Dear Honorable Members of the Joint Committee on Carbon,

I am taking the time to write to you today regarding the proposed Cap and Trade Bill (HB 2020) and its potential effects on my job and the local rural community that I call home. I appreciate the effort to impact climate change through the reduction of Green House Gases, but I am asking you to slow down and craft a program that will truly benefit all Oregonians across the state. I am a member of Local #2851 of the Carpenters Industrial Council and I work in a manufacturing facility in La Grande Oregon that employs more than 120 people in full time, year-round jobs with benefits. For every 1 job in my manufacturing facility, there are approximately 3 jobs created in my local community.

I am asking you to take a step back and really work towards a meaningful bill that doesn't destroy my job. The current manufacturing facility that I work in is well below the cap for carbon emissions, but my concern is the increased costs for fuel and natural gas that will affect the bottom line for the company. I do not work in a high margin industry that is able to pass along these extra costs to the customer. These extra costs put my job in jeopardy and ultimately my community.

My community relies on my manufacturing facility as a backbone of the economy. The jobs my facility provides are full time, year-round positions with benefits. These are highly desirable jobs in Northeast Oregon where full-time positions with benefits are scarce.

Please don't put my job and my community in jeopardy by passing a bill that will have very little impact on climate change but will destroy rural communities that have worked to build facilities that significantly contribute to the local community by providing jobs and sustainability for our citizens.

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

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

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
