

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3193

By COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND LABOR

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after the second semicolon, delete the rest of the line and  
2 insert “and amending ORS 652.332, 652.414, 701.102, 701.133, 701.143, 701.146 and 701.153.”.

3 Delete lines 4 through 27 and delete pages 2 through 4 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1. Sections 2 and 3 of this 2019 Act are added to and made a part of ORS**  
5 **652.310 to 652.414.**

6 **“SECTION 2. (1)(a) If the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries receives**  
7 **a valid wage claim filed against a contractor who is subject to licensing under ORS chapter**  
8 **701 for the contractor’s failure to pay a construction debt, the commissioner shall notify the**  
9 **Construction Contractors Board and the contractor of the claim within 30 days of the**  
10 **commissioner’s receipt of the claim.**

11 **“(b) If wages are found due and the contractor fails to pay the unpaid wages upon de-**  
12 **mand, the commissioner shall serve upon the contractor an order of determination as pre-**  
13 **scribed under ORS 652.332.**

14 **“(2)(a) If an order issued under ORS 652.332 for the payment of a wage claim described**  
15 **under subsection (1) of this section becomes final, the commissioner shall notify the board**  
16 **of the final order.**

17 **“(b) The commissioner shall notify the board if the contractor fails to pay the con-**  
18 **struction debt within 60 days of the date of the final order.**

19 **“(3) As used in this section, ‘contractor’ and ‘construction debt’ have the meanings given**  
20 **those terms in ORS 701.005.**

21 **“SECTION 3. (1) A business owner who incurs a penalty under ORS 652.150, 652.900,**  
22 **652.990 or 653.991, or becomes subject to a bond requirement under ORS 652.125 or 652.340,**  
23 **remains responsible for such penalties and bond requirements regardless of whether the**  
24 **business owner ceases doing business under the business name under which the business**  
25 **owner incurred the penalty or was required to obtain the bond.**

26 **“(2) As used in this section:**

27 **“(a) ‘Business owner’ means an owner, officer or responsible managing individual of a**  
28 **business that is subject to licensing under ORS chapter 701.**

29 **“(b) ‘Officer’ and ‘responsible managing individual’ have the meanings given those terms**  
30 **in ORS 701.005.**

31 **“SECTION 4. ORS 652.332 is amended to read:**

32 **“652.332. (1) In any case when the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries has re-**  
33 **ceived a wage claim complaint which the commissioner could seek to collect through court action,**  
34 **the commissioner may instead elect to seek collection of such claim through administrative pro-**  
35 **ceedings in the manner provided in this section, subject to the employer’s right to request a trial**

1 in a court of law. The commissioner may join in a single administrative proceeding any number of  
2 wage claims against the same employer. Upon making such election, the commissioner shall serve  
3 upon the employer and the wage claimant an order of determination directing the employer to pay  
4 to the commissioner the amount of the wage claim and any penalty amounts under ORS 279C.855 (1),  
5 652.150 and 653.055 (1) determined to be owed the wage claimant. Service shall be made in the same  
6 manner as service of summons or by certified mail, return receipt requested. The order of determi-  
7 nation shall include:

8 “(a) A reference to the particular sections of the statutes or rules involved;

9 “(b) A short and concise statement of the basis for the amounts determined to be owed to each  
10 wage claimant;

11 “(c) A statement of the party’s right to request a contested case hearing and to be represented  
12 by counsel at such a hearing, and of the employer’s right to a trial in a court of law, provided that  
13 any request for a contested case hearing or trial in a court of law must be received by the com-  
14 missioner in writing within 20 days after receipt by the party of the order of determination;

15 “(d) A statement that the employer must, within 20 days after receipt of the order of determi-  
16 nation, either pay in full the wage claim and any penalties assessed, or present to the commissioner  
17 a written request for a contested case hearing or a trial in a court of law as provided in this section;

18 “(e) A statement that failure to make a written request to the commissioner for a contested case  
19 hearing or a trial of the claim in a court of law within the time specified shall constitute a waiver  
20 of the right thereto and a waiver of the right to a trial by jury; [*and*]

21 “(f) **For an employer that is a contractor licensed under ORS chapter 701, a statement**  
22 **that failure to pay a construction debt as defined in ORS 701.005 within 60 days of the date**  
23 **that an order of determination becomes final under this section will result in notification to**  
24 **the Construction Contractors Board of such failure to pay and the suspension of the**  
25 **contractor’s license in accordance with section 12 of this 2019 Act; and**

26 “[*f*] (g) A statement that unless the written requests provided for in paragraph (c) of this sub-  
27 section are received by the commissioner within the time specified for making such requests, the  
28 order of determination shall become final.

