SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Expands types of entities that may receive grant from Farm-to-School Grant Program to purchase food produced or processed in state or to identify sources of foods or to process foods. Expands purposes for which grant may be used.

Creates grant to encourage and sustain successful efforts related to program. Expands types of entities that may receive grant for food-based, agriculture-based or gardenbased educational activities.

Directs Department of Education to evaluate effectiveness of program and to ensure that technical assistance, training and resources are provided to certain entities.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2019.

4	Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
5	SECTION 1. ORS 336.431 is amended to read:
6	336.431. (1) The Department of Education shall administer a Farm-to-School Grant Program as
7	provided by this section.
8	(2) [A school district] An entity identified in subsection (3)(a) or (5)(a) of this section may
9	apply to the department for a grant as follows:
10	(a) As a noncompetitive grant to assist the school district with paying for costs incurred by the
11	school district to purchase food produced or processed in this state[; or] or to pay for costs in-
12	curred to identify sources of those foods or to process those foods.
13	(b) As a competitive grant to encourage and sustain successful efforts to purchase or
14	promote food produced or processed in this state.
15	[(b)] (c) As a competitive grant to fund food-based, agriculture-based and garden-based educa-
16	tional activities in the school district.
17	(3)(a) Based on a noncompetitive process, the department shall provide grants to [school
18	districts] any of the following entities to assist in paying for costs incurred by the [school
19	district] entity to purchase food produced or processed in this state[.] or to pay for costs incurred

2	(b) An entity identified in paragraph (a) of this subsection that receives a grant under this
3	subsection shall use the moneys for costs directly associated with the educational activities, in-
4	cluding staff time, travel costs and equipment purchased for the activities.
5	(c) When awarding grants under this subsection, preference shall be given to entities that pro-
6	pose educational activities that:
7	(A) Are well designed;
8	(B) Promote healthy food activities;
9	(C) Have clear educational objectives;
10	(D) Involve parents or the community;
11	(E) Are connected to a school district's farm-to-school procurement activities; and
12	(F) Are culturally relevant to the students being served by the grant moneys.
13	(d) The department must ensure that the recipients of grants under this subsection:
14	(A) Represent a variety of school sizes and geographic locations; and
15	(B) Serve a high percentage of children who qualify for free or reduced price school meals under
16	the United States Department of Agriculture's National School Lunch Program.
17	[(5)] (6) The Department of Education shall consult with the State Department of Agriculture

19	(a) Develop rules and standards related to the grants awarded under this section.
20	(b) Determine the recipients and amounts of grants awarded under this section.
21	(c) Evaluate the effectiveness of the Farm-to-School Grant Program, including program
22	administration and the economic impact, educational outcomes and health outcomes of the
23	program. For the purpose of conducting the evaluation, the Department of Education may
24	collaborate or enter into a contract with a public or private entity.
25	(7) The Department of Education shall ensure that technical assistance, training and
26	resources are provided to entities identified in subsections (3)(a) and (5)(a) of this section,
27	and to any other entities that would contribute to the success of the program, by entering
28	into an agreement with one or more statewide, regional or community partners to provide
29	the technical assistance, training and resources.
30	[(6)] (8)(a) The Department of Education may expend for the administrative costs incurred under
31	this section no more than two percent of all moneys received by the department for the grant pro-

33	(b) For the purpose of encouraging the success of the program administered under this

34 section, the Department of Education shall enter into an agreement with the State Department of Agriculture to have the State Department of Agriculture distribute funding for 3536 infrastructure and equipment to persons who intend to sell food produced or processed in 37 this state to entities identified in subsection (3)(a) of this section.

38 (c) The Department of Education may enter into agreements with partners identified in subsection (7) of this section and with the State Department of Agriculture for the payment 39 40 of administrative costs incurred under this section.

41 SECTION 2. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-42 ated to the Department of Education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, out of the 43 General Fund, the amount of \$10,350,000, which shall be expended for the purposes of ORS 44 336.431.

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SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on

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1 expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2019 (Enrolled House Bill

2 5002), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses

3 from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, and including federal

4 funds for contract services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in

5 section 2, chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2019 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), collected or received by

6 the State Department of Agriculture, for market access, is increased by \$500,000 for the

7 purpose of carrying out the provisions of ORS 336.431.

8 <u>SECTION 4.</u> This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 9 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect 10 July 1, 2019.

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
