Dear Chair Salinas and Vice-Chair Hayden:

We are writing in regard to HB 2678, a bill giving the Oregon Health Authority the ability to require prior authorization when a physician recommends prescription drugs that are not listed on the state drug plan and are reimbursed in Medicaid on a fee-for-service basis. In particular, we urge the committee to include additional language in this bill that protects a physician's ability to recommend a specific treatment based on the individual needs of a patient.

There is nobody more informed and qualified to make professional judgments about the treatment of a patient than his or her doctor. That's why safeguarding the unique nature of the doctor-patient relationship is so ensconced in our healthcare system. While approved drug lists and formularies are established strategies in cost containment, existing agreements do not place limits on a physician's ability to prescribe a treatment. Without language making it clear HB 2678 won't place further restrictions on treatments, the bill will introduce new limits on patient access to medication a physician would like to prescribe.

Patients often react differently to different medication, which is why physicians need access to a wide range of treatment options. As we stated, physicians are the most informed caregiver when it comes to understanding the breadth of a patient's medical conditions. Often, there are a number of conditions being treated and understanding how different medications interact with each other is critical. Removing prescription drug options may lead to less-effective treatments and greater, not less, healthcare utilization. This serves neither the patient nor the goal of cost-containment.

Inserting language to protect a physician's ability to prescribe the best treatment simply upholds current law and practice. We urge the inclusion of an amendment to protect the doctor-patient relationship.
