g)(B) and (C) of this subsection, in con-  
18 nection with the allocation or expenditure of funds collected through public purpose charges and  
19 directed to the entity.

20 (4)(a) An electric company that satisfies its obligations under this section shall have no further  
21 obligation to invest in conservation, new market transformation or new low-income weatherization  
22 or to provide a commercial energy conservation services program and is not subject to ORS 469.631  
23 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900.

24 (b) Oregon Community Power, for any period during which Oregon Community Power collects  
25 a public purpose charge under subsection (2) of this section:

26 (A) Shall have no other obligation to invest in conservation, new market transformation or new  
27 low-income weatherization or to provide a commercial energy conservation services program; and

28 (B) Is not subject to ORS 469.631 to 469.645 and 469.860 to 469.900.

29 (5)(a) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at  
30 any site in the prior year shall receive a credit against public purpose charges billed by an electric  
31 company or Oregon Community Power for that site. The amount of the credit shall be equal to the  
32 total amount of qualifying expenditures for new energy conservation, not to exceed 68 percent of the  
33 annual public purpose charges, and the above-market costs of purchases of new renewable energy  
34 resources incurred by the retail electricity consumer, not to exceed 19 percent of the annual public  
35 purpose charges, less administration costs incurred under this subsection. The credit may not ex-  
36 ceed, on an annual basis, the lesser of:

37 (A) The amount of the retail electricity consumer's qualifying expenditures; or

38 (B) The portion of the public purpose charge billed to the retail electricity consumer that is  
39 dedicated to new energy conservation, new market transformation or the above-market costs of new  
40 renewable energy resources.

41 (b) To obtain a credit under this subsection, a retail electricity consumer shall file with the  
42 State Department of Energy a description of the proposed conservation project or new renewable  
43 energy resource and a declaration that the retail electricity consumer plans to incur the qualifying  
44 expenditure. The State Department of Energy shall issue a notice of precertification within 30 days  
45 of receipt of the filing, if such filing is consistent with this subsection. The credit may be taken after

1 a retail electricity consumer provides a letter from a certified public accountant to the State De-  
2 partment of Energy verifying that the precertified qualifying expenditure has been made.

3 (c) Credits earned by a retail electricity consumer as a result of qualifying expenditures that  
4 are not used in one year may be carried forward for use in subsequent years.

5 (d)(A) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at  
6 any site in the prior year may request that the State Department of Energy hire an independent  
7 auditor to assess the potential for conservation investments at the site. If the independent auditor  
8 determines there is no available conservation measure at the site that would have a simple payback  
9 of one to 10 years, the retail electricity consumer shall be relieved of 54 percent of its payment  
10 obligation for public purpose charges related to the site. If the independent auditor determines that  
11 there are potential conservation measures available at the site, the retail electricity consumer shall  
12 be entitled to a credit against public purpose charges related to the site equal to 54 percent of the  
13 public purpose charges less the estimated cost of available conservation measures.

14 (B) A retail electricity consumer shall be entitled each year to the credit described in this sub-  
15 section unless a subsequent independent audit determines that new conservation investment oppor-  
16 tunities are available. The State Department of Energy may require that a new independent audit  
17 be performed on the site to determine whether new conservation measures are available, provided  
18 that the independent audits shall occur no more than once every two years.

19 (C) The retail electricity consumer shall pay the cost of the independent audits described in this  
20 subsection.

21 (6) Electric utilities and retail electricity consumers shall receive a fair and reasonable credit  
22 for the public purpose expenditures of their energy suppliers. The [*State Department of Energy*]  
23 **Oregon Energy Commission** shall adopt rules to determine eligible expenditures and the method-  
24 ology by which such credits are accounted for and used. The rules also shall adopt methods to ac-  
25 count for eligible public purpose expenditures made through consortia or collaborative projects.

