**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 5202**

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after the first semicolon delete the rest of the
2 line and delete line 3 and insert “creating new provisions; amending section
3 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, sections 1 and 2, chapter 661, Oregon
4 Laws 2019, and sections 18, 28 and 37, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019; re-
5 pealing section 14, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019; and declaring an emer-
6 gency.”.

7 Delete lines 5 through 25 and insert:

8 **“SECTION 1.** Section 1, chapter 661, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to
9 read:

10 **“Sec. 1.** The amounts authorized, as provided by ORS 286A.035, for issu-
11 ance of general obligation bonds of the state during the 2019-2021 biennium,
12 notwithstanding section 9, chapter 570, Oregon Laws 2017, are as follows:

25 **“SECTION 4.** Section 18, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to
 26 read:

27 **“Sec. 18.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, at the request of
 28 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department
 29 consults with Multnomah County School District No. 7, the State Treasurer
 30 is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585

1 in an amount that produces \$2,331,872 in net proceeds for the purposes de-
2 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated
3 by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

4 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be
5 transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Develop-
6 ment Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for distribution to
7 Multnomah County School District No. 7 for construction of a school-based
8 health center at Reynolds High School in Troutdale. The project also in-
9 cludes [*renovation of existing classroom space to establish a temporary health*
10 *center that will be restored upon completion of the permanent health center*]
11 **acquisition and installation of medical equipment for the health**
12 **center.**

13 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
14 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
15 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,
16 and is authorized based on the following findings:

17 “(a) Funding construction of public school facilities finances public edu-
18 cation; and

19 “(b) Student access to healthcare services improves educational outcomes
20 and attainment.

21 **“SECTION 5.** Section 28, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to
22 read:

23 **“Sec. 28.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, at the request of
24 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department
25 consults with the Oregon Business Development Department, the State
26 Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to
27 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$[20] **27** million in net proceeds for the
28 purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional
29 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related
30 costs.

1 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be
2 transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for deposit in
3 the OBDD Economic Development Distributions Fund established under
4 section 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, for distribution to the City of
5 Salem for drinking water system improvements.

6 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
7 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
8 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,
9 and is authorized based on the finding that drinking water systems are an
10 integral part of the commercial and industrial infrastructure of this state,
11 and improvements to drinking water systems will promote economic devel-
12 opment in this state.

13 **“SECTION 6.** Section 37, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to
14 read:

15 **“Sec. 37.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, at the request of
16 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department
17 consults with the Department of Transportation, the State Treasurer is au-
18 thorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an
19 amount that produces \$[2] 4 million in net proceeds for the purposes de-
20 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated
21 by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

22 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be
23 transferred to the Department of Transportation for deposit in the DOT
24 Economic Development Distributions Fund established in ORS 461.557 for
25 distribution to the City of Sherwood for pedestrian connection improvements
26 between Sherwood East and West at or near the State Highway 99W and
27 Sunset Boulevard intersection.

28 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
29 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
30 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,

1 and is authorized based on the finding that a safe, efficient and reliable pe-
2 destrian and bicycle transportation network supports the long-term economic
3 development and livability of this state.

4 **“SECTION 7. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2021, at the re-
5 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
6 department consults with the City of Woodburn, the State Treasurer
7 is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to
8 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$7.5 million in net proceeds for
9 the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an addi-
10 tional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay
11 bond-related costs.**

12 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must
13 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic
14 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for
15 distribution to the City of Woodburn for construction of a community
16 center in Woodburn.**

17 **“(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
18 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
19 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
20 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
21 improving access to community services will enhance the economic
22 viability of the region, create jobs and improve the quality of life for
23 the community.**

24 **“SECTION 8. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2021, at the re-
25 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
26 department consults with the City of Eugene, the State Treasurer is
27 authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585
28 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds for the purposes
29 described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount
30 estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related**

1 costs.

2 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must
3 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic
4 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for
5 distribution to the City of Eugene for development of the Eugene
6 Downtown Riverfront Park.

7 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
8 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
9 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
10 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
11 developing an accessible riverfront park will enhance the economic
12 viability of the region through increased tourism, create jobs and im-
13 prove the quality of life for the community.

14 “SECTION 9. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2021, at the re-
15 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
16 department consults with the Willamette Falls Locks Authority, the
17 State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS
18 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$7,055,000 in net pro-
19 ceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus
20 an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary
21 to pay bond-related costs.

