What is the Child Care Development Fund (CCDF)?

Administration for Children and Families

- Early Learning Division is the lead agency of CCDF
- Provides financial assistance to qualified working families to make child care **affordable** through child care assistance, e.g., ERDC
- Supports regulation of baseline quality through health and safety through child care licensing
- Funding to improve the quality of child care through professional learning and other supports
- Supports increasing the **supply** and availability of child care for all families

Additional CCDF Funds

□ Utilized annual increase of \$25m for:

| Category | Percentage | Explanation |
|-----------------------------------|------------|---|
| Support for families and children | 64% | Child care assistance, including ERDC and pilot infant/toddler quality supply building effort |
| Support for providers | 26% | Assist programs in meeting new federal standards – subsidize background checks and CPR/First Aid training; increase professional learning opportunities and Focused Child Care Networks |
| Improve child care licensing | 10% | Continue to increase Early Learning Division capacity to strengthen licensing program to monitor and support programs to meet health and safety standards, building on February 2018 Session support from legislature |

Who We Do **NOT** License

- Public Schools
- Government Operated Facilities

- Family Friend and Neighbor Caregivers

Progress to Date: Transforming Child Care Licensing

Expanded Leadership

- Field Operation Director
- Legal Enforcement Director
- Two additional regional managers and field offices

Enhanced Monitoring

- Revised administrative rules
- Enhanced protocols for illegal care, injuries and serious violations
- Launched Tandem Investigations

Lowered Caseloads

- Investigative Specialists
- Licensing Specialist
- Compliance Staff

Tandem Investigations Pilot

- In the 2018 Legislative Session, received 5 Limited Duration positions (Compliance Specialist 2)
- Allows OCC to conduct joint investigations with Child Welfare when allegations of abuse and neglect occur in licensed child care
- Initiated September 2018
 - □ Trained new Office of Child Care Investigative Specialists to accompany Child Welfare when an allegation of abuse occurs in a child care facility.
 - Piloted in Multnomah, Washington, Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties
 - □ 112 Tandem Investigations to date
- POP 157 makes these 5 positions permanent

Tandem Investigation Pilot: What we are Learning

- Improved communication between Office of Child Care, Child Welfare, and Child Care Subsidy
- □ Faster determinations
- Allows for a more informed finding for the allegation(s)
- Dual expertise to support providers regarding regulatory issues
- Increase skill set to also investigate complaints in the field

Coordination of CCR&Rs

- Statewide Child Care Resource & Referral entities act as a network to deliver training and technical assistance to early care and education providers
- Western Oregon University Teaching Research Institute (TRI)
 serves as coordinator of the network
 - Provides professional development (PD) and technical assistance to CCR&R staff
 - Coordinates statewide communications and distributions of materials related to CCR&R activities on behalf of ELD

Proposed Changes to Coordination

- □ ELD will assume function of directly coordinating CCR&Rs
 - Regional staff that can work more closely with licensing field office staff and Early Learning Hubs, creating greater alignment
 - More streamlined communication to support implementation of unified vision around professional development system
- □ Cost savings over time



POP 153: Building the Supply of Quality Infant Toddler Child Care


- Families are struggling to find affordable, quality infant toddler care.
 - The cost of infant toddler care in Oregon is even more expensive than 1 year at a public university.
 - 1 in 4 child care providers leaves the field every year.
 - Quality of care has strong impacts on child development, but access to professional development supports are limited.

Quality Infant Toddler Care Pilot

- Solution: Contract directly with infant toddler child care providers to build supply and provide stable funding to keep providers in the field.
 - Contract tied quality supports and quality standards
- □ Approved at September 2018 E-Board:
 - \$3.3 million in child care assistance
 - \$700K in quality supports
 - 3 LD positions to establish and implement a proof of concept pilot project to serve 200-250 infants and toddlers in families who are eligible for child care assistance in high-quality care



POP 153 & HB 2024

- HB 2024 creates the statutory framework for the quality infant-toddler child care program
 - Eligibility for families
 - Eligibility for providers
 - Codifies high-quality standards
