PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2834

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 18 through 24 and delete pages 2 2 and 3 and insert:

"SECTION 1. (1) The State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall 3 collect, analyze and develop the best available science and data re-4 garding the connectivity of wildlife habitat areas. The State Depart- $\mathbf{5}$ ment of Fish and Wildlife, in cooperative with the Department of 6 Transportation, shall use the data to develop a plan, to be known as 7 the Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road Crossing Action Plan, to preserve 8 long-term habitat connectivity for wildlife as defined in ORS 496.004. 9 The plan shall provide guidance for all state agencies to develop 10 benchmarks for the designation and protection of wildlife corridors in 11 12 Oregon.

"(2) The Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road Crossing Action Plan shall,
 at a minimum, include:

15 "(a) Identification of species of concern that are at risk from
 16 habitat fragmentation or barriers to species movement.

"(b) Identification of the known migration and dispersal corridors
 for species identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

"(c) A description of the potential effects of climate change on
 species identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

²¹ "(d) Identification of known and potential human-caused barriers

1 in Oregon that negatively affect wildlife habitat connectivity.

"(e) A contemporary map showing existing and potential wildlife
 corridors and core high quality habitat areas.

"(f) A list of areas for which designation of wildlife corridors, land
acquisition or other agency actions are of high priority to protect
wildlife movement or habitat connectivity. The bases for identification
of the high priority areas shall include but not be limited to:

8 "(A) A designation of a species by the federal government or the 9 State Fish and Wildlife Commission as an endangered species or 10 threatened species; and

11 "(B) The potential for reducing vehicle-wildlife collisions.

"(3) The State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall review and
 update the Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road Crossing Action Plan every
 five years. Prior to final adoption of the plan or of a plan update the
 department shall:

"(a) Post the plan or update on the department website and provide
 an opportunity for public comment; and

"(b) Deliver a copy of the plan or update to a Senate interim or
 regular committee relating to natural resources.

"(4) Prior to final adoption of a proposed update, the State Depart-20ment of Fish and Wildlife shall prepare a report on implementation 21of the update, including but not limited to information concerning 22changes in the number of high priority wildlife corridors established. 23The Department of Transportation shall identify projects that have 24been implemented, the status of projects that are underway and the 25potential benefits from projects implemented, including but not lim-26ited to describing the numbers and types of infrastructure established, 27the use of mitigation plans and resulting changes in the number of 28vehicle-wildlife collisions in areas where wildlife corridors intersect 29 with public roads. The State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall 30

 Senate interim or regular committee relating to natural resources.

"SECTION 2. All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS
174.111, are directed to assist and advise the State Department of Fish
and Wildlife in the development of the Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road
Crossing Action Plan and in the five-year reviews of the plan required
under section 1 of this 2019 Act.

8 "SECTION 3. The State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall ini-9 tiate work on the Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road Crossing Action 10 Plan no later than January 1, 2020, and report department findings and 11 recommendations regarding the designation and protection of wildlife 12 corridors to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly relating 13 to natural resources in the manner provided by ORS 192.245 no later 14 than September 15, 2022.

"SECTION 4. (1) The Oregon Transportation Commission shall 15 adopt a program to reduce vehicle-wildlife collisions in areas where 16 wildlife corridors identified in the Wildlife Corridor and Safe Road 17 Crossing Action Plan by the State Department of Fish and Wildlife 18 intersect with proposed or existing public roads. The program shall 19 include, but need not be limited to, plans for creating or modifying 20road infrastructure in a manner that promotes wildlife migration and 21dispersal and increases wildlife safety and public safety. The plans may 22include but need not be limited to the use of wildlife crossing struc-23tures and roadway fencing. 24

"(2) If a federal, state or county road project is included in the program, the Department of Transportation shall incorporate measures that are consistent with the program into the design options for the road project. The environmental impact study that the department submits for the road project shall include a list of identified wildlife corridors that might be threatened by the proposed road project and 1 a mitigation plan for minimizing the threat to the wildlife corridors.

"(3) After the commission adopts the program, the Department of
Transportation shall review grant applications by county road departments for compliance with the program, the Wildlife Corridor and Safe
Road Crossing Action Plan and the purposes of sections 1 and 2 of this
2019 Act.

"<u>SECTION 5.</u> (1) The Oregon Transportation Commission shall
adopt the program required under section 4 of this 2019 Act no later
than December 31, 2023.

"(2) Until the commission adopts the program, the Department of Transportation and the State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall coordinate efforts to reduce vehicle-wildlife collisions based on the data gathered under section 1 of this 2019 Act. The Department of Transportation shall consider the benefit of including a wildlife crossing as part of a project if the data suggests that such a crossing could significantly reduce vehicle-wildlife collisions.".

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