29 “(2) Upon failure of the employer to pay the amount specified in the order of determination or  
30 to request a trial in a court of law within the time specified, and upon failure of any party to request  
31 a contested case hearing within the time specified, the order of determination shall become final.

32 “(3) If a party makes a timely request for a contested case hearing, a hearing shall be held in  
33 accordance with the applicable provisions of ORS 183.415 to 183.500 by the commissioner or the  
34 commissioner’s designee. The commissioner shall adopt rules for such hearing. In any hearing before  
35 the commissioner’s designee, the designee is authorized to issue the final order in the case. If the  
36 employer makes a timely request for a trial in a court of law, the commissioner may proceed against  
37 the employer as provided in ORS 652.330 (1)(b).

38 “(4) Final administrative orders issued in a wage claim proceeding are subject to review by the  
39 Court of Appeals as provided in ORS 183.480 and 183.482.

40 “(5) When an order issued under this section becomes final, it may be recorded in the County  
41 Clerk Lien Record in any county of this state. In addition to any other remedy provided by law,  
42 recording an order in the County Clerk Lien Record pursuant to the provisions of this section has  
43 the effect provided for in ORS 205.125 and 205.126, and the order may be enforced as provided in  
44 ORS 205.125 and 205.126.

45 “(6) Where the wage claim arose out of work performed by the claimant for the employer on any

1 public works project to which ORS 279C.830 or 279C.840 applies, and a state agency holds sufficient  
2 funds as retainage on such project to pay such claim or any portion thereof, the state agency may,  
3 at the request of the commissioner, pay to the commissioner from the retainage all or part of the  
4 amount due on the claim under the final order.

5 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 652.414 is amended to read:

6 **“652.414.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law:

7 **“(1)** When an employee files a wage claim under this chapter for wages earned and unpaid, and  
8 the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries determines that the employer against whom  
9 the claim was filed has ceased doing business and is without sufficient assets to pay the wage claim  
10 and the wage claim cannot otherwise be fully and promptly paid, the commissioner, after determin-  
11 ing that the claim is valid, shall pay the claimant, to the extent provided in subsection (2) of this  
12 section:

13 **“(a)** The unpaid amount of wages earned within 60 days before the date of the cessation of  
14 business; or

15 **“(b)** If the claimant filed a wage claim before the cessation of business, the unpaid amount of  
16 wages earned within 60 days before the last day the claimant was employed.

17 **“(2)** The commissioner shall pay the unpaid amount of wages earned as provided in subsection  
18 (1) of this section only to the extent of [~~\$4,000~~] **\$10,000** from such funds as may be available pursuant  
19 to ORS 652.409 (2).

20 **“(3)** The commissioner may commence an appropriate action, suit or proceeding to recover from  
21 the employer, or other persons or property liable for the unpaid wages, amounts paid from the Wage  
22 Security Fund under subsection (1) of this section. In addition to costs and disbursements, the com-  
23 missioner is entitled to recover reasonable attorney fees at trial and on appeal, together with a  
24 penalty of 25 percent of the amount of wages paid from the Wage Security Fund or \$200, whichever  
25 amount is the greater. All amounts recovered by the commissioner under this subsection and sub-  
26 section (4) of this section are appropriated continuously to the commissioner to carry out the pro-  
27 visions of this section.

28 **“(4)** The commissioner has a lien on the personal property of the employer for the benefit of the  
29 fund when the claim is paid under subsection (1) of this section for the amount so paid and the  
30 penalty referred to in subsection (3) of this section. The commissioner may cause to be filed a veri-  
31 fied written notice of claim of lien with the recording officer of the county in which the employer  
32 has its principal place of business no later than 30 days after the date the claim was paid under  
33 subsection (1) of this section. The notice of claim of lien shall contain:

34 **“(a)** A true statement of the sums paid to wage claimants and the amount of the penalty pro-  
35 vided for in subsection (3) of this section;

36 **“(b)** The name of the owner of the personal property to be charged with the lien;

37 **“(c)** A description of the personal property to be charged with the lien sufficient for identifica-  
38 tion. If a lien is being claimed against all personal property of the employer, the description is suf-  
39 ficient if it states that all personal property of the employer is covered; and

40 **“(d)** The date the wage claim was paid.

