SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Standardizes use of consumer price index for purposes of indexing values in statutes and session law.

7 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

8 **SECTION 1.** Section 3, chapter 390, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to read:

9 **Sec. 3.** (1) On January 1, 2021, the Oregon Department of Administrative Services shall deter-
10 mine the cumulative percentage increase or decrease in the cost of living for the previous four
11 years, based on changes in the [*Portland-Salem, OR-WA, Consumer Price Index for All Urban Con-*
12 *sumers for All Items*] **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All**
13 **Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.
14 The Oregon Department of Administrative Services shall adjust the fees under ORS 21.300 (1) and
15 (4) as follows:

16 (a) If the cost of living has increased, the department shall adjust the fees by multiplying the fee
17 amounts by the percentage amount determined under this subsection. The department shall round
18 the adjusted fees up to the nearest \$1. The adjusted fees become effective on July 1, 2021, and apply
19 to all fees incurred on or after July 1, 2021.

20 (b) If the cost of living has not increased, the department may not change the fees.

21 (2) After the department adjusts the fees under ORS 21.300 (1) and (4) as provided in subsection
22 (1) of this section, the department shall promptly notify the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association of the
23 adjusted fees.

24 **NOTE:** Sections 2 through 4 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not re-
25 numbered.

26 **SECTION 5.** ORS 58.187 is amended to read:

27 58.187. (1) For the purpose of revising the amounts of the limitation on joint and several liability
28 described in ORS 58.185 (5) and (8) to reflect the effects of inflation or deflation, the Secretary of

1 State shall multiply the amounts under ORS 58.185 (5) and (8) by the inflation factor described in
 2 this section every six years. The six-year cycle shall begin January 1, 1994. The Secretary of State
 3 shall round the amount to the nearest \$50,000 and publish the revised amount as a rule not later
 4 than February 1 following the end of the six-year cycle. The revised limitation shall take effect
 5 February 1 and apply for the next six years.

6 (2) For purposes of this section[:],

7 [(a)] the inflation factor shall be a number determined by dividing the [June 30] Consumer Price
 8 Index **for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau of La-**
 9 **bor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor, as of June 30** immediately preceding
 10 the calendar year in which the adjustment shall take effect, by the [December 31] **Portland Con-**
 11 **sumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for All Items, using the 1982-1984 base of 100,**
 12 **[for] as of December 31, 1993.**

13 [(b)] *The "Consumer Price Index" is the Portland Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers*
 14 *for All Items, using the 1982-1984 base of 100, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the*
 15 *United States Department of Labor. If the index is discontinued or no longer published at least semi-*
 16 *annually, the Secretary of State shall select an alternative index that, in the discretion of the Secretary*
 17 *of State, reasonably approximates changes in consumer spending power in the Portland, Oregon, met-*
 18 *ropolitan area.]*

19 **SECTION 6.** ORS 90.490 is amended to read:

20 90.490. (1) A tenant may bring an action against a building landlord if for the purpose of
 21 avoiding, or assisting a declarant of a conversion condominium in avoiding, the requirements under
 22 ORS 100.301 to 100.320:

23 (a) Within one year before the declarant records the declaration under ORS 100.100, the landlord
 24 gives a tenant a 30-day notice without stated cause; or

25 (b) Within one year before the declarant records the declaration under ORS 100.100, the landlord
 26 increases the rent in excess of the percentage increase in the [Portland-Salem Consumer Price Index
 27 for All Urban Consumers for All Items as reported by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics]
 28 **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by**
 29 **the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.**

30 (2) If a court finds that a landlord has taken an action described in subsection (1) of this section
 31 for the purpose of avoiding, or assisting a declarant of a conversion condominium in avoiding, the
 32 requirements under ORS 100.301 to 100.320, the court may award the tenant the greater of:

33 (a) Six times the monthly rent for the dwelling unit; or

34 (b) Twice the actual damages to the tenant arising out of the termination or rent increase.

35 (3) The time allowed under ORS 12.125 to commence an action under this section begins on the
 36 date the declarant records the declaration under ORS 100.100.

