- Black students leave high school and college without a degree at higher rates than do their white counterparts
- Once students have a high school or 4-year degree, they move on to further education at roughly the same rates regardless of race
- There remains a large attainment gap in Bachelor's degrees

Workers are very scarce in Oregon and other states, putting a lid on growth. Going forward, labor markets are expected to remain tight as many in the baby boom population cohort retire Closing the educational attainment gap across race & ethnicity would lead to more than a year's worth of additional workers over the next decade.
