SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Makes various changes to workers' compensation laws of this state.
Declares emergency, effective on passage.

2 Relating to workers' compensation; creating new provisions; amending ORS 656.005, 656.206, 656.210,
3 656.214, 656.225, 656.236, 656.245, 656.260, 656.262, 656.266, 656.267, 656.268, 656.283, 656.308,
4 656.310, 656.325, 656.386, 656.704, 656.802 and 656.804; and declaring an emergency.

5 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

6 **SECTION 1.** ORS 656.005 is amended to read:

7 656.005. (1) "Average weekly wage" means the Oregon average weekly wage in covered em-
8 ployment, as determined by the Employment Department, for the last quarter of the calendar year
9 preceding the fiscal year in which the injury occurred.

10 (2)(a) "Beneficiary" means an injured worker, and the spouse in a marriage, child or dependent
11 of a worker, who is entitled to receive payments under this chapter.

12 (b) "Beneficiary" does not include:

13 (A) A spouse of an injured worker living in a state of abandonment for more than one year at
14 the time of the injury or subsequently. A spouse who has lived separate and apart from the worker
15 for a period of two years and who has not during that time received or attempted by process of law
16 to collect funds for support or maintenance is considered living in a state of abandonment.

17 (B) A person who intentionally causes the compensable injury to or death of an injured worker.

18 (3) "Board" means the Workers' Compensation Board.

19 (4) "Carrier-insured employer" means an employer who provides workers' compensation cover-
20 age with the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or an insurer authorized under ORS
21 chapter 731 to transact workers' compensation insurance in this state.

22 (5) "Child" means a child of an injured worker, including:

23 (a) A posthumous child;

24 (b) A child legally adopted before the injury;

25 (c) A child toward whom the worker stands in loco parentis;

26 (d) A child born out of wedlock;

27 (e) A stepchild, if the stepchild was, at the time of the injury, a member of the worker's family
28 and substantially dependent upon the worker for support; and

29 (f) A child of any age who was an invalid at the time of the accident and thereafter remains an
30 invalid substantially dependent on the worker for support.

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter *[italic and bracketed]* is existing law to be omitted.
New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (6) "Claim" means a written request for compensation from a subject worker or someone on the
 2 worker's behalf, or any compensable injury of which a subject employer has notice or knowledge.

3 (7)(a) A "compensable injury" is an accidental injury, or accidental injury to prosthetic appli-
 4 ances, arising out of and in the course of employment requiring medical services or resulting in
 5 disability or death; an injury is accidental if the result is an accident, whether or not due to acci-
 6 dental means, if it is established by medical evidence supported by objective findings, [*subject to the*
 7 *following limitations:*]

8 [(A) *No*] **except that an** injury or disease is **not** compensable as a consequence of a
 9 compensable injury unless the compensable injury is the major contributing cause of the conse-
 10 quential condition.

11 [(B) *If an otherwise compensable injury combines at any time with a preexisting condition to cause*
 12 *or prolong disability or a need for treatment, the combined condition is compensable only if, so long*
 13 *as and to the extent that the otherwise compensable injury is the major contributing cause of the dis-*
 14 *ability of the combined condition or the major contributing cause of the need for treatment of the com-*
 15 *bined condition.*]

16 **(b) "Compensable injury" includes the accidental injury and all results requiring medical**
 17 **services or resulting in disability or death and is not limited by the conditions specified in**
 18 **the notice of acceptance.**

19 [(b)] (c) "Compensable injury" does not include:

20 (A) Injury to any active participant in assaults or combats which are not connected to the job
 21 assignment and which amount to a deviation from customary duties;

22 (B) Injury incurred while engaging in or performing, or as the result of engaging in or per-
 23 forming, any recreational or social activities primarily for the worker's personal pleasure; or

24 (C) Injury the major contributing cause of which is demonstrated to be by a preponderance of
 25 the evidence the injured worker's consumption of alcoholic beverages or cannabis or the unlawful
 26 consumption of any controlled substance, unless the employer permitted, encouraged or had actual
 27 knowledge of such consumption.

28 [(c)] (d) A "disabling compensable injury" is an injury which entitles the worker to compen-
 29 sation for disability or death. An injury is not disabling if no temporary benefits are due and pay-
 30 able, unless there is a reasonable expectation that permanent disability will result from the injury.

31 [(d)] (e) A "nondisabling compensable injury" is any injury which requires medical services only.

32 (8) "Compensation" includes all benefits, including medical services, provided for a compensable
 33 injury to a subject worker or the worker's beneficiaries by an insurer or self-insured employer pur-
 34 suant to this chapter.

35 (9) "Department" means the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

36 (10)(a) "Dependent" means any of the following relatives of the worker who, at the time of an
 37 accident, depended in whole or in part for the relative's support on the earnings of a worker who
 38 dies as a result of an injury:

39 (A) A parent, grandparent or stepparent;

40 (B) A grandson or granddaughter;

41 (C) A brother or sister or half-brother or half-sister; and

42 (D) A niece or nephew.

43 (b) "Dependent" does not include an alien who does not reside within the United States at the
 44 time of the accident, other than a parent, a spouse or children, unless a treaty provides otherwise.

45 (11) "Director" means the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

1 (12)(a) “Doctor” or “physician” means a person duly licensed to practice one or more of the
 2 healing arts in any country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States within the
 3 limits of the license of the licentiate.

4 (b) Except as otherwise provided for workers subject to a managed care contract, “attending
 5 physician” means a doctor, physician or physician assistant who is primarily responsible for the
 6 treatment of a worker’s compensable injury and who is:

7 (A) A physician licensed under ORS 677.100 to 677.228 by the Oregon Medical Board, or a
 8 podiatric physician and surgeon licensed under ORS 677.805 to 677.840 by the Oregon Medical
 9 Board, an oral and maxillofacial surgeon licensed by the Oregon Board of Dentistry or a similarly
 10 licensed doctor in any country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States; or

11 (B) For a cumulative total of 60 days from the first visit on the initial claim or for a cumulative
 12 total of 18 visits, whichever occurs first, to any of the medical service providers listed in this sub-
 13 paragraph, a:

14 (i) Doctor or physician licensed by the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners for the State of
 15 Oregon under ORS chapter 684 or a similarly licensed doctor or physician in any country or in any
 16 state, territory or possession of the United States;

17 (ii) Physician assistant licensed by the Oregon Medical Board in accordance with ORS 677.505
 18 to 677.525 or a similarly licensed physician assistant in any country or in any state, territory or
 19 possession of the United States; or

20 (iii) Doctor of naturopathy or naturopathic physician licensed by the Oregon Board of
 21 Naturopathic Medicine under ORS chapter 685 or a similarly licensed doctor or physician in any
 22 country or in any state, territory or possession of the United States.

23 (c) Except as otherwise provided for workers subject to a managed care contract, “attending
 24 physician” does not include a physician who provides care in a hospital emergency room and refers
 25 the injured worker to a primary care physician for follow-up care and treatment.

26 (d) “Consulting physician” means a doctor or physician who examines a worker or the worker’s
 27 medical record to advise the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide
 28 compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 regarding treatment of a worker’s compensable
 29 injury.

30 (13)(a) “Employer” means any person, including receiver, administrator, executor or trustee, and
 31 the state, state agencies, counties, municipal corporations, school districts and other public corpo-
 32 rations or political subdivisions, who contracts to pay a remuneration for and secures the right to
 33 direct and control the services of any person.

34 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, for purposes of this chapter, the client of
 35 a temporary service provider is not the employer of temporary workers provided by the temporary
 36 service provider.

37 (c) As used in paragraph (b) of this subsection, “temporary service provider” has the meaning
 38 for that term provided in ORS 656.850.

39 (14) “Insurer” means the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or an insurer authorized
 40 under ORS chapter 731 to transact workers’ compensation insurance in this state or an assigned
 41 claims agent selected by the director under ORS 656.054.

42 (15) “Consumer and Business Services Fund” means the fund created by ORS 705.145.

43 (16) “Invalid” means one who is physically or mentally incapacitated from earning a livelihood.

44 (17) “Medically stationary” means that no further material improvement would reasonably be
 45 expected from medical treatment, or the passage of time.

1 (18) “Noncomplying employer” means a subject employer who has failed to comply with ORS
2 656.017.

3 (19) “Objective findings” in support of medical evidence are verifiable indications of injury or
4 disease that may include, but are not limited to, range of motion, atrophy, muscle strength and
5 palpable muscle spasm. “Objective findings” does not include physical findings or subjective re-
6 sponses to physical examinations that are not reproducible, measurable or observable.

7 (20) “Palliative care” means medical service rendered to reduce or moderate temporarily the
8 intensity of an otherwise stable medical condition, but does not include those medical services ren-
9 dered to diagnose, heal or permanently alleviate or eliminate a medical condition.

10 (21) “Party” means a claimant for compensation, the employer of the injured worker at the time
11 of injury and the insurer, if any, of such employer.

12 (22) “Payroll” means a record of wages payable to workers for their services and includes
13 commissions, value of exchange labor and the reasonable value of board, rent, housing, lodging or
14 similar advantage received from the employer. However, “payroll” does not include overtime pay,
15 vacation pay, bonus pay, tips, amounts payable under profit-sharing agreements or bonus payments
16 to reward workers for safe working practices. Bonus pay is limited to payments which are not an-
17 ticipated under the contract of employment and which are paid at the sole discretion of the em-
18 ployer. The exclusion from payroll of bonus payments to reward workers for safe working practices
19 is only for the purpose of calculations based on payroll to determine premium for workers’ com-
20 pensation insurance, and does not affect any other calculation or determination based on payroll for
21 the purposes of this chapter.

22 (23) “Person” includes partnership, joint venture, association, limited liability company and
23 corporation.

24 (24)(a) “Preexisting condition” means, for all industrial injury claims, any injury, disease, con-
25 genital abnormality, personality disorder or similar condition that contributes to disability or need
26 for treatment **and does not render a worker more susceptible to an injury**, provided that:

27 (A) Except for claims in which a preexisting condition is arthritis or an arthritic condition, the
28 worker has been diagnosed with such condition, or has obtained medical services for the symptoms
29 of the condition regardless of diagnosis; and

30 (B)(i) In claims for an initial injury or omitted condition, the diagnosis or treatment precedes
31 the initial injury;

32 (ii) In claims for a new medical condition, the diagnosis or treatment precedes the onset of the
33 new medical condition; or

34 (iii) In claims for a worsening pursuant to ORS 656.273 or 656.278, the diagnosis or treatment
35 precedes the onset of the worsened condition.

36 (b) “Preexisting condition” means, for all occupational disease claims, any injury, disease, con-
37 genital abnormality, personality disorder or similar condition that contributes to disability or need
38 for treatment and that precedes the onset of the claimed occupational disease, or precedes a claim
39 for worsening in such claims pursuant to ORS 656.273 or 656.278.

40 (c) For the purposes of industrial injury claims, a condition does not contribute to disability or
41 need for treatment if the condition merely renders the worker more susceptible to the injury.

42 (d) **“Preexisting condition” does not include a condition that is materially related to a**
43 **worker’s immutable characteristics including, but not limited to, the worker’s age, sex, race**
44 **or ethnicity, or genetic heritage or makeup.**

45 (25) “Self-insured employer” means an employer or group of employers certified under ORS

1 656.430 as meeting the qualifications set out by ORS 656.407.

2 (26) "State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation" and "corporation" mean the State Accident
3 Insurance Fund Corporation created under ORS 656.752.

4 (27) "Subject employer" means an employer who is subject to this chapter as provided by ORS
5 656.023.

6 (28) "Subject worker" means a worker who is subject to this chapter as provided by ORS
7 656.027.

8 (29) "Wages" means the money rate at which the service rendered is recompensed under the
9 contract of hiring in force at the time of the accident, including reasonable value of board, rent,
10 housing, lodging or similar advantage received from the employer, and includes the amount of tips
11 required to be reported by the employer pursuant to section 6053 of the Internal Revenue Code of
12 1954, as amended, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, or the amount of actual tips
13 reported, whichever amount is greater. The State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation may estab-
14 lish assumed minimum and maximum wages, in conformity with recognized insurance principles, at
15 which any worker shall be carried upon the payroll of the employer for the purpose of determining
16 the premium of the employer.

17 (30) "Worker" means any person, including a minor whether lawfully or unlawfully employed,
18 who engages to furnish services for a remuneration, subject to the direction and control of an em-
19 ployer and includes salaried, elected and appointed officials of the state, state agencies, counties,
20 cities, school districts and other public corporations, but does not include any person whose services
21 are performed as an inmate or ward of a state institution or as part of the eligibility requirements
22 for a general or public assistance grant. For the purpose of determining entitlement to temporary
23 disability benefits or permanent total disability benefits under this chapter, "worker" does not in-
24 clude a person who has withdrawn from the workforce during the period for which such benefits are
25 sought.

26 (31) "Independent contractor" has the meaning for that term provided in ORS 670.600.

27 **SECTION 2.** ORS 656.206 is amended to read:

28 656.206. (1) As used in this section:

29 (a) "Essential functions" means the primary tasks associated with the job.

30 (b) "Materially improved medically" means an actual change for the better in the worker's
31 medical condition that is supported by objective findings.

32 (c) "Materially improved vocationally" means an actual change for the better in the:

33 (A) Worker's vocational capability; or

34 (B) Likelihood that the worker can return to work in a gainful and suitable occupation.

35 (d) "Permanent total disability" means[, notwithstanding ORS 656.225,] the loss, including pre-
36 existing disability, of use or function of any portion of the body which permanently incapacitates the
37 worker from regularly performing work at a gainful and suitable occupation.

38 (e) "Regularly performing work" means the ability of the worker to discharge the essential
39 functions of the job.

40 (f) "Suitable occupation" means one that the worker has the ability and the training or experi-
41 ence to perform, or an occupation that the worker is able to perform after rehabilitation.

42 (g) "Wages" means wages as determined under ORS 656.210.

43 (2) If permanent total disability results from a worker's injury, the worker shall receive during
44 the period of that disability compensation benefits equal to 66-2/3 percent of wages, no more than
45 133 percent of the average weekly wage or no less than 33 percent of the average weekly wage.

1 (3) A worker has the burden of proving permanent total disability status and must establish that
2 the worker is willing to seek regular gainful employment and that the worker has made reasonable
3 efforts to obtain such employment.

4 (4) When requested by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services, a
5 worker who receives permanent total disability benefits shall file on a form provided by the director,
6 a sworn statement of the worker's gross annual income for the preceding year along with such other
7 information as the director considers necessary to determine whether the worker regularly performs
8 work at a gainful and suitable occupation.

9 (5) Each insurer shall reexamine periodically each permanent total disability claim for which the
10 insurer has current payment responsibility to determine whether the worker has materially im-
11 proved, either medically or vocationally, and is no longer permanently incapacitated from regularly
12 performing work at a gainful and suitable occupation. Reexamination must be conducted every two
13 years or at such other more frequent interval as the director may prescribe. Reexamination must
14 include such medical examinations, vocational evaluations, reports and other records as the insurer
15 considers necessary or the director may require.

