To Chair Prozanski, Vice Chair Thatcher, and Members of the Committee on Senate Judiciary,

I am a resident of Oregon and supporter of sexual assault survivors. I care about this topic dearly.

Why is this Bill important?

- Having sexual assault survivors go back to court to renew their restraining orders annually is traumatic, and goes against what the point of having a restraining order specific to a sexual assault is for. This restraining order needs to be extended.
