



- Benefit northbound and southbound directions








I-205 Paving and Auxiliary Lanes: Johnson Creek Blvd to Glenn Jackson Bridge




Seismic Resiliency Triage Strategy



Project Delivery Approach

Post HB 2017

- Increasing average total volume from \$370M to \$560M per year for 2018-2021 STIP
- 192 new permanent project delivery positions
- Increasing outsourcing levels from 52% to 70% statewide
- Establishing new Project Development Section to support outsourcing needs and enhance project delivery efficiency
- Increasing transparency, accountability, and efficiency measures









Implementation Highlights

Ongoing Efforts

 <u>Recruitments</u>: ODOT staff are actively recruiting for positions allocated during 2018 Legislative Session; targeting 01/01/19 for the third round of hiring. Policy Option Package for 54 additional positions submitted to legislature for consideration during 2019 Legislative Session. Next update anticipated 02/2019.

This month...

- SOS Real-time Audit: Final report of findings and recommendations related to SOS Audits Division "real-time" audit of HB 2017 implementation, which has now concluded.
- <u>Safe Routes to Schools</u>: 112 entities submitted applications for 206 projects in the first solicitation for competitive grants with requested funds totaling \$85 million. Review process complete & 24 recommended projects, totaling \$15.7million, submitted for Commission consideration.
- <u>ConnectOregon</u>: Rules Advisory Committees met in October, November and early January to develop draft OARs reflecting program modifications. Draft rules posted to ConnectOregon website 01/04/19.
- <u>Transparency, Accountability, & Performance (TAP) Website</u>: Soft launch of TAP website completed in advance of 01/01/19 targeted deadline. Additional usability testing and refinements ongoing.

Next month...

 <u>ConnectOregon</u>: Review of the three sponsor plans submitted for two of the remaining dedicated projects will be presented for OTC consideration & discussion.