41 **“(5)** Liens created by subsection (4) of this section shall be recorded in the same manner as  
42 provided for in ORS 87.246 and may be foreclosed in the manner provided for in ORS 87.262.

43 **“(6)** Liens created by subsection (4) of this section shall have priority over any other liens or  
44 security interests perfected after the date the notice of claim is filed with the county recording of-  
45 ficer under subsections (4) and (5) of this section.

1 “(7) The commissioner shall promulgate rules to carry out the provisions of this section that  
2 include, but are not limited to, prescribing procedures for a timely and cost efficient method for the  
3 payment of wage claims from the Wage Security Fund and procedures for prorating wage claims if  
4 insufficient funds are available for payment.

5 “(8) Nothing in this section is intended to require the commissioner to pay wage claims for  
6 which moneys are not available under ORS 652.409 (2).

7 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 701.102 is amended to read:

8 “701.102. (1) As used in this section, ‘construction contractor license’ means a license issued  
9 within the United States to engage in the business of construction contracting.

10 “(2) The Construction Contractors Board may revoke, suspend or refuse to issue a license re-  
11 quired under this chapter to a business if:

12 “(a) The business owes a construction debt or has had a construction contractor license revoked  
13 or suspended;

14 “(b) An owner, officer or responsible managing individual of the business owes a construction  
15 debt or has had a construction contractor license revoked or suspended;

16 “(c) An owner, officer or responsible managing individual of the business was an owner, officer  
17 or responsible managing individual of another business at the time the other business incurred a  
18 construction debt that is owing or at the time of an event that resulted in the revocation or sus-  
19 pension of the other business’s construction contractor license; or

20 “(d) The board determines that an owner, officer or responsible managing individual of the  
21 business is not fit for licensure, based upon information submitted to the board under ORS 701.046,  
22 submitted in a registration of securities described in ORS 701.046 (2) or discovered by a board in-  
23 vestigation under ORS 701.225.

24 “(3) The board may place a contractor on probation if a total of three or more complaints are  
25 filed with the board under ORS 701.139 within a 12-month period against the contractor or a former  
26 licensed construction contracting business in which the contractor held at least a 10 percent own-  
27 ership interest, measured as determined by board rule. A contractor may not be placed on probation  
28 unless the board determines after investigation that it is likely that the contractor has caused harm  
29 to the complainants. The board may require a contractor that is placed on probation to develop a  
30 corrective action plan, to attend specific classes and to resolve outstanding complaints. The board  
31 may require a contractor that is placed on probation to take training and pass a test, both as de-  
32 scribed in ORS 701.122. The board shall take action to terminate the contractor’s license if the  
33 contractor is unwilling or unable to comply with the conditions of probation.

34 **“(4) The board may use the notification of a final order received under section 2 of this**  
35 **2019 Act for purposes of determining whether to:**

36 **“(a) Revoke, suspend or refuse to issue a license to a business under subsection (2) of**  
37 **this section;**

38 **“(b) Notwithstanding the conditions specified for probation in subsection (3) of this sec-**  
39 **tion, place a contractor on probation as provided in subsection (3) of this section; and**

40 **“(c) Require a contractor to pay a higher amount to obtain a surety bond as required by**  
41 **a board condition or rule under ORS 701.068 (5) or (6).**

42 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 701.133 is amended to read:

43 “701.133. (1) Unless otherwise provided by the Construction Contractors Board by rule, before  
44 filing a complaint under ORS 701.139, a person must send notice to the contractor that the person  
45 intends to file the complaint. The person must send the notice at least 30 days before filing the

1 complaint. The notice must be mailed by certified mail to the last known address of the contractor  
2 as shown in board records. The board by rule may:

3 “(a) Specify the manner in which the person may show compliance with this subsection at the  
4 time of filing the complaint.

5 “(b) Provide that all or part of the requirements for sending a notice under this subsection may  
6 be waived if the contractor, by other means, has actual notice of the dispute with the person filing  
7 the complaint.

