As a small business owner and NFIB member, I would like to share with you why I oppose Cap & Trade - and ask you to stand-up for small businesses and Oregon families by opposing SB 1530.

After hearing some of the testimony before the Committee yesterday, it seemed to me that some who testified as proponents of the bill, were very little aware of the meaning and any detriment attributed to the name "climate change". They interject the term as a buzzword, or as we would in "name dropping". No explanation or example was given as to how they would be impacted adversely. The focus rather was on the benefit to them of the portion of taxes the State will collect, should this measure pass, and the amount that would flow to them and the members of their group. I am disappointed that some groups are singled out for express preference to these monies, rather than adherence to the "self-evident truth that all men are created equal."

The committee, it seems to me, assumes this measure will be passed without question and that minds of the committee are not likely to be altered by the many who will yet testify as either for or against it. I hope and pray that I am wronging that particular. I do not personally believe the ostensible basis for this bill, namely, the detriment to our climate due to the level of carbon emissions, has been proven beyond reasonable doubt. That purported detriment is doubtful and the supporting arguments tenuous and, among scientists, arguable.

This will only deepen the economic division between Portland and rural Oregon. Sadly we are experiencing a house divided. This bill should it pass over all the expressed opposition will augment that divide.

We know that this program if adopted, would increase energy costs for all Oregonians in the form of higher utility bills and higher prices at the pump with virtually no impact on the global climate. For small-business families, the impact of higher energy costs would be twice as painful. We'll pay once for our household energy needs - and then a second time for our businesses. As a longtime small business owner I am among that number. An additional burden and aggravation is the regulation and reporting which the rule making bureaucracy will require. One of the answers to the committee question about oversight was that a report would be required to the legislators every FIVE years. Every five years is equivalent to no oversight at all.