37 **SECTION 7.** ORS 90.493 is amended to read:

38 90.493. (1) The landlord of a building for which a declarant of a conversion condominium has
 39 issued the tenant a notice of conversion under ORS 100.305 may not:

40 (a) Give the tenant a 30-day notice without stated cause that causes the tenancy to terminate
 41 on a date that is prior to the end of the 120-day period described in ORS 100.305 or the 60-day period
 42 described in ORS 100.310; or

43 (b) Increase the rent for the dwelling unit in excess of:

44 (A) Any scheduled increase provided for in a written rental agreement; or

45 (B) A percentage equal to the percentage increase in the [Portland-Salem Consumer Price Index

1 *for All Urban Consumers for All Items as reported by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics]*
2 **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by**
3 **the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.**

4 (2) A tenant may bring an action against a landlord that violates subsection (1) of this section
5 to recover the greater of:

- 6 (a) Six times the monthly rent for the dwelling unit; or
- 7 (b) Twice the actual damages to the tenant arising out of the termination.

8 **SECTION 8.** ORS 100.305 is amended to read:

9 100.305. (1) A declarant of a conversion condominium shall give each of the existing tenants of
10 any building which the declarant intends to submit to the provisions of this chapter notice of the
11 conversion at least 120 days before the conversion condominium is submitted to the provisions of
12 this chapter. Thereafter, until the property is submitted to the provisions of this chapter, the
13 declarant shall provide a copy of such notice to any new tenant before the commencement of the
14 tenancy. The notice of conversion shall:

15 (a) State that the declarant intends to create a conversion condominium and include general
16 information relating to the nature of condominium ownership.

17 (b) State that the notice does not constitute a notice to terminate the tenancy.

18 (c) State whether there will be a substantial alteration of the physical layout of the unit.

19 (d) State whether the declarant intends to offer the unit for sale and, if so:

20 (A) Set forth the rights of the tenant under ORS 100.310 (1) to (3), including the time available
21 for the declarant to make an offer to sell and for the tenant to respond;

22 (B) Set forth a good faith estimate of the approximate price range for which the unit will be
23 offered for sale to the tenant under ORS 100.310 (1) and (2);

24 (C) Set forth a good faith estimate of the monthly operational, maintenance and any other
25 common expenses or assessments appertaining to the unit;

26 (D) State that financial assistance for purchasing the unit may be available from a local gov-
27 erning body, the Housing and Community Services Department or a regional housing center;

28 (E) Give contact information for the local regional housing center or, if no regional housing
29 center exists, for the Housing and Community Services Department; and

30 (F) State that the landlord may not terminate the tenancy without cause if the termination
31 would take effect before the end of the 120-day period described in this subsection or the 60-day
32 period described in ORS 100.310.

33 (e) Include information in substantially the following form:

36 **NOTICE OF RENT INCREASE**
37 **RESTRICTIONS**

39 During the 120 days following the receipt of this notice, your landlord may increase your rent
40 only as follows:

41 If your rental agreement says that your rent will increase on a particular date and by a definite
42 amount, the landlord may increase the rent as provided in your rental agreement.

43 If your rental agreement allows rent increases but does not say that your rent will increase on
44 a particular date and by a definite amount, the landlord may not increase your rent by a percentage
45 that is more than the percentage increase in the general cost of living. An increase in the general

1 cost of living is measured by the percentage increase in the [*Portland-Salem Consumer Price Index*
2 *for All Urban Consumers for All Items as reported by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics*]
3 **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by**
4 **the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.**
5

7 (f) Be hand delivered to the dwelling unit of the tenant or sent to the tenant at the address of
8 the dwelling unit by certified mail, return receipt requested.

9 (2) A notice of conversion given under subsection (1) of this section:

10 (a) Shall be for the sole purpose of providing the tenant with general information regarding the
11 anticipated cost of acquisition of the unit and estimated monthly expenses.

12 (b) Does not obligate the declarant to submit the property to the provisions of this chapter.

13 (c) Does not constitute an offer to sell the unit to the tenant or an offer to sell at a particular
14 price.

15 (d) Is not a limitation on monthly common expenses or assessments.

16 (3) The notice of conversion given under subsection (1) of this section must be delivered to the
17 tenant at least 30 days prior to the presentation of an offer to sell under ORS 100.310 (1) and (2).