16 (6)(a) If a worker receiving permanent total disability benefits is found to be materially improved
17 and capable of regularly performing work at a gainful and suitable occupation, the insurer or self-
18 insured employer shall issue a notice of closure pursuant to ORS 656.268. Permanent total disability
19 benefits shall be paid through the date of the notice of closure. Notwithstanding ORS 656.268 (5),
20 if a worker objects to a notice of closure issued under this subsection, the worker shall request a
21 hearing. If the worker requests a hearing on the notice of closure before the Hearings Division of
22 the Workers' Compensation Board within 30 days of the date of the notice of closure, the insurer
23 or self-insured employer shall continue payment of permanent total disability benefits until an order
24 of the Hearings Division or a subsequent order affirms the notice of closure or until another order
25 that terminates the worker's benefits becomes final. If the worker requests a hearing on the notice
26 of closure more than 30 days from the date of the notice of closure but before the 60-day period for
27 requesting a hearing expires, the insurer or self-insured employer shall resume paying permanent
28 total disability benefits from the date the hearing is requested and shall continue payment of bene-
29 fits until an order of the Hearings Division or a subsequent order affirms the notice of closure or
30 until another order that terminates the worker's benefits becomes final. If the notice of closure is
31 upheld by the Hearings Division, the insurer or self-insured employer must be reimbursed from the
32 Workers' Benefit Fund for the amount of permanent total disability benefits paid after the date of
33 the notice of closure issued under this subsection.

34 (b) An insurer or self-insured employer must establish that the condition of a worker who is
35 receiving permanent total disability benefits has materially improved by a preponderance of the ev-
36 idence presented at hearing.

37 (c) Medical examinations or vocational evaluations used to support the issuance of a notice of
38 closure under this subsection must include at least one report in which the author personally ob-
39 served the worker.

40 (d) Notwithstanding section 54 (3), chapter 2, Oregon Laws 1990, the Hearings Division of the
41 Workers' Compensation Board may request the director to order a medical arbiter examination of
42 an injured worker who has requested a hearing under this subsection.

43 (7) A worker who has had permanent total disability benefits terminated under this section by
44 an order that has become final is eligible for vocational assistance pursuant to ORS 656.340.
45 Notwithstanding ORS 656.268 (10), if a worker has enrolled in and is actively engaged in a training

1 program, when vocational assistance provided under this section ends or the worker ceases to be
2 enrolled and actively engaged in the training program, the insurer or the self-insured employer shall
3 determine the extent of disability pursuant to ORS 656.214.

4 (8) A worker receiving permanent total disability benefits is required, if requested by the di-
5 rector, the insurer or the self-insured employer, to submit to a vocational evaluation at a time rea-
6 sonably convenient to the worker as may be provided by the rules of the director. No more than
7 three evaluations may be requested except after notification to and authorization by the director.
8 If the worker refuses to submit to or obstructs a vocational evaluation, the rights of the worker to
9 compensation must be suspended with the consent of the director until the evaluation has taken
10 place, and no compensation is payable for the period during which the worker refused to submit to
11 or obstructed the evaluation. The insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the costs of the evalu-
12 ation and related services that are reasonably necessary to allow the worker to attend the evalu-
13 ation requested under this subsection. As used in this subsection, "related services" includes, but
14 is not limited to, wages, child care, travel, meals and lodging.

15 (9) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter, if a worker receiving permanent total
16 disability incurs a new compensable injury, the worker's entitlement to compensation for the new
17 injury shall be limited to medical benefits pursuant to ORS 656.245 and permanent partial disability
18 benefits for impairment, as determined in the manner set forth in ORS 656.214 (2).

19 (10) When a worker eligible for benefits under this section returns to work, if the combined total
20 of the worker's post-injury wages plus permanent total disability benefit exceeds the worker's wage
21 at the time of injury, the worker's permanent total disability benefit must be reduced by the amount
22 the worker's wages plus statutory permanent total disability benefit exceeds the worker's wage at
23 injury.

24 (11) For purposes of this section:

25 (a) A gainful occupation for workers with a date of injury prior to January 1, 2006, who were:

26 (A) Employed continuously for 52 weeks prior to the injury, is an occupation that provides
27 weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three
28 that are applicable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by
29 the United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the worker's av-
30 erage weekly wages from all employment for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury.

31 (B) Not employed continuously for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, but who were em-
32 ployed for at least four weeks prior to the date of injury, is an occupation that provides weekly
33 wages that are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that
34 are applicable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
35 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the worker's average
36 weekly wage from all employment for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury based on weeks of
37 actual employment, excluding any extended periods of unemployment.

38 (C) Employed for less than four weeks prior to the date of injury with no other employment
39 during the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, is an occupation that provides weekly wages that
40 are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable
41 to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the United States
42 Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the average weekly wages intended
43 by the parties at the time of initial hire.

44 (b) A gainful occupation for workers with a date of injury on or after January 1, 2006, who were:

45 (A) Employed continuously for 52 weeks prior to the injury, is an occupation that provides

1 weekly wages that are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three
 2 that are applicable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by
 3 the United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the worker's av-
 4 erage weekly wages from all employment for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury adjusted by
 5 the percentage of change in the applicable federal poverty guidelines for a family of three from the
 6 date of injury to the date of evaluation of the extent of the worker's disability.

7 (B) Not employed continuously for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, but who were em-
 8 ployed for at least four weeks prior to the date of injury, is an occupation that provides weekly
 9 wages that are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that
 10 are applicable to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the
 11 United States Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the worker's average
 12 weekly wage from all employment for the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury based on weeks of
 13 actual employment, excluding any extended periods of unemployment and as adjusted by the per-
 14 centage of change in the applicable federal poverty guidelines for a family of three from the date
 15 of injury to the date of evaluation of the extent of the worker's disability.

16 (C) Employed for less than four weeks prior to the date of injury with no other employment
 17 during the 52 weeks prior to the date of injury, is an occupation that provides weekly wages that
 18 are the lesser of the most recent federal poverty guidelines for a family of three that are applicable
 19 to Oregon residents and that are published annually in the Federal Register by the United States
 20 Department of Health and Human Services or 66-2/3 percent of the average weekly wages intended
 21 by the parties at the time of initial hire adjusted by the percentage of change in the applicable
 22 federal poverty guidelines for a family of three from the date of injury to the date of evaluation of
 23 the extent of the worker's disability.

24 **SECTION 3.** ORS 656.210 is amended to read:

25 656.210. (1) When the total disability is only temporary, the worker shall receive during the pe-
 26 riod of that total disability compensation equal to 66-2/3 percent of wages, but not more than 133
 27 percent of the average weekly wage nor less than the amount of 90 percent of wages a week or the
 28 amount of \$50 a week, whichever amount is less. Notwithstanding the limitation imposed by this
 29 subsection, an injured worker who is not otherwise eligible to receive an increase in benefits for the
 30 fiscal year in which compensation is paid shall have the benefits increased each fiscal year by the
 31 percentage which the applicable average weekly wage has increased since the previous fiscal year.

32 (2)(a) For the purpose of this section, the weekly wage of workers shall be ascertained:

33 (A) For workers employed in one job at the time of injury, by multiplying the daily wage the
 34 worker was receiving by the number of days per week that the worker was regularly employed; or

35 (B) For workers employed in more than one job at the time of injury, by adding all earnings the
 36 worker was receiving from all subject employment.

37 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection, the weekly wage calculated under par-
 38 agraph (a)(A) of this subsection shall be used for workers employed in more than one job at the time
 39 of injury unless the insurer, self-insured employer or assigned claims agent for a noncomplying em-
 40 ployer receives:

41 (A) Within 30 days of receipt of the initial claim, notice that the worker was employed in more
 42 than one job with a subject employer at the time of injury; and

43 (B) Within 60 days of the date of mailing a request for verification, verifiable documentation of
 44 wages from such additional employment.

45 (c) Notwithstanding ORS 656.005 [(7)(c)] (7)(d), an injury to a worker employed in more than one

1 job at the time of injury is not disabling if no temporary disability benefits are payable for time lost
 2 from the job at injury. Claim costs incurred as a result of supplemental temporary disability benefits
 3 paid as provided in subsection (5) of this section may not be included in any data used for
 4 ratemaking or individual employer rating or dividend calculations by an insurer, a rating organiza-
 5 tion licensed pursuant to ORS chapter 737, the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or the
 6 Department of Consumer and Business Services if the injured worker is not eligible for permanent
 7 disability benefits or temporary disability benefits for time lost from the job at injury.

8 (d) For the purpose of this section:

9 (A) The benefits of a worker who incurs an injury shall be based on the wage of the worker at
 10 the time of injury.

11 (B) The benefits of a worker who incurs an occupational disease shall be based on the wage of
 12 the worker at the time there is medical verification that the worker is unable to work because of
 13 the disability caused by the occupational disease. If the worker is not working at the time that there
 14 is medical verification that the worker is unable to work because of the disability caused by the
 15 occupational disease, the benefits shall be based on the wage of the worker at the worker's last
 16 regular employment.

17 (e) As used in this subsection, "regularly employed" means actual employment or availability for
 18 such employment. For workers not regularly employed and for workers with no remuneration or
 19 whose remuneration is not based solely upon daily or weekly wages, the Director of the Department
 20 of Consumer and Business Services, by rule, may prescribe methods for establishing the worker's
 21 weekly wage.

22 (3) No disability payment is recoverable for temporary total or partial disability suffered during
 23 the first three calendar days after the worker leaves work or loses wages as a result of the
 24 compensable injury unless the worker is totally disabled after the injury and the total disability
 25 continues for a period of 14 consecutive days or unless the worker is admitted as an inpatient to a
 26 hospital within 14 days of the first onset of total disability. If the worker leaves work or loses wages
 27 on the day of the injury due to the injury, that day shall be considered the first day of the three-day
 28 period.

29 (4) When an injured worker with an accepted disabling compensable injury is required to leave
 30 work for a period of four hours or more to receive medical consultation, examination or treatment
 31 with regard to the compensable injury, the worker shall receive temporary disability benefits cal-
 32 culated pursuant to ORS 656.212 for the period during which the worker is absent, until such time
 33 as the worker is determined to be medically stationary. However, benefits under this subsection are
 34 not payable if wages are paid for the period of absence by the employer.

35 (5)(a) The insurer of the employer at injury or the self-insured employer at injury, may elect to
 36 be responsible for payment of supplemental temporary disability benefits to a worker employed in
 37 more than one job at the time of injury. In accordance with rules adopted by the director, if the
 38 worker's weekly wage is determined under subsection (2)(a)(B) of this section, the insurer or self-
 39 insured employer shall be reimbursed from the Workers' Benefit Fund for the amount of temporary
 40 disability benefits paid that exceeds the amount payable pursuant to subsection (2)(a)(A) of this
 41 section had the worker been employed in only one job at the time of injury. Such reimbursement
 42 shall include an administrative fee payable to the insurer or self-insured employer pursuant to rules
 43 adopted by the director.

44 (b) If the insurer or self-insured employer elects not to pay the supplemental temporary disabil-
 45 ity benefits for a worker employed in more than one job at the time of injury, the director shall ei-

1 ther administer and pay the supplemental benefits directly or shall assign responsibility to
2 administer and process the payment to a paying agent selected by the director.

3 (6) The director shall adopt rules for the payment and reimbursement of supplemental temporary
4 disability benefits under this section.

5 **SECTION 4.** ORS 656.214 is amended to read:

6 656.214. (1) As used in this section:

7 (a) "Impairment" means the loss of use or function of a body part or system [*due to*] **caused in**
8 **material part by** the compensable industrial injury or occupational disease determined in accord-
9 ance with the standards provided under ORS 656.726, expressed as a percentage of the whole person.

10 (b) "Loss" includes permanent and complete or partial loss of use.

11 (c) "Permanent partial disability" means:

12 (A) Permanent impairment resulting from the compensable industrial injury or occupational
13 disease; or

14 (B) Permanent impairment and work disability resulting from the compensable industrial injury
15 or occupational disease.

16 (d) "Regular work" means the job the worker held at injury.

17 (e) "Work disability" means impairment modified by age, education and adaptability to perform
18 a given job.

19 (2) When permanent partial disability results from a compensable injury or occupational disease,
20 benefits shall be awarded as follows:

21 (a) If the worker has been released to regular work by the attending physician or nurse practi-
22 tioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 or has returned to
23 regular work at the job held at the time of injury, the award shall be for impairment only. Impair-
24 ment shall be determined in accordance with the standards provided by the Director of the Depart-
25 ment of Consumer and Business Services pursuant to ORS 656.726 (4). Impairment benefits are
26 determined by multiplying the impairment value times 100 times the average weekly wage as defined
27 by ORS 656.005.

28 (b) If the worker has not been released to regular work by the attending physician or nurse
29 practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 or has not re-
30 turned to regular work at the job held at the time of injury, the award shall be for impairment and
31 work disability. Work disability shall be determined in accordance with the standards provided by
32 the director pursuant to ORS 656.726 (4). Impairment shall be determined as provided in paragraph
33 (a) of this subsection. Work disability benefits shall be determined by multiplying the impairment
34 value, as modified by the factors of age, education and adaptability to perform a given job, times
35 150 times the worker's weekly wage for the job at injury as calculated under ORS 656.210 (2). The
36 factor for the worker's weekly wage used for the determination of the work disability may be no
37 more than 133 percent or no less than 50 percent of the average weekly wage as defined in ORS
38 656.005.

39 (3) Impairment benefits awarded under subsection (2)(a) of this section shall be expressed as a
40 percentage of the whole person. Impairment benefits for the following body parts may not exceed:

41 (a) For the loss of one arm at or above the elbow joint, 60 percent.

42 (b) For the loss of one forearm at or above the wrist joint, or the loss of one hand, 47 percent.

43 (c) For the loss of one leg, at or above the knee joint, 47 percent.

44 (d) For the loss of one foot, 42 percent.

45 (e) For the loss of a great toe, six percent; for loss of any other toe, one percent.

1 (f) For partial or complete loss of hearing in one ear, that proportion of 19 percent which the
2 loss bears to normal monaural hearing.

3 (g) For partial or complete loss of hearing in both ears, that proportion of 60 percent which the
4 combined binaural hearing loss bears to normal combined binaural hearing. For the purpose of this
5 paragraph, combined binaural hearing loss shall be calculated by taking seven times the hearing loss
6 in the less damaged ear plus the hearing loss in the more damaged ear and dividing that amount
7 by eight. In the case of individuals with compensable hearing loss involving both ears, either the
8 method of calculation for monaural hearing loss or that for combined binaural hearing loss shall be
9 used, depending upon which allows the greater award of impairment.

10 (h) For partial or complete loss of vision of one eye, that proportion of 31 percent which the loss
11 of monocular vision bears to normal monocular vision. For the purposes of this paragraph, the term
12 "normal monocular vision" shall be considered as Snellen 20/20 for distance and Snellen 14/14 for
13 near vision with full sensory field.

14 (i) For partial loss of vision in both eyes, that proportion of 94 percent which the combined
15 binocular visual loss bears to normal combined binocular vision. In all cases of partial loss of sight,
16 the percentage of said loss shall be measured with maximum correction. For the purpose of this
17 paragraph, combined binocular visual loss shall be calculated by taking three times the visual loss
18 in the less damaged eye plus the visual loss in the more damaged eye and dividing that amount by
19 four. In the case of individuals with compensable visual loss involving both eyes, either the method
20 of calculation for monocular visual loss or that for combined binocular visual loss shall be used,
21 depending upon which allows the greater award of impairment.

22 (j) For the loss of a thumb, 15 percent.

23 (k) For the loss of a first finger, eight percent; of a second finger, seven percent; of a third fin-
24 ger, three percent; of a fourth finger, two percent.

