SUMMARY

Modifies amounts authorized for issuance of certain general obligation bonds and revenue bonds.

Repeals authorization for issuance of certain lottery bonds. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

7 SECTION 1. Section 8, chapter 87, Oregon Laws 2018, is amended to read:

Sec. 8. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2019, at the request of the Oregon Department of 8 9 Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Higher Education Coordinating 10 Commission, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to

286A.585 in an amount that produces \$9 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for the pur-11 12poses described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State

13 Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an amount sufficient to provide 14 \$9 million in net proceeds and interest earnings must be transferred to the Higher Education Coor-15

16 dinating Commission for deposit in the [Public University Fund established under ORS 352.450, seg-

regated in a distinct subaccount to allow necessary compliance with the Internal Revenue Code] EOU 17

Field House Facility Fund, established under section 2 of this 2019 Act, for distribution to 18

Eastern Oregon University to construct a new field house facility. 19

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economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds
 and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following findings:

3 (a) A new facility is needed in order for the university to have adequate instructional and ath-4 letic space.

5 (b) Having adequate university buildings and facilities is essential to Oregon's healthy economic6 growth.

7 (c) The field house facility will be used as a venue for regional events, providing significant 8 economic benefits to local communities.

9 (d) Oregon manufactured wood products, including cross-laminated timber, will be utilized in the 10 construction of the field house facility, supporting Oregon's wood products manufacturing industry.

11 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) The EOU Field House Facility Fund is established in the State Treasury, 12 separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned on the moneys in the EOU 13 Field House Facility Fund must be credited to the fund. The fund consists of moneys depos-14 ited in the fund under section 8, chapter 87, Oregon Laws 2018, and may include moneys ap-15 propriated, allocated, deposited or transferred to the fund by the Legislative Assembly or 16 otherwise and interest earned on moneys in the fund.

17 (2) Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the Higher Education Coordi 18 nating Commission for the purposes specified in section 8, chapter 87, Oregon Laws 2018.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> The Oregon Department of Administrative Services may expend up to
 \$533,000 of net proceeds of lottery bonds issued pursuant to section 1, chapter 614, Oregon
 Laws 2011, for distribution to the Cascade AIDS Project for the purposes described in section
 12, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017.

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SECTION 4. Section 12, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to read:

Sec. 12. (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, at the request of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Cascade AIDS Project, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces, together with the amount distributed by the department under section 3 of this 2019 Act, no more than \$1 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an amount sufficient to provide \$1 million in net proceeds and interest earnings must be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for distribution to the Cascade AIDS Project for acquisition and renovation of a primary care and mental health center for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and other minority gender identities and sexual orientation community.

(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, further
economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds
and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following findings:

40 (a) Individuals increase their potential for self-sufficiency and use fewer public resources when

(b) A severe shortage of affordable housing exists in Oregon, and market indicators demonstrate
 a growing gap between the supply of and demand for affordable housing.

SECTION 6. Section 29, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to read:

Sec. 29. (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, at the request of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Oregon Business Development Department, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3,390,000 in net proceeds and interest earnings for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an amount sufficient to provide \$3,390,000 in net proceeds and interest earnings must be transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for deposit in the American Manufacturing Innovation District Fund established in section 7a, chapter 66, Oregon Laws 2016, for construction of [access roads to the] Oregon Manufacturing Innovation Center [Research and Development Facility and Training Center] access roads.

(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bonds proceeds with create jobs and further economic development, and is authorized based on the finding that the Oregon Manufacturing Innovation Center will enable and encourage the development of a robust manufacturing sector in the Oregon economy.

21	274.064. (1) The Portland Harbor Cleanup Fund is established in the State Treasury, separate
22	and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Portland Harbor Cleanup Fund must

32	department's ability to recover, by way of insurance, cost recovery, contribution, or claim or action
33	relating to or arising out of the Portland Harbor Superfund Site, moneys from other parties, in-
34	cluding claims for costs incurred by the department. In no event shall anything in this section or
35	[section 10, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017,] any other law that appropriates, allocates, deposits

36 or transfers moneys to the fund be construed as a waiver by the State of Oregon of any form of 37 defense or immunity, whether sovereign immunity, governmental immunity, immunity based on the 38 Eleventh Amendment to the United States Constitution or otherwise.

SECTION 11. This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 39 40 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect 41 on its passage.

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