18 (4) The declarant shall send a copy of the notice of conversion to the mayor of the city in which
19 the conversion condominium is located or, if the conversion condominium is not located in a city,
20 to the county commission or county court.

21 (5) A notice of conversion that does not contain the information required by subsection (1)(a)
22 to (e) of this section, or that is not sent to the mayor, county commission or county court as re-
23 quired by subsection (4) of this section, does not begin the 120-day period required by subsection (1)
24 of this section. Notwithstanding any prior delivery of a deficient notice of conversion, the 120-day
25 period required by subsection (1) of this section does not begin until the date a valid notice is de-
26 livered. A tenant, mayor, county commission or county court entitled to notice may bring an action
27 for injunctive relief to prevent the conversion until the declarant has complied with the notice re-
28 quirement.

29 (6) The declaration may be recorded prior to the end of the 120-day period required under sub-
30 section (1) of this section with the written consent of all tenants who received the notice of con-
31 version less than 120 days before the date of such consent.

32 (7) The requirement under subsection (1) of this section to provide a copy of the notice of con-
33 version to new tenants shall not extend the 120-day period nor shall such tenant's consent be re-
34 quired to record the declaration prior to the end of the 120-day period as provided for under
35 subsection (6) of this section.

36 (8) A notice of conversion does not constitute a notice to terminate the tenancy.

37 **SECTION 9.** ORS 196.815 is amended to read:

38 196.815. (1) A person who is required to have a permit to remove material from the bed or banks
39 or fill any waters of this state shall file a written application with the Director of the Department
40 of State Lands for each individual project before performing any removal or fill.

41 (2)(a) Except as otherwise may be provided by the rules of the Department of State Lands for
42 removal or fill permits related to ocean renewable energy facilities as defined in ORS 274.870, each
43 application under subsection (1) of this section must be accompanied by a base fee in accordance
44 with the following schedule:

45 (A) For a removal by a private operator, or a person contracting to perform services for a pri-

1 vate operator, \$85.

2 (B) For a removal by a public body, \$250.

3 (C) For a removal by a commercial operator, \$250.

4 (D) For a fill by a private operator, or a person contracting to perform services for a private
5 operator, \$250.

6 (E) For a fill by a public body, \$620.

7 (F) For a fill by a commercial operator, \$620.

8 (G) For erosion-flood repair, including riprap, no fee.

9 (b) In addition to the base fee for removal established under paragraph (a) of this subsection,
10 each applicant shall also pay as part of the application fee the following fee based on the volume
11 of removal material:

12 (A) Less than 500 cubic yards, no volume fee.

13 (B) 500 to less than 5,000 cubic yards, \$125.

14 (C) 5,000 to less than or equal to 50,000 cubic yards, \$250.

15 (D) Over 50,000 cubic yards, \$375.

16 (c) In addition to the base fee for fill established under paragraph (a) of this subsection, each
17 applicant shall also pay as part of the application fee the following fee based on the volume of fill
18 material:

19 (A) Less than 500 cubic yards, no volume fee.

20 (B) 500 to less than 3,000 cubic yards, \$125.

21 (C) 3,000 to less than or equal to 10,000 cubic yards, \$250.

22 (D) Over 10,000 cubic yards, \$375.

23 (d) The department may establish by rule a volume-based fee for the commercial removal of sand
24 and gravel from the waters of this state for use in administering the provisions of the fill and re-
25 moval law in this state.

26 (e) For the purposes of this subsection:

27 (A) "Private operator" means any person undertaking a project for exclusively a nonincome-
28 producing and nonprofit purpose;

29 (B) "Public body" means federal, state, and local governmental bodies, unless specifically ex-
30 empted by law, engaged in projects for the purpose of providing free public services;

31 (C) "Commercial operator" means any person undertaking a project having financial profit as
32 a goal;

33 (D) "Riprap" means the facing of a streambank with rock or similar substance to control erosion
34 in accordance with rules adopted by the department; and

35 (E) "Erosion-flood repair" means riprap or any other work necessary to preserve existing facil-
36 ities and land from flood and high streamflows, in accordance with regulations promulgated by the
37 department.