22 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must
23 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic
24 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for
25 distribution to the Willamette Falls Locks Authority for restoration
26 of the Willamette Falls navigation canal and locks.

27 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
28 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
29 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
30 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that

1 restoration of the Willamette Falls navigation canal and locks will
2 enhance the economic viability of the region, increase opportunities
3 for commercial transportation and offer opportunities for recreation
4 and transportation.

5 **“SECTION 9a.** Notwithstanding section 2, chapter __, Oregon Laws
6 2020 (Enrolled House Bill 4150), the Willamette Falls Locks Authority
7 is subject to ORS chapters 279A, 279B and 279C with respect to con-
8 tracts that are to be paid, in whole or in part, by proceeds of lottery
9 bonds issued under section 9 of this 2020 Act.

10 **“SECTION 10.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2021, at the re-
11 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
12 department consults with the Oregon Business Development Depart-
13 ment, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursu-
14 ant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million
15 in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this
16 section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer
17 to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

18 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must
19 be transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for
20 deposit in the OBDD Economic Development Distributions Fund es-
21 tablished under section 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, for distrib-
22 ution to the Lyons-Mehama Water District for water system
23 improvements.

24 **“(3)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
25 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
26 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
27 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
28 water systems are an integral part of the commercial and industrial
29 infrastructure of this state, and improvements to water systems will
30 promote economic development in this state.

1 **“SECTION 11.** Section 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, as amended
2 by section 32, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to read:

3 **“Sec. 28.** (1) The OBDD Economic Development Distributions Fund is
4 established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General
5 Fund. Interest earned on the moneys in the OBDD Economic Development
6 Distributions Fund must be credited to the fund. The OBDD Economic De-
7 velopment Distributions Fund consists of moneys deposited in the fund under
8 sections 26 and 27, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, *[and]* sections 27 to 31
9 *[of this 2019 Act]*, **chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, and section 10 of this**
10 **2020 Act** and may include fees, revenues or other income deposited into the
11 fund by the Legislative Assembly.

12 “(2) Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the Oregon
13 Business Development Department for purposes described in sections 26 and
14 27, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, *[and]* sections 27 to 31 *[of this 2019*
15 *Act]*, **chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, and section 10 of this 2020 Act.**

16 **“SECTION 12.** (1) **A public university that is carrying out a qualified**
17 **project shall require each contractor in a contract with an estimated**
18 **cost of \$200,000 or greater to:**

19 **“(a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours**
20 **that workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the con-**
21 **tract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices’ respective ap-**
22 **prenticeship training programs;**

23 **“(b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and**
24 **retention of women, minority individuals and veterans to perform**
25 **work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having at**
26 **least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one**
27 **or more of those groups;**

28 **“(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers;**
29 **and**

30 **“(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide**

1 by the requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this
2 subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract has an
3 estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

4 “(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university
5 that is carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Com-
6 mittee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and
7 Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

8 “(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by ap-
9 prentices;

10 “(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women,
11 minority individuals and veterans; and

12 “(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits
13 provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

14 “(3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in
15 lieu of, the requirements imposed under ORS 350.379.

16 “(4) As used in this section:

17 “(a) ‘Apprentice’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

18 “(b) ‘Apprenticeable occupation’ has the meaning given that term
19 in ORS 660.010.

20 “(c) ‘Apprenticeship training program’ means the total system of
21 apprenticeship that a particular local joint committee, as defined in
22 ORS 660.010, operates, including the local joint committee’s registered
23 standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting,
24 selecting, employing and training apprentices in an apprenticeable
25 occupation.

26 “(d) ‘Minority individual’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
27 200.005.

28 “(e) ‘Qualified project’ means the following capital construction
29 projects:

30 “(A) The Oregon Institute of Technology Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

1 **referenced in section 1 (1)(L) of this 2020 Act;**

2 **“(B) The Oregon State University Arts and Education Complex**
3 **project referenced in section 1 (1)(m) of this 2020 Act;**

4 **“(C) The Portland State University SB1 Renovation and Expansion**
5 **referenced in section 1 (1)(n) of this 2020 Act;**

6 **“(D) The University of Oregon Huestis Hall Renovation referenced**
7 **in section 1 (1)(o) of this 2020 Act; and**

8 **“(E) The Western Oregon University Student Success Center project**
9 **referenced in section 1 (5)(g)(E) of this 2020 Act.**

10 **“(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.**

11 **“(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.**

12 **“SECTION 13. This 2020 Act being necessary for the immediate**
13 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**
14 **declared to exist, and this 2020 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**
