SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure

Appropriates moneys from General Fund to Higher Education Coordinating Commission for certain biennial expenses.

Limits biennial expenditures by commission from lottery moneys for debt service on lottery bonds.

Limits biennial expenditures by commission from lottery moneys allocated from Education Stability Fund for Oregon Opportunity Grants.

Limits biennial expenditures by commission from lottery moneys for Outdoor School Education Fund

Limits biennial expenditures by commission from lottery moneys allocated to Sports Lottery Account.

Limits certain biennial expenditures from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by commission for certain purposes.

Limits biennial expenditures of commission from federal funds for certain purposes.

Limits biennial expenditures by commission from timber tax funds for Community College Support Fund.

Authorizes specified nonlimited expenditures.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2019.

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Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: 4

SECTION 1. There are appropriated to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission,

for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, out of the General Fund, the following amounts, for 6

26 <u>SECTION 2.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of 27 \$34,519,205 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, as the maximum limit for 28 payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Eco-29 nomic Development Fund to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for debt service 30 on lottery bonds sold for the benefit of Oregon public universities.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$11,520,140 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for debt service on lottery bonds sold for the benefit of Oregon community colleges.

36 <u>SECTION 4.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of 37 \$40,000,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, as the maximum limit for 38 payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Education Stability Fund to the 39 Higher Education Coordinating Commission for Oregon Opportunity Grants.

40 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of 41 \$45,305,847 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, as the maximum limit for 42 payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Eco-43 nomic Development Fund to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission to the Outdoor 44 School Education Fund.

9 <u>SECTION 10.</u> For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, expenditures by the Higher Edu-10 cation Coordinating Commission for payments to individuals, organizations or units of gov-11 ernment from federal National Emergency Grants funds are not limited.

12 <u>SECTION 11.</u> For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, expenditures by the Higher Edu-13 cation Coordinating Commission for debt service on Build America Bonds sold for the benefit 14 of public universities and community colleges are not limited.

<u>SECTION 12.</u> For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, expenditures by the Higher Edu cation Coordinating Commission of moneys from the Tuition Protection Fund are not limited.

17 <u>SECTION 13.</u> This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 18 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect 19 July 1, 2019.

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
