

Senate Bill 786

Sponsored by Senators HANSELL, TAYLOR

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Directs school district board to adopt child sexual abuse prevention instructional program that addresses sex trafficking of children.

Takes effect July 1, 2020.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

1
2 Relating to instruction on the prevention of sex trafficking of children; creating new provisions;
3 amending ORS 336.059; and prescribing an effective date.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 336.059 is amended to read:

6 336.059. (1) **As used in this section, "sexual abuse" includes sex trafficking of children.**

7 [(1)] (2) Each school district board shall adopt a child sexual abuse prevention instructional
8 program for students in kindergarten through grade 12.

9 [(2)] (3) School districts must include in the program:

10 (a) Developmentally appropriate, culturally sensitive and evidence-based instruction for each
11 grade level;

12 (b) A minimum of four instructional sessions per school year, with each year's instruction
13 building on the previous year's instruction;

14 (c) Age-appropriate curriculum including role-playing, discussion, activities and books to educate
15 students regarding child sexual abuse prevention;

16 (d) Instruction providing students with the knowledge and tools to communicate incidents of
17 sexual abuse;

18 (e) Instruction regarding "safe touch," "unsafe touch," "safe secrets," "unsafe secrets," and how
19 to escape and report a sexual abuse situation;

20 (f) Techniques to recognize child sexual abuse, skills to reduce vulnerability and encouragement
21 to report child sexual abuse;

22 (g) An evaluation component with measurable outcomes;

23 (h) A professional training component for administrators, teachers and other school personnel
24 regarding communicating child sexual abuse prevention techniques to students, effects of child sex-
25 ual abuse on children, receiving child sexual abuse reports and disclosures and mandated reporting;
26 and

27 (i) A parental involvement component to inform parents about child sexual abuse topics, in-
28 cluding characteristics of offenders, "grooming" behaviors and how to discuss child sexual abuse
29 prevention with children.

30 [(3)] (4) Program instruction may be delivered by instructors including teachers, school counse-
31 lors and outside agency prevention educators, provided the instructors have knowledge of and

1 training in child sexual abuse prevention.

2 **SECTION 2. The amendments to ORS 336.059 by section 1 of this 2019 Act first apply to**
3 **the 2020-2021 school year.**

4 **SECTION 3. This 2019 Act takes effect on July 1, 2020.**

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
