Work Session

HB 2002

Converts mandatory minimum sentences for specified felonies other than murder to presumptive sentences.

HB 2003

Expands membership of Public Defense Services Commission from seven to nine members.

HB 2172

Converts mandatory minimum sentences for specified felonies other than murder to presumptive sentences.

HB 2239

Directs each judicial district to ensure veterans who are criminal defendants have access to veterans' court programs.

HB 2367

Establishes Oregon Right to Rest Act.

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HB 2825

Requires sentencing court to consider as mitigation evidence defendant was subjected to domestic abuse that was significant factor in criminal behavior.

HB 3117

Prohibits prosecuting attorney from conditioning plea agreement on stipulation of defendant's ability to pay attorney fees for appointed counsel or other defense fees and expenses.

HB 3134

Replaces references to vehicle accident and vehicle collision with vehicle crash.

HB 3136

Provides that person who operates motor vehicle upon premises open to public or highways of this state is deemed to have given consent to submit to drug recognition evaluation under certain circumstances.

HB 3140

Makes changes to statutes related to operating vehicle or boat while under influence of intoxicants that reference controlled substances to clarify applicability to psilocybin.

HB 3327 **

**Subsequent Referral(s) to Ways and Means

Extends sunset for authorization to Department of Justice to assist victims of domestic violence and sexual assault with housing needs until January 2, 2024.

HB 3374

Provides that when court reduces felony conviction to Class A misdemeanor after person's completion of probation, person for purposes of law is deemed not to have been previously convicted of felony.

Public Hearing

HB 3117

(2:15 - 2:30 pm) Prohibits prosecuting attorney from conditioning plea agreement on stipulation of defendant's ability to pay attorney fees for appointed counsel or other defense fees and expenses.

HB 2367

(2:30 - 2:45 pm) Establishes Oregon Right to Rest Act.

Note change: HB 2162 and HB 2929 Work Sessions removed.