38 (3) For each application that involves both removal and filling, the application fee assessed shall
39 be either for removal or filling, whichever is higher according to the fee schedule in subsection (2)
40 of this section.

41 (4) The department may waive the fees specified in subsection (2) of this section for a permit
42 that will be used to perform a voluntary habitat restoration project.

43 (5) A person who receives an emergency authorization under ORS 196.810 to remove material
44 from the beds or banks of any waters of this state or to fill any waters of this state shall, within
45 45 days after receiving the authorization, submit a fee to the department calculated in the manner

1 provided under this section for permit applications.

2 (6) Each holder of a material removal or fill permit shall pay a fee during the term of the permit
3 in accordance with the schedule set forth in subsection (2) of this section, except that the applicant
4 shall pay only the base fee. For multiyear permits valid over a period of more than one year, the
5 department may assess a one-time fee that covers all fees due under subsection (2) of this section
6 for the period of the permit. The permit shall be suspended during any period of delinquency of
7 payment as though no permit was applied for. Notwithstanding this subsection the director may,
8 before granting a renewal of the permit, require the permittee to show that the continued exercise
9 of the permit is consistent with the protection, conservation and best use of the water resources of
10 this state.

11 (7) Fees received under this section shall be credited to the Common School Fund for use by the
12 department in administration of ORS 196.600 to 196.905.

13 (8) The director shall issue an order revising the fees specified in this section on January 1 of
14 each year, beginning in 2009, based on changes in the [*Portland-Salem, OR-WA Consumer Price In-*
15 *dex for All Urban Consumers for All Items*] **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers,**
16 **West Region (All Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States De-
17 partment of Labor. The director shall round the amount of each fee to the nearest dollar. The re-
18 vised fees shall take effect January 1 and apply for that calendar year.

19 **SECTION 10.** ORS 196.818 is amended to read:

20 196.818. (1) A person or governmental body requesting a permit under ORS 196.810 shall submit
21 a wetland delineation report to the Department of State Lands for a determination of:

22 (a) Whether waters of this state are present on a specific land parcel;

23 (b) Where the boundaries of waters of this state are located on a land parcel; or

24 (c) Whether the waters of this state or a proposed activity in the waters of this state is subject
25 to permit requirements.

26 (2) A person or governmental body must pay a nonrefundable fee of \$350 to the department when
27 submitting a wetland delineation report under subsection (1) of this section.

28 (3) The department shall:

29 (a) Review the wetland delineation report submitted under subsection (1) of this section no more
30 than 120 days after the date on which the person or governmental body submits the report; and

31 (b) Give priority to the review of a wetland delineation report that is submitted with or in ad-
32 vance of an application for a permit required under ORS 196.810 if the permit would authorize ac-
33 tivities on the land parcel that is the subject of the wetland delineation report.

34 (4) All determinations made by the department under subsection (1)(a) and (b) of this section:

35 (a) Must be made by a person with expertise in wetlands hydrology, soil and vegetation; and

36 (b) Expire five years after the date on which a final determination is made.

37 (5) Five years after the date on which a final determination has been made under subsection
38 (1)(a) or (b) of this section, if the owner of the land parcel that is the subject of the determination
39 is conducting activities that require a permit under ORS 196.810, the landowner shall conduct a
40 review of the land parcel. If the baseline conditions leading to the final determination have suffi-
41 ciently changed to require a new determination, then the landowner shall submit a new wetland
42 delineation report under subsection (1) of this section. If the baseline conditions leading to the final
43 determination have not sufficiently changed to require a new determination, then the final determi-
44 nation of the department, notwithstanding subsection (4)(b) of this section, may be extended by five
45 years.

1 (6) The department may waive or suspend the requirements of this section for the purpose of
2 issuing an emergency authorization under ORS 196.810.

3 (7) The fee described in subsection (2) of this section is in addition to any permit application fee
4 required under ORS 196.815. A person or governmental body submitting a revised report to replace
5 a previously rejected report must pay an additional nonrefundable fee of \$100.

