In the aftermath of a recent workplace shooting, a friend who works for a local company was at lunch with his co-workers, who were discussing the incident. One of them opined that "that kind of thing could never happen here". When asked why he thought that was so, this person responded, "Because we have a rule against bringing guns to work". Apparently, the notion that criminals don't obey laws was just too abstruse for him to comprehend, despite (and, one may hope, not because of) an advanced engineering degree.

Can we expect no better than this from our Legislators? In the present instance of HB 4145, are you somehow unable to realize that criminals don't obey restraining orders or prohibitions against owning "dangerous weapons" either?