8 “(2) If the notice described in subsection (1) of this section is mailed to the contractor fewer  
9 than 45 days before expiration of the time limitation under ORS 701.143 for the board to receive the  
10 complaint, the time limitation for the board to receive the complaint does not expire until 60 days  
11 after the notice is mailed.

12 “(3) The board by rule may impose a processing fee for complaints filed under ORS 701.139. The  
13 fee amount may not exceed \$100. The board may impose different processing fees for complaints  
14 processed under ORS 701.145 than for complaints processed under ORS 701.146.

15 “(4) If the board adopts rules under subsection (3) of this section, the rules:

16 “(a) Except as provided in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this subsection, must provide that a pre-  
17 vailing complainant recover processing fees.

18 “(b) Must provide that the board may waive or defer all or part of the processing fee upon ap-  
19 plication by the person filing the complaint that shows the person is unable to pay all or part of the  
20 fee. The application must be made under oath and notarized. The application must show the average  
21 monthly income and expenses of the complainant, assets and liabilities of the complainant and any  
22 other information required by board rule.

23 “(c) May provide for the processing fee to be waived for all complaints that are based on the  
24 furnishing of labor by a complainant to a contractor. The board may provide for processing fee  
25 waiver under this paragraph only if, in the opinion of the board, a majority of complainants who file  
26 complaints based on the furnishing of labor to contractors are eligible for fee waivers as described  
27 in paragraph (b) of this subsection.

28 “(5) **Notification and receipt of an order of determination under section 2 of this 2019 Act**  
29 **satisfies the notice of intent to file a complaint required by subsection (1) of this section.**

30 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 701.143 is amended to read:

31 “701.143. The Construction Contractors Board may not process a complaint against a licensed  
32 contractor, including a complaint based upon a court judgment or an arbitration award, unless the  
33 complaint is filed with the board in a timely manner as follows:

34 “(1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if the owner of a new structure files the  
35 complaint, the board must receive the complaint no later than the earlier of:

36 “(a) One year after the date the structure was first occupied; or

37 “(b) Two years after substantial completion of the structure by the contractor filed against.

38 “(2) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if the owner of an existing structure files the  
39 complaint, the board must receive the complaint no later than one year after the date the work was  
40 substantially completed by the contractor filed against.

41 “(3) Regardless of whether the complaint involves a new or an existing structure, if the owner  
42 of the structure files the complaint and the licensed contractor failed to begin the work, the board  
43 must receive the complaint no later than one year after the date the parties entered into the con-  
44 tract.

45 “(4) Regardless of whether the complaint involves a new or an existing structure, if the owner

1 of the structure files the complaint and the licensed contractor failed to substantially complete the  
2 work, the board must receive the complaint no later than one year after the date the contractor  
3 ceased to work on the structure.

4 “(5) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if a licensed contractor files the complaint  
5 against the licensed contractor performing work as a subcontractor on a new structure, the board  
6 must receive the complaint no later than the earlier of:

7 “(a) Fourteen months after the date the structure was first occupied; or

8 “(b) Two years after substantial completion of the structure.

9 “(6) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if a licensed contractor files the complaint  
10 against the licensed contractor performing work as a subcontractor on an existing structure, the  
11 board must receive the complaint no later than 14 months after the date the work on the structure  
12 was substantially completed.

13 “(7) If a licensed contractor files the complaint against the licensed contractor performing work  
14 as a subcontractor on a structure and the subcontractor failed to substantially complete the work,  
15 the board must receive the complaint no later than 14 months after the date the subcontractor  
16 ceased to work on the structure.

17 “(8) If the licensed contractor’s employee, subcontractor or material or equipment supplier files  
18 the complaint, the board must receive the complaint no later than one year after the date the con-  
19 tractor incurred the indebtedness.

20 “(9) **The filing of a complaint with the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Indus-**  
21 **tries for unpaid wages constitutes the filing of a complaint for purposes of establishing**  
22 **timeliness of the filing of a complaint under this section.**

23 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 701.146 is amended to read:

24 “701.146. For a complaint described in ORS 701.139 (2) or (3)(c) or a complaint under ORS  
25 701.139 (3)(b) that a complainant elects to have resolved under this section:

26 “(1) The person seeking to file the complaint with the Construction Contractors Board must:

27 “(a) Bring an action on the dispute against the licensed contractor in a court of competent ju-  
28 risdiction; or

29 “(b) Initiate a proceeding to resolve the dispute through binding arbitration substantially in  
30 conformance with ORS 36.600 to 36.740.

