Multnomah County // Prioritizing BIPOC Communities

- Root Causes: Social Determinants of Health
 - Untreated behavioral health concerns impacts individuals' ability to meet basic needs like shelter.
 - 37.1% more people are experiencing chronic homelessness, and people of color make up more of this percentage than in 2017.¹
 - In Portland, less than 3% of the population is considered homeless, however, those who are houseless made up 52 percent of arrests in 2017.²
- Community-based and built localized solutions

- Data Disaggregation