25 (4) The loss of one phalange of a thumb, including the adjacent epiphyseal region of the proximal
26 phalange, is considered equal to the loss of one-half of a thumb. The loss of one phalange of a finger,
27 including the adjacent epiphyseal region of the middle phalange, is considered equal to the loss of
28 one-half of a finger. The loss of two phalanges of a finger, including the adjacent epiphyseal region
29 of the proximal phalange of a finger, is considered equal to the loss of 75 percent of a finger. The
30 loss of more than one phalange of a thumb, excluding the epiphyseal region of the proximal
31 phalange, is considered equal to the loss of an entire thumb. The loss of more than two phalanges
32 of a finger, excluding the epiphyseal region of the proximal phalange of a finger, is considered equal
33 to the loss of an entire finger. A proportionate loss of use may be allowed for an uninjured finger
34 or thumb where there has been a loss of effective opposition.

35 (5) A proportionate loss of the hand may be allowed where impairment extends to more than one
36 digit, in lieu of ratings on the individual digits.

37 (6) All permanent disability contemplates future waxing and waning of symptoms of the condi-
38 tion. The results of waxing and waning of symptoms may include, but are not limited to, loss of
39 earning capacity, periods of temporary total or temporary partial disability, or inpatient
40 hospitalization.

41 **SECTION 5.** ORS 656.225 is amended to read:

42 656.225. *[In accepted injury or occupational disease claims, disability solely caused by or medical*
43 *services solely directed to a worker's preexisting condition are not compensable unless:]*

44 *[(1) In occupational disease or injury claims other than those involving a preexisting mental dis-*
45 *order, work conditions or events constitute the major contributing cause of a pathological worsening*

1 *of the preexisting condition.]*

2 *[(2) In occupational disease or injury claims involving a preexisting mental disorder, work condi-*
 3 *tions or events constitute the major contributing cause of an actual worsening of the preexisting con-*
 4 *dition and not just of its symptoms.]*

5 *[(3) In medical service claims, the medical service is prescribed to treat a change in the preexisting*
 6 *condition as specified in subsection (1) or (2) of this section, and not merely as an incident to the*
 7 *treatment of a compensable injury or occupational disease.]*

8 **Except as provided in ORS 656.206, a worker’s preexisting condition may not be consid-**
 9 **ered if the consideration reduces or eliminates the worker’s rights or benefits under this**
 10 **chapter.**

11 **SECTION 6.** ORS 656.236 is amended to read:

12 656.236. (1)(a) The parties to a claim, by agreement, may make such disposition of any or all
 13 matters regarding a claim, except for medical services **and benefits allowed under the authority**
 14 **provided in ORS 656.278**, as the parties consider reasonable, subject to such terms and conditions
 15 as the Workers’ Compensation Board may prescribe. For the purposes of this section, “matters re-
 16 garding a claim” includes the disposition of a beneficiary’s independent claim for compensation un-
 17 der this chapter. Unless otherwise specified, a disposition resolves all matters and all rights to
 18 compensation, attorney fees and penalties potentially arising out of claims, except medical services
 19 **and the late payment or nonpayment of settlement as agreed**, regardless of the conditions
 20 stated in the agreement. **Benefits allowed under the authority provided in ORS 656.278 may**
 21 **only be compromised if the director approves of the settlement and engages in meaningful**
 22 **settlement negotiations for payment of the reasonable value of benefits allowed under the**
 23 **authority provided in ORS 656.278.** Each disposition shall be filed with the board for approval by
 24 the Administrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement or by the board. If the worker is not
 25 represented by an attorney, the worker may, at the worker’s request, personally appear before the
 26 board. Submission of a disposition shall stay all other proceedings and payment obligations, except
 27 for medical services, on that claim. The disposition shall be approved in a final order unless:

28 (A) The Administrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement or the board finds the proposed
 29 disposition is unreasonable as a matter of law;

30 (B) The Administrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement or the board finds the proposed
 31 disposition is the result of an intentional misrepresentation of material fact; or

32 (C) Within 30 days of submitting the disposition for approval, the worker, the insurer or self-
 33 insured employer requests the Administrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement or the board
 34 to disapprove the disposition.

35 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a)(C) of this subsection, a disposition may provide for waiver of
 36 the provisions of that subparagraph if the worker was represented by an attorney at the time the
 37 worker signed the disposition.

38 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, an order approving disposition of a
 39 claim pursuant to this section is not subject to review. However, an order disapproving a disposition
 40 is subject to review pursuant to ORS 656.298. The board shall file with the Department of Consumer
 41 and Business Services a copy of each disposition that the Administrative Law Judge who mediated
 42 the agreement or the board approves. If the Administrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement
 43 or the board does not approve a disposition, the Administrative Law Judge or the board shall enter
 44 an order setting aside the disposition.

45 (3) Unless the terms of the disposition expressly provide otherwise, no payments, except for

1 medical services, pursuant to a disposition are payable until the Administrative Law Judge who
 2 mediated the agreement or the board approves the disposition.

3 (4) If a worker is represented by an attorney in the negotiation of a disposition under this sec-
 4 tion, the insurer or self-insured employer shall pay to the attorney a fee prescribed by the Admin-
 5 istrative Law Judge who mediated the agreement or the board.

6 (5) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, none of the cost of workers' compensation to
 7 employers under this chapter, or in the court review of any claim therefor, shall be charged to a
 8 subject worker.

9 (6) Any claim in which the parties enter into a disposition under this section shall not be eligi-
 10 ble for reimbursement of expenditures authorized by law from the Workers' Benefit Fund without
 11 the prior approval of the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services.

12 (7) Insurers or self-insured employers who are parties to an approved claim disposition agree-
 13 ment under this section shall not be joined as parties in subsequent proceedings under this chapter
 14 to determine responsibility for payment for any matter for which disposition is made by the agree-
 15 ment. Insurers or self-insured employers may be joined as parties in subsequent proceedings under
 16 this chapter to determine responsibility for medical services for claim conditions for which disposi-
 17 tion is made by an approved claim disposition agreement, but no order in any subsequent pro-
 18 ceedings may alter the obligations of an insurer or self-insured employer set forth in an approved
 19 claims disposition agreement, except as those obligations concern medical services.

20 (8) No release by a worker or beneficiary of any rights under this chapter is valid, except pur-
 21 suant to a claim disposition agreement under this section or a release pursuant to ORS 656.593.

22 (9) Notwithstanding ORS 656.005 (21), as used in this section, "party" does not include a non-
 23 complying employer.

24 **SECTION 7.** ORS 656.245 is amended to read:

25 656.245. (1)(a) For every compensable injury, the insurer or the self-insured employer shall cause
 26 to be provided medical services for conditions caused in material part by the injury for such period
 27 as the nature of the injury or the process of the recovery requires[, *subject to the limitations in ORS*
 28 *656.225,*] including such medical services as may be required after a determination of permanent
 29 disability. In addition, for consequential [*and combined*] conditions described in ORS 656.005 (7), the
 30 insurer or the self-insured employer shall cause to be provided only those medical services directed
 31 to medical conditions caused in major part by the injury.

32 (b) Compensable medical services shall include medical, surgical, hospital, nursing, ambulances
 33 and other related services, and drugs, medicine, crutches and prosthetic appliances, braces and
 34 supports and where necessary, physical restorative services. A pharmacist or dispensing physician
 35 shall dispense generic drugs to the worker in accordance with ORS 689.515. The duty to provide
 36 such medical services continues for the life of the worker.

37 **(c) An insurer or self-insured employer shall preauthorize compensable medical services**
 38 **within 14 days after a request by a medical provider.**

39 [(c)] (d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, medical services after the worker's
 40 condition is medically stationary are not compensable except for the following:

41 (A) Services provided to a worker who has been determined to be permanently and totally dis-
 42 abled.

43 (B) Prescription medications.

44 (C) Services necessary to administer prescription medication or monitor the administration of
 45 prescription medication.

1 (D) Prosthetic devices, braces and supports.

2 (E) Services necessary to monitor the status, replacement or repair of prosthetic devices, braces
3 and supports.

4 (F) Services provided pursuant to an accepted claim for aggravation under ORS 656.273.

5 (G) Services provided pursuant to an order issued under ORS 656.278.

6 (H) Services that are necessary to diagnose the worker's condition.

7 (I) Life-preserving modalities similar to insulin therapy, dialysis and transfusions.

8 (J) With the approval of the insurer or self-insured employer, palliative care that the worker's
9 attending physician referred to in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A) prescribes and that is necessary to enable
10 the worker to continue current employment or a vocational training program. If the insurer or
11 self-insured employer does not approve, the attending physician or the worker may request approval
12 from the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services for such treatment. The
13 director may order a medical review by a physician or panel of physicians pursuant to ORS 656.327
14 (3) to aid in the review of such treatment. The decision of the director is subject to review under
15 ORS 656.704.

16 (K) With the approval of the director, curative care arising from a generally recognized, non-
17 experimental advance in medical science since the worker's claim was closed that is highly likely
18 to improve the worker's condition and that is otherwise justified by the circumstances of the claim.
19 The decision of the director is subject to review under ORS 656.704.

20 (L) Curative care provided to a worker to stabilize a temporary and acute waxing and waning
21 of symptoms of the worker's condition.

22 [(d)] (e) When the medically stationary date in a disabling claim is established by the insurer
23 or self-insured employer and is not based on the findings of the attending physician, the insurer or
24 self-insured employer is responsible for reimbursement to affected medical service providers for
25 otherwise compensable services rendered until the insurer or self-insured employer provides written
26 notice to the attending physician of the worker's medically stationary status.

27 [(e)] (f) Except for services provided under a managed care contract, out-of-pocket expense re-
28 imbursement to receive care from the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to pro-
29 vide compensable medical services under this section shall not exceed the amount required to seek
30 care from an appropriate nurse practitioner or attending physician of the same specialty who is in
31 a medical community geographically closer to the worker's home. For the purposes of this para-
32 graph, all physicians and nurse practitioners within a metropolitan area are considered to be part
33 of the same medical community.

34 (2)(a) The worker may choose an attending doctor, physician or nurse practitioner within the
35 State of Oregon. The worker may choose the initial attending physician or nurse practitioner and
36 may subsequently change attending physician or nurse practitioner two times without approval from
37 the director. If the worker thereafter selects another attending physician or nurse practitioner, the
38 insurer or self-insured employer may require the director's approval of the selection. The decision
39 of the director is subject to review under ORS 656.704. The worker also may choose an attending
40 doctor or physician in another country or in any state or territory or possession of the United
41 States with the prior approval of the insurer or self-insured employer.

42 (b) A medical service provider who is not a member of a managed care organization is subject
43 to the following provisions:

44 (A) A medical service provider who is not qualified to be an attending physician may provide
45 compensable medical service to an injured worker for a period of 30 days from the date of the first

1 visit on the initial claim or for 12 visits, whichever first occurs, without the authorization of an
2 attending physician. Thereafter, medical service provided to an injured worker without the written
3 authorization of an attending physician is not compensable.

4 (B) A medical service provider who is not an attending physician cannot authorize the payment
5 of temporary disability compensation. However, an emergency room physician who is not authorized
6 to serve as an attending physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(c) may authorize temporary disability
7 benefits for a maximum of 14 days. A medical service provider qualified to serve as an attending
8 physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(B) may authorize the payment of temporary disability compen-
9 sation for a period not to exceed 30 days from the date of the first visit on the initial claim.

10 (C) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, only a physician qualified to serve as an at-
11 tending physician under ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A) or (B)(i) who is serving as the attending physician
12 at the time of claim closure may make findings regarding the worker's impairment for the purpose
13 of evaluating the worker's disability.

14 (D) Notwithstanding subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this paragraph, a nurse practitioner licensed
15 under ORS 678.375 to 678.390:

16 (i) May provide compensable medical services for 180 days from the date of the first visit on the
17 initial claim;

18 (ii) May authorize the payment of temporary disability benefits for a period not to exceed 180
19 days from the date of the first visit on the initial claim; and

20 (iii) When an injured worker treating with a nurse practitioner authorized to provide
21 compensable services under this section becomes medically stationary within the 180-day period in
22 which the nurse practitioner is authorized to treat the injured worker, shall refer the injured worker
23 to a physician qualified to be an attending physician as defined in ORS 656.005 for the purpose of
24 making findings regarding the worker's impairment for the purpose of evaluating the worker's disa-
25 bility. If a worker returns to the nurse practitioner after initial claim closure for evaluation of a
26 possible worsening of the worker's condition, the nurse practitioner shall refer the worker to an
27 attending physician and the insurer shall compensate the nurse practitioner for the examination
28 performed.

29 (3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, the director, by rule, upon the advice
30 of the committee created by ORS 656.794 and upon the advice of the professional licensing boards
31 of practitioners affected by the rule, may exclude from compensability any medical treatment the
32 director finds to be unscientific, unproven, outmoded or experimental. The decision of the director
33 is subject to review under ORS 656.704.

34 (4) Notwithstanding subsection (2)(a) of this section, when a self-insured employer or the insurer
35 of an employer contracts with a managed care organization certified pursuant to ORS 656.260 for
36 medical services required by this chapter to be provided to injured workers:

37 (a) Those workers who are subject to the contract shall receive medical services in the manner
38 prescribed in the contract. Workers subject to the contract include those who are receiving medical
39 treatment for an accepted compensable injury or occupational disease, regardless of the date of in-
40 jury or medically stationary status, on or after the effective date of the contract. If the managed
41 care organization determines that the change in provider would be medically detrimental to the
42 worker, the worker shall not become subject to the contract until the worker is found to be med-
43 ically stationary, the worker changes physicians or nurse practitioners, or the managed care or-
44 ganization determines that the change in provider is no longer medically detrimental, whichever
45 event first occurs. A worker becomes subject to the contract upon the worker's receipt of actual

1 notice of the worker's enrollment in the managed care organization, or upon the third day after the
2 notice was sent by regular mail by the insurer or self-insured employer, whichever event first oc-
3 curs. A worker shall not be subject to a contract after it expires or terminates without renewal. A
4 worker may continue to treat with the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to pro-
5 vide compensable medical services under this section under an expired or terminated managed care
6 organization contract if the physician or nurse practitioner agrees to comply with the rules, terms
7 and conditions regarding services performed under any subsequent managed care organization con-
8 tract to which the worker is subject. A worker shall not be subject to a contract if the worker's
9 primary residence is more than 100 miles outside the managed care organization's certified ge-
10 ographical area. Each such contract must comply with the certification standards provided in ORS
11 656.260. However, a worker may receive immediate emergency medical treatment that is
12 compensable from a medical service provider who is not a member of the managed care organization.
13 Insurers or self-insured employers who contract with a managed care organization for medical ser-
14 vices shall give notice to the workers of eligible medical service providers and such other informa-
15 tion regarding the contract and manner of receiving medical services as the director may prescribe.
16 Notwithstanding any provision of law or rule to the contrary, a worker of a noncomplying employer
17 is considered to be subject to a contract between the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation
18 as a processing agent or the assigned claims agent and a managed care organization.

19 (b)(A) For initial or aggravation claims filed after June 7, 1995, the insurer or self-insured em-
20 ployer may require an injured worker, on a case-by-case basis, immediately to receive medical ser-
21 vices from the managed care organization.

