Work Session

SB 763

Provides that person may not engage in business as pharmaceutical representative without obtaining license from Director of Department of Consumer and Business Services.

SB 764

Provides that Attorney General and court must presume that resolution agreement that ends dispute over alleged infringement of patent or violation of other protection for protected drug has anticompetitive effects if alleged infringer receives item of value as part of or in connection with resolution agreement or if alleged infringer agrees to limit or stop researching, developing, manufacturing, marketing or selling competing drug.

SB 143 **

Extends sunset for tax credit for rural medical care.

**Subsequent Referral(s) to Tax Expenditures

SB 157 **

Enacts express sunset for exemption of medical marijuana registry cardholder or primary caregiver from tax imposed on retail sale of marijuana items.

SB 719

Provides that certain aggregate data relating to reportable disease investigations are not confidential or exempt from disclosure under public records law unless data could reasonably lead to identification of individual.

SB 722

Clarifies that aggregate data, statistical compilations and reports relating to reportable disease investigations are not confidential or exempt from disclosure under public records law unless data, compilations and reports could reasonably lead to identification of individual.

SB 700

Establishes Oregon Brain Injury Trust Fund Board to administer programs paid for by Oregon Brain Injury Trust Fund to provide service coordination and skills training to individuals with brain injuries, provide educational information to increase awareness and understanding of issues and needs related to brain injuries and to provide grants to support research into treatment of brain injuries.

SB 741

Repeals sunset on and obsolete reporting requirement for Central Oregon Health Council.
