Oregon repair shop owners know that the value of Right to Repair goes beyond being able to access original manufacturer parts, tools and manuals to use for repairs. They see Right to Repair as a way to empower consumers against the monopolized tech industry, promote digital equity and access, encourage sustainable reuse and reduce the amount of e-waste in our landfills.

"Our society often perpetuates a wasteful lifestyle and those who seek to solve problems are often unable to be assertive and solve problems for themselves in the world of electronics. Electronics manufacturers make electronics items that are designed to wear out quickly and be replaced rather than be a reliable tool that can be serviced. Imagine if you will, buying a car and knowing that if your vehicle breaks, you have to buy a new one. While electronics are typically less costly than vehicles, quality repairs are monopolized by manufacturers."

In addition, customers with newer Macs do not want to deal with the chaos in an Apple store or the high cost of repair so they come to us as well. Apple's only path to being given access to their support materials is via a program that basically puts you under their thumb and forces you, again, to ignore customers with Macs older than 5 years by being a Certified Repair Shop. But only large shops with lots of money can even have a chance of qualifying for this certification. Ironically, I worked for Apple. I was trained and certified in Cupertino. I am helping Apple from the outside now, keeping their loyal customer base happy. Instead of having an aggressive stance towards people and shops like ours, they should be thankful we are around and support us as we are supporting them."
