## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3165

1 On <u>page 1</u> of the printed bill, delete lines 5 through 27 and delete <u>pages</u> 2 <u>2 and 3</u> and insert:

SECTION 1. (1) The Oregon Health Authority, in consultation with the Department of Education, shall select 10 school districts or education service districts to receive planning grants for district planning and technical assistance. Each district receiving a grant, beginning on or after July 1, 2019, and concluding before July 1, 2021, shall:

8 "(a) Evaluate the need for school-based health services in their re9 spective communities; and

10 "(b) Develop a plan that addresses the need identified in paragraph 11 (a) of this subsection by drafting a proposal for a school-based health 12 center as defined in ORS 413.225 or by designing a pilot program as 13 described in subsection (5)(b) of this section to test an alternative ap-14 proach to providing school-based health services.

"(2) Each grantee shall contract with a nonprofit organization with
 experience in organizing community projects, or a local organization
 that coordinates with a statewide nonprofit organization, to facilitate
 the planning process and to provide technical assistance.

"(3) Each grantee shall solicit community participation in the
 planning process, including the participation of the local public health
 authority, any federally qualified health centers located in the district

and every coordinated care organization with members residing in the
 district.

"(4) The Oregon Health Authority shall contract with a statewide
nonprofit organization with experience in supporting school-based
health centers to create tools and provide support to grantees during
the community engagement and planning process.

"(5) At the conclusion of the two-year planning process:

8 "(a) The authority shall select at least six school-based health cen-9 ter medical sponsors to each receive operating funds based on a 10 school-based health center funding formula, to open a state-certified 11 school-based health center in respective grantee school districts or 12 education service districts.

"(b) The authority may select up to four school districts or educa-13 tion service districts to each receive operating funds, for a five-year 14 period, to pilot an approach to providing school-based health services 15 as an alternative model to the school-based health center model. The 16 alternative approach pilot programs may be designed to focus services 17 on a specific community need, such as a need for mental health ser-18 vices, school nursing services, dental services, primary care or 19 trauma-informed services, and must: 20

"(A) Involve a partnership with a coordinated care organization, a
 federally qualified health center, a local public health authority or
 another major medical sponsor; and

"(B) Identify a process for billing insurance, medical assistance or
 another third-party payer, or identify other funding, for the cost of
 services; and

"(6) By the end of the fourth year of the five-year period described
in subsection (5)(b) of this section:

"(a) Each school district or education service district piloting an
 alternative approach to providing school-based health services either

commits to establish a school-based health center or proposes an al ternative model to the authority and the Legislative Assembly.

"(b) The authority may use the data collected and the recommendations of the school districts to adopt rules establishing flexible,
outcome-based criteria for certification of the alternative approaches
developed and implemented by the four grantees.

7 "SECTION 2. ORS 413.225 is amended to read:

8 "413.225. (1) As used in this section:

9 "(a) 'Community health center or safety net clinic' means a nonprofit 10 medical clinic or school-based health center that provides primary physical 11 health, vision, dental or mental health services to low-income patients with-12 out charge or using a sliding scale based on the income of the patient.

13 "(b) 'School-based health center' means a health clinic that:

"(A) Is located on the grounds of a school in a school district or on the
 grounds of a school operated by a federally recognized Indian tribe or tribal
 organization;

"(B) Is organized through collaboration among schools, communities and
 health providers, including public health authorities;

"(C) Is administered by a county, state, federal or private organization that ensures that certification requirements are met and provides project funding through grants, contracts, billing or other sources of funds;

"(D) Is operated exclusively for the purpose of providing health servicessuch as:

24 "(i) Primary care;

25 "(ii) Preventive health care;

<sup>26</sup> "(iii) Management and monitoring of chronic health conditions;

27 "(iv) Behavioral health care;

28 "(v) Oral health care;

29 "(vi) Health education services; and

30 "(vii) The administration of vaccines recommended by the Centers for

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"(E) Provides health services to children and adolescents by licensed or
 certified health professionals; and

4 "(F) May provide one or more health services to children and adolescents
5 by:

6 "(i) A student enrolled in a professional medical, nursing or dental pro-7 gram at an accredited university if the health service is within the student's 8 field of study and training; or

9 "(ii) An expanded practice dental hygienist holding a permit issued under
10 ORS 680.200 for oral health care.

"(2)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall award grants to community health centers or safety net clinics, including school-based health centers, to ensure the capacity of each grantee to provide health care services to underserved or vulnerable populations[, within the limits of funds provided by the Legislative Assembly for this purpose].

"(b) The authority shall work with the Centers for Medicare and
Medicaid Services and stakeholders to identify additional sources of
funding for school-based health center expenditures for which federal
financial participation is available under Title XIX or Title XXI of the
Social Security Act.

"(3) The authority shall provide outreach for the Health Care for All Oregon Children program, including development and administration of an application assistance program, and including grants to provide funding to organizations and local groups for outreach and enrollment activities for the program, within the limits of funds provided by the Legislative Assembly for this purpose.

"(4) The authority shall, using funds allocated by the Legislative Assem-bly:

"(a) Provide funds for the expansion and continuation of school-based
 health centers that are operating on July 29, 2013, and that become certified

1 under ORS 413.223;

"(b) Direct funds to communities with certified school-based health centers and to communities planning for certified school-based health centers;
and

5 "(c) Create a pool of funds available to provide financial incentives to:

6 "(A) Increase the number of school-based health centers certified as pa-7 tient centered primary care homes without requiring school-based health 8 centers to be certified as patient centered primary care homes;

9 "(B) Improve the coordination of the care of patients served by coordi-10 nated care organizations and school-based health centers; and

11 "(C) Improve the effectiveness of the delivery of health services through 12 school-based health centers to children who qualify for medical assistance.

"(5) The authority shall by rule adopt criteria for awarding grants and
 providing funds in accordance with this section.

"(6) The authority shall analyze and evaluate the implementation of theHealth Care for All Oregon Children program.

17 "SECTION 3. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-18 ation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the 19 biennium beginning July 1, 2019, out of the General Fund, the amount 10 of \$950,000, which may be expended for providing the planning grants 21 and funding for pilot programs described in section 1 of this 2019 Act. 22 "SECTION 4. Section 1 of this 2019 Act and the amendments to ORS 23 413.225 by section 2 of this 2019 Act become operative on July 1, 2019.

"<u>SECTION 5.</u> Section 1 of this 2019 Act is repealed on January 2,
2026.

<u>"SECTION 6.</u> This 2019 Act being necessary for the immediate
 preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is
 declared to exist, and this 2019 Act takes effect on its passage.".

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