22 (B) If the insurer or self-insured employer gives notice that the worker is required to receive
23 treatment from the managed care organization, the insurer or self-insured employer must guarantee
24 that any reasonable and necessary services so received, that are not otherwise covered by health
25 insurance, will be paid as provided in ORS 656.248, even if the claim is denied, until the worker
26 receives actual notice of the denial or until three days after the denial is mailed, whichever event
27 first occurs. The worker may elect to receive care from a primary care physician or nurse practi-
28 tioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under this section who agrees to the
29 conditions of ORS 656.260 (4)(g). However, guarantee of payment is not required by the insurer or
30 self-insured employer if this election is made.

31 (C) If the insurer or self-insured employer does not give notice that the worker is required to
32 receive treatment from the managed care organization, the insurer or self-insured employer is under
33 no obligation to pay for services received by the worker unless the claim is later accepted.

34 (D) If the claim is denied, the worker may receive medical services after the date of denial from
35 sources other than the managed care organization until the denial is reversed. Reasonable and
36 necessary medical services received from sources other than the managed care organization after
37 the date of claim denial must be paid as provided in ORS 656.248 by the insurer or self-insured em-
38 ployer if the claim is finally determined to be compensable.

39 (5)(a) A nurse practitioner licensed under ORS 678.375 to 678.390 who is not a member of the
40 managed care organization is authorized to provide the same level of services as a primary care
41 physician as established by ORS 656.260 (4) if the nurse practitioner maintains the worker's medical
42 records and with whom the worker has a documented history of treatment, if that nurse practitioner
43 agrees to refer the worker to the managed care organization for any specialized treatment, including
44 physical therapy, to be furnished by another provider that the worker may require and if that nurse
45 practitioner agrees to comply with all the rules, terms and conditions regarding services performed

1 by the managed care organization.

2 (b) A nurse practitioner authorized to provide medical services to a worker enrolled in the
3 managed care organization may provide medical treatment to the worker if the treatment is deter-
4 mined to be medically appropriate according to the service utilization review process of the man-
5 aged care organization and may authorize temporary disability payments as provided in subsection
6 (2)(b)(D) of this section. However, the managed care organization may authorize the nurse practi-
7 tioner to provide medical services and authorize temporary disability payments beyond the periods
8 established in subsection (2)(b)(D) of this section.

9 (6) Subject to the provisions of ORS 656.704, if a claim for medical services is disapproved, the
10 injured worker, insurer or self-insured employer may request administrative review by the director
11 pursuant to ORS 656.260 or 656.327.

12 **SECTION 8.** ORS 656.260 is amended to read:

13 656.260. (1) Any health care provider or group of medical service providers may make written
14 application to the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services to become certi-
15 fied to provide managed care to injured workers for injuries and diseases compensable under this
16 chapter. However, nothing in this section authorizes an organization that is formed, owned or op-
17 erated by an insurer or employer other than a health care provider to become certified to provide
18 managed care.

19 (2) Each application for certification shall be accompanied by a reasonable fee prescribed by the
20 director. A certificate is valid for such period as the director may prescribe unless sooner revoked
21 or suspended.

22 (3) Application for certification shall be made in such form and manner and shall set forth such
23 information regarding the proposed plan for providing services as the director may prescribe. The
24 information shall include, but not be limited to:

25 (a) A list of the names of all individuals who will provide services under the managed care plan,
26 together with appropriate evidence of compliance with any licensing or certification requirements
27 for that individual to practice in this state.

28 (b) A description of the times, places and manner of providing services under the plan.

29 (c) A description of the times, places and manner of providing other related optional services
30 the applicants wish to provide.

31 (d) Satisfactory evidence of ability to comply with any financial requirements to insure delivery
32 of service in accordance with the plan which the director may prescribe.

33 (4) The director shall certify a health care provider or group of medical service providers to
34 provide managed care under a plan if the director finds that the plan:

35 (a) Proposes to provide medical and health care services required by this chapter in a manner
36 that:

37 (A) Meets quality, continuity and other treatment standards adopted by the health care provider
38 or group of medical service providers in accordance with processes approved by the director; and

39 (B) Is timely, effective and convenient for the worker.

40 (b) Subject to any other provision of law, does not discriminate against or exclude from partic-
41 ipation in the plan any category of medical service providers and includes an adequate number of
42 each category of medical service providers to give workers adequate flexibility to choose medical
43 service providers from among those individuals who provide services under the plan. However,
44 nothing in the requirements of this paragraph shall affect the provisions of ORS 441.055 relating to
45 the granting of medical staff privileges.

1 (c) Provides appropriate financial incentives to reduce service costs and utilization without
 2 sacrificing the quality of service.

3 (d) Provides adequate methods of peer review, service utilization review, quality assurance,
 4 contract review and dispute resolution to ensure appropriate treatment or to prevent inappropriate
 5 or excessive treatment, to exclude from participation in the plan those individuals who violate these
 6 treatment standards and to provide for the resolution of such medical disputes as the director con-
 7 siders appropriate. A majority of the members of each peer review, quality assurance, service utili-
 8 zation and contract review committee shall be physicians licensed to practice medicine by the
 9 Oregon Medical Board. As used in this paragraph:

10 (A) "Peer review" means evaluation or review of the performance of colleagues by a panel with
 11 similar types and degrees of expertise. Peer review requires participation of at least three physicians
 12 prior to final determination.

13 (B) "Service utilization review" means evaluation and determination of the reasonableness, ne-
 14 cessity and appropriateness of a worker's use of medical care resources and the provision of any
 15 needed assistance to clinician or member, or both, to ensure appropriate use of resources. "Service
 16 utilization review" includes prior authorization, concurrent review, retrospective review, discharge
 17 planning and case management activities.

18 (C) "Quality assurance" means activities to safeguard or improve the quality of medical care
 19 by assessing the quality of care or service and taking action to improve it.

20 (D) "Dispute resolution" includes the resolution of disputes arising under peer review, service
 21 utilization review and quality assurance activities between insurers, self-insured employers, workers
 22 and medical and health care service providers, as required under the certified plan.

23 (E) "Contract review" means the methods and processes whereby the managed care organization
 24 monitors and enforces its contracts with participating providers for matters other than matters
 25 enumerated in subparagraphs (A), (B) and (C) of this paragraph.

26 (e) Provides a program involving cooperative efforts by the workers, the employer and the
 27 managed care organizations to promote workplace health and safety consultative and other services
 28 and early return to work for injured workers.

29 (f) Provides a timely and accurate method of reporting to the director necessary information
 30 regarding medical and health care service cost and utilization to enable the director to determine
 31 the effectiveness of the plan.

32 (g)(A) Authorizes workers to receive compensable medical treatment from a primary care phy-
 33 sician or chiropractic physician who is not a member of the managed care organization, but who
 34 maintains the worker's medical records and is a physician with whom the worker has a documented
 35 history of treatment, if:

36 (i) The primary care physician or chiropractic physician agrees to refer the worker to the
 37 managed care organization for any specialized treatment, including physical therapy, to be furnished
 38 by another provider that the worker may require;

39 (ii) The primary care physician or chiropractic physician agrees to comply with all the rules,
 40 terms and conditions regarding services performed by the managed care organization; and

41 (iii) The treatment is determined to be medically appropriate according to the service utilization
 42 review process of the managed care organization.

43 (B) Nothing in this paragraph is intended to limit the worker's right to change primary care
 44 physicians or chiropractic physicians prior to the filing of a workers' compensation claim.

45 (C) A chiropractic physician authorized to provide compensable medical treatment under this

1 paragraph may provide services and authorize temporary disability compensation as provided in ORS
2 656.005 (12)(b)(B) and 656.245 (2)(b). However, the managed care organization may authorize
3 chiropractic physicians to provide medical services and authorize temporary disability payments
4 beyond the periods established in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(B) and 656.245 (2)(b).

5 (D) As used in this paragraph, “primary care physician” means a physician who is qualified to
6 be an attending physician referred to in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A) and who is a family practitioner, a
7 general practitioner or an internal medicine practitioner.

8 (h) Provides a written explanation for denial of participation in the managed care organization
9 plan to any licensed health care provider that has been denied participation in the managed care
10 organization plan.

11 (i) Does not prohibit the injured worker’s attending physician from advocating for medical ser-
12 vices and temporary disability benefits for the injured worker that are supported by the medical
13 record.

14 (j) Complies with any other requirement the director determines is necessary to provide quality
15 medical services and health care to injured workers.

16 (5)(a) Notwithstanding ORS 656.245 (5) and subsection (4)(g) of this section, a managed care or-
17 ganization may deny or terminate the authorization of a primary care physician or chiropractic
18 physician to serve as an attending physician under subsection (4)(g) of this section or of a nurse
19 practitioner to provide medical services as provided in ORS 656.245 (5) if the physician or nurse
20 practitioner, within two years prior to the worker’s enrollment in the plan:

21 (A) Has been terminated from serving as an attending physician or nurse practitioner for a
22 worker enrolled in the plan for failure to meet the requirements of subsection (4)(g) of this section
23 or of ORS 656.245 (5); or

24 (B) Has failed to satisfy the credentialing standards for participating in the managed care or-
25 ganization.

26 (b) The director shall adopt by rule reporting standards for managed care organizations to re-
27 port denials and terminations of the authorization of primary care physicians, chiropractic physi-
28 cians and nurse practitioners who are not members of the managed care organization to provide
29 compensable medical treatment under ORS 656.245 (5) and subsection (4)(g) of this section. The di-
30 rector shall annually report to the Workers’ Compensation Management-Labor Advisory Committee
31 the information reported to the director by managed care organizations under this paragraph.

32 (6) The director shall refuse to certify or may revoke or suspend the certification of any health
33 care provider or group of medical service providers to provide managed care if the director finds
34 that:

35 (a) The plan for providing medical or health care services fails to meet the requirements of this
36 section.

37 (b) Service under the plan is not being provided in accordance with the terms of a certified plan.

38 (c) **The plan fails to require the managed care organization to preapprove or deny medical**
39 **services requested by the worker or the worker’s provider within 14 days after the receipt**
40 **of the request for approval of the services.**

41 (7) Any issue concerning the provision of medical services to injured workers subject to a
42 managed care contract and service utilization review, quality assurance, dispute resolution, contract
43 review and peer review activities as well as authorization of medical services to be provided by
44 other than an attending physician pursuant to ORS 656.245 (2)(b) shall be subject to review by the
45 director or the director’s designated representatives. The decision of the director is subject to re-

1 view under ORS 656.704. Data generated by or received in connection with these activities, includ-
2 ing written reports, notes or records of any such activities, or of any review thereof, shall be
3 confidential, and shall not be disclosed except as considered necessary by the director in the ad-
4 ministration of this chapter. The director may report professional misconduct to an appropriate li-
5 censing board.

6 (8) No data generated by service utilization review, quality assurance, dispute resolution or peer
7 review activities and no physician profiles or data used to create physician profiles pursuant to this
8 section or a review thereof shall be used in any action, suit or proceeding except to the extent
9 considered necessary by the director in the administration of this chapter. The confidentiality pro-
10 visions of this section shall not apply in any action, suit or proceeding arising out of or related to
11 a contract between a managed care organization and a health care provider whose confidentiality
12 is protected by this section.

13 (9) A person participating in service utilization review, quality assurance, dispute resolution or
14 peer review activities pursuant to this section shall not be examined as to any communication made
15 in the course of such activities or the findings thereof, nor shall any person be subject to an action
16 for civil damages for affirmative actions taken or statements made in good faith.

17 (10) No person who participates in forming consortiums, collectively negotiating fees or other-
18 wise solicits or enters into contracts in a good faith effort to provide medical or health care services
19 according to the provisions of this section shall be examined or subject to administrative or civil
20 liability regarding any such participation except pursuant to the director's active supervision of
21 such activities and the managed care organization. Before engaging in such activities, the person
22 shall provide notice of intent to the director in a form prescribed by the director.

23 (11) The provisions of this section shall not affect the confidentiality or admission in evidence
24 of a claimant's medical treatment records.

25 (12) In consultation with the committees referred to in ORS 656.790 and 656.794, the director
26 shall adopt such rules as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.

27 (13) As used in this section, ORS 656.245, 656.248 and 656.327, "medical service provider" means
28 a person duly licensed to practice one or more of the healing arts in any country or in any state
29 or territory or possession of the United States.

30 (14) Notwithstanding ORS 656.005 (12) or subsection (4)(b) of this section, a managed care or-
31 ganization contract may designate any medical service provider or category of providers as attend-
32 ing physicians.

33 (15) If a worker, insurer, self-insured employer, the attending physician or an authorized health
34 care provider is dissatisfied with an action of the managed care organization regarding the provision
35 of medical services pursuant to this chapter, peer review, service utilization review or quality as-
36 surance activities, that person or entity must first apply to the director for administrative review
37 of the matter before requesting a hearing. Such application must be made not later than the 60th
38 day after the date the managed care organization has completed and issued its final decision.

39 (16) Upon a request for administrative review, the director shall create a documentary record
40 sufficient for judicial review. The director shall complete administrative review and issue a pro-
41 posed order within a reasonable time. The proposed order of the director issued pursuant to this
42 section shall become final and not subject to further review unless a written request for a hearing
43 is filed with the director within 30 days of the mailing of the order to all parties.

44 (17) At the contested case hearing, the order may be modified only if it is not supported by
45 substantial evidence in the record or reflects an error of law. No new medical evidence or issues

1 shall be admitted. The dispute may also be remanded to the managed care organization for further
2 evidence taking, correction or other necessary action if the Administrative Law Judge or director
3 determines the record has been improperly, incompletely or otherwise insufficiently developed. De-
4 cisions by the director regarding medical disputes are subject to review under ORS 656.704.

5 (18) Any person who is dissatisfied with an action of a managed care organization other than
6 regarding the provision of medical services pursuant to this chapter, peer review, service utilization
7 review or quality assurance activities may request review under ORS 656.704.

8 (19) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, original jurisdiction over contract review dis-
9 putes is with the director. The director may resolve the matter by issuing an order subject to re-
10 view under ORS 656.704, or the director may determine that the matter in dispute would be best
11 addressed in another forum and so inform the parties.

12 (20) The director shall conduct such investigations, audits and other administrative oversight in
13 regard to managed care as the director deems necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

14 (21)(a) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, only a managed care organization certified
15 by the director may:

16 (A) Restrict the choice of a health care provider or medical service provider by a worker;

17 (B) Restrict the access of a worker to any category of medical service providers;

18 (C) Restrict the ability of a medical service provider to refer a worker to another provider;

19 (D) Require preauthorization or precertification to determine the necessity of medical services
20 or treatment; or

21 (E) Restrict treatment provided to a worker by a medical service provider to specific treatment
22 guidelines, protocols or standards.

23 (b) The provisions of paragraph (a) of this subsection do not apply to:

24 (A) A medical service provider who refers a worker to another medical service provider;

25 (B) Use of an on-site medical service facility by the employer to assess the nature or extent of
26 a worker's injury; or

27 (C) Treatment provided by a medical service provider or transportation of a worker in an
28 emergency or trauma situation.

29 (c) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, if the director finds that a person has
30 violated a provision of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the director may impose a sanction that may
31 include a civil penalty not to exceed \$2,000 for each violation.

32 (d) If violation of paragraph (a) of this subsection is repeated or willful, the director may order
33 the person committing the violation to cease and desist from making any future communications
34 with injured workers or medical service providers or from taking any other actions that directly or
35 indirectly affect the delivery of medical services provided under this chapter.

36 (e)(A) Penalties imposed under this subsection are subject to ORS 656.735 (4) to (6) and 656.740.

37 (B) Cease and desist orders issued under this subsection are subject to ORS 656.740.