26 (7)(a) In addition to the public purpose charge provided under subsection (2) of this section, an  
27 electric company or Oregon Community Power shall collect funds for low-income electric bill pay-  
28 ment assistance in an amount determined under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

29 (b) The **Public Utility** Commission shall establish the amount to be collected by each electric  
30 company in calendar year 2008 from retail electricity consumers served by the company, and the  
31 rates to be charged to retail electricity consumers served by the company, so that the total antic-  
32 ipated collection for low-income electric bill payment assistance by all electric companies in calen-  
33 dar year 2008 is \$15 million. In calendar year 2009 and subsequent calendar years, the commission  
34 may not change the rates established for retail electricity consumers, but the total amount collected  
35 in a calendar year for low-income electric bill payment assistance may vary based on electricity  
36 usage by retail electricity consumers and changes in the number of retail electricity consumers in  
37 this state. In no event shall a retail electricity consumer be required to pay more than \$500 per  
38 month per site for low-income electric bill payment assistance.

39 (c) Funds collected by the low-income electric bill payment assistance charge shall be paid into  
40 the Housing and Community Services Department Low-Income Electric Bill Payment Assistance  
41 Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2). Moneys deposited in the fund under this paragraph shall be  
42 used by the Housing and Community Services Department for the purpose of funding low-income  
43 electric bill payment assistance. The department's cost of administering this subsection shall be paid  
44 out of funds collected by the low-income electric bill payment assistance charge. Moneys deposited  
45 in the fund under this paragraph shall be expended solely for low-income electric bill payment as-

1 assistance. Funds collected from an electric company or Oregon Community Power shall be expended  
 2 in the service area of the electric company or Oregon Community Power from which the funds are  
 3 collected.

4 (d)(A) The Housing and Community Services Department shall determine the manner in which  
 5 funds collected under this subsection will be allocated by the department to energy assistance pro-  
 6 gram providers for the purpose of providing low-income bill payment and crisis assistance.

7 (B) The department shall investigate and may implement alternative delivery models in consul-  
 8 tation with electric companies to effectively reduce service disconnections and related costs to retail  
 9 electricity consumers and electric utilities.

10 (C) Priority assistance shall be directed to low-income electricity consumers who are in danger  
 11 of having their electricity service disconnected.

12 (D) The department shall maintain records and provide those records upon request to an electric  
 13 company, Oregon Community Power and the Citizens' Utility Board established under ORS chapter  
 14 774 on a quarterly basis. Records maintained must include the numbers of low-income electricity  
 15 consumers served, the average amounts paid and the type of assistance provided. Electric companies  
 16 and Oregon Community Power shall, if requested, provide the department with aggregate data re-  
 17 lating to consumers served on a quarterly basis to support program development.

18 (e) Interest on moneys deposited in the Housing and Community Services Department Low-  
 19 Income Electric Bill Payment Assistance Fund established by ORS 456.587 (2) may be used to pro-  
 20 vide bill payment and crisis assistance to electricity consumers whose primary source of heat is not  
 21 electricity.

22 (f) Notwithstanding ORS 757.310, the commission may allow an electric company or Oregon  
 23 Community Power to provide reduced rates or other payment or crisis assistance or low-income  
 24 program assistance to a low-income household eligible for assistance under the federal Low Income  
 25 Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981, as amended and in effect on July 23, 1999.

26 (8) For purposes of this section, "retail electricity consumers" includes any direct service in-  
 27 dustrial consumer that purchases electricity without purchasing distribution services from the elec-  
 28 tric utility.

29 (9) For purposes of this section, amounts collected by Oregon Community Power through public  
 30 purpose charges are not considered moneys received from electric utility operations.

31 **SECTION 105.** Section 9, chapter 774, Oregon Laws 2013, is amended to read:

32 **Sec. 9.** (1) A credit against the taxes that are otherwise due under ORS chapter 316 or, if the  
 33 taxpayer is a corporation, under ORS chapter 317 or 318, is allowed to a taxpayer for certified al-  
 34 ternative fuel vehicle contributions made by the taxpayer during the tax year to the Alternative  
 35 Fuel Vehicle Revolving Fund established under [section 2 of this 2013 Act] **ORS 469.961.**

