## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes Domestic Violence Committee within Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to [study and make recommendations on ways to improve criminal justice system response to domestic violence in state] facilitate coordination between state agencies and organizations providing services in response to domestic violence, advise Governor and Legislative Assembly regarding policies and best practices for state agency response to domestic violence, provide training for state agencies regarding domestic violence and increase public awareness regarding domestic violence issues.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

2	Relating to domestic violence; creating new provisions; amending ORS 137.651; and declaring an
3	emergency.
4	Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
5	SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:
6	(a) "Domestic violence" means abuse, as defined in ORS 107.705.
7	(b) "Victim of domestic violence" means an individual against whom domestic violence
8	has been committed.
9	(2) The Domestic Violence Committee is established within the Oregon Criminal Justice
10	Commission.
11	(3) The committee consists of 13 members, as follows:
12	(a) The President of the Senate shall appoint one member from among members of the
13	Senate.
14	(b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member from among
15	members of the House of Representatives.
16	(c) The Governor shall appoint five members who are subject to confirmation by the
17	Senate pursuant to Article III, section 4, of the Oregon Constitution, and who are from
18	among the following with expertise in areas of domestic violence or in providing resources
19	and services in response to domestic violence in this state:
20	(A) One member who represents district attorneys or law enforcement-based victim
21	services advocates.
22	(B) One member who is a nonprofit victim services advocate.
23	(C) One member who is a victim advocate serving culturally specific populations.
24	(D) One member who is a representative of a federally recognized Indian tribe.
25	(E) One member who represents the civil legal services community.

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1	(d) The Attorney General shall appoint one member who represents the Crime Victims'
<b>2</b>	Assistance Section of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice.
3	(e) The Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee.
4	(f) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority or a designee of the director.
5	(g) The Director of Human Services or a designee of the director.
6	(h) One member who is a representative of the Department of Education.
7	(i) The Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries or a designee of the com-
8	missioner.
9	(4) The primary roles of the committee are to:
10	(a) Facilitate coordination between state agencies and organizations that provide services
11	in response to domestic violence;
12	(b) Advise the Governor and the Legislative Assembly regarding policies and best prac-
13	tices for state agency response to domestic violence;
14	(c) Provide training for state agencies regarding the intersection of domestic violence and
15	the services provided by the state agencies; and
16	(d) Increase public awareness regarding issues relating to domestic violence.
17	(5)(a) The committee shall undertake the following tasks and provide the following in-
18	formed, data-driven recommendations:
19	(A) Review the state's laws regarding domestic violence and make recommendations to
20	resolve statutory and administrative inconsistencies;
21	(B) Make recommendations to members of the criminal justice system regarding im-
22	provements to procedures relating to domestic violence;
23	(C) Make recommendations for remedying criminal justice system practices that hinder
24	a victim of domestic violence from getting to safety and security;
25	(D) Study and make recommendations to improve any other aspects of the criminal jus-
26	tice system that do not prevent or ameliorate domestic violence;
27	(E) Prepare and publish reports on critical domestic violence issues;
28	(F) Develop opportunities for interagency networking and multi-disciplinary approaches
29	to addressing domestic violence;
30	(G) Coordinate with organizations and state advisory committees, task forces, agencies,
31	boards and commissions that provide services relating to domestic violence;
32	(H) Identify domestic violence training requirements of state agencies, conduct initial
33	training and develop and implement a plan for ongoing training;
34	(I) Identify domestic violence technical assistance requirements of state agencies and
35	develop a technical assistance plan; and
36	(J) Identify needed supplemental supports for programs that intersect with domestic vi-
37	olence issues, including, but not limited to, mental health services, child welfare, housing and
38	homelessness services, criminal and civil justice and teen dating violence services.
39	(b) To the extent practicable, the committee shall consult with and engage domestic vi-
40	olence stakeholders, including members of the criminal justice system, in the development
41	of the committee's recommendations under this subsection.
42	(6) The committee chairperson may create any subcommittees within the committee as
43	the chairperson considers necessary.
44	(7) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the committee are nonvoting
45	members of the committee and may act in an advisory capacity only.

SECTION 3. The report described in section 1 (13) of this 2019 Act is first due no later 2930 than September 15, 2020.

31 SECTION 4. This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect 32on its passage. 33

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(8) A majority of the voting members of the committee constitutes a quorum for the 1 2 transaction of business.

(9) Official action by the committee requires the approval of a majority of the voting 3 members of the committee. 4

(10) The committee shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

(11) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appoint-6 ment to become immediately effective. 7

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(12) The committee may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the committee.

9 (13) The committee shall submit a report in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to the Governor and the interim legislative 10 committees related to human services, judiciary, domestic relations and domestic violence 11 12 no later than September 15 of each even-numbered year.

(14) The commission shall provide staff support to the committee. 13

(15) The committee shall meet at least once a month, at a time and place determined by 14 15 the committee. The committee shall also meet at such other times and places as are specified by a call of the committee chairperson. If a majority of the voting members, in writing, 16 requests a special meeting, the committee chairperson shall designate a time for a special 17 meeting as requested. 18

(1) "Commission" means the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. 21

22(2) "Criminal justice system" includes all activities and agencies, whether state or local, public or private, pertaining to the prevention, prosecution and defense of offenses, the disposition of 23offenders under the criminal law and the disposition or treatment of juveniles adjudicated to have 94 committed an act which, if committed by an adult, would be a crime. [The] "Criminal justice 25system" includes police, public prosecutors, defense counsel, courts, correction systems, mental 26health agencies, crime victims and all public and private agencies providing services in connection

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