38 **SECTION 9.** ORS 656.262 is amended to read:

39 656.262. (1) Processing of claims and providing compensation for a worker shall be the respon-
40 sibility of the insurer or self-insured employer. All employers shall assist their insurers in processing
41 claims as required in this chapter.

42 (2) The compensation due under this chapter shall be paid periodically, promptly and directly
43 to the person entitled thereto upon the employer's receiving notice or knowledge of a claim, except
44 where the right to compensation is denied by the insurer or self-insured employer.

45 (3)(a) Employers shall, immediately and not later than five days after notice or knowledge of any

1 claims or accidents which may result in a compensable injury claim, report the same to their
 2 insurer. The report shall include:

3 (A) The date, time, cause and nature of the accident and injuries.

4 (B) Whether the accident arose out of and in the course of employment.

5 (C) Whether the employer recommends or opposes acceptance of the claim, and the reasons
 6 therefor.

7 (D) The name and address of any health insurance provider for the injured worker.

8 (E) Any other details the insurer may require.

9 (b) Failure to so report subjects the offending employer to a charge for reimbursing the insurer
 10 for any penalty the insurer is required to pay under subsection (11) of this section because of such
 11 failure. As used in this subsection, "health insurance" has the meaning for that term provided in
 12 ORS 731.162.

13 (4)(a) The first installment of temporary disability compensation shall be paid no later than the
 14 14th day after the subject employer has notice or knowledge of the claim and of the worker's disa-
 15 bility, if the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical
 16 services under ORS 656.245 authorizes the payment of temporary disability compensation. There-
 17 after, temporary disability compensation shall be paid at least once each two weeks, except where
 18 the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services determines that payment in in-
 19 stallments should be made at some other interval. The director may by rule convert monthly benefit
 20 schedules to weekly or other periodic schedules.

21 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, if a self-insured employer pays to an
 22 injured worker who becomes disabled the same wage at the same pay interval that the worker re-
 23 ceived at the time of injury, such payment shall be deemed timely payment of temporary disability
 24 payments pursuant to ORS 656.210 and 656.212 during the time the wage payments are made.

25 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, when the holder of a public office is
 26 injured in the course and scope of that public office, full official salary paid to the holder of that
 27 public office shall be deemed timely payment of temporary disability payments pursuant to ORS
 28 656.210 and 656.212 during the time the wage payments are made. As used in this subsection, "public
 29 office" has the meaning for that term provided in ORS 260.005.

30 (d) Temporary disability compensation is not due and payable for any period of time for which
 31 the insurer or self-insured employer has requested from the worker's attending physician or nurse
 32 practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 verification of
 33 the worker's inability to work resulting from the claimed injury or disease and the physician or
 34 nurse practitioner cannot verify the worker's inability to work, unless the worker has been unable
 35 to receive treatment for reasons beyond the worker's control **and the injured worker is notified**
 36 **in writing of the lack of verification of temporary disability authorization before termination**
 37 **of temporary disability.**

38 (e) If a worker fails to appear at an appointment with the worker's attending physician or nurse
 39 practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245, the insurer or
 40 self-insured employer shall notify the worker by certified mail that temporary disability benefits may
 41 be suspended after the worker fails to appear at a rescheduled appointment. If the worker fails to
 42 appear at a rescheduled appointment, the insurer or self-insured employer may suspend payment of
 43 temporary disability benefits to the worker until the worker appears at a subsequent rescheduled
 44 appointment, **if the worker is given written notification of the suspension before termination**
 45 **of temporary disability.**

1 (f) If the insurer or self-insured employer has requested and failed to receive from the worker's
2 attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under
3 ORS 656.245 verification of the worker's inability to work resulting from the claimed injury or dis-
4 ease, medical services provided by the attending physician or nurse practitioner are not
5 compensable until the attending physician or nurse practitioner submits such verification **if the**
6 **injured worker is given prior written notification of the inability to verify the worker's ina-**
7 **bility to work.**

8 (g) Temporary disability compensation is not due and payable pursuant to ORS 656.268 after the
9 worker's attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical ser-
10 vices under ORS 656.245 ceases to authorize temporary disability or for any period of time not au-
11 thorized by the attending physician or nurse practitioner **and the injured worker is given written**
12 **notification of the lack of verification of the worker's inability to work before the termi-**
13 **nation of temporary disability.** No authorization of temporary disability compensation by the at-
14 tending physician or nurse practitioner under ORS 656.268 shall be effective to retroactively
15 authorize the payment of temporary disability more than [14] **60** days prior to its issuance **and no**
16 **termination of temporary disability by the insurer or self-insured employer shall be allowed**
17 **more than 60 days after the issuance of payment and the insurer or self-insured employer**
18 **has provided prior written notification to the worker so the injured worker may correct any**
19 **deficiency in order to avoid the termination of temporary disability.**

20 (h) The worker's disability may be authorized only by a person described in ORS 656.005
21 (12)(b)(B) or 656.245 for the period of time permitted by those sections. The insurer or self-insured
22 employer may unilaterally suspend payment of temporary disability benefits to the worker at the
23 expiration of the period until temporary disability is reauthorized by an attending physician or nurse
24 practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 **and the injured**
25 **worker is given prior written notification of the lack of verification of the inability to work.**

26 (i) The insurer or self-insured employer may unilaterally suspend payment of all compensation
27 to a worker enrolled in a managed care organization if the worker continues to seek care from an
28 attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical services under
29 ORS 656.245 that is not authorized by the managed care organization more than seven days after
30 the mailing of notice by the insurer or self-insured employer.

31 (5)(a) Payment of compensation under subsection (4) of this section or payment, in amounts per
32 claim not to exceed the maximum amount established annually by the Director of the Department
33 of Consumer and Business Services, for medical services for nondisabling claims, may be made by
34 the subject employer if the employer so chooses. The making of such payments does not constitute
35 a waiver or transfer of the insurer's duty to determine entitlement to benefits. If the employer
36 chooses to make such payment, the employer shall report the injury to the insurer in the same
37 manner that other injuries are reported. However, an insurer shall not modify an employer's expe-
38 rience rating or otherwise make charges against the employer for any medical expenses paid by the
39 employer pursuant to this subsection.

40 (b) To establish the maximum amount an employer may pay for medical services for nondisabling
41 claims under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the director shall use \$1,500 as the base compensation
42 amount and shall adjust the base compensation amount annually to reflect changes in the United
43 States City Average Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for Medical Care for July of
44 each year as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor.
45 The adjustment shall be rounded to the nearest multiple of \$100.

1 (c) The adjusted amount established under paragraph (b) of this subsection shall be effective on
2 January 1 following the establishment of the amount and shall apply to claims with a date of injury
3 on or after the effective date of the adjusted amount.

4 (6)(a) Written notice of acceptance or denial of the claim shall be furnished to the claimant by
5 the insurer or self-insured employer within 60 days after the employer has notice or knowledge of
6 the claim. Once the claim is accepted, the insurer or self-insured employer shall not revoke accept-
7 ance except as provided in this section. The insurer or self-insured employer may revoke acceptance
8 and issue a denial at any time when the denial is for fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal ac-
9 tivity by the worker. If the worker requests a hearing on any revocation of acceptance and denial
10 alleging fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal activity, the insurer or self-insured employer has
11 the burden of proving, by a preponderance of the evidence, such fraud, misrepresentation or other
12 illegal activity. Upon such proof, the worker then has the burden of proving, by a preponderance
13 of the evidence, the compensability of the claim. If the insurer or self-insured employer accepts a
14 claim in good faith, in a case not involving fraud, misrepresentation or other illegal activity by the
15 worker, and later obtains evidence that the claim is not compensable or evidence that the insurer
16 or self-insured employer is not responsible for the claim, the insurer or self-insured employer may
17 revoke the claim acceptance and issue a formal notice of claim denial, if such revocation of ac-
18 ceptance and denial is issued no later than two years after the date of the initial acceptance. If the
19 worker requests a hearing on such revocation of acceptance and denial, the insurer or self-insured
20 employer must prove, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the claim is not compensable or that
21 the insurer or self-insured employer is not responsible for the claim. Notwithstanding any other
22 provision of this chapter, if a denial of a previously accepted claim is set aside by an Administrative
23 Law Judge, the Workers' Compensation Board or the court, temporary total disability benefits are
24 payable from the date any such benefits were terminated under the denial. Except as provided in
25 ORS 656.247, pending acceptance or denial of a claim, compensation payable to a claimant does not
26 include the costs of medical benefits or funeral expenses. The insurer shall also furnish the employer
27 a copy of the notice of acceptance.

28 (b) The notice of acceptance shall:

29 (A) Specify what conditions are compensable.

30 (B) Advise the claimant whether the claim is considered disabling or nondisabling.

31 (C) Inform the claimant of the Expedited Claim Service and of the hearing and aggravation
32 rights concerning nondisabling injuries, including the right to object to a decision that the injury
33 of the claimant is nondisabling by requesting reclassification pursuant to ORS 656.277.

34 (D) Inform the claimant of employment reinstatement rights and responsibilities under ORS
35 chapter 659A.

36 (E) Inform the claimant of assistance available to employers and workers from the Reemploy-
37 ment Assistance Program under ORS 656.622.

38 (F) Be modified by the insurer or self-insured employer from time to time as medical or other
39 information changes a previously issued notice of acceptance.

40 *[(c) An insurer's or self-insured employer's acceptance of a combined or consequential condition*
41 *under ORS 656.005 (7), whether voluntary or as a result of a judgment or order, shall not preclude the*
42 *insurer or self-insured employer from later denying the combined or consequential condition if the*
43 *otherwise compensable injury ceases to be the major contributing cause of the combined or consequen-*
44 *tial condition.]*

45 *[(d)]* (c) An injured worker who believes that a condition has been incorrectly omitted from a

1 notice of acceptance, or that the notice is otherwise deficient, first must communicate in writing to
2 the insurer or self-insured employer the worker's objections to the notice pursuant to ORS 656.267.
3 The insurer or self-insured employer has 60 days from receipt of the communication from the worker
4 to revise the notice or to make other written clarification in response. A worker who fails to comply
5 with the communication requirements of this paragraph or ORS 656.267 may not allege at any
6 hearing or other proceeding on the claim a de facto denial of a condition based on information in
7 the notice of acceptance from the insurer or self-insured employer. Notwithstanding any other pro-
8 vision of this chapter, the worker may initiate objection to the notice of acceptance at any time.

9 (7)(a) After claim acceptance, written notice of acceptance or denial of claims for aggravation
10 or new medical or omitted condition claims properly initiated pursuant to ORS 656.267 shall be
11 furnished to the claimant by the insurer or self-insured employer within 60 days after the insurer
12 or self-insured employer receives written notice of such claims. A worker who fails to comply with
13 the communication requirements of subsection (6) of this section or ORS 656.267 may not allege at
14 any hearing or other proceeding on the claim a de facto denial of a condition based on information
15 in the notice of acceptance from the insurer or self-insured employer.

16 [(b) Once a worker's claim has been accepted, the insurer or self-insured employer must issue a
17 written denial to the worker when the accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the
18 worker's combined condition before the claim may be closed.]

19 [(c)] (b) When an insurer or self-insured employer determines that the claim qualifies for claim
20 closure, the insurer or self-insured employer shall issue at claim closure an updated notice of ac-
21 ceptance that specifies which conditions are compensable. The procedures specified in subsection
22 (6)(d) of this section apply to this notice. Any objection to the updated notice or appeal of denied
23 conditions shall not delay claim closure pursuant to ORS 656.268. If a condition is found
24 compensable after claim closure, the insurer or self-insured employer shall reopen the claim for
25 processing regarding that condition.

26 (8) The assigned claims agent in processing claims under ORS 656.054 shall send notice of ac-
27 ceptance or denial to the noncomplying employer.

28 (9) If an insurer or any other duly authorized agent of the employer for such purpose, on record
29 with the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services denies a claim for com-
30 pensation, written notice of such denial, stating the reason for the denial, and informing the worker
31 of the Expedited Claim Service and of hearing rights under ORS 656.283, shall be given to the
32 claimant. A copy of the notice of denial shall be mailed to the director and to the employer by the
33 insurer. The worker may request a hearing pursuant to ORS 656.319.

34 (10) Merely paying or providing compensation shall not be considered acceptance of a claim or
35 an admission of liability, nor shall mere acceptance of such compensation be considered a waiver
36 of the right to question the amount thereof. Payment of permanent disability benefits pursuant to a
37 notice of closure, reconsideration order or litigation order, or the failure to appeal or seek review
38 of such an order or notice of closure, shall not preclude an insurer or self-insured employer from
39 subsequently contesting the compensability of the condition rated therein, unless the condition has
40 been formally accepted.

41 (11)(a) If the insurer or self-insured employer unreasonably delays or unreasonably refuses to
42 pay compensation, attorney fees or costs, or unreasonably delays acceptance or denial of a claim,
43 the insurer or self-insured employer shall be liable for an additional amount up to 25 percent of the
44 amounts then due plus any attorney fees assessed under this section. The fees assessed by the di-
45 rector, an Administrative Law Judge, the board or the court under this section shall be reasonable

1 attorney fees. In assessing fees, the director, an Administrative Law Judge, the board or the court
2 shall consider the proportionate benefit to the injured worker. The board shall adopt rules for es-
3 tablishing the amount of the attorney fee, giving primary consideration to the results achieved and
4 to the time devoted to the case. An attorney fee awarded pursuant to this subsection may not exceed
5 \$4,000 absent a showing of extraordinary circumstances. The maximum attorney fee awarded under
6 this paragraph shall be adjusted annually on July 1 by the same percentage increase as made to the
7 average weekly wage defined in ORS 656.211, if any. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
8 chapter, the director shall have exclusive jurisdiction over proceedings regarding solely the assess-
9 ment and payment of the additional amount and attorney fees described in this subsection. The
10 action of the director and the review of the action taken by the director shall be subject to review
11 under ORS 656.704.

12 (b) When the director does not have exclusive jurisdiction over proceedings regarding the as-
13 sessment and payment of the additional amount and attorney fees described in this subsection, the
14 provisions of this subsection shall apply in the other proceeding.

15 (12)(a) If payment is due on a disputed claim settlement authorized by ORS 656.289 and the
16 insurer or self-insured employer has failed to make the payment in accordance with the requirements
17 specified in the disputed claim settlement, the claimant or the claimant's attorney shall clearly no-
18 tify the insurer or self-insured employer in writing that the payment is past due. If the required
19 payment is not made within five business days after receipt of the notice by the insurer or self-
20 insured employer, the director may assess a penalty and attorney fee in accordance with a matrix
21 adopted by the director by rule.

22 (b) The director shall adopt by rule a matrix for the assessment of the penalties and attorney
23 fees authorized under this subsection. The matrix shall provide for penalties based on a percentage
24 of the settlement proceeds allocated to the claimant and for attorney fees based on a percentage of
25 the settlement proceeds allocated to the claimant's attorney as an attorney fee.

26 (13) The insurer may authorize an employer to pay compensation to injured workers and shall
27 reimburse employers for compensation so paid.

28 (14)(a) Injured workers have the duty to cooperate and assist the insurer or self-insured em-
29 ployer in the investigation of claims for compensation. Injured workers shall submit to and shall
30 fully cooperate with personal and telephonic interviews and other formal or informal information
31 gathering techniques. Injured workers who are represented by an attorney shall have the right to
32 have the attorney present during any personal or telephonic interview or deposition. If the injured
33 worker is represented by an attorney, the insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the attorney a
34 reasonable attorney fee based upon an hourly rate for actual time spent during the personal or
35 telephonic interview or deposition. After consultation with the Board of Governors of the Oregon
36 State Bar, the Workers' Compensation Board shall adopt rules for the establishment, assessment and
37 enforcement of an hourly attorney fee rate specified in this subsection.

