I am in support of SB 48, to extend the historic property special assessment program. This bill helps to protect Oregon Historic Cultural resources, and should continue indefinately.

I am in support of SB 927-3 the Public Participation and Preservation Act. This act will support local governments in promoting Oregon Goal

5 with regards to preservation of historic properties in the State.

Even though Oregon is the end of the Oregon Trail and is rich in historic resources, it trails in preservation standards. This act will bring Oregon standards up to date at the local level, and be consistent with land use planning procedures.

Finally, I am in support of SB 929, the Preservation, Housing, and Seismic Safety Act. This act will provide incentives for private companies and individuals to preserve Oregon's treasures for future generations.