31 “(2) The complainant must file the complaint with the Construction Contractors Board by de-  
32 livering to the board a copy of the complainant’s court pleading or the demand for arbitration or  
33 other document necessary to initiate arbitration. The pleading, demand or other document must be  
34 accompanied by a completed board complaint form. The complainant must also give notice to the  
35 surety on the bond by delivering to the surety a copy of the complainant’s court pleading or the  
36 demand for arbitration or other document necessary to initiate arbitration and a copy of the com-  
37 pleted board complaint form. Delivery to the board and the surety must be accomplished by certified  
38 mail, return receipt requested, no later than the earlier of:

39 “(a) The 90th day after filing the court action or after filing or making the arbitration demand  
40 or other initiation of arbitration;

41 “(b) The 14th day before the first day of trial or arbitration; or

42 “(c) The 30th day before:

43 “(A) The court issues a judgment in the action; or

44 “(B) The arbitrator issues an award on the arbitration.

45 “(3) Filing the complaint with the board under subsection (2) of this section constitutes filing

1 the complaint for purposes of establishing timeliness of the complaint under ORS 701.143 and pri-  
2 ority of the complaint for possible payment from the bond under ORS 701.157.

3 “(4) Except as provided in this subsection and subsection [(7)] (8) of this section, if the  
4 complainant properly gives notice to the surety under subsection (2) of this section, a judgment or  
5 award against the contractor entered in the action or arbitration is binding on the surety. If the  
6 complainant delivers the notice required under subsection (2) of this section to the wrong surety,  
7 the surety receiving the notice may avoid being bound by a judgment or award by delivering notice  
8 of the mistake to the complainant or the complainant’s attorney of record, and to the board, on or  
9 before the 30th day after the surety receives notice under subsection (2) of this section. Delivery  
10 of the notice of mistake must be by certified mail, return receipt requested, or by facsimile machine  
11 or other form of transmission with an acknowledgment of receipt.

12 “(5) A surety under subsection (2) of this section has an absolute right to intervene in an action  
13 or arbitration brought or initiated under subsection (1) of this section. A complainant may not join  
14 a surety as a party to an action or arbitration unless the complainant disputes the validity or  
15 timeliness of the surety’s notice of mistake or the surety disputes the validity or timeliness of the  
16 delivery to the surety of the notice required by subsection (2) of this section. If the surety elects to  
17 intervene or is joined as a party, the surety is bound by all issues of fact and law determined by the  
18 court or arbitrator and may not seek board review of those determinations.

19 “(6) If a court issues a judgment on an action, or reduces an arbitration award to judgment,  
20 against a contractor on a complaint described in subsection (1) of this section, the complainant must  
21 deliver a certified copy of the judgment to the board and to the surety no later than the 30th day  
22 after entry of the judgment in order to maintain the complaint and possibly receive payment from  
23 the bond. The entry of a final judgment against the contractor concludes the contractor’s involve-  
24 ment in any proceedings to determine whether the complaint is subject to payment from the bond.  
25 The complainant and the surety are the only parties to the administrative process set forth in sub-  
26 section [(7)] (8) of this section.

27 “(7) **If a complaint is filed under ORS 701.140 (4), the complainant may recover payment**  
28 **from the bond of the contractor as provided in subsection (4) or (8) of this section or by**  
29 **obtaining a final order issued by the Bureau of Labor and Industries that states an amount**  
30 **of unpaid wages that the licensed contractor owes to the wage claimant.**

31 “[7] (8) Upon receipt of a timely delivered certified copy of the judgment as described in sub-  
32 section (6) of this section, the board shall issue a determination that the surety must pay the amount  
33 stated by the board. The determination issued by the board is an order in other than a contested  
34 case proceeding. The determination shall include the amount of the judgment together with any  
35 costs, interest and attorney fees awarded under the judgment, to the extent that the judgment, costs,  
36 interest and fees are within the jurisdiction of the board. The board’s determination of the complaint  
37 is limited to whether the complaint comes within the jurisdiction of the board and is subject to  
38 payment by the surety.