38 (b) If the attorney is not willing or available to participate in an interview at a time reasonably
39 chosen by the insurer or self-insured employer within 14 days of the request for interview and the
40 insurer or self-insured employer has cause to believe that the attorney's unwillingness or unavail-
41 ability is unreasonable and is preventing the worker from complying within 14 days of the request
42 for interview, the insurer or self-insured employer shall notify the director. If the director deter-
43 mines that the attorney's unwillingness or unavailability is unreasonable, the director shall assess
44 a civil penalty against the attorney of not more than \$1,000.

45 (15) If the director finds that a worker fails to reasonably cooperate with an investigation in-

1 volving an initial claim to establish a compensable injury or an aggravation claim to reopen the
 2 claim for a worsened condition, the director shall suspend all or part of the payment of compen-
 3 sation after notice to the worker. If the worker does not cooperate for an additional 30 days after
 4 the notice, the insurer or self-insured employer may deny the claim because of the worker's failure
 5 to cooperate. The obligation of the insurer or self-insured employer to accept or deny the claim
 6 within 60 days is suspended during the time of the worker's noncooperation. After such a denial, the
 7 worker shall not be granted a hearing or other proceeding under this chapter on the merits of the
 8 claim unless the worker first requests and establishes at an expedited hearing under ORS 656.291
 9 that the worker fully and completely cooperated with the investigation, that the worker failed to
 10 cooperate for reasons beyond the worker's control or that the investigative demands were unrea-
 11 sonable. If the Administrative Law Judge finds that the worker has not fully cooperated, the Ad-
 12 ministrative Law Judge shall affirm the denial, and the worker's claim for injury shall remain
 13 denied. If the Administrative Law Judge finds that the worker has cooperated, or that the investi-
 14 gative demands were unreasonable, the Administrative Law Judge shall set aside the denial, order
 15 the reinstatement of interim compensation if appropriate and remand the claim to the insurer or
 16 self-insured employer to accept or deny the claim.

17 (16) In accordance with ORS 656.283 (3), the Administrative Law Judge assigned a request for
 18 hearing for a claim for compensation involving more than one potentially responsible employer or
 19 insurer may specify what is required of an injured worker to reasonably cooperate with the inves-
 20 tigation of the claim as required by subsection (14) of this section.

21 **SECTION 10.** ORS 656.266 is amended to read:

22 656.266. [(1)] The burden of proving that an injury or occupational disease is compensable and
 23 of proving the nature and extent of any disability resulting therefrom is upon the worker. The
 24 worker cannot carry the burden of proving that an injury or occupational disease is compensable
 25 merely by disproving other possible explanations of how the injury or disease occurred.

26 [(2) *Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, for the purpose of combined condition injury*
 27 *claims under ORS 656.005 (7)(a)(B) only:*]

28 [(a) *Once the worker establishes an otherwise compensable injury, the employer shall bear the*
 29 *burden of proof to establish the otherwise compensable injury is not, or is no longer, the major con-*
 30 *tributing cause of the disability of the combined condition or the major contributing cause of the need*
 31 *for treatment of the combined condition.]*

32 [(b) *Notwithstanding ORS 656.804, paragraph (a) of this subsection does not apply to any occupa-*
 33 *tional disease claim.]*

34 **SECTION 11.** ORS 656.267 is amended to read:

35 656.267. (1) To initiate omitted medical condition claims under ORS 656.262 [(6)(d)] **(6)(c)** or new
 36 medical condition claims under this section, the worker must clearly request formal written ac-
 37 ceptance of a new medical condition or an omitted medical condition from the insurer or self-insured
 38 employer. **The worker need not request acceptance of each medical condition with**
 39 **particularity if the request for acceptance reasonably apprises the insurer or self-insured**
 40 **employer of the nature of the medical condition.** A claim for a new medical condition or an
 41 omitted condition is not made by the receipt of medical billings, nor by requests for authorization
 42 to provide medical services for the new or omitted condition, nor by actually providing such medical
 43 services. The insurer or self-insured employer is not required to accept each and every diagnosis
 44 or medical condition with particularity, as long as the acceptance tendered reasonably apprises the
 45 claimant and the medical providers of the nature of the compensable conditions. Notwithstanding

1 any other provision of this chapter, the worker may initiate a new medical or omitted condition
 2 claim at any time.

3 (2)(a) Claims properly initiated for new medical conditions and omitted medical conditions re-
 4 lated to an initially accepted claim shall be processed pursuant to ORS 656.262.

5 (b) If an insurer or self-insured employer denies a claim for a new medical or omitted medical
 6 condition, the claimant may request a hearing on the denial pursuant to ORS 656.283.

7 (3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, claims for new medical or omitted medical
 8 conditions related to an initially accepted claim that have been determined to be compensable and
 9 that were initiated after the rights under ORS 656.273 expired shall be processed as requests for
 10 relief under the Workers' Compensation Board's own motion jurisdiction pursuant to ORS 656.278
 11 (1)(b).

12 **SECTION 12.** ORS 656.268 is amended to read:

13 656.268. (1) One purpose of this chapter is to restore the injured worker as soon as possible and
 14 as near as possible to a condition of self support and maintenance as an able-bodied worker. The
 15 insurer or self-insured employer shall close the worker's claim, as prescribed by the Director of the
 16 Department of Consumer and Business Services, and determine the extent of the worker's permanent
 17 disability, provided the worker is not enrolled and actively engaged in training according to rules
 18 adopted by the director pursuant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726, when:

19 (a) The worker has become medically stationary and there is sufficient information to determine
 20 permanent disability, **except that a division of impairment between the compensable injury and**
 21 **a preexisting condition may not occur;**

22 *[(b) The accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the worker's combined or*
 23 *consequential condition or conditions pursuant to ORS 656.005 (7). When the claim is closed because*
 24 *the accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the worker's combined or consequential*
 25 *condition or conditions, and there is sufficient information to determine permanent disability, the likely*
 26 *permanent disability that would have been due to the current accepted condition shall be estimated;]*

27 *[(c)]* (b) Without the approval of the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to
 28 provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245, the worker fails to seek medical treatment
 29 for a period of 30 days or the worker fails to attend a closing examination, unless the worker
 30 affirmatively establishes that such failure is attributable to reasons beyond the worker's control; or

31 *[(d)]* (c) An insurer or self-insured employer finds that a worker who has been receiving per-
 32 manent total disability benefits has materially improved and is capable of regularly performing work
 33 at a gainful and suitable occupation.

34 (2) If the worker is enrolled and actively engaged in training according to rules adopted pursu-
 35 ant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726, the temporary disability compensation shall be proportionately re-
 36 duced by any sums earned during the training.

37 (3) A copy of all medical reports and reports of vocational rehabilitation agencies or counselors
 38 shall be furnished to the worker, if requested by the worker.

39 (4) Temporary total disability benefits shall continue until whichever of the following events
 40 first occurs:

41 (a) The worker returns to regular or modified employment;

42 (b) The attending physician or nurse practitioner who has authorized temporary disability ben-

 4 and the worker fails to begin such employment. However, an offer of modified employment may be
 5 refused by the worker without the termination of temporary total disability benefits if the offer:

6 (A) Requires a commute that is beyond the physical capacity of the worker according to the
 7 worker's attending physician or the nurse practitioner who may authorize temporary disability un-
 8 der ORS 656.245;

9 (B) Is at a work site more than 50 miles one way from where the worker was injured unless the
 10 site is less than 50 miles from the worker's residence or the intent of the parties at the time of hire
 11 or as established by the pattern of employment prior to the injury was that the employer had mul-
 12 tiple or mobile work sites and the worker could be assigned to any such site;

13 (C) Is not with the employer at injury;

14 (D) Is not at a work site of the employer at injury;

15 (E) Is not consistent with the existing written shift change policy or is not consistent with
 16 common practice of the employer at injury or aggravation; or

17 (F) Is not consistent with an existing shift change provision of an applicable collective bar-
 18 gaining agreement;

19 (d) Any other event that causes temporary disability benefits to be lawfully suspended, withheld
 20 or terminated under ORS 656.262 (4) or other provisions of this chapter; or

21 (e) Notwithstanding paragraph (c)(C), (D), (E) and (F) of this subsection, the attending physician
 22 or nurse practitioner who has authorized temporary disability benefits under ORS 656.245 for a home
 23 care worker who has been made a subject worker pursuant to ORS 656.039 advises the home care
 24 worker and documents in writing that the home care worker is released to return to modified em-
 25 ployment, appropriate modified employment is offered in writing by the Home Care Commission or
 26 a designee of the commission to the home care worker for any client of the Department of Human
 27 Services who employs a home care worker, *[and]* the home care worker fails to begin the employ-
 28 ment **and the insurer properly issues a notice of closure in accordance with subsection (5)(a)**
 29 **to (d) of this section.**

30 (5)(a) Findings by the insurer or self-insured employer regarding the extent of the worker's dis-
 31 ability in closure of the claim shall be pursuant to the standards prescribed by the director.

32 (b) The insurer or self-insured employer shall issue a notice of closure of the claim to the
 33 worker, to the worker's attorney if the worker is represented, and to the director. If the worker is
 34 deceased at the time the notice of closure is issued, the insurer or self-insured employer shall mail
 35 the worker's copy of the notice of closure, addressed to the estate of the worker, to the worker's last
 36 known address and may mail copies of the notice of closure to any known or potential beneficiaries
 37 to the estate of the deceased worker.

38 (c) The notice of closure must inform:

39 (A) The parties, in boldfaced type, of the proper manner in which to proceed if they are dissat-
 40 isfied with the terms of the notice of closure;

41 (B) The worker of:

42 (i) The amount of any further compensation, including permanent disability compensation to be
 43 awarded;

44 (ii) The duration of temporary total or temporary partial disability compensation;

45 (iii) The right of the worker or beneficiaries of the worker who were mailed a copy of the notice

1 of closure under paragraph (b) of this subsection to request reconsideration by the director under
2 this section within 60 days of the date of the notice of closure;

3 (iv) The right of beneficiaries who were not mailed a copy of the notice of closure under para-
4 graph (b) of this subsection to request reconsideration by the director under this section within one
5 year of the date the notice of closure was mailed to the estate of the worker under paragraph (b)
6 of this subsection;

7 (v) The right of the insurer or self-insured employer to request reconsideration by the director
8 under this section within seven days of the date of the notice of closure;

9 (vi) The aggravation rights; and

10 (vii) Any other information as the director may require; and

11 (C) Any beneficiaries of death benefits to which they may be entitled pursuant to ORS 656.204
12 and 656.208.

13 (d) If the insurer or self-insured employer has not issued a notice of closure, the worker may
14 request closure. Within 10 days of receipt of a written request from the worker, the insurer or
15 self-insured employer shall issue a notice of closure if the requirements of this section have been
16 met or a notice of refusal to close if the requirements of this section have not been met. A notice
17 of refusal to close shall advise the worker of:

18 (A) The decision not to close;

19 (B) The right of the worker to request a hearing pursuant to ORS 656.283 within 60 days of the
20 date of the notice of refusal to close;

21 (C) The right to be represented by an attorney; and

22 (D) Any other information as the director may require.

23 (e) If a worker, a worker's beneficiary, an insurer or a self-insured employer objects to the no-
24 tice of closure, the objecting party first must request reconsideration by the director under this
25 section. A worker's request for reconsideration must be made within 60 days of the date of the no-
26 tice of closure. If the worker is deceased at the time the notice of closure is issued, a request for
27 reconsideration by a beneficiary of the worker who was mailed a copy of the notice of closure under
28 paragraph (b) of this subsection must be made within 60 days of the date of the notice of closure.
29 A request for reconsideration by a beneficiary to the estate of a deceased worker who was not
30 mailed a copy of the notice of closure under paragraph (b) of this subsection must be made within
31 one year of the date the notice of closure was mailed to the estate of the worker under paragraph
32 (b) of this subsection. A request for reconsideration by an insurer or self-insured employer may be
33 based only on disagreement with the findings used to rate impairment and must be made within
34 seven days of the date of the notice of closure.

35 (f) If an insurer or self-insured employer has closed a claim or refused to close a claim pursuant
36 to this section, if the correctness of that notice of closure or refusal to close is at issue in a hearing
37 on the claim and if a finding is made at the hearing that the notice of closure or refusal to close
38 was not reasonable, a penalty shall be assessed against the insurer or self-insured employer and paid
39 to the worker in an amount equal to 25 percent of all compensation determined to be then due the
40 claimant.

41 (g) If, upon reconsideration of a claim closed by an insurer or self-insured employer, the director
42 orders an increase by 25 percent or more of the amount of compensation to be paid to the worker
43 for permanent disability and the worker is found upon reconsideration to be at least 20 percent
44 permanently disabled, a penalty shall be assessed against the insurer or self-insured employer and
45 paid to the worker in an amount equal to 25 percent of all compensation determined to be then due

1 the claimant. If the increase in compensation results from information that the insurer or self-
2 insured employer demonstrates the insurer or self-insured employer could not reasonably have
3 known at the time of claim closure, from new information obtained through a medical arbiter ex-
4 amination or from a determination order issued by the director that addresses the extent of the
5 worker's permanent disability that is not based on the standards adopted pursuant to ORS 656.726
6 (4)(f), the penalty shall not be assessed.

7 (6)(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, only one reconsideration proceeding may be
8 held on each notice of closure. At the reconsideration proceeding:

9 (A) A deposition arranged by the worker, limited to the testimony and cross-examination of the
10 worker about the worker's condition at the time of claim closure, shall become part of the recon-
11 sideration record. The deposition must be conducted subject to the opportunity for cross-examination
12 by the insurer or self-insured employer and in accordance with rules adopted by the director. The
13 cost of the court reporter, interpreter services, if necessary, and one original of the transcript of the
14 deposition for the Department of Consumer and Business Services and one copy of the transcript
15 of the deposition for each party shall be paid by the insurer or self-insured employer. The recon-
16 sideration proceeding may not be postponed to receive a deposition taken under this subparagraph.
17 A deposition taken in accordance with this subparagraph may be received as evidence at a hearing
18 even if the deposition is not prepared in time for use in the reconsideration proceeding.

19 (B) Pursuant to rules adopted by the director, the worker or the insurer or self-insured employer
20 may correct information in the record that is erroneous and may submit any medical evidence that
21 should have been but was not submitted by the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized
22 to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 at the time of claim closure.

23 (C) If the director determines that a claim was not closed in accordance with subsection (1) of
24 this section, the director may rescind the closure.

25 (b) If necessary, the director may require additional medical or other information with respect
26 to the claims and may postpone the reconsideration for not more than 60 additional calendar days.

27 (c) In any reconsideration proceeding under this section in which the worker was represented
28 by an attorney, the director shall order the insurer or self-insured employer to pay to the attorney,
29 out of the additional compensation awarded, an amount equal to 10 percent of any additional com-
30 pensation awarded to the worker.

