Founded in 1965, the Population Research Center (PRC) at Portland State University (PSU) has emerged as a leader in addressing demographic trends affecting state and local communities across Oregon. Leveraging resources across PSU, and from collaborative partnerships with other university partners and communities across Oregon, the center produces research that is applied, analytical, and relevant to leaders, policymakers, and residents of Oregon.

We make demographic information easily accessible to Oregonians and provide timely and accurate analyses of Oregon's demographic trends through the following programs:

- Oregon Population Estimates Program (OPEP). Operating under a state mandate (see ORS 190.510-610), PRC prepares annual certified population estimates for all cities and counties in Oregon, used by state and local governments, various organizations, and agencies for revenue sharing, funds allocation, and planning purposes.
- Oregon State Data Center (SDC). Partners with the U.S. Census Bureau as the Oregon State Data Center (SDC) for census data dissemination and training through a network of state agencies, universities, libraries, and regional and local governments.
- Oregon Population Forecast Program (OPFP). Operating under a state mandate (see ORS 190.033), PRC produces coordinated population forecasts for all counties and cities outside of the Portland Metro UGB under a continuing four-year cycle for land use planning purposes.

- **Demographic Consulting Services**. Provides consulting services to public agencies, private firms, and not-for-profit groups requesting customized demographic data and analyses to assist in making informed planning and policy decisions.
- Graduate Certificate in Applied Social Demography. Faculty instruct courses in population studies and applied demography as part of a graduate certificate program—the only such program in Oregon.

On behalf of our PRC research faculty and staff, I strongly encourage you to support full funding of the Population Research Center (PRC) at PSU. Supporting the state's leading census research and training center will ensure that PRC can continue to make demographic information available to Oregonians, conduct demographic research that supports data-driven decision-making, and support PRC's work in ensuring a fair and accurate census enumeration in Oregon for Census 2020.

In my role as Director of the Center for Public Service – a unit of the Mark O. Hatfiewld School of Government at Portland State University - I've had the chance to work closely with PRC on several projects. In 2014 we partnered with PRC on a project to assist the Portland Public School District to devise a citizen-based process for Comprehensive Boundary Review. During the 2015-16 period, I served as co - Principal Investigator along with PRC's Dr. Jason Jurgevich -- on a Knight Foundation (Miami) funded effort to map voter turnout information for 50 U.S. mayoral elections, including those in Portland and other "top 30" cities in the country.

Both of these projects relied on data that was carefully organized and curated by PRC. But beyond the data itself I found the expertise of PRC leaders and staff alike invaluable -not to mention responsive, creative, and thoroughly professional in their work.

Since 1965, PRC has conducted demographic research specific to communities across Oregon. The center has also demonstrated a commitment to building collaborative relationships with counties, cities, school districts, and special districts through applied and analytical research. (The Center works with a lot of these same entities in its work, and I can personally attest to the value that is provided to them, in their work, by the PRC's database and its staff.

Dear Co-Chairs and Committee Members:

This letter is in support of fully funding the Population Research Center (PRC) at Portland State University (PSU), a university statewide program, in House Bill (HB) 5024.

PRC population estimates and projections are a reliable source of data for many of our regulatory reporting duties in land use planning. We would not be able to create accurate buildable lands inventories and assess housing needs within the context of urban growth boundary amendments without direct support from PRC staff. In between decennial census data years, the American Community Survey from census is a poor substitute for population estimates. Future year population projections used in planning are finicky and must be created by skilled demographers with access to, and relationships with, the entities under study. This critical human element is something PRC staff excels at. They take a complex tapestry of information and analytics and make it accessible to people who rely upon that data to guide policy decisions. In my work, I assess many types of data from both public sources and private industry. I have not found population estimates that are more reliable than what PRC provides.

PRC population data is also a critical component in the new activity-based travel model that ODOT is building. Without population estimates for the base (current) year and projections to the horizon (2045) model year, we cannot accurately predict growth and plan transportation needs accordingly.

This letter provides testimony in support of fully funding the Population Research Center (PRC) at Portland State University (PSU), a university statewide program, through House Bill (HB) 5024.

