SPP Role

Vietnam Scene Setter

Vietnam balances its Foreign Policy with Eyes on China and the South China Sea <u>3 No's:</u> "No alliances, No foreign bases, No actions with one country aimed against another"



Political

- South China Sea remains primary policy concern along with China's influence on other ASEAN neighbors
- Hanoi takes pains not to act unilaterally with the US or any other partner that could provoke a retaliatory response from Beijing
- VN & US are like-minded partners who advocate for regional order that upholds international norms & rules, provides for freedom of navigation & overflight, resolves disputes peacefully, without coercion
- Vietnam continues to pursue an independent foreign policy though it is dominated by balancing act between US & China
- VN hopes to take on a greater international role to include seeking a non-permanent seat on the UN Security Council for 2020-2021

Military

- Defense relationship is progressing rapidly; VN plans to diversify its defense partners & suppliers -- looking to US for continued support
- Nothing has advanced the bi-lateral relationship more than US cooperation on war-legacy issues
- VN is participating in UN peacekeeping efforts for the fist time, sending a medial team to South Sudan with considerable US support

Economic

- US exports to VN jumped 19% to \$10 Billion in 2018
- US is VN 3rd largest trading partner

Social

- People-to-people ties are strong. 93% of Vietnamese say they hold a favorable opinion of US (compared to 22% in China).
- US hosts 30,000 VN students fifth in the world and first in SE Asia