31 (d) Except as provided in subsection (7) of this section, the reconsideration proceeding shall be
32 completed within 18 working days from the date the reconsideration proceeding begins, and shall
33 be performed by a special evaluation appellate unit within the department. The deadline of 18
34 working days may be postponed by an additional 60 calendar days if within the 18 working days the
35 department mails notice of review by a medical arbiter. If an order on reconsideration has not been
36 mailed on or before 18 working days from the date the reconsideration proceeding begins, or within
37 18 working days plus the additional 60 calendar days where a notice for medical arbiter review was
38 timely mailed or the director postponed the reconsideration pursuant to paragraph (b) of this sub-
39 section, or within such additional time as provided in subsection (8) of this section when reconsid-
40 eration is postponed further because the worker has failed to cooperate in the medical arbiter
41 examination, reconsideration shall be deemed denied and any further proceedings shall occur as
42 though an order on reconsideration affirming the notice of closure was mailed on the date the order
43 was due to issue.

44 (e) The period for completing the reconsideration proceeding described in paragraph (d) of this
45 subsection begins upon receipt by the director of a worker's or a beneficiary's request for recon-

1 sideration pursuant to subsection (5)(e) of this section. If the insurer or self-insured employer re-
 2 quests reconsideration, the period for reconsideration begins upon the earlier of the date of the
 3 request for reconsideration by the worker or beneficiary, the date of receipt of a waiver from the
 4 worker or beneficiary of the right to request reconsideration or the date of expiration of the right
 5 of the worker or beneficiary to request reconsideration. If a party elects not to file a separate re-
 6 quest for reconsideration, the party does not waive the right to fully participate in the reconsider-
 7 ation proceeding, including the right to proceed with the reconsideration if the initiating party
 8 withdraws the request for reconsideration.

9 (f) Any medical arbiter report may be received as evidence at a hearing even if the report is
 10 not prepared in time for use in the reconsideration proceeding.

11 (g) If any party objects to the reconsideration order, the party may request a hearing under ORS
 12 656.283 within 30 days from the date of the reconsideration order.

13 (7)(a) The director may delay the reconsideration proceeding and toll the reconsideration
 14 timeline established under subsection (6) of this section for up to 45 calendar days if:

15 (A) A request for reconsideration of a notice of closure has been made to the director within
 16 60 days of the date of the notice of closure;

17 (B) The parties are actively engaged in settlement negotiations that include issues in dispute
 18 at reconsideration;

19 (C) The parties agree to the delay; and

20 (D) Both parties notify the director before the 18th working day after the reconsideration pro-
 21 ceeding has begun that they request a delay under this subsection.

22 (b) A delay of the reconsideration proceeding granted by the director under this subsection ex-
 23 pires:

24 (A) If a party requests the director to resume the reconsideration proceeding before the expi-
 25 ration of the delay period;

26 (B) If the parties reach a settlement and the director receives a copy of the approved settlement
 27 documents before the expiration of the delay period; or

28 (C) On the next calendar day following the expiration of the delay period authorized by the di-
 29 rector.

30 (c) Upon expiration of a delay granted under this subsection, the timeline for the completion of
 31 the reconsideration proceeding shall resume as if the delay had never been granted.

32 (d) Compensation due the worker shall continue to be paid during the period of delay authorized
 33 under this subsection.

34 (e) The director may authorize only one delay period for each reconsideration proceeding.

35 (8)(a) If the basis for objection to a notice of closure issued under this section is disagreement
 36 with the impairment used in rating of the worker's disability, the director shall refer the claim to
 37 a medical arbiter appointed by the director.

38 (b) If the director determines that insufficient medical information is available to determine
 39 disability, the director may appoint, and refer the claim to, a medical arbiter **or, at the director's**
 40 **discretion, to more than one medical arbiter if necessary to determine complete impairment**
 41 **because the compensable injury involves more than one body part or system.**

42 *[(c) At the request of either of the parties, the director shall appoint a panel of as many as three*
 43 *medical arbiters in accordance with criteria that the director sets by rule.]*

44 *[(d)]* (c) The arbiter¹, *or panel of medical arbiters,* must be chosen from among a list of physi-
 45 cians qualified to be attending physicians referred to in ORS 656.005 (12)(b)(A) whom the director

1 selected in consultation with the Oregon Medical Board and the committee referred to in ORS
2 656.790.

3 [(e)(A)] (d)(A) The medical arbiter [*or panel of medical arbiters*] may examine the worker and
4 perform such tests as may be reasonable and necessary to establish the worker's impairment.

5 (B) If the director determines that the worker failed to attend the examination without good
6 cause or failed to cooperate with the medical arbiter[, *or panel of medical arbiters,*] the director shall
7 postpone the reconsideration proceedings for up to 60 days from the date of the determination that
8 the worker failed to attend or cooperate, and shall suspend all disability benefits resulting from this
9 or any prior opening of the claim until such time as the worker attends and cooperates with the
10 examination or the request for reconsideration is withdrawn. Any additional evidence regarding
11 good cause must be submitted prior to the conclusion of the 60-day postponement period.

12 (C) At the conclusion of the 60-day postponement period, if the worker has not attended and
13 cooperated with a medical arbiter examination or established good cause, the worker may not attend
14 a medical arbiter examination for this claim closure. The reconsideration record must be closed, and
15 the director shall issue an order on reconsideration based upon the existing record.

16 (D) All disability benefits suspended under this subsection, including all disability benefits
17 awarded in the order on reconsideration, or by an Administrative Law Judge, the Workers' Com-
18 pensation Board or upon court review, are not due and payable to the worker.

19 [(f)] (e) The insurer or self-insured employer shall pay the costs of examination and review by
20 the medical arbiter [*or panel of medical arbiters*].

21 [(g)] (f) The findings of the medical arbiter [*or panel of medical arbiters*] must be submitted to
22 the director for reconsideration of the notice of closure.

23 [(h)] (g) After reconsideration, no subsequent medical evidence of the worker's impairment is
24 admissible before the director, the Workers' Compensation Board or the courts for purposes of
25 making findings of impairment on the claim closure, **except that the injured worker may submit
26 evidence to rebut a medical arbiter's findings.**

27 [(i)(A)] (h)(A) If the basis for objection to a notice of closure issued under this section is a

10 in progress at the place of employment, the worker may refuse to return to that employment without
11 loss of reemployment rights or any vocational assistance provided by this chapter.

12 (12) Any notice of closure made under this section may include necessary adjustments in com-
13 pensation paid or payable prior to the notice of closure, including disallowance of permanent disa-
14 bility payments prematurely made, crediting temporary disability payments against current or future
15 permanent or temporary disability awards or payments and requiring the payment of temporary
16 disability payments which were payable but not paid.

17 (13) An insurer or self-insured employer may take a credit or offset of previously paid workers'
18 compensation benefits or payments against any further workers' compensation benefits or payments
19 due a worker from that insurer or self-insured employer when the worker admits to having obtained
20 the previously paid benefits or payments through fraud, or a civil judgment or criminal conviction
21 is entered against the worker for having obtained the previously paid benefits through fraud. Bene-
22 fits or payments obtained through fraud by a worker may not be included in any data used for
23 ratemaking or individual employer rating or dividend calculations by an insurer, a rating organiza-
24 tion licensed pursuant to ORS chapter 737, the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or the
25 director.

26 (14)(a) An insurer or self-insured employer may offset any compensation payable to the worker
27 to recover an overpayment from a claim with the same insurer or self-insured employer. When

29 amount recovered from each payment shall not exceed 25 percent of the payment, without prior
30 authorization from the worker.

 5 *the accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the worker's combined or consequential*
 6 *condition or conditions, and there is sufficient information to determine permanent disability, the likely*
 7 *permanent disability that would have been due to the current accepted condition shall be estimated;]*

8 **(b) The compensable injury is no longer the major contributing cause of an accepted**
 9 **combined condition, the insurer has issued a combined condition denial in accordance with**
 10 **ORS 656.262 (7)(b) and there is sufficient information to determine permanent disability,**
 11 **provided that the impairment may be divided between the compensable injury and a preex-**
 12 **isting condition that is accepted as part of a combined condition;**

13 (c) Without the approval of the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide
 14 compensable medical services under ORS 656.245, the worker fails to seek medical treatment for a
 15 period of 30 days or the worker fails to attend a closing examination, unless the worker
 16 affirmatively establishes that such failure is attributable to reasons beyond the worker's control; or

17 (d) An insurer or self-insured employer finds that a worker who has been receiving permanent
 18 total disability benefits has materially improved and is capable of regularly performing work at a
 19 gainful and suitable occupation.

20 (2) If the worker is enrolled and actively engaged in training according to rules adopted pursu-
 21 ant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726, the temporary disability compensation shall be proportionately re-
 22 duced by any sums earned during the training.

23 (3) A copy of all medical reports and reports of vocational rehabilitation agencies or counselors
 24 shall be furnished to the worker, if requested by the worker.

25 (4) Temporary total disability benefits shall continue until whichever of the following events
 26 first occurs:

27 (a) The worker returns to regular or modified employment;

28 (b) The attending physician or nurse practitioner who has authorized temporary disability ben-
 29 efits for the worker under ORS 656.245 advises the worker and documents in writing that the worker

3 (F) Is not consistent with an existing shift change provision of an applicable collective bar-
 4 gaining agreement;

5 (d) Any other event that causes temporary disability benefits to be lawfully suspended, withheld
 6 or terminated under ORS 656.262 (4) or other provisions of this chapter; or

7 (e) Notwithstanding paragraph (c)(C), (D), (E) and (F) of this subsection, the attending physician
 8 or nurse practitioner who has authorized temporary disability benefits under ORS 656.245 for a home
 9 care worker or a personal support worker who has been made a subject worker pursuant to ORS
 10 656.039 advises the home care worker or personal support worker and documents in writing that the
 11 home care worker or personal support worker is released to return to modified employment, appro-
 12 priate modified employment is offered in writing by the Home Care Commission or a designee of the
 13 commission to the home care worker or personal support worker for any client of the Department
 14 of Human Services who employs a home care worker or personal support worker, [and] the worker
 15 fails to begin the employment **and the insurer properly issues a notice of closure in accordance**
 16 **with subsection (5)(a) to (d) of this section.**

17 (5)(a) Findings by the insurer or self-insured employer regarding the extent of the worker's dis-
 18 ability in closure of the claim shall be pursuant to the standards prescribed by the director.

19 (b) The insurer or self-insured employer shall issue a notice of closure of the claim to the
 20 worker, to the worker's attorney if the worker is represented, and to the director. If the worker is
 21 deceased at the time the notice of closure is issued, the insurer or self-insured employer shall mail

41 (vi) The aggravation rights; and

42 (vii) Any other information as the director may require; and

43 (C) Any beneficiaries of death benefits to which they may be entitled pursuant to ORS 656.204
 44 and 656.208.

45 (d) If the insurer or self-insured employer has not issued a notice of closure, the worker may

1 request closure. Within 10 days of receipt of a written request from the worker, the insurer or
 2 self-insured employer shall issue a notice of closure if the requirements of this section have been
 3 met or a notice of refusal to close if the requirements of this section have not been met. A notice
 4 of refusal to close shall advise the worker of:

5 (A) The decision not to close;

20 consent of all the parties to the claim, the director shall postpone the proceeding until the worker's
21 condition is appropriate for claim closure under subsection (1) of this section.

22 (9) No hearing shall be held on any issue that was not raised and preserved before the director
23 at reconsideration. However, issues arising out of the reconsideration order **or a medical arbiter's**
24 **findings** may be addressed and resolved at hearing.

25 (10) If, after the notice of closure issued pursuant to this section, the worker becomes enrolled
26 and actively engaged in training according to rules adopted pursuant to ORS 656.340 and 656.726,
27 any permanent disability payments due for work disability under the closure shall be suspended, and
28 the worker shall receive temporary disability compensation and any permanent disability payments
29 due for impairment while the worker is enrolled and actively engaged in the training. When the
30 worker ceases to be enrolled and actively engaged in the training, the insurer or self-insured em-
31 ployer shall again close the claim pursuant to this section if the worker is medically stationary or
32 if the worker's accepted injury is no longer the major contributing cause of the worker's [*combined*
33 *or*] consequential condition or conditions pursuant to ORS 656.005 (7). The closure shall include the
34 duration of temporary total or temporary partial disability compensation. Permanent disability
35 compensation shall be redetermined for work disability [*only*] **or for permanent disability if the**
36 **injured worker asks for the redetermination.** If the worker has returned to work or the worker's
37 attending physician has released the worker to return to regular or modified employment, the
38 insurer or self-insured employer shall again close the claim. This notice of closure may be appealed
39 only in the same manner as are other notices of closure under this section.

40 (11) If the attending physician or nurse practitioner authorized to provide compensable medical
41 services under ORS 656.245 has approved the worker's return to work and there is a labor dispute
42 in progress at the place of employment, the worker may refuse to return to that employment without
43 loss of reemployment rights or any vocational assistance provided by this chapter.

44 (12) Any notice of closure made under this section may include necessary adjustments in com-
45 pensation paid or payable prior to the notice of closure, including disallowance of permanent disa-

1 bility payments prematurely made, crediting temporary disability payments against current or future
 2 permanent or temporary disability awards or payments and requiring the payment of temporary
 3 disability payments which were payable but not paid.

4 (13) An insurer or self-insured employer may take a credit or offset of previously paid workers'
 5 compensation benefits or payments against any further workers' compensation benefits or payments
 6 due a worker from that insurer or self-insured employer when the worker admits to having obtained
 7 the previously paid benefits or payments through fraud, or a civil judgment or criminal conviction
 8 is entered against the worker for having obtained the previously paid benefits through fraud. Bene-
 9 fits or payments obtained through fraud by a worker may not be included in any data used for
 10 ratemaking or individual employer rating or dividend calculations by an insurer, a rating organiza-
 11 tion licensed pursuant to ORS chapter 737, the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or the
 12 director.

13 (14)(a) An insurer or self-insured employer may offset any compensation payable to the worker
 14 to recover an overpayment from a claim with the same insurer or self-insured employer. When
 15 overpayments are recovered from temporary disability or permanent total disability benefits, the
 16 amount recovered from each payment shall not exceed 25 percent of the payment, without prior
 17 authorization from the worker.

18 (b) An insurer or self-insured employer may suspend and offset any compensation payable to the
 19 beneficiary of the worker, and recover an overpayment of permanent total disability benefits caused
 20 by the failure of the worker's beneficiaries to notify the insurer or self-insured employer about the
 21 death of the worker.

22 (15) Conditions that are direct medical sequelae to the original accepted condition shall be in-
 23 cluded in rating permanent disability of the claim unless they have been specifically denied.

24 **SECTION 14.** ORS 656.283 is amended to read:

25 656.283. (1) Subject to ORS 656.319, any party or the Director of the Department of Consumer
 26 and Business Services may at any time request a hearing on any matter concerning a claim, except
 27 matters for which a procedure for resolving the dispute is provided in another statute, including
 28 ORS 656.704.

29 (2) A request for hearing may be made by any writing, signed by or on behalf of the party and
 30 including the address of the party, requesting the hearing, stating that a hearing is desired, and
 31 mailed to the Workers' Compensation Board.

32 (3)(a) The board shall refer the request for hearing to an Administrative Law Judge for deter-
 33 mination as expeditiously as possible. The hearing shall be scheduled for a date not more than 90
 34 days after receipt by the board of the request for hearing. The hearing may not be postponed:

35 (A) Except in extraordinary circumstances beyond the control of the requesting party; and

36 (B) For more than 120 days after the date of the postponed hearing.