6 (8) Delineations made pursuant to this section, and determinations made under this section, must
7 comport with:

8 (a) The United States Army Corps of Engineers Wetlands Delineation Manual of 1987; and

9 (b) Any subsequent federal supplements to the manual or applicable guidance documents issued
10 by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, including guidance documents for the area in which
11 a delineation will take place, as adopted by rule of the Director of the Department of State Lands.
12 Such rules must comply with those federal supplements and guidance documents.

13 (9) The director shall issue an order revising the fee specified in subsection (2) of this section
14 on January 1 of each year, based on changes in the [*Portland-Salem, OR-WA Consumer Price Index*
15 *for All Urban Consumers for All Items*] **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West**
16 **Region (All Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department
17 of Labor. The director shall round the amount to the nearest dollar. The revised fee shall take effect
18 January 1 and apply for that calendar year.

19 (10) Fees received under this section shall be credited to the Common School Fund for use by
20 the department in administration of ORS 196.600 to 196.905.

21 **SECTION 11.** ORS 200.057 is amended to read:

22 200.057. (1) A business may be certified as an emerging small business by the Oregon Business
23 Development Department for up to 12 years and may be:

24 (a) Designated a tier one firm for up to six years unless the business no longer qualifies as a
25 tier one firm.

26 (b) Designated a tier two firm for up to six years unless the business no longer qualifies as a
27 tier two firm.

28 (2) The department shall adjust annually the amount of the average annual gross receipts re-
29 quired to qualify as a tier one firm or a tier two firm using the most recent three-year average of
30 the [*Portland-Salem Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for All Items, as reported by the*
31 *United States Bureau of Labor Statistics*] **Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West**
32 **Region (All Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States De-
33 **partment of Labor.**

34 (3) Notwithstanding the time limits established by subsection (1) of this section, if a tier one firm
35 provides compelling information showing, in the judgment of the department, that the firm has not
36 been afforded an opportunity to bid on emerging small business projects during a year of eligibility,
37 the department shall extend the tier one designation of the firm for one year. A tier one firm may
38 receive the extension described in this subsection only once.

39 **SECTION 12.** ORS 238A.155 is amended to read:

40 238A.155. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.250, an active
41 member of the pension program described in subsection (2) of this section who becomes disabled
42 shall accrue retirement credit and hours of service credit for vesting purposes for the period during
43 which the member is disabled.

44 (2) The provisions of this section apply only to:

45 (a) A member who has accrued 10 years or more of retirement credit before the member becomes

1 disabled; or

2 (b) A member who becomes disabled by reason of injury or disease sustained while in the actual
3 performance of duty.

4 (3) Retirement credit accrues under this section only for as long as the member remains disabled
5 or until the member reaches the normal retirement age under ORS 238A.160.

6 (4) If a disabled member does not return to employment with a participating public employer
7 after the period of disability, the member shall receive a pension under ORS 238A.180, 238A.185 or
8 238A.190 upon retirement based on an adjusted salary. The adjusted salary shall be the salary paid
9 to the disabled member on the date the member left active employment with the participating public
10 employer by reason of disability, adjusted for each year after the member left employment and before
11 the member's effective date of retirement to reflect cost-of-living changes, based on the [*Portland-*
12 *Salem, OR-WA, Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for All Items,*] **Consumer Price**
13 **Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor
14 Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. Adjustments under this subsection may not
15 exceed a two percent increase or decrease for any year. An adjustment shall be made under this
16 subsection only for calendar years in which the member is disabled for at least six months during
17 the year.

18 (5) A pension program member is considered to be disabled for the purpose of this section if:

19 (a) The member is found, after being examined by one or more physicians selected by the Public
20 Employees Retirement Board, to be mentally or physically incapacitated for an extended duration
21 and unable to perform any work for which qualified, by reason of injury or disease that was not
22 intentionally self-inflicted; or

23 (b) The member receives workers' compensation benefits by reason of injury or disease that was
24 sustained while in actual performance of duty with a participating public employer and that was not
25 intentionally self-inflicted and returns to employment with a participating public employer after the
26 period of disability.

27 **SECTION 13.** ORS 321.017 is amended to read:

28 321.017. (1) In addition to the taxes levied under ORS 321.015 (1) to (4), there hereby is levied
29 a privilege tax upon taxpayers on the harvesting of all merchantable forest products harvested on
30 forestlands in the amount provided in subsection (2) of this section.

