

HB 3389 -1, -2, -3, -4, -5 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Requires name and address of Oregon Lottery prize winners to be confidential unless the winner provides written authorization for such disclosure. Allows Oregon Lottery to pay prize to trustee of a trust at written request of prize winner.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

- 1 Removes proposal to allow trustee of trust to collect lottery prize.
- 2 Allows Oregon Lottery Commission to specify by rule that service fee may be charged for tickets or shares purchased via a personal electronic device.
- 3 Combines -1 and -2: Removes proposal to allow trustee of trust to collect lottery prize. Allows Oregon Lottery Commission to specify by rule that service fee may be charged for tickets or shares purchased via a personal electronic device.
- 4 Allows Oregon Lottery Commission to specify by rule that service fee may be charged in addition to retail sales price and any other fees required by law for tickets or shares purchased via a personal electronic device. Caps service fee at no more than 30 percent of retail sales price of ticket or share.
- 5 Allows Oregon Lottery Commission to specify by rule that service fee may be charged in addition to retail sales price and any other fees required by law for tickets or shares (all sales, not just those via a personal electronic device). Caps service fee at no more than 30 percent of retail sales price of ticket or share. Limits anonymity of winners of multi-state games offered in at least 30 states.

BACKGROUND:

The Oregon State Lottery Commission has adopted an administrative rule that allows the Lottery to use the name, address, and likeness of a winner in any Lottery promotional campaign, advertisement, or press release. By claiming a prize, the winner grants the Lottery this right. However, the street or house number of the winner's address cannot be released. House Bill 3389 prohibits the Lottery from publicly disclosing a winner's name and address unless the winner provides written authorization for such disclosure. The measure also allows the trustee of a trust at the written request of the prize winner.