37 (b) When a hearing set pursuant to paragraph (a) of this subsection is postponed because of the
 38 need to join one or more potentially responsible employers or insurers, the assigned Administrative
 39 Law Judge shall reschedule the hearing as expeditiously as possible after all potentially responsible
 40 employers and insurers have been joined in the proceeding and the medical record has been fully
 41 developed. The board shall adopt rules for hearings on claims involving one or more potentially re-
 42 sponsible employers and insurers that:

43 (A) Require the parties to participate in any prehearing conferences required to expedite the
 44 hearing; and

45 (B) Authorize the Administrative Law Judge conducting the hearing to:

1 (i) Establish a prehearing schedule for investigation of the claim, including but not limited to
 2 the interviewing of the claimant;

3 (ii) Make prehearing rulings necessary to promote full discovery and completion of the medical
 4 record required for determination of the issues arising from the claim; and

5 (iii) Specify what is required of the claimant to meet the obligation to reasonably cooperate with
 6 the investigation of claims.

7 (c) Nothing in paragraph (b) of this subsection alters the obligation of an insurer or self-insured
 8 employer to accept or deny a claim for compensation as required under this chapter.

9 (d) If a hearing has been postponed in accordance with paragraph (b) of this subsection:

10 (A) The director may not consider the timeliness of a denial issued in the claim that is the
 11 subject of the hearing for the purpose of imposing a penalty against an insurer or self-insured em-
 12 ployer that is potentially responsible for the claim; and

13 (B) The 120-day maximum postponement established under paragraph (a) of this subsection for
 14 rescheduling a hearing does not apply.

15 (4)(a) At least 60 days' prior notice of the time and place of hearing shall be given to all parties
 16 in interest by mail. Hearings shall be held in the county where the worker resided at the time of
 17 the injury or such other place selected by the Administrative Law Judge.

18 (b) The 60-day prior notice required by paragraph (a) of this subsection:

19 (A) May be waived by agreement of the parties and the board if waiver of the notice will result

 22 656.291, cases involving stayed compensation under ORS 656.313 (1)(b) and requests for hearing that
 23 are consolidated with an existing case with an existing hearing date.

24 (5) A record of all proceedings at the hearing shall be kept but need not be transcribed unless
 25 a party requests a review of the order of the Administrative Law Judge. Transcription shall be in
 26 written form as provided by ORS 656.295 (3).

27 (6) Except as otherwise provided in this section and rules of procedure established by the board,
 28 the Administrative Law Judge is not bound by common law or statutory rules of evidence or by
 29 technical or formal rules of procedure, and may conduct the hearing in any manner that will achieve
 30 substantial justice. Neither the board nor an Administrative Law Judge may prevent a party from
 31 withholding impeachment evidence until the opposing party's case in chief has been presented, at
 32 which time the impeachment evidence may be used. Impeachment evidence consisting of medical or

7 (7) Any party shall be entitled to issuance and service of subpoenas under the provisions of ORS 656.726 (2)(c). Any party or representative of the party may serve such subpoenas.

9 (8) After a party requests a hearing and before the hearing commences, the board, by rule, may require the requesting party, if represented by an attorney, to notify the Administrative Law Judge in writing that the attorney has conferred with the other party and that settlement has been achieved, subject to board approval, or that settlement cannot be achieved.

29 (b) No insurer or self-insured employer, including other insurers for the same employer, shall be joined to any workers' compensation hearing unless the worker has first filed a timely, written claim against that insurer or self-insured employer, or the insurer or self-insured employer has consented to issuance of an order designating a paying agent pursuant to ORS 656.307. An insurer or self-insured employer against whom a claim is filed may contend that responsibility lies with another insurer or self-insured employer, including another insurer for the same employer, regardless of whether the worker has filed a claim against that insurer or self-insured employer.

36 (c) Upon written notice by an insurer or self-insured employer filed not more than 28 days or less than 14 days before the hearing, the Administrative Law Judge shall dismiss that party from the proceeding if the record does not contain substantial evidence to support a finding of responsibility against that party.  9 claim conditions, unless the claim in the subsequent proceeding is limited to a claim for medical
 10 services for claim conditions settled in the agreement.

12 656.310. (1) In any proceeding for the enforcement of a claim for compensation under this
 13 chapter, there is a rebuttable presumption that:

14 (a) Sufficient notice of injury was given and timely filed; and

15 (b) The injury was not occasioned by the willful intention of the injured worker to commit
 16 self-injury or suicide.

17 (2) The contents of medical, surgical and hospital reports presented by claimants for compen-
 18 sation shall constitute prima facie evidence as to the matter contained therein; so, also, shall such
 19 reports presented by the insurer or self-insured employer, provided that the doctor rendering med-

28 **SECTION 17.** ORS 656.325 is amended to read:

29 656.325. (1)(a) Any worker entitled to receive compensation under this chapter is required, if
 30 requested by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services, the insurer or
 31 self-insured employer, to submit to a medical examination at a time reasonably convenient for the
 32 worker as may be provided by the rules of the director. No more than three independent medical
 33 examinations may be requested except after notification to and authorization by the director. If the
 34 worker refuses to submit to any such examination, or obstructs the same, the rights of the worker
 35 to compensation shall be suspended with the consent of the director until the examination has taken
 36 place, and no compensation shall be payable during or for account of such period. The provisions
 37 of this paragraph are subject to the limitations on medical examinations provided in ORS 656.268.

38 (b) When a worker is requested by the director, the insurer or self-insured employer to attend

 44 of the location selected for an independent medical examination. Upon receipt of the request for
 45 review, the director shall conduct an expedited review of the location selected for the independent

2 The director shall determine if there is substantial evidence for the objection to the location for the

30 thorized to provide compensable medical services under ORS 656.245 approves employment in a
31 modified job whether or not such a job is available.

32 (6) Any party may request a hearing on any dispute under this section pursuant to ORS 656.283.

33 **SECTION 18.** ORS 656.386 is amended to read:

34 656.386. (1)(a) In all cases involving denied claims where a claimant finally prevails against the
35 denial in an appeal to the Court of Appeals or petition for review to the Supreme Court, the court
36 shall allow a reasonable attorney fee to the claimant's attorney. In such cases involving denied
37 claims where the claimant prevails finally in a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge or in
38 a review by the Workers' Compensation Board, then the Administrative Law Judge or board shall
39 allow a reasonable attorney fee. In such cases involving denied claims where an attorney is instru-
40 mental in obtaining a rescission of the denial prior to a decision by the Administrative Law Judge,
41 a reasonable attorney fee shall be allowed.

42 (b) For purposes of this section, a "denied claim" is:

43 (A) A claim for compensation which an insurer or self-insured employer refuses to pay on the

36 Services regarding matters concerning a claim under this chapter, and administrative and judicial

 6 those matters in which a worker's right to receive compensation, or the amount thereof, are directly
 7 in issue. However, subject to paragraph (b) of this subsection, such matters do not include any dis-
 8 putes arising under ORS 656.245, 656.247, 656.248, 656.260 or 656.327, any other provisions directly
 9 relating to the provision of medical services to workers or any disputes arising under ORS 656.340
 10 except as those provisions may otherwise provide.

11 (b) The respective authority of the board and the director to resolve medical service disputes
 12 shall be determined according to the following principles:

13 (A) Any dispute that requires a determination of the compensability of the medical condition for
 14 which medical services are proposed is a matter concerning a claim.

15 (B) Any dispute that requires a determination of whether medical services are excessive, inap-
 16 propriate, ineffectual or in violation of the rules regarding the performance of medical services, or
 17 a determination of whether medical services for an accepted condition qualify as compensable med-
 18 ical services among those listed in ORS 656.245 [(1)(c)] (1)(d), is not a matter concerning a claim.

19 (C) Any dispute that requires a determination of whether a sufficient causal relationship exists
 20 between medical services and an accepted claim to establish compensability is a matter concerning
 21 a claim.

22 (c) Notwithstanding ORS 656.283 (3), if parties to a hearing scheduled before an Administrative
 23 Law Judge are involved in a dispute regarding both matters concerning a claim and matters not
 24 concerning a claim, the Administrative Law Judge may defer any action on the matter concerning
 25 a claim until the director has completed an administrative review of the matters other than those
 26 concerning a claim. The director shall mail a copy of the administrative order to the parties and to
 27 the Administrative Law Judge. A party may request a hearing on the order of the director. At the
 28 request of a party or by the own motion of the Administrative Law Judge, the hearings on the
 29 separate matters may be consolidated. The Administrative Law Judge shall issue an order for those
 30 matters concerning a claim and a separate order for matters other than those concerning a claim.

31 (4) Hearings under ORS 656.740 shall be conducted by an Administrative Law Judge from the
 32 board's Hearings Division.

33 (5) If a request for hearing or administrative review is filed with either the director or the board
 34 and it is determined that the request should have been filed with the other, the dispute shall be
 35 transferred. Filing a request will be timely filed if the original filing was completed within the pre-
 36 scribed time.

37 **SECTION 20.** ORS 656.802 is amended to read:

38 656.802. (1)(a) As used in this chapter, "occupational disease" means any disease or infection
 39 arising out of and in the course of employment caused by substances or activities to which an em-
 40 ployee is not ordinarily subjected or exposed other than during a period of regular actual employ-
 41 ment therein, and which requires medical services or results in disability or death, including:

42 (A) Any disease or infection caused by ingestion of, absorption of, inhalation of or contact with
 43 dust, fumes, vapors, gases, radiation or other substances.

44 (B) Any mental disorder, whether sudden or gradual in onset, which requires medical services
 45 or results in physical or mental disability or death.

1 (C) Any series of traumatic events or occurrences which requires medical services or results in
 2 physical disability or death.

3 (b) As used in this chapter, “mental disorder” includes any physical disorder caused or worsened
 4 by mental stress.

5 [(2)(a)] (2) The worker must prove that employment conditions were the major contributing
 6 cause of the disease.

7 *[(b) If the occupational disease claim is based on the worsening of a preexisting disease or condi-*
 8 *tion pursuant to ORS 656.005 (7), the worker must prove that employment conditions were the major*
 9 *contributing cause of the combined condition and pathological worsening of the disease.]*

10 *[(c) Occupational diseases shall be subject to all of the same limitations and exclusions as acci-*
 11 *dental injuries under ORS 656.005 (7).]*

12 *[(d) Existence of an occupational disease or worsening of a preexisting disease must be established*
 13 *by medical evidence supported by objective findings.]*

14 *[(e) Preexisting conditions shall be deemed causes in determining major contributing cause under*
 15 *this section.]*

16 (3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a mental disorder is not compensable
 17 under this chapter unless the worker establishes all of the following:

18 (a) The employment conditions producing the mental disorder exist in a real and objective sense.

19 (b) The employment conditions producing the mental disorder are conditions other than condi-
 20 tions generally inherent in every working situation or reasonable disciplinary, corrective or job
 21 performance evaluation actions by the employer, or cessation of employment or employment deci-
 22 sions attendant upon ordinary business or financial cycles.

23 (c) There is a diagnosis of a mental or emotional disorder which is generally recognized in the
 24 medical or psychological community.

25 (d) There is clear and convincing evidence that the mental disorder arose out of and in the
 26 course of employment.

27 (4) Death, disability or impairment of health of firefighters of any political division who have
 28 completed five or more years of employment as firefighters, caused by any disease of the lungs or
 29 respiratory tract, hypertension or cardiovascular-renal disease, and resulting from their employment
 30 as firefighters is an “occupational disease.” Any condition or impairment of health arising under this
 31 subsection shall be presumed to result from a firefighter’s employment. However, any such fire-
 32 fighter must have taken a physical examination upon becoming a firefighter, or subsequently thereto,
 33 which failed to reveal any evidence of such condition or impairment of health which preexisted
 34 employment. Denial of a claim for any condition or impairment of health arising under this sub-
 35 section must be on the basis of clear and convincing medical evidence that the cause of the condi-
 36 tion or impairment is unrelated to the firefighter’s employment.

37 (5)(a) Death, disability or impairment of health of a nonvolunteer firefighter employed by a pol-
 38 itical division or subdivision who has completed five or more years of employment as a nonvolunteer
 39 firefighter is an occupational disease if the death, disability or impairment of health:

40 (A) Is caused by brain cancer, colon cancer, stomach cancer, testicular cancer, prostate cancer,
 41 multiple myeloma, non-Hodgkin’s lymphoma, cancer of the throat or mouth, rectal cancer, breast
 42 cancer or leukemia;

43 (B) Results from the firefighter’s employment as a nonvolunteer firefighter; and

44 (C) Is first diagnosed by a physician after July 1, 2009.

45 (b) Any condition or impairment of health arising under this subsection is presumed to result

1 from the firefighter’s employment. Denial of a claim for any condition or impairment of health aris-
 2 ing under this subsection must be on the basis of clear and convincing medical evidence that the
 3 condition or impairment was not caused or contributed to in material part by the firefighter’s em-
 4 ployment.

5 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subsection, the presumption established under para-
 6 graph (b) of this subsection may be rebutted by clear and convincing evidence that the use of to-
 7 bacco by the nonvolunteer firefighter is the major contributing cause of the cancer.

8 (d) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection does not apply to pro-
 9 state cancer if the cancer is first diagnosed by a physician after the firefighter has reached the age
 10 of 55. However, nothing in this paragraph affects the right of a firefighter to establish the
 11 compensability of prostate cancer without benefit of the presumption.

12 (e) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection does not apply to claims
 13 filed more than 84 months following the termination of the nonvolunteer firefighter’s employment
 14 as a nonvolunteer firefighter. However, nothing in this paragraph affects the right of a firefighter
 15 to establish the compensability of the cancer without benefit of the presumption.

16 (f) The presumption established under paragraph (b) of this subsection does not apply to volun-
 17 teer firefighters.

18 (g) Nothing in this subsection affects the provisions of subsection (4) of this section.

19 (h) For purposes of this subsection, “nonvolunteer firefighter” means a firefighter who performs
 20 firefighting services and receives salary, hourly wages equal to or greater than the state minimum
 21 wage, or other compensation except for room, board, lodging, housing, meals, stipends, reimburse-
 22 ment for expenses or nominal payments for time and travel, regardless of whether any such com-
 23 pensation is subject to federal, state or local taxation. “Nominal payments for time and travel”
 24 includes, but is not limited to, payments for on-call time or time spent responding to a call or similar
 25 noncash benefits.

26 (6) Notwithstanding ORS 656.027 (6), any city providing a disability and retirement system by
 27 ordinance or charter for firefighters and police officers not subject to this chapter shall apply the
 28 presumptions established under subsection (5) of this section when processing claims for firefighters
 29 covered by the system.

30 **SECTION 21.** ORS 656.804 is amended to read:

31 656.804. Subject to ORS 656.005 (24) [and 656.266 (2)], an occupational disease, as defined in ORS
 32 656.802, is considered an injury for employees of employers who have come under this chapter, ex-
 33 cept as otherwise provided in ORS 656.802 to 656.807.

34 **SECTION 22. The amendments to ORS 656.005, 656.206, 656.210, 656.214, 656.225, 656.236,**
 35 **656.245, 656.260, 656.262, 656.266, 656.267, 656.268, 656.283, 656.308, 656.310, 656.325, 656.386,**
 36 **656.704, 656.802 and 656.804 by sections 1 to 21 of this 2019 Act apply to all claims or causes**
 37 **of action that exist or that arise on or after the effective date of this 2019 Act, regardless**
 38 **of the date of injury or the date a claim is presented. This 2019 Act is retroactive unless a**
 39 **specific provision of this 2019 Act indicates otherwise.**

40 **SECTION 23. This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
 41 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect**
 42 **on its passage.**
