Bill would include firefighters' names on roadside memorials

Columbia County family helps introduce amendment during 2019 Legislature

A bill in the 2019 legislative session would allow the names of fallen firefighters to be included in roadside memorials throughout the state.

In 2013, the Oregon Department of Transportation approved roadside memorials to honor fallen members of the Armed Forces, and amended the law in 2015 to include public safety officers.

Now, the family of a Columbia County firefighter who died in the line of duty is pushing to have the statute amended to include fallen firefighters.

The family of Robert Hales, a former Scappoose Fire District volunteer firefighter and EMT who died from a heart attack following a long shift in 2008, proposed the language change to Sen. Betsy Johnson, D-Scappoose, who is sponsoring Senate Bill 528.