In my role as a Senior Planner with the City of Bend Growth Management Department, I have either worked closely with PRC staff or relied on PRC data to complete key long range planning projects for the City. I've engaged with the PRC through:

- The Oregon Population Estimates Program (OPEP);
- The Oregon Population Forecast Program (OPFP), and;
- Demographic Consulting Services (e.g. school district forecasts)

For the City of Bend, we rely on the PRC's annual estimates of population for housing, infrastructure (e.g. water, sewer collection), and transportation planning. We consulted their 2015 population forecast for the Bend urban growth boundary (UGB) during our planning for UGB expansion in 2015 and 2016, and have used the 2018 population forecast for the Bend UGB to inform the ongoing update of the City's transportation system plan. In addition, I've participated on two workgroups for the Bend-LaPine School District to assist the District in updating their Sites and Facilities study for new schools and improvements to existing schools. For these projects, the District relies on the PRC's long range school enrollment forecasting to examine the District's growth and use it to schedule new school projects. Since 1965, PRC has conducted demographic research specific to communities across Oregon. The center has also demonstrated a commitment to building collaborative relationships with counties, cities, school districts, and special districts through applied and analytical research. Recently, PRC expanded its statewide reach by supporting learning opportunities for students through the Graduate Certificate in Applied Social Demography. The only such program in Oregon, the graduate certificate trains students to tackle the complex issues and relationships between demographic change and its impact on Oregon's communities. I myself am a graduate of PSU with a Masters in Urban Planning, and worked as a research assistant for the PRC between 1988 and 1990.

I strongly encourage you to support full funding of the Population Research Center (PRC) at PSU. Washington County is pleased to support the important work of the Population Research Center at Portland State University, and recommends full state funding for this important statewide service program in <u>HB 5024</u>, currently before your Committee.

In my role as Government Relations Manager for Washington County, I frequently draw upon the talents and resources at the Population Research Center, to inform elected public officials and government agencies about the changing population and demographic trends in Oregon's fastest-growing County. PRC data and forecasts are essential tools for local governments planning for future housing needs, transportations demands, public schools, health care services, municipal water supplies, and the orderly development of our growing communities.

In 2017, for example, the Population Research Center helped Washington County redraw our District boundaries to more evenly balance the shifting population among our four Commission districts. Washington County has added >75,000 constituents since the 2010 U.S. Census, with most of these new neighbors settling in eastern portions of our County, including Senate Districts 16 and 17. Redefining our District boundaries would have been much more difficult if we had needed to rely on outdated and less-precise federal census data. But with help from the PRC, this work was successfully completed with virtually no criticism or complaint from our constituents, and was readily accepted by the Board of Commissioners elected to serve them.

Washington County certainly supports full funding of the Population Research Center (PRC) at PSU, as an important investment that benefits all corners of our state. By continuing to support our state's leading census research and training center, Oregon legislators will enable the PRC to provide useful demographic information for all Oregonians, continue demographic research that informs data-based policy-making at all levels of government, and will enable the PRC to continue their work to ensure a fair and accurate census of all Oregonians in 2020.

I am sending this letter as I am in full support of House Bill 5024 and to fully fund the Population Research Center (PRC) at Portland State University (PSU), a university statewide program.

I am the Executive Director of the Greater Eastern Oregon Development Corporation (GEODC) and I am the "Mary McArthur" for eastern Oregon. GEODC relies on the PRC to provide us with pertinent data such as the Oregon Population Estimates Program (OPEP), Oregon Population Forecast Program (OPFP) and to a lesser degree, but just as important the State Data Center (SDC) (e.g. census outreach) and Demographic Consulting Services (e.g. demographics and housing)

As a federally recognized Economic Development District we are required to have a 5-Year Comprehensive Economic Development Strategic Plan. This plan is dependent on the resources provided by PRC especially since we are a four (4) person office covering seven (7) eastern Oregon Counties.

Currently, GEODC is under contract with Harney County to develop a Harney County Housing Road Map. The Housing Road Map work is being funded by DLCD and is viewed as Pilot Project for frontier rural Oregon and the need for moderate to upper income housing. I am utilizing the work PRC recently completed on the population forecast for Harney County. Recently, I was under an April 5, 2019 deadline to produce draft Housing Road Map report but I needed help with analysis of PRC data.
