SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Makes governing body of coordinated care organization subject to Oregon's public meetings law. Allows Oregon Health Authority to contract with only one statewide coordinated care organization.] Requires meetings of governing body of coordinated care organization in which decisions

Requires meetings of governing body of coordinated care organization in which decisions are made final to be open to public and to take public testimony. Requires coordinated care organization to record all meetings of governing body in sound, video, digital or written format and make record available on coordinated care organization's website. Requires coordinated care organization to provide contact information for chairperson of governing body and member of governing body or designated staff person. Directs Oregon Health Authority to collaborate with coordinated care organizations to

Directs Oregon Health Authority to collaborate with coordinated care organizations to develop specific requirements for coordinated care organization investments in social determinants of health.

Requires expenditure of portion of coordinated care organization's [annual net income or reserves on services designed to address health disparities and] **global budget on investments in** social determinants of health. Modifies composition of coordinated care organization governing body.

Establishes new requirements for contracts between authority and coordinated care organizations. Requires coordinated care organization to provide advance notice of intent not to renew contract to authority and, under certain circumstances, to members and providers.

Establishes Task Force on Sustainable Funding for Services Provided by Coordinated Care Organizations to create legislative concept to ensure stable funding source or strategy to pay costs of services provided to medical assistance recipients by coordinated care organizations. Specifies membership and duties. Requires task force to report on concept to interim committees of Legislative Assembly related to health by December 31, 2018. Sunsets task force on December 31, 2019.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to coordinated care organizations; creating new provisions; amending ORS 414.025, 414.625
 and 414.652; and declaring an emergency.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 <u>SECTION 1.</u> Sections 2 and 3 of this 2018 Act are added to and made a part of ORS 6 chapter 414.

7 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) As used in this section, "decision" has the meaning given that term in 8 ORS 192.610.

9 (2) Meetings of a governing body of a coordinated care organization in which decisions

10 are made final must:

11 (a) Be open to the public;

12 (b) Provide an opportunity for members of the public to provide written or oral testi-

13 mony; and

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1 (c) Include the minutes or other record of the previous meeting of the governing body.

2 (3) A coordinated care organization shall give public notice, reasonably calculated to give 3 actual notice to interested persons, of the time and place for meetings described in sub-4 section (1) of this section.

5 (4) Meetings of a governing body of a coordinated care organization are not subject to 6 ORS 192.610 to 192.690.

7 (5) The governing body of a coordinated care organization shall provide for the sound, 8 video or digital recording or the taking of written minutes of all its meetings. Neither a full 9 transcript nor a full recording of a meeting is required but the written minutes or recording 10 must give a true reflection of the matters discussed at the meeting and the views of the 11 participants. All minutes or recordings must be available to the public within a reasonable 12 time after the meeting and must include at least the following information:

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(a) All members of the governing body present;

(b) All motions, proposals, resolutions, orders, ordinances and measures proposed and
 their disposition;

(c) Unanimous votes on decisions or, if a vote is not unanimous, the results of the vote
 and the vote of each member by name; and

(d) The substance of any discussion on any matter.

(6) A coordinated care organization shall make available on its website, at a minimum,
 the following information:

the following information.

(a) The minutes or other record of previous meetings of the governing body of the coor dinated care organization; and

23 (b) Contact information for:

(A) The chairperson of the governing body; and

(B) A member of the governing body or a staff member of the coordinated care organ ization responsible for providing information to the public about the activities of the coordi nated care organization.

28 <u>SECTION 3.</u> The Oregon Health Authority shall collaborate with coordinated care or 29 ganizations to develop specific requirements for a coordinated care organization's annual 30 investments in the social determinants of health of its members. The requirements must be 31 consistent with the requirements contained in the terms and conditions of the demonstration 32 project approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services regarding:

(1) The incorporation of costs of health-related services into the development of the
 global budget for each coordinated care organization; and

(2) The treatment of health-related services in the calculation of a coordinated care
 organization's medical loss ratio and the reinvestment that is triggered by a coordinated care
 organization's medical loss ratio.

ORS 413.550.

(f) Services and supports are geographically located as close to where members reside as possible and are, if available, offered in nontraditional settings that are accessible to families, diverse
communities and underserved populations.

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(22) "Person centered care" means care that:

(23) "Personal health navigator" means an individual who meets qualification criteria adopted

29 <u>SECTION 10.</u> This 2018 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 30 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2018 Act takes effect 31 on its passage.

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
