# House Bill 2942

Sponsored by Representative ALONSO LEON; Representative HERNANDEZ, Senators DEMBROW, MANNING JR, WAGNER

#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Requires Higher Education Coordinating Commission to adopt statewide higher education equity plan and take plan into account in recommending to Governor appropriations for specified programs, facilities and investments and in advising Legislative Assembly, Governor, community colleges, public universities and other state boards and commissions on educational policies. Requires executive director of Higher Education Coordinating Commission to appoint Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer.

The commission shall ensure that approved programs: 8 9 (A) Are consistent with the mission statement of the community college or public university; (B) Do not unnecessarily duplicate academic programs offered by Oregon's other community 10 colleges or public universities; 11 12 (C) Are not located in a geographic area that will cause undue hardship to Oregon's other community colleges or public universities; and 13 (D) Are allocated among Oregon's community colleges and public universities to maximize the 14 15 achievement of statewide needs and requirements. 16 (h) For public universities listed in ORS 352.002: (A) Approve the mission statement adopted by a governing board of a public university. 17 18 (B) Review and determine whether a proposed annual increase of resident undergraduate en-19 rollment fees of greater than five percent is appropriate. 20 (C) Advise the Governor and the Legislative Assembly on issues of university governance. 21(D) Approve and authorize degrees. 22(E) Perform the evaluation and certification required by ORS 350.095. 23(i) Authorize degrees to be offered by independent post-secondary institutions in this state under ORS 348.594 to 348.615. 94 25(i) Oversee the licensing of career schools under ORS 345.010 to 345.450. (k) Have the authority to enter into and administer interstate agreements regarding the pro-2627vision of post-secondary distance education. The participation by an educational institution that is not based in this state in distance learning courses or programs that are part of an interstate 28agreement entered into and administered under this paragraph does not constitute operating in this 29state for purposes of ORS 348.594 to 348.615. The commission, by rule, may impose a fee on any 30 31 educational institution that seeks to operate under or participate in such interstate agreements. The 32fee amount shall be established to recover designated expenses incurred by the commission in par-33 ticipating in such agreements. 34 (4) In addition to the duties described in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, the Higher Ed-35 ucation Coordinating Commission shall advise the Legislative Assembly, the Governor, community colleges, public universities and other state boards and commissions on policies in order to: 36 37 (a) Ensure or improve access to higher education by diverse and underserved populations. 38 (b) Encourage student success and completion initiatives. (c) Improve the coordination of the provision of educational services, including: 39 (A) Transfers and coenrollment throughout the higher education system; 40 (B) Accelerated college credit programs for high school students; 41 (C) Applied baccalaureate and other transfer degrees; 42 (D) Programs and grants that span multiple institutions; and 43 (E) Reciprocity agreements with other states. 44

45 (d) In coordination with the State Board of Education, enhance the use and quality of dual

credit, career and technical pathways and efforts to create a culture of college attendance in this
 state.

3 (e) In coordination with the State Workforce and Talent Development Board, local workforce 4 development boards, the Oregon Health and Science University and independent institutions, ensure 5 that the state's colleges and universities offer programs in high-demand occupations that meet 6 Oregon's workforce needs.

(f) Improve economies of scale by encouraging and facilitating the use of the shared services
among post-secondary institutions in this state.

9 (5) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in a manner consistent with ORS chapter 10 183, may adopt administrative rules.

(6) With the exception of the rulemaking authority granted in subsection (5) of this section, the
 Higher Education Coordinating Commission may delegate any of its powers, duties or functions to
 a committee of the commission or to the executive director of the commission.

(7) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may, subject to the Public Contracting Code, enter into contracts and agreements, including grant agreements, with public and private entities for those higher education and workforce development activities that are consistent with ORS 350.001 and 350.005, with the policies set forth in ORS chapters 341 and 348 and with statutory policies related to career schools and public universities.

(8) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may exercise only powers, duties and functions expressly granted by the Legislative Assembly. Except as otherwise expressly provided by law,
all other authorities reside at the institutional level with the respective boards of the post-secondary
institutions.

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
