

House Bill 3331

Sponsored by Representative LEIF

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Allows eligible employee who declines coverage in health benefit plan offered by Oregon Educators Benefit Board or Public Employees' Benefit Board and who is enrolled as spouse or family member in another health benefit plan offered by Oregon Educators Benefit Board or Public Employees' Benefit Board to be paid employer contribution for plan that was declined.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to state-sponsored health benefit plans; amending ORS 243.135 and 243.866; and declaring
3 an emergency.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 243.135, as amended by section 27, chapter 746, Oregon Laws 2017, is
6 amended to read:

7 243.135. (1) Notwithstanding any other benefit plan contracted for and offered by the Public
8 Employees' Benefit Board, the board shall contract for a health benefit plan or plans best designed
9 to meet the needs and provide for the welfare of eligible employees, the state and the local gov-
10 ernments. In considering whether to enter into a contract for a plan, the board shall place emphasis
11 on:

12 (a) Employee choice among high quality plans;

13 (b) A competitive marketplace;

14 (c) Plan performance and information;

15 (d) Employer flexibility in plan design and contracting;

16 (e) Quality customer service;

17 (f) Creativity and innovation;

18 (g) Plan benefits as part of total employee compensation;

19 (h) The improvement of employee health; and

20 (i) Health outcome and quality measures, described in ORS 413.017 (4), that are reported by the
21 plan.

22 (2) The board may approve more than one carrier for each type of plan contracted for and of-
23 fered but the number of carriers shall be held to a number consistent with adequate service to eli-
24 gible employees and their family members.

25 (3) Where appropriate for a contracted and offered health benefit plan, the board shall provide
26 options under which an eligible employee may arrange coverage for family members who are not
27 enrolled in another health benefit plan offered by the board or the Oregon Educators Benefit Board.
28 An eligible employee who declines coverage in a health benefit plan offered by the Public
29 Employees' Benefit Board or the Oregon Educators Benefit Board and who is enrolled as a spouse
30 or family member in another health benefit plan offered by the Public Employees' Benefit Board or

1 the Oregon Educators Benefit Board may *[not]* be paid the employer contribution for the plan that
2 was declined.

3 (4) Payroll deductions for costs that are not payable by the state or a local government may be
4 made upon receipt of a signed authorization from the employee indicating an election to participate
5 in the plan or plans selected and the deduction of a certain sum from the employee's pay.

6 (5) In developing any health benefit plan, the board may provide an option of additional cover-
7 age for eligible employees and their family members at an additional cost or premium.

8 (6) Transfer of enrollment from one plan to another shall be open to all eligible employees and
9 their family members under rules adopted by the board. Because of the special problems that may
10 arise in individual instances under comprehensive group practice plan coverage involving acceptable
11 provider-patient relations between a particular panel of providers and particular eligible employees
12 and their family members, the board shall provide a procedure under which any eligible employee
13 may apply at any time to substitute a health service benefit plan for participation in a compre-
14 hensive group practice benefit plan.

15 (7) The board shall evaluate a benefit plan that serves a limited geographic region of this state
16 according to the criteria described in subsection (1) of this section.

17 (8)(a) The board shall use payment methodologies in self-insured health benefit plans offered by

20 (b) The board shall adopt policies and practices designed to limit the annual increase in pre-
21 mium amounts paid for contracted health benefit plans to 3.4 percent.

22 (9) A carrier or third party administrator that contracts with the board to provide or administer
23 a health benefit plan shall, at least once each plan year, conduct an audit of the health benefit plan
24 enrollees' continued eligibility for coverage as spouses or dependents or any other basis that would
25 affect the cost of the premium for the plan.

26 (10) By January 1, 2023, the board shall spend at least 12 percent of its total medical expen-
27 ditures in self-insured health benefit plans on payments for primary care.

28 (11) No later than February 1 of each year, the board shall report to the Legislative Assembly
29 on the board's progress toward achieving the target of spending at least 12 percent of total medical
30 expenditures in self-insured health benefit plans on payments for primary care.

41 (11) No later than February 1 of each year, the board shall report to the Legislative Assembly
42 on any plan implemented under subsection (10) of this section and on the board's progress toward
43 achieving the target of spending at least 12 percent of total medical expenditures in self-insured
44 health benefit plans on payments for primary care.

 36 plan, the board shall provide a procedure under which any eligible employee may apply at any time
 37 to substitute another benefit plan for participation in a comprehensive group practice benefit plan.

38 (7) An eligible employee who is retired is not required to participate in a health benefit plan
 39 offered under this section in order to obtain dental benefit plan coverage. The board shall establish
 40 by rule standards of eligibility for retired employees to participate in a dental benefit plan.

41 (8) The board shall evaluate a benefit plan that serves a limited geographic region of this state
 42 according to the criteria described in subsection (1) of this section.

43 (9)(a) The board shall use payment methodologies in self-insured health benefit plans offered by
 44 the board that are designed to limit the growth in per-member expenditures for health services to
 45 no more than 3.4 percent per year.

19 (11) If the board spends less than 12 percent of its total medical expenditures in self-insured
 20 health benefit plans on payments for primary care, the board shall implement a plan for increasing
 21 the percentage of total medical expenditures spent on payments for primary care by at least one
 22 percent each year.

23 (12) No later than February 1 of each year, the board shall report to the Legislative Assembly
 24 on any plan implemented under subsection (11) of this section and on the board's progress toward
 25 achieving the target of spending at least 12 percent of total medical expenditures on payments for
 26 primary care.

27 **SECTION 5. This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
 28 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect**
 29 **on its passage.**