36 (2)(a) The Department of Revenue shall, in cooperation with the State Department of Energy,  
 37 conduct an auction of tax credits under this section. The Department of Revenue may not auction  
 38 more than \$3 million of tax credits under this section. The department may conduct the auction in  
 39 the manner that the department determines is best suited to maximize the return to the state on the  
 40 sale of tax credit certifications and shall announce a reserve bid prior to conducting the auction.  
 41 The reserve amount shall be at least 95 percent of the total amount of the tax credit. Moneys nec-  
 42 essary to reimburse the Department of Revenue for the actual costs incurred by the department in  
 43 administering an auction, not to exceed 0.25 percent of auction proceeds, are continuously appro-  
 44 priated to the department. The Department of Revenue shall deposit net receipts from the auction  
 45 required under this section in the Alternative Fuel Vehicle Revolving Fund established under [sec-

1 *tion 2 of this 2013 Act*] **ORS 469.961**. Net receipts from the auction required under this section shall  
2 be used to provide loans as described in [*section 3 of this 2013 Act*] **ORS 469.962**.

3 (b) The [*State Department of Energy*] **Oregon Energy Commission** shall adopt rules for the  
4 administration and implementation of this section.

5 (3) Contributions made under this section shall be deposited in the Alternative Fuel Vehicle  
6 Revolving Fund.

7 (4)(a) Upon receipt of a contribution, the State Department of Energy shall issue to the taxpayer  
8 written certification of the amount certified for tax credit under this section to the extent the  
9 amount certified for tax credit, when added to all amounts previously certified for tax credit under  
10 this section, does not exceed \$3 million for the tax year beginning January 1, 2013.

11 (b) The State Department of Energy and the Department of Revenue are not liable, and a refund  
12 of a contributed amount need not be made, if a taxpayer who has received tax credit certification  
13 is unable to use all or a portion of the tax credit to offset the tax liability of the taxpayer.

14 (5) The tax credit allowed under this section for any one tax year may not exceed the tax li-  
15 ability of the taxpayer.

16 (6) Any tax credit otherwise allowable under this section that is not used by the taxpayer in a  
17 particular tax year may be carried forward and offset against the taxpayer's tax liability for the next  
18 succeeding tax year. Any credit remaining unused in the next succeeding tax year may be carried  
19 forward and used in the second succeeding tax year, and, likewise, any credit not used in the second  
20 succeeding tax year may be carried forward and used in the third succeeding tax year but may not  
21 be carried forward for any tax year thereafter.

22 (7) If a tax credit is claimed under this section by a nonresident or part-year resident taxpayer,  
23 the amount shall be allowed without proration under ORS 316.117.

24 (8) If the amount of contribution for which a tax credit certification is made is allowed as a  
25 deduction for federal tax purposes, the amount of the contribution shall be added to federal taxable  
26 income for Oregon tax purposes.

30 **SECTION 106.** (1) **Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, sections 2 to 10 and**  
31 **14 to 17 of this 2017 Act, the amendments to statutes and session law by sections 1, 11, 12**  
32 **and 18 to 105 of this 2017 Act and the repeal of statutes by section 13 of this 2017 Act become**  
33 **operative July 1, 2018.**

34 (2) **The members of the Oregon Energy Commission may be appointed and the State De-**  
35 **partment of Energy, the Director of the State Department of Energy and the Oregon Energy**  
36 **Commission may take any action before the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this**  
37 **section that is necessary to enable the department, the director and the commission to ex-**  
38 **ercise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, the duties,**  
39 **functions and powers of the department, the director and the commission pursuant to**  
40 **sections 2 to 10 and 14 to 17 of this 2017 Act, the amendments to statutes and session law**  
41 **by sections 1, 11, 12 and 18 to 105 of this 2017 Act and the repeal of statutes by section 13**  
42 **of this 2017 Act.**

43 (3) **The transfer of duties, functions and powers by section 6 of this 2017 Act does not**  
44 **become operative until the members of the Oregon Energy Commission have been appointed**  
45 **and have qualified. Until appointment and qualification, the State Department of Energy and**

1 the Director of the State Department of Energy shall continue to perform the duties and  
2 functions and exercise the powers.

6 **SECTION 107.** The unit captions used in this 2017 Act are provided only for the conven-  
7 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any  
8 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2017 Act.

12 **SECTION 108.** This 2017 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public  
13 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2017 Act takes effect  
14 on its passage.