31 (2) The rate of tax levied in subsection (1) of this section shall be established annually at the
32 beginning of each calendar year by the board of directors of the Oregon Forest Resources Institute,
33 at a rate not to exceed 75 cents per thousand feet, board measure, adjusted annually for inflation
34 since 1991 based on the [*Consumer Price Index (Portland area -- all items)*] **Consumer Price Index**
35 **for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items)**, as published by the Bureau of Labor Sta-
36 tistics of the United States Department of Labor [*for the Portland, Oregon, area*].

37 (3) The tax shall be measured by and be applicable to each per thousand feet, board measure,
38 and such shall be subject to and determined by the procedures and provisions of ORS 321.015 (5)
39 and (6).

40 (4) The tax levied by subsection (1) of this section shall be due and payable to the Department
41 of Revenue in the manner and procedure, including penalties and interest, as set forth for the col-
42 lection of the privilege tax in ORS 321.005 to 321.185.

43 (5) The revenue from the tax levied by subsection (1) of this section shall be remitted to the
44 State Treasurer who shall deposit it in a suspense account established under ORS 321.145 (1). After
45 payment of refunds, which shall be paid in the same manner as other forest products harvest tax

1 refunds are paid in ORS 321.145 (2), the balance of the additional tax imposed under subsection (1)
2 of this section shall be deposited in the Oregon Forest Resources Institute Fund.

3 **SECTION 14.** ORS 327.006 is amended to read:

4 327.006. As used in ORS 327.006 to 327.133, 327.348 and 327.731 and sections 1 to 3, chapter 735,
5 Oregon Laws 2013:

6 (1) "Aggregate days membership" means the sum of days present and absent, according to the
7 rules of the State Board of Education, of all resident pupils when school is actually in session during
8 a certain period. The aggregate days membership of kindergarten pupils shall be calculated on the
9 basis of a half-day program for half-day kindergarten and on the basis of a full-day program for
10 full-day kindergarten.

11 (2)(a) "Approved transportation costs" means those costs as defined by rule of the State Board
12 of Education and is limited to those costs attributable to transporting or room and board provided

42 posal site and related transfer stations located in the county including but not limited to rehabili-
43 tation and enhancement of the area, development of alternate water systems, road construction and
44 maintenance and mitigation of adverse effects on wildlife and the environment, if provisions to mit-
45 igate such adverse impacts are not assured by permit conditions or bond requirements.

(2) If the parties negotiating a surcharge under subsection (1) of this section do not reach an agreement within 90 days after the Department of Environmental Quality receives an application under ORS 459.235 for a permit for the regional disposal site, the board of county commissioners shall unilaterally impose the following surcharge:

- (a) For the first 2,000 tons per day..... \$ 0.75/ton
- (b) For each ton between 2,000 to 4,000 tons per day..... \$ 1.00/ton
- (c) For each ton above 4,000 tons per day..... \$ 1.25/ton

(3) If a board of county commissioners imposes the surcharge under subsection (2) of this section:

17 (3) The holder of a full on-premises sales license shall allow a patron to remove a partially
18 consumed bottle of wine from the licensed premises if the wine is served in conjunction with the
19 patron's meal, the patron is not a minor and the patron is not visibly intoxicated.

20 (4) The holder of a full on-premises sales license is entitled to purchase any distilled liquor from
21 an agent of the commission appointed pursuant to ORS 471.750 at a discount of not more than five
22 percent off the regular listed price fixed by the commission, together with all taxes, in a manner

7 (c) Landscaping work performed by a landscape maintenance business if:

8 (A) The landscaping work is performed for a customer that in a calendar year receives primarily
9 landscape maintenance services from the business;

10 (B) The value of all labor, materials or other items supplied for landscaping work at a job site
11 does not exceed \$500 in a calendar year; and

12 (C) The landscaping work is of a casual, minor or inconsequential nature, as those terms are
13 defined by the State Landscape Contractors Board by rule.

14 (d) Installation of fences, decks, arbors, driveways, walkways or retaining walls if performed by
15 a person or business licensed with the Construction Contractors Board.

16 (e) Rough grading of plots and areas of land performed in conjunction with new or remodeling
