LOW Satiand We went through the process of waiting 8 months for the toxicology report. It was ruled to be "ACCIDENTAL **METHADONE INTOXICATION".** He was a recovering Oxiconten user who had been clean for 1.5 years but had relapsed due to a broken hand injury from riding his BMX bike. He was sold liquid methadone by a dealer friend. He was never a methadone user for heroin addiction. He was not just another junkie. Methadone is synthetic heroin which will kill you just as dead as heroin or fentanyl when used unsupervised. His dealer knew this.

In June 2018 his case was forwarded to the MCDA office who told me that the most Oregon State law could provide for sentencing is 12 months. This angered me. I then directed his case be walked across the hallway and presented to the US Attny office. His case is now with them and continues to be under investigation for prosecution under the "Len Bias" law which provides for a 20 years to life sentence for Schedule 2 Methadone sale that causes either severe injury or death on the first instance. This is a POWERFUL tool for prosecutors to Sherry induce offenders to cooperate and provide information. opinion,

As written, HB 2797 is a deeply flawed and inadequate bill for the following reasons:

place

### **SPECTRUM**:

- 1. It does not provide for the entire spectrum of dangerous drugs. It only provides for the "BIG 4" drugs: Heroin, Meth, Cocaine, Exctasy
- 2. It does not address Fentanyl, Methadone, PCP, LSD or the other schedule 2, 3, 4 and 5 substances, including Marijuana derivatives.
- 3. In it's wording it does not provide for "SEVERE INJURY" (such as brain damage or permanent vegetative state) resulting from delivery and usage of such substances

#### SENTENCING:

- 1. The recommended sentence of 5-12 years is wholly inadequate for the nature of the crimes and outcomes.
- 2. 5-12 years is a slap on the hand and is nothing more than a "Cost of Doing Business" sentence.
- 3. 5-12 years provides no incentive for suspects to provide prosecutors with further evidence.
- 4. This fails to provide prosecutors with the tools necessary to provide a true deterrance for anyone thinking of doing this.
- 5. A minimum sentence of 20 years to life with a charge of "Murder/Manslaughter By Drugs" would be far more effective for prosecutors to have available.

#### **EXAMPLES**:

#### I am providing several examples for the panel to consider:

- 1. 20 other states have instituted "Murder By Drug Laws". I have included an article on this.
- 2. The state of Wisconsin is a model example for instituting its own "Len Bias" law. I have included an article on this.
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- 3. As of 2013, Oregon is the state with the highest number of convictions under the "Len Bias" law. I have included an article on this.
- 4. Federal drug sentencing guidelines under the "Len Bias" law. I have included the chart.

**CONCLUSION:** As presently written, HB 2797 is wholly inadequate as to providing prosecutors with the real tools they need to deter drug dealer in the State of Oregon. This is both in terms of addressing the full spectrum of dangerous drug sales with resulting severe injury and death along with sentencing lengths. I most strongly suggest the panel rewrite this bill to mirror federal sentencing guidelines and other states "Murder By Drug" laws and address the FULL spectrum of dangerous drugs and resulting severe injuries and deaths. Give prosecutors the REAL deterance tools and law they need to get these people off the street and bring REAL justice to the victims who suffer as a result. Do not create something that is a half-measure at best. As written HB 2797 is nothing more than a slap on the wrist and a cost of doing business sentence which will be ignored by drug dealers. At best it's a first step. It's up to you to give it some REAL TEETH. Thank you.









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WISCONSIN -- Prosecutors charged a man with homicide after he reportedly provided a heroin dose that led to the death of the man who bought - and later shared - his own drugs.

Police say that man, Mark Glisczinski, has been charged under Wisconsin's "Len <u>Mark</u> Law," a law that is being used more and more now that the heroin epidemic is claiming more lives.

Mark Glisczinksi of Milwaukee has been charged with <u>First Degree Reckless Homicide</u> under Wisconsin's Len Bias law, which holds drug dealers accountable in cases involving fatal drug overdoses. Twenty states now have so-called "drug-induced homicide" laws that carry the same sentences as murder and manslaughter, according to the Drug Policy Alliance, a nonprofit drug policy organization based in New York.

Federal law has included a penalty of 20 years to life in prison for providing drugs that cause fatal overdoses since Congress passed the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1986, spurred by the cocaine overdose death of basketball star Len Bias that year.

## Oregon Leads U.S. In "Len Bias" Drug-Overdose Prosecutions

Oregon leads the nation in using a "Len Bias" law as a weapon against major drug traffickers, The Oregonian reports. After someone dies of an overdose, investigators threaten all those in the supply chain with a 20-year sentence if they don't lead to the next link. The tactic, pioneered by Oregon federal prosecutor Kathleen Bickers, could be seen in action this month in federal court in Portland: Oregon has had 40 Len Bias prosecutions. Bickers regularly trains state and federal prosecutors. The prosecutions, she said, reach past the first- and second-tier dealers to "those traffickers who believe they remain Teflon at the top of the organization." Heroin traffickers in particular, she said, are suddenly finding "an alarming number of their own people" willing to talk. Bias was a <u>University of</u> Maryland basketball star who died in 1986 of a cocaine overdose.
