WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Provides that any evidence obtained from an individual's report of the commission of a person felony to law enforcement may not be used in prosecution of the individual for prostitution or attempted prostitution.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Limited to evidence for crime of prostitution
- Codification of a policy in practice in many jurisdictions
- Encourages victims of persons crime to report without fear of prosecution
- Increases access to justice for vulnerable population

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

A person commits the crime of prostitution if the person engages in, or offers or agrees to engage in, sexual conduct or sexual contact in return for a fee.

Senate Bill 596 extends protection from criminal liability for prostitution when an individual is reporting a person felony committed against them.