39 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 701.153 is amended to read:

40 “701.153. (1) If an order of the Construction Contractors Board determines a complaint against  
41 a residential contractor that was filed with the board prior to July 1, 2011, and the order becomes  
42 final by operation of law or on appeal and remains unpaid 10 days after the date the order becomes  
43 final, the complainant may file the order with the county clerk in any county of this state.

44 “(2) Upon receipt of an order described in subsection (1) of this section, the clerk shall record  
45 the order in the County Clerk Lien Record. In addition to any other remedy provided by law, re-

1 cording an order described in subsection (1) of this section in the County Clerk Lien Record pur-  
2 suant to the provisions of this section has the effect provided for in ORS 205.125 and 205.126, and  
3 the order may be enforced as provided in ORS 205.125 and 205.126.

4 “(3)(a) Payments from the surety bond of a residential contractor pursuant to a board determi-  
5 nation under ORS 701.145 are satisfied in the following priority in any 90-day period:

6 “(A) Board determinations as a result of complaints against a residential contractor by the  
7 owner of a residential or small commercial structure have payment priority to the full extent of the  
8 bond over all other types of complaints.

9 “(B) If the determinations described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph do not exhaust the  
10 bond, then amounts due under board determinations for all other types of residential or small com-  
11 mercial structure complaints filed with the board within that 90-day period may be paid from the  
12 bond, except that the total amount paid from any one bond to nonowner complainants may not ex-  
13 ceed \$3,000.

14 “(b) A 90-day period begins on the date the first complaint is filed with the board. Subsequent  
15 90-day periods begin on the date the first complaint is filed with the board after the close of the  
16 preceding 90-day period.

17 “(4) If the total amount payable under determinations issued by the board for complaints against  
18 a residential contractor filed with the board within 90 days after the board receives notice of the  
19 first complaint against the contractor exceed the amount of the bond available for payment, subject  
20 to the priorities under this section, the board shall decide how payment of the determined amounts  
21 from the bond is to be apportioned.

22 “(5) If the total amount payable under determinations issued by the board as a result of com-  
23 plaints that were filed with the board within 90 days after the board receives notice of the first  
24 complaint do not exceed the amount of the bond available for payment, those determinations have  
25 payment priority over amounts due under determinations resulting from subsequently filed com-  
26 plaints.

27 “(6) The total amount paid from a residential contractor bond for costs and interest under all  
28 determinations issued by the board under ORS 701.145 may not exceed \$3,000.

29 “(7)(a) **Notwithstanding subsection (3)(a)(B) of this section, if the board determines that**  
30 **the bond required a higher amount than the amount required ordinarily of a licensee to file**  
31 **a bond under ORS 701.081, the \$3,000 limit payable from the bond for a nonowner complaint**  
32 **under subsection (3)(a)(B) shall be increased in an amount that is proportional to the in-**  
33 **creased amount required to file the bond, as determined by the board under ORS 701.068 (5)**  
34 **or (6).**

35 “(b) **If a complaint filed under ORS 701.140 (4) or a notice received under section 2 of this**  
36 **2019 Act contributes to the board’s determination under ORS 701.068 (5) or (6) that a licensee**  
37 **must file a bond in an amount that is higher than the amount required ordinarily of a**  
38 **licensee, the total amount available for payment of nonowner complaints shall be \$3,000 plus**  
39 **up to 50 percent of the amount of the bond as required by the board that exceeds the bond**  
40 **amount ordinarily required under ORS 701.081 or 701.084.**

41 “**SECTION 11.** Section 12 of this 2019 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 701.

42 “**SECTION 12.** Upon receipt of the notification provided by the Commissioner of the Bu-  
43 reau of Labor and Industries under section 2 of this 2019 Act stating that a contractor has  
44 failed to pay the amount of a wage claim as ordered in a final determination order within 60  
45 days of the issuance of the order, the Construction Contractors Board shall, after notice and



1 opportunity for a hearing under ORS chapter 183, suspend the license of the contractor.

2       “SECTION 13. The amendments to ORS 652.332 by section 4 of this 2019 Act apply to  
3 wages owed for labor performed on or after the effective date of this 2019 Act.”

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
