I have lived in Portland for 35 years and over the past approximately 10 years have joined with many of my friends and neighbors regarding the concern as to how our community is growing and the manner in which it is expanding. Unfortunately for the most part, what I have observed are people who are not our neighbors, and are not invested in the betterment of our neighborhoods.
